All of the above proposed increases apply to both campuses in Vancouver and Okanagan, and are effective May 1, 2018.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A 2% increase in domestic tuition is proposed for all domestic students for 2018-2019 for programs listed in Schedule A. Current Provincial Policy has limited domestic tuition and all mandatory fee increases to 2% for all programs. The University continues to operate in a constrained funding environment. Even though the Province of BC is unlikely to make further cuts to the operating grants of the university, and will provide assistance for mandated salary increases, any inflationary costs including non-mandated salary increases must be absorbed or covered by other sources of revenue.

A 2% increase is proposed for new and continuing international students in certificate programs and in programs with standard rates. A range of 2-3% increase in international tuition is proposed for continuing international undergraduate and graduate students in programs with specialized rates, as set out in Schedule A. A 2% increase in tuition is also proposed for new incoming international graduate students in the Okanagan for the Master of Arts in Faculty of Education (Full Time), Master of Arts in Faculty of Education (Part Time), Master of Education (Part Time), and Master of Management.

These moderate increases in tuition will allow the University to continue to invest in teaching and research excellence.

A 3% increase in tuition is proposed for new incoming international graduate students in the Professional Master of Business Administration, Master of Business Analytics, Master of Data Science, Master of Geomatics for Environmental Management, Master of Global Surgical Care, and Master of High Performance Coaching and Technical Leadership. These programs were approved after December 2015, and therefore were not included with the program tuition rates previously approved by the Board.

A 9.2% increase is proposed for international unclassified, qualified, visiting, access studies, and auditing students. This aligns with the approved rate of increase for new incoming international undergraduate students entering their programs effective May 1, 2018. This increase was determined by calculating the average per-credit international tuition rate for each undergraduate degree program weighted by the number of courses taken by non-degree studies students in 2016W.

A 5% increase is proposed for international unclassified students taking graduate-level Master of Laws in Common Laws courses. This aligns with the approved rate of increase for new incoming international students in the Master of Laws in Common Laws program effective May 1, 2018.

The revenue from tuition increases is used to maintain and enhance the calibre of the university’s teaching, learning, and student services and experiences. Most of the incremental tuition revenue will be allocated to the Faculties to support teaching, learning, and research infrastructure. Tuition allocations will also be made to student financial support programs and to fund centrally-administered student services and supports.

All increases apply to both campuses and apply to programs and courses commencing on or after May 1, 2018.

Under the Guidelines of Policy 71, the Vancouver and Okanagan Provosts, VP Students and AVP Students, Okanagan, conducted a consultation process and engaged with the student body on information related to the tuition proposal. A communication campaign was developed to provide information and to encourage feedback regarding the 2018-2019 tuition proposal.

DESCRIPTION & RATIONALE

Tuition for Domestic Undergraduate and Graduate Students

A 2% increase in domestic tuition is proposed for all domestic students for 2018-2019 for programs listed in Schedule A. This increase applies to both campuses.

Current provincial government policy has limited domestic tuition and all mandatory fee increases for 2018-2019 to 2% for all programs, including differentiated, post-baccalaureate and professional graduate programs. The Tuition Limit Policy has been in place since 2005.

The university continues to operate in a constrained funding environment. Even though the Government of BC is likely to sustain the current operating grants of

the University, and will provide assistance for some staff and faculty salary increases, any inflationary costs (including cost pressures arising from non-supported salary increases and the increasing cost of library acquisitions) must be absorbed or covered by other sources of revenue. Higher expenses with no corresponding revenue increase can lead to a deficit, and the university is not allowed to run operating budget deficits. A modest increase in tuition is part of the solution. This helps the university to continue investing in teaching and learning excellence, supporting students, and enhancing the student experience.

The principles used to guide developing the 2018-19 domestic tuition include:

1. Tuition fees will be the same for UBC Vancouver and UBC Okanagan for comparable programs.
2. Annual planning will be directed by the University's longer-term goals.
3. Resources required will be based on measures consistent with those goals.
4. Tuition increases in 2018-2019, for domestic students, will be based on current government policy.
5. UBC will assist domestic students unable to start or continue their studies for financial reasons. Bursary support will be provided to eligible students (Policy 72).

Tuition for Continuing International Undergraduate Students

On December 3, 2015, the Board approved increases in tuition for new incoming students for three academic years: 2016-2017, 2017-2018, and 2018-2019. The Board also approved limiting the annual increases to no more than 5% for the subsequent four years, or until graduation from their current degree program, whichever is shorter, for international undergraduate students entering their degree programs in 2016-2017, 2017-2018, or 2018-2019. The actual percentage increase proposed is to be reviewed at the end of each academic year.

On December 6, 2016, a 3% increase in tuition in 2017-2018 for continuing international undergraduate students who entered their degree programs in 2016-2017 (on or after May 1, 2016 and prior to May 1, 2017) was proposed and approved by the Board.

Upon review, a 3% increase in tuition for continuing international undergraduate students who entered their degree programs in 2017-2018 (on or after May 1, 2017 and prior to May 1, 2018) is proposed.

It is proposed that continuing international undergraduate students who entered UBC on or after May 1, 2015 and prior to May 1, 2017 will continue to have their tuition increased at 3% per annum for their current degree programs. Those who entered UBC prior to May 1, 2015 will have their tuition increased at 2% per annum for their current degree programs (these students were "grandparented" when the Board approved the new rate increase for continuing international students).

These tuition increases are applied to maintain and enhance UBC's ability to make investments that will strengthen the teaching, learning and research mission, and excellence, of the University.

Tuition for International Students in Graduate Programs

A 2-3% increase in tuition is proposed for continuing international graduate students in the following graduate programs and courses as set out in Schedule A:

- All international graduate students in programs with standard rates, including full-time and part-time programs;
- All international graduate students in programs with specialized rates.

The annual increase for continuing international students aligns with Statistics Canada's finding that, on average, international students enrolled in Canadian programs experience a 3% to 5% increase in graduate and undergraduate tuition, respectively.

A 2% increase in tuition is proposed to new, incoming international graduate students entering the following programs in the Okanagan on or after May 1, 2018:

- Master of Arts in Faculty of Education (Full Time),
- Master of Arts in Faculty of Education (Part Time),
- Master of Education (Part Time), and
- Master of Management.

In December 2015, these programs were excluded from three years of benchmarking to ensure that enrolment targets were achieved.

A 3% increase in tuition is proposed to new, incoming international graduate students entering the following programs on or after May 1, 2018:

- Professional Master of Business Administration,
- Master of Business Analytics,
- Master of Data Science,
- Master of Engineering Leadership,
- Master of Geomatics for Environmental Management,
- Master of Global Surgical Care,
- Master of Health Leadership and Policy, and
- Master of High Performance Coaching and Technical Leadership.

These programs were approved after December 2015, and therefore were not included with the programs approved by the Board, at that time.

Tuition for Continuing Students in Specified Graduate Programs with Specialized Rates

It is proposed that continuing students in the following graduate programs with specialized rates who started in their current degree programs prior to May 1, 2018 will continue to pay the same rate of tuition until program completion. This applies to both domestic and international students in these specified graduate programs:

- Master of Business Administration
- Master of Engineering Leadership
- Master of Health Leadership and Policy, and
- Master of Management (except Bachelor Dual Degree Option).

Other Tuition Increases

A 9.2% increase is proposed for international unclassified, qualified, visiting, access studies, and auditing students. This aligns with the approved rate of increase for new incoming international undergraduate students entering their programs effective May 1, 2018. This increase was determined by calculating the average per-credit international tuition rate for each undergraduate degree program weighted by the number of courses taken by non-degree studies students in 2016W.

A 5% increase is proposed for international unclassified students taking graduate-level Master of Laws in Common Laws courses. This aligns with the approved rate of increase for new incoming international students in the Master of Laws in Common Laws program, effective May 1, 2018. The Master of Laws in Common Laws program was included in the aforementioned Board approval, for three academic years, granted on December 3, 2015.

SCHEDULE Implementation Timeline

The proposed increases, if approved, will apply to all domestic and international students in specified programs as set out in Schedule A for the academic year of 2018-19, effective May 1, 2018

CONSULTATION Relevant Units, Internal & External Constituencies

Under the Guidelines of Policy 71, the Vancouver and Okanagan Provosts, VP Students and Deputy Vice-Chancellor jointly conducted a consultation process to communicate the rationale and principles underlying the 2018-2019 tuition proposal.

The consultation was conducted over the period of October 10 and November 7.

The student consultation process included the following components:

- Meetings with the leadership of the Alma Mater Society (AMS) and Graduate Student Society (GSS) on UBC's Vancouver campus, and the Students' Union on UBC's Okanagan campus.

- Tuition consultation website featuring:

 - Confidential feedback form, open between October 10 and November 7.
- A communication plan encouraging students to review and share their feedback on the tuition proposal

 - Social Media Toolkit shared with campus partners

**Submission to the UBC Board of Governors regarding the Annual Tuition Increases
November 7th, 2017**

Dear Board of Governors,

This submission is being made on behalf of the Alma Mater Society (AMS) of UBC Vancouver in response to the consultation opened on October 10th, 2017 on the annual general tuition increase of domestic tuition by 2%, thesis-based tuition by 2%, non-instructional fees by 2%, and continuing international tuition by 2-3%.

We appreciate that the University has taken efforts to improve the annual consultation process this year. We support the enhanced level of information provided by the University online regarding the allocation of tuition and student fees.

We hope that the University will recognize the magnitude of student comments this year regarding personal finances and the fairness regarding continuing tuition increases. If the University is going to have continuing tuition increases they need to be clearly advertised to students when they initially apply to UBC. Furthermore, UBC needs to review the affect that annual increases can have on higher cost programs where a 2% increase is a significant additional burden placed on the student.

If the University is going to have annual tuition increases there needs to be a commitment for continued development and improvement of services and supporting resources that a student may access. Additionally, there should be a formal process to update students on these developments and improvements on an annual basis.

We hope to work with the University to ensure that we explore new avenues to prioritize student affordability. As per the 2014 student referendum and the AMS Policy on UBC and Student Affordability, the AMS opposes all tuition increase beyond the 2% domestic cap.

We would like to thank the Board of Governors for their continued commitment to ensuring that all student voices are heard at the Board of Governors and throughout the University. We hope to see this continue and we look forward to working with UBC to make education affordable and accessible to all current and future UBC students.

4. INDIVIDUAL STUDENT SUBMISSIONS

In total, there were 1799 individual student responses regarding the international tuition proposal. This marks a large increase from the 1186 individual student responses received during the 2016 consultation. The verbatim comments are provided in Appendix 2.

Methodology

The categories for this analysis were developed through an initial thematic coding to identify the primary codes. A subsequent pass was done to ensure sufficient specificity to capture the range of issues and opinions being presented by the data. A final pass was done to ensure alignment with coding. Comments could be coded into multiple themes.

Summary of respondents

Respondents were asked for specific identifiers, specifically their degree type and whether they are domestic or international students.

THEMES WITHIN THE “AGAINST INCREASE” CATEGORY

Within the category of “Against Increase,” there were several themes that emerged. Because of multi-coding of the comments, the categories should not be considered mutually exclusive (e.g. comments about reducing costs can also be comments about construction). As well, there are a series of general remarks that were against the increase but did not contain additional reasons². The full set of verbatim comments can be found in Appendix 2.

Several themes were much more visible in the comments this year including personal/peer financial situation, needing more value, and the effect of tuition increases on international students.

Each year, the costs of providing a university education increase due to inflationary pressures. In addition to taking action to reduce costs and pursuing other sources of revenue, UBC is proposing:

Increases to reflect inflationary pressures

- a 2% increase in tuition for all domestic students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year.
- a 2% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in graduate programs with standard rates.¹
- a 2% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in certificate programs.
- a 2% to 3% increase in tuition for new incoming international graduate students in [specified graduate programs](#)¹.
- a 2% to 3% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year.
- a 2% increase in non-instructional fees for all students.

Increases to bring international tuition for unclassified, qualifying, visiting, access studies and auditing students in line with general international tuition for programs

- a 9.2% increase for international per credit tuition for unclassified, qualifying, visiting, access studies, and auditing students.²
- a 5% increase for international per credit tuition for unclassified students taking graduate-level Master of Laws in Common Laws courses.³



The University's budget is made up of two parts: the Operating Fund and restricted funds. Your tuition is part of the Operating Fund, which goes to general University operations such as faculties, student services, academic and financial supports, IT, and facilities.



RESTRICTED FUNDS

Tuition fees do not go towards restricted funds. These funds are earmarked for specific purposes like research projects, scholarships, and capital infrastructure projects including new buildings and community spaces.

Research and endowment funds

The [UBC Endowment](#) funds specific research and academic projects, student financial support, and capital infrastructure projects. UBC's Endowment money comes from donors (75%) and land lease revenues (25%).

The University also receives significant [research funding](#), with \$580 million coming last year from NGOs, government, and industry research grants.

Construction costs

Construction and renewal of buildings, walkways, fountains, and public spaces are not funded by tuition fees. They are capital infrastructure projects funded through the UBC Endowment, private donations, government investments, and levies on UBC-owned land.

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
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FINANCIAL PRESSURES

The University is facing financial pressures as costs continue to rise year over year, and revenue sources are constrained. While UBC continues to look for cost savings and other revenue opportunities, the proposed tuition increase is necessary to address inflationary pressures and maintain our commitment to an excellent teaching and learning environment. The increase is also in line with [Provincial Government policy](#) which has, since 2005, capped tuition increases for domestic students to 2% annually.

PROPOSED TUITION INCREASE, 2018/19

UBC is proposing:

Increases to reflect inflationary pressures

- a 2% increase in tuition for all domestic students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year.
- a 2% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in graduate programs with standard rates.¹
- a 2% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in certificate programs.
- a 2% to 3% increase in tuition for new incoming international graduate students in [specified graduate programs](#)¹
- a 2% to 3% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year.
- a 2% increase in non-instructional fees for all students.

Increases to bring international tuition for unclassified, qualifying, visiting, access studies and auditing students in line with general international tuition for programs

- a 9.2% increase for international per credit tuition for unclassified, qualifying, visiting, access studies, and auditing students.²



ALLOCATION PLAN

Tuition revenue is used to maintain and strengthen the University's teaching, learning, and student support services. The allocation plan is designed to ensure the bulk of tuition flows directly to the Faculties to support direct teaching costs and the remainder is allocated to support services that benefit students. The incremental revenue from the proposed tuition and fee increases will be allocated in the same proportions as the current base revenue which is generated from tuition and fees.



HOW IS TUITION CURRENTLY ALLOCATED?

Tuition funds are currently allocated slightly differently depending on the program and type of student.

Faculty funds

In general, the majority of tuition funds go to faculties to support:

- **teaching and learning**, including faculty and staff salaries, equipment purchases, and supplies;
- **faculty-based student services and programming**, including advising and teaching support for students;
- **learning and research infrastructure**, including student advising space, classroom AV upgrades and graduate student space; and,
- **research**, including support for grant applications and negotiations, ethics approval, and patenting and commercialization.

Central supports

The second largest proportion goes towards central supports, such as:

- **infrastructure** including the Library and IT services;
- **student services** including student health, counselling, and career development; and,
- **enrolment services** including exam & classroom scheduling, registration systems, admission, and transcripts and diplomas.

Student Financial Aid

Many programs also have defined student financial aid and financial support mechanisms, which draw a percentage from tuition. These range by program and by type of student.

UBC Excellence Fund


Approximately 7.6% of the undergraduate international student's tuition is allocated to the UBC Excellence Fund. This fund was created in 2016 to support the university's top priorities including the recruitment and retention of exemplary faculty, staff, and students, support world-changing research, and deliver an exceptional learning experience for our students. A total of \$20.2 million is earmarked for 2017/18.


COMMITMENT TO FINANCIAL SUPPORT

In such an environment, tuition fee hikes, however small, should be scorned upon.

Instead of a tuition hike, UBC should look at other avenues such as getting more out of its research investments, control wasteful expenses and perhaps, more importantly, start moving its operations to low cost areas and use the freed space in Vancouver for commercial purposes. I believe that should be the longer term goal. A large body such as UBC moving into a tier-2 city is a win-win for both sides. It seems every year the tuition increases and every year they ask for our feedback making us think that our opinions matter. Of course no one wants a tuition increase. Anything that I say will not change UBC's decision so there is no more that I can say on this topic.

Increases for existing international students has the potential to make it much harder for existing students to afford tuition. It's easier for new students to calibrate their budgeting for a certain tuition cost than for existing international students, who are already stretching budgets and dealing with fluctuating exchange rates, to find even more money to pay tuition.

For the amount of tuition I am currently paying I don't feel that the facilities and general student services reflect the standards I would expect. I understand that UBC is a large university that has many expenses but for the average student the experience is not significantly worth the increase in tuition compared to universities of a similar stature. I think students would feel more comfortable paying more if they felt that environment they learn is worth the increase in tuition yearly.

To whom it may concern,

Please consider this message a response to the tuition proposal for 2018/19. I am an international student studying in the [...] program at UBC. I feel obligated to voice my concern about a further tuition increase. I hope this note clearly communicates the distress this proposed increase is causing my colleagues and myself. Since I began my doctorate at UBC I have faced a number of fee increases. While these changes have made life harder for all the graduate students in my department I must emphasise the particular pressures experienced by international students. International students in research-intensive programs can almost never rely on independent financing to survive a doctoral program. Their work rights are restricted and they are often ineligible for awards and bursaries offered in Canada and in their home countries. In my department doctoral students are almost always funded for four years even as the average completion time is well over five years. I cannot over-emphasise how profoundly damaging further fee increases will be to the future of our department without substantial increases to base scholarships.

I implore UBC administration to consider the particularly deleterious effect graduate student financial pressure is having on the unit's broader international standing. Over the last several years I have witnessed [...] move from a department widely considered a preeminent site for elite study to a much less desirable option. My field is relatively small and one senses the surprisingly rapid transformation in the department's ability to attract talent in this time. The prevailing understanding in the broader research community is this: local property, rental, and associated economic crises have rendered Vancouver unviable for almost any graduate student to set up a healthy life. I personally know several high-level graduate students who decided not to bother applying to UBC because the the real and opportunity costs of studying in Vancouver are prohibitive. Potential applicants to our department's graduate programs are some of the most productive researchers in the field and these students are now producing valued research in other universities in North America, Europe, and Australia.

These fee increases also have broader effects. It is widely recognised that potential faculty hires are looking elsewhere with the understanding that the best graduate research will no longer be done at UBC. Many students enrolled in our programs have relocated outside of the city (including returning to their home countries) over the last few years to finish their research remotely. Beyond the intrinsic disadvantages of empty hallways and fissured networks, these pressures have seen some students enter into early postdoc positions early, elsewhere, and subsequent research written up so that UBC misses out on an institutional affiliation credit. In the quest to squeeze relatively small amounts of money from graduate students living in literal poverty, the university is closing off significant avenues by which prestige and global reputation is accrued.

Since I began life at UBC, in [...], the yearly rent I expect to pay for a room within 1.5 hours of campus has increased to almost \$10 000. My fellowship remains around the \$18 000 mark, with no extra sources of support for research costs. This situation is untenable. When my scholarship winds up at the end of the year I will begin to directly incur fees and will experience these increases even more sharply. I will continue to support potential students in their decisions to apply for graduate study away from Vancouver, as almost everyone else in my field now does with the growing realisation that serious economic and social crises face prospective researchers in the city. I feel it is in the best long-term interests of the University for these fee increases to be reassessed. I ask that international student fees in research-heavy programs be quarantined from broader increases with an understanding that these students are particularly vulnerable.

I believe the fees is already very high. Also it is higher than what domestic students pay. We are taught by the same professors, in the same classrooms with the same facilities, yet we are already paying more than domestic students. This demonstrates UBC treats domestic and international students unequally.

Another hike for international students is totally unjustified.

No 2% increase because it may seem small it's going to add up and I don't see it helping me further my education. Thank You

The current tuition's are high enough. UBC fees are deterring new students with potential from coming here. As opposed to hiking up the fees the university needs to evaluate their expenses to see the departments that are using way too much money. This will be a very unpopular move among the students here at UBC!

I understand that this raise is to compensate for the inflation and economical fluctuations, however, I believe these factors impact students as much as - maybe even more - they influence the budget planning of the university. Hence, I only approve this raise if our (The students) scholarships, fellowships and payrolls increase by the same value. We are facing the raise in housing ourselves even the on-campus residents are very expensive, so I think putting more debits on the students is unfair and may affect our focus on school and shift it towards how can we pay for everything e.g. Grocery, transportation, housing, tuition and flights for international students.

Thanks for your understanding and carrying on this survey which shows how much the administration cares about the students, Hopefully my opinion influence your decision.

First and foremost, UBC should be treated as a higher education institution. Instead, I see the campus being used as a business and status symbol. Life on campus has gotten extremely expensive without an apparent increase in campus quality. Over the last 2 years, there has been a constant stream of construction which has closed walkways on campus, shut down buildings and had students need to reroute their paths and time (Hebb shut down scheduled in November has shortened laboratory work time for students in physics labs this semester) in order to accommodate it all. Professors who, despite having a class full of negative feedback on teaching evaluations, continue to be allowed to teach courses in which they do not supply ample instruction, compassion, or fair assessment. Despite the issues, UBC still claims to pride itself on the quality of its institution and wants to increase tuition again, even though students see no improvement in their campus as a result.

I have read through the tuition consultation and have broken down a few issues I have with the way UBC is deciding to spend our money below:

UBC Excellence Fund: This sounds like a lot of money, recently added to student expenses, that doesn't need to be spent. The cost to attend UBC keeps increasing, and there has been no increase to campus or learning quality (if anything, projects have been detrimental to quality) and the increase in tuition puts students who do not come from affluent families in distress, as they have to take out loans or work on top of having a full course load in order to attend this university. The tuition consultation claims that this money goes "...to support the university's top priorities including the recruitment and retention of exemplary faculty, staff, and students, support world-changing research, and deliver an exceptional learning experience for our students," yet I have already laid out an issue with the claimed "exemplary" instruction and quality of learning life supplied at UBC. 7.6% is a large chunk of tuition to go to a fund that appears to have made no lasting effect on student life. If this is necessary, then students should see the effects of this fund in their institution.

Student Financial Aid: University costs are increasing, making it more difficult on all students not from very affluent families. Financial aid should NOT be taken as a notable percentage from other students attending the university for a select few. There are other systems in place to provide financial aid to students (student loans, scholarships, etc). If student financial aid is really necessary, then more award money should be allocated to "needs based awards" and less into "merit based awards". The university should look into the distribution of money coming in and going out of financial aid funds and evaluate how/ where money comes from in order to ensure fair financials for all students.

Faculty funds and central supports: The way student tuition is broken down in the consultation is extremely vague. What percentage of tuition goes to what aspects of these funds? How much goes towards the staff at UBC and how much is given back in some sense to its students? Within my peer group, however, I have noticed a general displeasure with two things contained within these funds: student health and counselling services, and exam scheduling. Students feel money in these areas are not being spent effectively.

Counselling services always has a wait list, unless their initial evaluation deems you as someone in need of immediate counselling. More money should be invested into counselling services, as the pressures of attending this institution mean many students would benefit and see an improvement in their lives if counselling services were made more available.

Exam scheduling is another issue that needs to be addressed, as some students have speculated it is automated and not reviewed by any person before being released. Courses in the same department at the same year level, or courses students generally take at the same time, consistently seem to be scheduled just outside of the scheduling required for exam hardships. The time of the class is also not taken into consideration; some students plan to take classes at certain times of the day due to commutes, other previous engagements, or for their own mental function. A student who places their classes in the afternoon for one or more of these reasons will almost certainly have at least one exam in the morning or late at night. More consideration for student schedules should be made when putting together the exam schedules.

It appears to me, as it does to much of the aware senior student body, that UBC is putting more money into appearing a high standard, flashy university than it is into actually being a high standard university. The university should re-evaluate the amount of money going into superfluous projects and expenses and attempt to redirect some of that money into supplying a stable, high quality learning environment for its students.

Unless all staff and administration are also suffering and agree to taking a 2% pay cut, then I am in strong opposition of this proposition and will remain so. While I love learning, attending classes, and I am well aware of how privileged I am to do so at UBC, the institutionalization of universities is horrendous and an extremely upsetting aspect. If I didn't need a piece of paper to be able to do the job I want to do, I would not be in post- secondary at all.

I don't support increasing the tuition fees, particularly for graduates student as that results in adverse impact on the research and development, noting that this would discourage students from pursuing post graduate degrees.

We're broke stop increasing tuition as if money grows on trees. If anything lower it instead of increasing. Goodness. This makes me angry.

Universities must keep in mind that education needs to be universally accessible. This principle is often overlooked when profit-maximizing objectives become the main concern.

As a domestic student on a tight budget, I feel as though charging us more (even 2% which translates to something like \$150) is a burden that some cannot bear. This would put even more strain on families that have barely enough to begin with. I feel as though the better solution would be to charge domestic students 0.5%-1% more and make international students pick up the slack with a 3-4% increase. Remember: British Columbians should be able to study at the University of British Columbia!

Government funding increases should match increases from student funding (ie. 2% raise to students should be matched), which appears to be the case this year over last. If not, the additional step of pressuring the government should be taken - UBC is 'too big to fail' and the government will be forced to fund it.

Increasing international student tuition by larger percentages is an acceptable practice, and some of the \$\$ should be spent ensuring success, so those students will stay at UBC long enough to pay. However, international tuition needs to be distributed more evenly, not just to the faculties with the most international students. Under the current system, services such as the libraries, and programs without international transferability, such as law, suffer most from rising costs and inability to mediate with international student tuition.

Funding for student aid needs to start increasing to help out more students - living in Vancouver is also increasingly expensive, and when UBC charges market rates for student housing, students will have affordability issues in attending UBC that aren't just related to tuition. It would be great if future income from endowments is contributed more to student aid and less to capital projects (although, there are more capital projects that need to be completed to finish making UBC into the best possible university it can be)

International student fees are already ridiculously high and put a lot of stress on both the student and their parents. I know that some of the tuition goes to helping other international students in need but it is a little unfair as a lot of us can barely afford our education.

Please don't make me pay more. Why can't you just decrease spending on construction? We don't need sidewalk replacements ever 2 years. We don't need a new fountain and we don't need new centerpieces and totem poles that nobody will see.

As someone from a low-income household I find that the proposed tuition and fee increase will be incredibly straining on my budget, the the budgets of those like me. UBC is a fine school, but it's impossible to enjoy the various amenities the school provides if I'm always working in order to pay for tuition. UBC has approximately 60,000 students and brings in over 2.39 Billion CAD in revenue each year, a 2% increase would draw in an additional 40 Million (CAD). What does UBC require these funds for?

I was surprised with "Total operating revenues 2016/17" chart in the information. From the infographic shown on Imagine day UBC is comprised of nearly 50% of domestic students and 50% of international students, if I am not mistaken. And if the approximate international tuition is 4 times the tuition of a domestic student I was expecting to see international students taking up a larger part of the chart.

I believe an increase in revenue is necessary for the University. However, I don't believe that an increase in tuition, from any demographic, is the best approach to getting that increase in revenue. In September 2015, the UN international conference adopted 17 global sustainable development goals. Goal number 4 was to Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all. I think UBC can go a long ways in this goal by trying to implement changes in tuition fees all together.

Looking at the charts more than 500 million is collected by the University each year and only 74 million dollars is returned to students in need. With these number only under 10% of the students at UBC can seek out financial aid that would be able to cover just their tuition costs.

I believe one of the most frustrating concern for students currently is the rising new buildings, renovations and infrastructure upgrades currently happening at UBC. Nearly each new building can be seen with students commenting: "this is where my tuition money is going". However, looking back at the demographics. These construction costs are not funded by tuition fees. They are capital infrastructure projects funded through the UBC Endowment, private donations, government investments, and levies on UBC-owned land. However, this information was not even showed in the revenues at all. Instead of using these funds to fund capital infrastructure projects wouldn't it be better suited to fund the education for the citizens of the future?

Here are a list of spending costs that are omitted from context section as the section was conveniently titled operating expenses rather than showing all expenses.

Tall Wood building: The project is expected to cost approximately \$51.5 million, with \$47.07 million financed by UBC

New Aquatic Center: Construction of the \$39-million facility began in August, 2014.

Orchard Commons: Construction of the \$127-million building

Just taking the following funds for the above buildings and the current funds to financial needs would provide enough funds to nearly half of all students to cover all their tuition costs. I believe that this is a feat that students would more proud to express rather than being known as the University with the tallest wooden building in Western Canada.

Many of these buildings are known for being sustainable however the actual action of building more infrastructure and then charging students more for tuition is not a sustainable cycle. Just like fossil fuels are a non-renewable income so is the financial income of students and their families.

To end I would like to paraphrase a message from Dr. Santa Ono that he said last year at a Prof talks meeting in Totem Park. He said he has been to Universities where so much money has been spent on beautiful buildings and upgrading the campus however not enough was spent on the student experience and improving the culture of the university. Ironically, I think this is exactly what is currently happening with UBC.

Fair but could have a better representation of how our fee is used within the different areas.

Please do not raise tuition. There are already too many barriers to entry for post-secondary education. Thank you for soliciting my opinion.

It's understandable when tuition increases follow general inflation, however many parts of the tuition increase are far greater than inflation, and in all my years at the university I've never seen attempts to reduce the financial burden of students. I've never seen any proposed changes that don't increase tuition beyond inflation

UBC operates more like a private company than an academic institution, trying to squeeze ever dollar out of students and their families making students grades literally dependant on how much money they pay for courses (buying textbooks or online acces for homework) and this is rediculous considering how much money they receive from the government

I have no interest in donating to a private company after graduation and won't until the university starts valuing academic achievement over financial contributions from students

I'm already living below the poverty line here in Vancouver and the fact that there is going to be ANOTHER tuition increase for the next academic year is stressing me out.

NO, PLEASE NO!

Please consider a flat fee increase, rather than a percent fee increase. Increasing fees for all domestic students by 2% will disproportionately burden professional students who pay higher tuition fees. In my case, this fee increase amounts to a charge of over \$1,000, paid over the remainder of my degree. Also, as fees increase it becomes more difficult to pay the fees up front- when I was an undergraduate student and a masters student at [...] I was able to defer fall-tuition fees until the end of the term, which I found extremely helpful. Consider allowing fees to be deferred until later, so that professional students don't need to withdraw large sums of from their line of credit until later in the year, and so that it is easier for all students to budget around loans, scholarships, graduate stipends, etc.

It looks like the proposed fee increase will affect all domestic students, including those currently enrolled. I had the opportunity to select from several professional programs, and tuition fees was one consideration - it is unfair to increase the fees of students who are in programs from which they cannot realistically withdraw. The university should always plainly present the "expected fees" to incoming students, and market themselves to students more honestly.

Please don't raise tuition prices any more. It is extremely cheap for domestic students, and I myself as an international student am paying a very large amount of money to attend school here. If anything, I would suggest offering more financial aid and scholarship opportunities. I already have to take out loans in order to pay for school and my family has no way of paying a penny more. For my family in particular, we have three kids in college at the same time and we all attend expensive universities. We already pay enough. There is no need to raise the price. UBC has plenty of money and is very rich- you know this. Stop charging us more than the absolute minimum it costs for us to go here. Thank you.

It appears that there is no shortage of international students willing to pay for access to the local education system, and in turn the residency and economic benefits that represents. The increases proposed for domestic students should therefore be reduced or eliminated in favour of larger increases in the international per credit tuition for unclassified, qualifying, visiting, access studies, and auditing students at both graduate and undergraduate levels. I would like to see UBC recognize the need to cater to local, regional and national students as well as it appears to have catered to international students during my time in post-secondary education.

I believe a tuition hike is justified based on the parameters provided in the email. UBC continues to be one of the top ranked universities in the world and quality education is not cheap. I don't think most students would agree with the fee hike though, since it any kind of increase in the amount people need to pay is viewed by default as negative without taking circumstances into consideration.

I feel like being an international student we already pay a lot. It would be better to consider increasing tuition fee for international students seriously.

Although a 2% increase may not seem much on a normal undergraduate tuition, a 2% increase on [...] tuition would result in a price increase of over 4K. This seems very unreasonable as our tuition is already the highest in Canada. I do not support this increase, at least as it applies to the [...] tuition.

International students are already paying tremendously more tuition than domestics.

I do not understand the need of increase of the tuition for internationals.

2% is the maximum allowable by government and is also significantly higher than the average rate of inflation.

I would rather see UBC not push for the maximum amount allowable, but understand that the costs of maintaining such an excellent school are significant. I would be happier with 1.8% for domestic students.

Please do not increase tuition as I am currently renting in Vancouver, a city which is in an affordable housing crisis. My cost of living is high enough as it is, and I still have two more co-op terms and one more term of study left of my degree.

It is unfair to increase tuition for international students by a higher percentage than domestic students, especially when international students are already paying much more. In addition, higher tuition prices turn UBC into a school that only the rich can attend, and economic diversity among students is already visibly decreasing every year. UBC should not increase tuition so much without providing more scholarships to help those who need them. UBC is a public college, but every year it feels more and more like a private club for the rich.

I do not think that tuition increase will be a good idea, right now all students are already drowning in debt. Already a lot of students have to decide between eating campus food or saving that money and paying for tuition; and a lot of the students choose tuition over food. It would not be fair to any of the students as the cost is already too much for us.

We come here for education not because we have spare money to waste. We work hard towards our dreams and not all of us come from a middle or high class to support such expenses. We often have to work jobs and work very hard to sustain our academic study. Please do not make this even harder. Students are enduring so much pressure already with study, and many students commit suicide because of the financial, living pressure in UBC. It is not right to ignore such issues and keep increasing tuition. This is simply against human rights. We are not commodities, we are students that have rights. The tuition is high enough compared with the facilities and the quality of courses UBC is providing. As a result, proposing of increasing tuition is unreasonable in the current situation, especially for the international student because it is already high enough. More and more international students are under super financial pressure now. Considering the physical and mental health of students, it should be a good idea or plan for UBC to decrease at least 5-10% of the tuition for the international student or set up more scholarship for international students to motivate their studies and release their financial pressure.

The tuition for international students is a little bit expensive due to no available loan

As an international student, I think tuition fees are really high and we must pay for housing, books, living costs as well as MSP. I would reconsider increasing the amount as most of us can't afford this much and I, for example, have financial difficulties. Thank you, I really hope my feedback will have an impact.

Increasing tuition due to inflation rate is understandable, but the increase fee for domestic student and international student (not the rate) is really not fair. The percentage multiplies the original price can show the huge gap between what is supposed to be increased due to inflation. Since the reason is inflation, it shouldn't be such a huge gap between domestic and international students.

The explanation of where our tuition goes is not specific enough or persuasive enough to make me be happy about this proposal. A large portion of where the money goes to really does not go to me directly.

We already pay things like construction of the buildings and stuff in our fees. I have a strong believe that UBC needs to consider what needs to be fixed and what really is unnecessary. For example, there was a construction right outside my window at 2am. The other morning, I found out what they were doing was simply painting the street signs again. I understand what the increase in tuition fees will go towards, but I think that the University needs to explore other options. I know I along with many others are not having a positive reaction to UBC asking for even more money from us. This is not ok. 2% in the grand scheme of things adds up to a lot of money, especially for international students. This may deter students from choosing UBC to continue their studies.

International students need to pay lots of tuition fees now. Hope the increase rate of tuition fees for International student could be not that much. Thanks.

I understand and accept the changes. For me, cheaper tuition is of course better, but reasonable increase is acceptable.

I think the university is increasing the tuition rates by more than the increase in general prices (i.e. inflation rate).

The following are the historical annual inflation rates in Canada from 2013 to 2016 (2017 numbers are not out yet):

CPI Canada 2016 1.50 % CPI Canada 2015 1.61 % CPI Canada 2014 1.47 % CPI Canada 2013 1.24 %.

Observing these rates, we notice that the 2% is way above the inflation rate in Canada. Hence, the 2% tuition hike overshoots the real increase in prices.

Proposal: adjust the tuition rate hikes to 1.50% not 2%

As an international student already struggling to get by with the current tuition fees and depending on all of my family members to pitch in for my tuition, this tuition raise poses a problem. Although our income isn't low enough to qualify for scholarships, it still makes it difficult to get by because I insisted on attending UBC. To continue attending UBC would become quite a hardship if the tuition is raised and I would like to avoid putting my family under more stress, getting a loan or even stop attending and go back to my home country. I would appreciate it if other measures were taken with the funds currently available.

Would it be possible to raise the domestic tuition a little bit more than the international because I feel like the gap in domestic and international tuition is significantly large what with all the other costs an international student has.

I am against raising the tuition for domestic students.

I don't think you should keep on increasing the student fee.

Do you not think students are poor enough? How are we supposed to keep up with inflated prices of RENT and tuition while not even making a living wage?

I do not approve of an increase in tuition fees.

I approve of the tuition increase to support education in the future. However, I think less money should be spent on merit-based awards. If you're going to raise tuition fees for all students, then a larger proportion of that money should be spent on need-based awards instead of merit-based awards. Also, all of the money generated by raising tuition must be spent on bettering the student experience for current students, not on recruiting future students.

Domestic tuition should not be raised. The services rendered for domestic ubc students are minimal; everything you've been building has been for international students, for pure profit. Our campus should not be capitalist.

I have difficulty believing that my voice matters on this issue, because I have difficulty believing that any of our voices matter on this issue. A simple thought experiment: what fraction of the student responses would have to oppose any tuition/fee increases in order for these increases to be voted down? Is there a situation where that could possibly happen? If, as I suspect, there is no way that these increases will not be implemented, then what is the point of asking us, other than as a PR stunt in order to appear to care?

What I would like to see is EVIDENCE that my voice matters. Freeze tuition and fees (without increasing other student costs such as student housing rent), and find some other source of funding that doesn't put additional burdens on the shoulders of students.

I think that these tuition increases are higher than what inflation is expected to be. Also where does all this money go? It's hard to imagine that given the revenue stream for a single class at UBC [let's say 50 students * \$2000/class (tuition plus government funding) = \$100,000] that there's any financial need. I'm very confused at why this costs so much. Also why on earth is there an extra fee for online classes? Should it not be cheaper given there is no building needed?

I am a domestic student in [...]. My yearly tuition is over [...] at UBC, which is significantly higher than any university in Canada. Due to this high value, I am forced to not only get a government loan but a professional line of credit from the bank. At the end of the day, my degree will cost me [...], and that's not including living expense and food. As a future health provider, I believe the services me and my colleagues render will greatly benefit our society. This tuition increase will severely affect me as well as my colleagues. Recently, there has been a new proposed tax law, which will affect a corporation's ability to save money for the future. As a practicing [...], this law will affect my ability to save money and pay off my debts. With increasing tuition, my debts will only continue to increase. This tuition increase, in addition to the new tax law, is hugely detrimental to graduating students, affecting our ability to start practices, families and ultimately purchase a home. Furthermore, while tuition costs rise, salary expectations do not follow a similar trend, ie. Cost of living goes up, while salary stays the same. Please stop raising tuition!

As a local student who has to pay it's own tuition fee, extra 2% is a burden when the costs of living had increased due to minimum wages raised. A greater volume of widely accessible scholarships should be available for students with each tuition increase. This applies mainly to domestic students, as the majority of international students tend to come from wealthy families who pay their tuition and living expenses on their behalf.

The ones that can afford that tuition, often move the city right after because they just can't afford living here. By increasing that 2% fees to us, domestic students, it will still have a considerable effect. I am taking part time studies, and I was seriously shocked to attend my class and being part of the minority in class. Myself and another girl are the only two domestic students following the course in a 20+ students (don't get me wrong I am more than happy to collaborate with them). International fees should be much higher, and domestic student should benefit from a great advantage being local. I have no clue how many foreign students are at UBC but I believe it would make so much sense to increase international fees, not domestic. It will still be cheaper from them, and possibly a better education for them than what they could get home (in some situation).

For the non-instructional fees, it is unrealistic. As I said, I am a part-time student and have to pay so many fees for silly things that I would never have time to use or interested really.... PLEASE reconsider, as this tuition increase will cause massive financial strain on me to the point that I will no longer be able to afford my tuition without some kind of alternative additional funding.

Tuition rates are already very high for students and while we are working and hoping for lowering tuition costs, they seem to only be getting worse and worse. However, I am not concerned about rising tuition cost, however if tuition rates go up, I think it's only fair to bring down housing and student fees for those of us living on campus. The residence fees are what cost the most and I think it's only fair to lower those costs. The food on campus here is ridiculous for what we pay, please take that into consideration!

Stop with your Increase of tuition. Please. Why does it increase every year

Hello, I am writing to voice my classmates' concerns regarding the recent tuition increase proposal. We have just begun [...] program this fall, and we have already been overwhelmed with the high costs of our education and the debt that we've had to jump into this early. Assuming we follow the projected costs of our 4 year [...] program, a 2% increase would mean an extra \$3621 (assuming this effect applies on our 2nd year and beyond) at graduation. It is very disappointing that UBC has proposed to make this significant tuition increase, because for many of us, our current "unmet need" assessed by StudentaidBC is already at around \$50,000. I hope the Board will take all of this into consideration upon the decision-making process, and on behalf of our class and students of many other programs, I would like to ask that you reconsider this tuition change proposal and perhaps consider other means of maintaining UBC's budget rather than increasing the already high tuition costs that have been emotionally impacting many students including myself. Thank you very much for your time.

I think this is ridiculous. We should be thinking about making higher education MORE affordable, not less. Presently I am struggling to find other self-funded peers. Think about what an independent underemployed youth can afford. Please do not think about how much money you can grab from the wealthy, and remember the poor who are saving up to go to school (and actually might not save enough).

I understand that inflation is unavoidable and it is true that UBC has amazing facilities but undergraduate fees for international students are already extremely expensive. While domestic students normally live in their homes, international students need to pay for both huge tuition fees plus residency or rent plus meal plan, medical coverage, etc. When we, as international students decided to accept UBC's admission, we were calculating expenses with the 2016/2017 fees, not with those plus a 2-3% increase. I am aware that if there's an increase it's because the university needs the money to continue offering amazing facilities but I feel it is not fair to increase the fees of current students, instead fees of prospective students should be increased as they then have the option to decide whether they want to pay the increase or not.

I can barely afford tuition as is.

The tuition increases on International Students seem rather harsh. While it is likely that many international students will be capable of paying the extra fee, I am also certain that a few will have to sharply cut their other expenditures. Whether or not the Administration believes this to be a good trade-off, is not a matter for me to decide.

I am a member of a number of student clubs, which rely on university funding for many of their activities. I understand that the University regularly funds[...] Teams. This equates to a considerable sum of money, but I believe it to be 'worth it' as these teams provide [...] students valuable work experiences, hence improving their chances of getting a good job later on.

I believe that some of the cost of operation could be lowered by investing less in 'prestige' projects without tangible benefits to the students or facility.

I would NOT like a tuition increase.

This is outrageous. While increasing tuition in hundreds of dollars, as well as housing, day care and parking fees, the university does not update TA fees or other sources of income in a similar way. Furthermore, UBC is one of the only universities where PhD candidates still pay this outrageous tuition - which increases yearly!

This is a way to ensure education for the rich only, and mediocre academy - since students under debt make do not make great scholars.

It seems to me that as a national university UBC is working against its mandate.

Between \$50,000 to \$100,000 of student fees going to a potential design change for restaurants in the NEST? Upwards of \$5000 to re-brand a name BEFORE signage is made? These fees are not spent in student interest. They are a ludicrous expropriation of funds made by a governing body lacking business acumen. The students should not suffer fees for the lack of common sense displayed by the board.

A savvy brand developer can easily create high-class branding for ALL food service restaurants in the Nest with the same amount of funding, with some slices to spare.

A ridiculous use of funding.

"For incoming international students entering in 2018/19 in undergraduate programs and some specialized graduate programs, the rates of increase exceed 3% as compared to 2017/18." This is written in the fine prints, and despite being previously approved, the lack of mentioning in the main context gives readers a false sense of increases being relatively similar, between 2-3%. When in reality, this is another increase on top of the already approved increase that focused a lot on international students.

I am not in support of this tuition increase. I do not feel that past fee increases have benefitted myself or the UBC community. If a fee increase were to go ahead, UBC should be transparent as to where the money is going and what/who it is funding.

I believe it is important to redistribute funding that is already being received as opposed to continuing to increase tuition. For many students tuition is already a near unmanageable burden; continuing to raise tuition creates further barriers to marginalized and low income folks.

This seems reasonable given inflation. I'm in agreement with the tuition increase.

I do not support raising student tuition fees.

I'm a third year student and have noticed a tuition increase every year of my undergrad. This financial pressure is only resulting in a negative effect in the future of our country as it results in those who are financially unstable to refrain from continuing their studies. Countries that have prioritized free education for their students are the ones flourishing, not the ones that continually increase the price of schooling.

I would reserve my opinion on the tuition increase. As an international student, I have been inputting lots of money. However as a biology student, I don't think our infrastructures are well equipped, in terms of the condition of our lecture buildings, to our laboratories. For most science students, we don't have any study rooms to stay during the gap between courses. Also, the Irving Learning Centre is always very busy and pretty hard to find a spot. The Woodward Library is kind of out of date and needs renovation. The newly built Nest in my opinion is not operating very efficiently. During lunch time it's very hard to find a table and wait for a long time to get food.

The information provided showed food services, the book store and parking cost the University money despite the fact that students pay to use these services. How is it that these businesses are unable to fund themselves? I'm not saying that they should be trying to make huge profits, but could they operate on a non-profit self sustaining basis to free up university spending?

I do not need the extra spending on services such as the video displays in the Library and Recreation building at UBC-O. The making of these videos and the setting up of the screen is nice. And that's all it is. Things like this contribute nothing to my university experience or to my education.

I think it is fair that foreign visiting student pay a fair amount more, than the local students, as we as visiting student probably do not contribute with much to Canada. However, I am one of the cases that could be contributing with something for UBC, through my research, that I will continue next semester here, again as an [...] student. I am a [...] student and so is my Canadian roommate. I pay 13000 CAD for 12 creds and he pays 2000 CAD. If you only want rich chinese students to attend your university, that difference is fine, but if you want e.g. middle-class [...] students, as me, that are paying themselves, for the tuition, then you should decrease tuition. I can just barely make it with the tuition rates now - and I have worked very hard to get the money for the tuition.

Tuition is hard enough to pay for as it is, even without an increase. I do not want to see it increased

As an international student, I find that the availability of scholarships for international students are severely lacking. It is already financially difficult to be an international student at UBC, and an increase in fees will only cause a strain on all of us international students. Whether this means higher debts in the future or a bigger burden on our parents (or other means of funding), an increase in tuition fees is ridiculous and unnecessary, especially since it does not benefit the international students (who are paying the highest tuition fees). And since there are so few scholarships for international students, our ability to afford an education here is getting more difficult. If the school plans to increase the school fees (which you are going to do regardless), at the very least can the scholarship and bursary options for international students please increase? It will make our lives at least a tiny bit better knowing that a tiny portion (since all of the scholarships are one-off and valued at maximum \$5 which, as you would know, barely covers the cost of one course for an international student) of our school fees are being sponsored by a scholarship donor. Thank you. (But to sum up, please don't increase the school fees. Cost of living in Kelowna is already so ridiculously expensive, and as a poor university student, I and my fellow students, all feel the strain.)

I think that most of the increases in tuition are not based solely on inflation, but rather on the opportunity to increase revenue from international students. I think this attitude towards students is leading UBC to lower its standards in terms of acceptance requirements. It is ruining the reputation of UBC - More and more believe it is becoming an elitist university where ability to pay becomes paramount to merit.

Please don't increase the tuition even more. I'll end up having to apply for more loan which I'll have to pay back eventually.

I feel that a tuition increase should be avoided at all costs. The cost of living is already unreal in Vancouver, an additional few hundred dollars a year could discourage innovative new thinkers who may face financial barriers from contributing to UBC. Funds could come from freezing top earning employees salaries, taking an inventory of expenditures and cutting unnecessary ones (like luncheons or special events or certain kinds of everyday costs), donors could be solicited, private fundraising events could be held. Students do not have to be the ones responsible for additional costs all of the time. There should be a way forward that does not discriminate against people of lower income status.

Like other countries in Europe, Canada, BC, and UBC should work to DECREASE tuition. I will never vouch for an increase.

tuition is already overly expensive especially for professional programs

I do not think that tuition prices and fees should be increased for next year.

Many students in my graduate program, including myself, are struggling financially and work multiple jobs to make ends meet. Our stipend is already ridiculously low and with tuition increasing, we'll be skipping meals just to continue our education.

I think tuition increase if necessary should also increase the amount of funding that student services get, specifically the counselling/mental health teams. It's tragic how little support there is when the demand is so great. Additionally, there should be drop-in capacity for the clinic. There also doesn't seem to be a distinction between tuition fees for international fees for students based on their country of origin and their own economic position. I think that this could limit who is able to study at our university, and continue to re-enforce dominant power structures. I also want to comment that I am certain costs can be cut in IT because UBC does not need 3 different platforms to host online learning (it's insane), I am certain it can be more streamline (with a single sign in option!), there's already terrible email service, so why not just remove that or use gmail... look at a model like UAlberta! Which I am sure saves on operating cost because it's much easier and straightforward to use...

I do not agree to this proposal. Students will just graduate with increasing debt. Instead of increasing the tuition so much every year, set aside funds from clubs that don't do anything but hold party events and executive retreats or halt the unnecessary constructions for a few years until you have saved up enough funds.

International graduate students bear substantial and disproportionate weight in relationship to the institutional activities that make UBC what it is: research, teaching, community relations, industry collaboration, revenue, and more. Yet, international graduate students receive minimal support from UBC. They are often overworked and underpaid. If anything, a tuition decrease needs to be made to match the level of support provided to international students at other universities comparable to UBC. This is especially urgent given the fact that much of the support available to domestic graduate students, such as student loans, tri-agency scholarships, as well other scholarships, are not available to international graduate students. What support is available, such as departmental scholarships, run out within maximum of 4 years for PhD students, and 2 years for masters students, which in the majority of cases does not match the realistic timeframe required to complete studies. Beyond that international graduate students are forced to rely on teaching and research assistant jobs, which are vastly underpaid. This is while they are not allowed to work more than 20 hours per week off campus, which makes finding a well paying job that would match their top level skills nearly impossible. To make this even worse, as of 2017 UBC set a policy excluding international graduate students from scheduled breaks (i.e. summer and winter holiday breaks), which would have allowed them to work full-time during those periods. This is while domestic students face no restrictions what so ever to off-campus employment. Unfortunately my feeling is that the system is not broken, it actually is functioning exactly as it was intended to. I would not take low paying teaching and research assistant jobs if I were not coerced by policies which the University of British Columbia has been complicit in creating; especially given that my skills would have earned me at minimum twice the wage I am paid at UBC. This is far too familiar for those conscious of how big institutions, such as UBC, implicitly and explicitly exploit those who are most vulnerable in order to maximize profit. Hence, my feedback to you, the university of British Columbia, is to oppose a tuition increase for the 2018/19 academic year for international graduate students. Thank you!

I think the fee proposal makes sense. As much as a HATE having to pay more I do understand that UBC needs to stay competitive. The cancer that I have is what UBC is spending their fees on. Students NEED a better fitness centre and study halls with good desks. We also NEED affordable housing. I know UBC wants to look fancy and pretty but you will lose the top talent if you don't appeal to what the students NEED. you want to be a strong institute at the core right?! Not just know for fancy buildings. I want to make sure my University stays student orientated so I can tell my kids and family and friends what a great place to LIVE AND LEARN it!!

The difference between the amount of international students' tuition and domestic students' is too much. International students already pay for a lot of things like the plane tickets and housing. With all of these combined, international students spend a lot more money than domestic ones and I think it's not fair. Because of this the increase effect international students very much. I believe that the difference in tuition cost shouldn't be this much.

I believe that in Canada education should be accessible and with tuition fees that are already higher than in most canadian university UBC's accessibility is already more compromised than I believe it should. I do not share this belief for International Student, who can choose to pursue their education in the place of their liking. Therefore, I am opposed to the tuition fee increase for domestic students but agree with the one aimed at international students, and believe it could be higher if needed.

The fees per credit for international students is already very high. Increasing fees will make it harder for prospective international students to join UBC. Only those having the funds would apply to UBC and they might not necessarily be the brightest students. The diversity within the university would also decrease.

Tuition in graduate programs should not be increased for both domestic and international students as we do not take many courses. I strongly oppose the unnecessary increase of tuition fees.

The tuition fees for international students at UBC are somehow crazy. Tuition fee for international students is incredible expensive and it is going to be higher and higher.

Why do you waste everyone's times asking for our "opinions", when you are just going to go ahead and increase tuition anyway? Happens every year. Please stop asking me for my opinion on matters wherein my opinion has zero value.

Agree with 2% increases. Disagree with the combined [...] program charging double tuition to students. A full-time course is a full-time course load, so students shouldn't have to pay full-time to BOTH schools ([...]).

Tuition increase of 2% is too much. My salary does not increase that much each year. It is difficult to pay for school, unless I take up another job.

UBC is investing \$899m in faculties. However, more than 80% of the professors I have had are incapable of proper communication and instructional skills. One even went as far as mocking students in class. Perhaps some of this grand budget could be allocated to training professors on how to communicate, teach, and respect students. Just because a person is capable of achieving a PhD, it does not mean they are capable of being an instructor.

I am in the top 10% of my faculty and I have learned more by watching YouTube videos and researching on Google than I have in a UBC classroom. Prior to enrolling at UBC, I have taken courses at 2 other post secondary institutions within BC, and UBC can learn from them in terms of Instructor - student relationships.

It does genuinely feel like I am wasting my money by having enrolled in UBC. If the courses were transferable, believe me I would have transferred out of UBC. My learning experience has not been exceptional, rather quite disappointing.

I wouldn't mind paying a small fee in my tuition if a proper training program could be established for instructors. I am sure many students will appreciate being in a classroom with an instructor that has proper communication skills.

Tuition increases cause financial hardships for students with scholarships that do not increase according to the inflation rate. If there is a tuition increase every year according to the inflation rate, scholarships should also increase every year according to the inflation rate. Scholarship increases should affect all students with the scholarship, not just incoming students.

I believe tuition increases for students are unnecessary and will be harmful. Students with low incomes have a hard time paying tuition, in addition to borrowing student loans. Increasing tuition for students will segregate lower income students who are not accommodated by the tuition fee from higher income students. As a third year student, my tuition has increased throughout the years I have attended this university, yet I have not noticed a difference in student support. I support an increase in fees except for domestic students in undergraduate and graduate school.

To whom this may concern,

The subject of rising tuition every academic year is appalling to say the least. Students already have enormous amounts of stress put on them from every direction- including prospective careers, academics, emotional barriers and personal stresses. Then why must universities, especially big leading institutions continue to increase tuition by ~2% (higher for visiting, specialized programs etc) for students every year? It seems like a rather small percentage in increase in the short term, but it impacts us and our education over the years greatly. A number of students do not come from well-off families, they attend post-secondary institutions with

1. Money loaned from the province/federal
2. Hard earned money through minimum-wage jobs that they have sacrificed their social lives and mental health for.

A very few number of students that attend this university actually receive scholarships that cover their tuition for the entire term of their education. You must understand that our costs are not limited to education alone, but also living costs that continue to rise in places that house these Universities, that we must pay off what we loan, and that such steps make it harder for people to afford post secondary education- which is becoming an essential step in achieving a decent standard of living.

I, as a student, disagree with the proposal. I hope you understand where our frustration stems from. A lot of us can not afford proper nutrition so saving a \$100~ per year REALLY makes a difference.

The increase is quite a lot, especially since the international tuition is already expensive in comparison to other Canadian universities. It's almost like paying for an American college education...

If the quality of education/resources available are constant (i.e. minimal changes) every year, there shouldn't be a 2% tuition increase. The tuition increase will only turn down more international and domestic students; student loans are already increasing and creates stress for students and families.

I worry about a tuition raise. As a [...] student, I am already paying \$18 000 a year in tuition and student fees, taking out student loans yearly to support my education. However, I understand that costs are rising for the university due to inflation; as an alternative to raising tuition by 2% yearly for students, cutting back 2% on the funds for new buildings or study spaces would be more helpful for students, as the facilities at UBC are already more than sufficient to support our needs.

Please do not raise tuition.

I don't think that the school should increase the fees for international students. International students already pay very high fees. Often they come from countries with a currency that is worth much less than ours. Its not good for the diversity of opinion in the student body when only very wealthy international students are capable of studying at UBC. I'm not opposed to the modest increases for domestic students. I find it really unfair that student tuition rates have increased substantially since I began university. I've spoken to my peers about this and a lot of us are angry. We are paying increased fees for tuition and instead of protecting us, the UBC administration raises prices for everything else as well. Our textbook prices are WAY TOO high. I pay \$550-\$600 dollars/ course and you charge me half that amount for a textbook. On top of that, you change the textbook editions each year and introduce "custom packages" so that students are forced to buy these books new instead of being able to resell them back to the bookstore. I have never in my university experience gone to the UBC bookstore and ACTUALLY seen any books in the USED section for any of the overly expensive textbooks I'm forced to buy.

Dear Sir/ Madame

I am an international graduate student - self funded - with a student visa i.e. only officially able to work 20 hours per week. I strongly disagree with this proposed increase to tuition.

This year (2017-2018), there was an increase of \$5,731 in tuition fees, from \$33,922 to \$39,653. This serves as around 4 months student shared rent in Vancouver, to give one perspective - with rent increasing year on year too.

One's performance in a class is strongly related to the stress factors in the environment. As a continuing international student in the [...] programme at UBC, I request that the increase does not occur as it will place a lot more pressure on the budget saved for the 2-year degree programme, especially considering the work hour constraints on the student visa, the rent inflation and other increasing expenses to live in Vancouver. I chose Vancouver and UBC to experience the student lifestyle and to learn from leaders in my field. Yet, struggling to maintain the lifestyle because of the increasing financial pressures will reflect in (1) studies, (2) stressors on the student and therefore (3) experience as an international student here in total.

I hope you take a self-funded, international student's opinion into perspective.

I strongly oppose another fee increase.

I can understand the need for tuition increases, but I think there may be alternative methods for increasing the university's revenue, including fundraising, investments, and further international student recruitment. My main concern with the current proposal to increase tuition for all programs is that it is not an equitable distribution of increases across different programs. For example, the additional amount that an average undergraduate student would pay for a 2% increase is substantially less than a 2% increase for medical or dental students. These students, with tuition nearing \$19,000 a year, will be paying close to \$400 more each year. This is large financial strain on medical/dental students, the majority of which already have unmet financial need despite being funded through government student loans. I think a more careful look at equity, across all programs, demographics, etc. is needed to refine the proposal.

One of the reasons I chose UBC was because of the lower tuition costs. As such, I would of course prefer that tuition does not go up. Thank you.

As an international student, the raise of school tuition will provide more financial strain for me and my parents and would possibly affect my studies. I am not in favour of this.

I don't agree with this. Our education is already too expensive. We should be offering education to everyone. Education is the way grow, please do not limit people's growth.

Please, STOP raising tuition!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!!

As a student I am limited to the amount of hours I can work to provide myself with income to pay for the things I need. While I understand that inflation increases your prices, my paycheck does not increase at the same rate. When I have to decide between eating and paying for tuition while I wait for my student loans to get processed I become frustrated seeing more increases in price. I believe that tuition prices should be locked in at the price that it was when I was accepted to your university. When I started my degree I had price expectations and I budgeted accordingly, but now with more and more increases each year I become increasingly dependent on loans which do not always come on time. This leaves me unable to pay for things in a timely manner and forces me to make unpleasant choices regarding where I allocate my funds. I also find that much of what UBCO spends their money on does not benefit me. I find that I am paying for things that I do not use. Perhaps have tuition prices better reflect which students will be using what facilities.

Thank you for your email and breakdown of the budget on your website. I found it very informative. Nevertheless, I do not believe UBC needs to raise tuition. Current tuition borders on absurd. It seems to me that the university spends a lot of money on its image. Your plea for tuition hikes is based on the need to keep up with inflation. Since the 2008-2009 school year, inflation has raised costs by 12.89%. In the same time, your spending has gone up 36.09%. This tuition increase is not to keep up with inflation, it is to keep up with spending. Additionally, your graph of "financial pressures" lists 2016/17 expenses as 2.3 billion. When I totaled up the operating expenses breakdown, I got a figure of 1.76 billion.

This is another money-grab by the University disguised as a tuition increase. The University does not need to extort its students further after another recent tuition increase. Especially in Vancouver, one of the most expensive metropolitan areas by living cost in North America (possibly the world), adding any more financial strain to any student is unreasonable and downright cruel. While the summary report goes into depth about the costs and expenses of the University, the tangible benefits for students that the report claims are missing from the student body. These increases will place an undue burden on the student populace and therefore should not be considered without a full review on the non-academic expenses of the University. If it has to go through, absolute transparency on where the funds are going must be implemented, especially with the installment of our latest president. Furthermore, if it has to happen, students should be given sufficient additional financial and academic supports to mitigate the massive effects of a tuition increase.

Being a senior in an audit programme I am not sure if the intention of UBC is to apply fees

for my category. Would you please let me know. Thank you.

I generally approve of the proposed tuition increases as they are reasonable within bounds. However, I am surprised of the high budget for alumni and development operations, and would certainly appreciate greater transparency as to where those costs come from. I would also like to further understand the causes of the budget increase beyond 'inflationary pressures'. The budget increases for 2013-2016 are incremental while the jump to 2017 is larger- what is the anticipated budget for 2018?

Considering the rise in inflation, I recognize that this is an action that should be done. Nevertheless, considering that the families of domestic students already provide substantial financial support for UBC in the form of taxes, I suggest that domestic students' tuition should increase less than that of international students, who do not contribute taxes to the Canadian government and therefore has made less financial contribution to the BC education system in general.

Tuition should not be raised. Perhaps if the university reallocated funds intended to make it an ever more glorious husk towards making it a halfway decent place to be a human being, maybe I could get behind giving you more money. I'll be damned if my tuition goes to building another broken down fountain while there's absurd wait times for student services.

As a student, I am disappointed to see that our tuition fees are increasing for both international and domestic students. I feel as if this will make it even more difficult for students from low income families like myself. I personally do not think this is acceptable, nor do I think it is a coincidence that our tuition fees are increasing during a time when UBC is undergoing a large number of construction projects. There is a growing sense of distrust towards UBC among the students, as well as their families, because we feel as if we are being exploited for the interests of the institution. And just to add fuel to the flames, it is not clear as to where this increased revenue is going to be allocated to. Is it going to be for the benefit of the students, the faculty, or the members of the administration? I am really disappointed to see that UBC is prioritizing profits over the best interests of their students; particularly in a time when tuition, textbook costs, living expense, and so forth, are at an all time high.

Please do not increase tuition, I am a broke student.

I am concerned that the increased burden will widen the already significant disparity between people who are and are not able to attend university. Massive student debt continues to be a massive concern and is only growing. Perhaps if the university were to lobby and pressure the government to increase funding or decrease costs, the financial burden on students wouldn't need to increase. If we want to aspire to be an inclusive campus, and accessible to people regardless of race, gender, or socio-economic background, we need to would on systemic changes rather than a damaging symptomatic approach.

Don't raise domestic fees.

International students should get increased by 3% and domestic by 1%

I don't believe you have reasonable cause to be raising tuition. 2% is excessive.

I only see the prices of my education rising, not the quality. I don't think that the school should raise their fees, unless it means raising the fees of the domestic students to better match those of the international students. Assuming that these two fees are already on equal footing is wrong. You can't raise both by 2% when international fees are already sky high. And I'm not sure how a couple of hundred cars dispersed across 13 parking lots each paying hundreds of dollars is not sufficient revenue on its own to fund these goals that the university has.

My parents and I are already reluctantly paying quite high prices.

I understand the need for a 2% inflation. however a sustainable solution needs to be found as it cannot increase 2% every year forever.

As a student, I'm sure it's unsurprising that I'm opposed to the tuition increases proposed. However, I am also opposed to them as a former staff member. I understand that the University needs money, and that the provincial government has withdrawn support over the past several years, and that costs are rising. However, I have seen how the University mismanages the money it receives. There are numerous inefficiencies stemming from the "academics are not a business" mindset. No, the University is not a business, but the it needs to dedicate itself to operational efficiency nonetheless.

I have watched faculty members push off "administrative work" onto staff when it does not belong there. This makes staffing appear bloated while staff simultaneously feel overworked. Lack of investment in administrative systems has also necessitated the hiring of staff to complete work that machines should do. The inability to move the SASI program forward is another point to be examined.

Thinking again from my perspective as a student, this increase unfairly burdens those who are not eligible for scholarships or bursaries - those who are in part-time programs largely because they cannot afford to step out of the workforce and pursue full-time studies.

I understand that this consultation is a formality and that it is unlikely to sway a decision. However, I hope it provokes some examination of the faculty-staff relationship and how the academic mindset applied to administrative processes can result in student money being frittered away.

The tuition does not need to be raised. If UBC is experiencing "financial hardship" it should limit its excessive construction and updates.

UBC , is already extremely expensive for domestic students especially for those who pay their own tuition or have working class parents . Maybe BC residents should pay less and more for out of province and international students .

UBC lacks transparency in tuition increases. Stop building that many buildings if you cannot be financially stable hoping international to pay for it.

We don't even know how the money is spent and how 2% increase came up. Keep increasing tuition is not a long term solution for university, it can only make university lose its credibility and reputation.

However small the proposed increase to students tuition, we the students are always dumbfounded. Is it acceptable that a student should see an average yearly increase of 2% to their tuition such that by the time they finish their degree they are paying 5-10% more than when they started. Most student would argue that an increase isnt very fair considering that they already can't afford tuition prices as they stand right now.

I understand that the school has many large updates, renovations, and new construction expansion projects on the go and lined up in the near future, However, I do not think that a tuition increase is warranted on that basis alone.

I also understand that the University must adjust its prices based on the changing economy. The problem with this assumption is that I am sure that I remember a tution increase was already put through in the last three years that I have been in my undergraduate.

For these reasons and in the interest on the student body I would have to veto these tuition increases.

Not in favour.

Screwing us over again. We pay this increased tuition cost but how does it really benefit me when part of my money goes to supporting sports teams that loose and facilities that I never use. Or to student programs who do not actually provide a solid student life.

I think the increases due to inflationary purposes should be the same for domestic and international students.

I do find the rate for international students too high and consider transferring.

I do not think that tuition should be increased for students in upcoming years. UBC does not offer entrance scholarships or many other opportunities for lower-income students to to relieve the financial pressure of school. With the sky-rocketing cost of living in Vancouver, combined with inadequate government student loans, an immense amount of financial pressure is put on low income students.

Take my case for example. I lived off of student loans and worked for my entire degree, and I had to live drastically below the poverty line. I never had food security or healthcare security. There were many months where I lived off of \$1000 per month. My rent, food, and cellphone bill and internet amounted to more than \$850 per month. I never had enough money for the other things a person needs to live -- toiletries, clothing, medicines, dental visits, etc. For two years I dumpster-dived for food to support myself.

In this last year I sustained a significant back injury and wasn't able to finish by degree because of cost of treatment meant that I couldn't afford tuition. It's now taken me more than two years longer to finish my degree because of the health expenses.

Additionally, low income students are under significantly more stress and are much more likely to have mental health challenges, yet often time these students aren't necessarily accessing the services provided on campus. I, for example, didn't have the time to access the services I needed to thrive because I had to work, or dumpster dive, or spend time managing chronic illnesses, etc, and therefore didn't have the time to access what free services there are as I was too busy doing survival tasks.

By increasing the tuition rates and student fess, you are committing to marginalizing low income students even more than they already are. If you are not also coupling the tuition increase with strategies to support low-income students, you are reinforcing class hierarchies and creating a nearly impossible situation for low-income students to navigate.

I maintained an A average throughout my degree, but there simply weren't enough opportunities for high-achieving students like myself to access scholarships or other awards to relieve financial stress.

I am a queer, mix-raced, low income student and I felt consistently marginalized by UBC and can't imagine ever putting myself in this situation again, where my survival and well-being simply isn't considered or cared about.

If you are only taking ques from middle and high-income students, your data will be flawed. Your analysis will be flawed. You're decision making will not be adequately informed. Seek out low-income students. Listen to their stories and struggles. Find ways to support them. UBC is a wealthy institution filled with brilliant minds--leverage those resources to help students thrive.

Tuition was increased for the 2017/18 year. I don't believe that inflation is growing at the rate where tuition needs to be increased by 2% every year.

Optically, it appears more likely that tuition increases are being used to fund capital projects, marketing projects, and increasing payrolls - which is fine. Just be honest about it.

In my opinion, I think it would be extremely unfair to keep raising international fee's. The existing gap between international fee's and domestic fee's is already immensely large. I believe that it is unfair to just raise international fee's on a smaller student body and then disregard the larger domestic student body. I believe that either one should raise fee's on the entire student body or no-one at all. If fee's were to increase on only a select group of students can it please be domestic students. Domestic students pay so little that they will hardly notice a 2-3% increase in their fee's.

If the increase is simply to reflect inflationary pressures, how come the increase for international students is categorically higher than domestic students? It seems unfair since international students are already paying much higher fees than domestic, thus even the same increase in percentage will be reflected in a significant number, let alone a higher percentage.

I am not convinced that these increases in tuition will be beneficial for students. The university has already increased tuitions last year and it has an impact on many families' financial situation, especially mine. I understand that UBC is expanding its education for more young adults, and that you are trying to keep profits consistent with inflation. However, I do not see the school being worse off if they kept the tuition rate the way it is this year. I know there is a lot of money in the school to make programs better and accommodating for those who want to pursue their degrees, Even if 2% does not sound like a lot, it is when taking it from a +\$20,000 tuition fee. There are students who will not provide feedback because they likely have more than enough money to not complain. This proposal will only put middle to low income families even worse off because they have to sacrifice their leisure to work harder for an education that already consumes so much of their time. I hope you can consider my thoughts, and provide support to those who may not be able to manage higher tuitions over their post-secondary experience. Thank you.

Personally, I do not see how increasing the tuition will be a good long term solution to the rising financial pressures. From what I can see based on our budget and expenses, it seems that we certainly have enough funding but may not be spending it wisely. In my opinion, certain services such as the different undergraduate societies, or even IT can most definitely function just as efficiently on a smaller budget. Many services targeting student needs (such as the AMS) mostly use a top down approach, giving students what they may not have asked for. Furthermore, a lot of funding for student run positions seem to go into unnecessary luxuries for those in executive positions. Not to mention that our operating fund did not include donations, which I believe added up to be about \$180 million between 2015 and 2016. To keep things short, I believe that as a university that is always advocating for sustainability, we need to really take a look at ourselves and how we can better use our resources before asking for more and increasing the tuition. I understand that UBC is already looking for ways save costs, but in all honesty the efforts aren't quite showing based on all the expendable services I see on campus, or sometimes lavish spending. There are ways to keep running these important services that enrich our campus life without spending as much, a lot of which probably lies in good leadership. If we are to the increase the tuition every time there are financial pressures, then there may be more pressing concerns to address from the student body than just financial issues. All in all, I know that I am still quite uninformed about all of the painstaking consideration that goes into decisions like this, and the logistical matters that must also be reflected upon. However, I will say that as a student who does not by any means come from a financially well off family, I will gladly accept an increase in tuition if I can at least see that efforts have been made to cut costs in other aspects of our school. Instead of raising tuition as the first means of trying to solve an understandably growing financial need, perhaps it is worth taking the time to reflect inwards and look for solutions there. What makes UBC great is how innovative and dedicated to research we are. But, what makes UBC outstanding is how much we care; about our students, our faculty members, the indigenous land we occupy. This is what sets us apart from simply being an institution, so I am grateful that UBC cares about the students opinions, and I hope that this will help you all make an informed choice.

Honestly I'm broke enough already. Y'all defs have more money than me

Stop increasing our tuition. The cost of living in Vancouver continuously increases and my income does not match this increase. As students we can not afford to pay more to attend University

Classes are already too expensive -- we need to cut non-academic/non-mental-health programs!

Please don't make it more expensive, it is already a stretch to be able to pay as is.

Tuition should only increase for international students.

I am very against these changes. Myself and many of my friends can barely afford to live and study here as it is. I used to think that UBC tuition is comparable to other universities but this year I will be paying close to 10 thousand in tuition. This is ridiculous. Especially considering student loans provides a maximum of 15 thousand per school term, I have 5 thousand for (Vancouver) rent and living expenses. This is practically impossible. I need to work when I should be studying in order to survive.

The whole increasing tuition thing sounds troubling. Based on past experiences, the overall increment will not only be the percentage announced in the email; it will be larger. University is a place to share knowledge and knowledge should be free for all mankind, we need ability instead of money to access this knowledge. Now that indeed is too idealistic, but it is true that the increasing tuition shuts the door of more and more capable, promising but financially-awkward students from getting the chance to embrace knowledge. That's not fair. There must be another way.

It seems reasonable to me

As a graduate student, I personally feel the strain from receiving a stipend that does not match tuition and fees. I feel the tuition and fees should not be raised, and graduate student stipends should be increased to match the cost of living. As is, the stipend is at least \$2000 below the absolute minimum livable wage in Vancouver, which is unacceptable. An increase in tuition and fees would only exacerbate this problem.

I do not like it when the cost increases.

Even though the increase in international tuition is on the same proportion as domestic tuition fees, the base price of international tuition is already 400% higher than that of domestic tuition. The increase of 2 to 3% significantly increases burden to my personal financial abilities in paying tuition. The increase will result in a \$500 increase per term for students on a full 5-course course load. The increase in \$500 can almost cover the price of one domestic tuition course.

Relative to the funding assistance and number/ease of scholarships that Ubc provides this increase in tuition is unacceptable. I do not support it.

Graduate students - namely those of us in doing our PhDs are being killed by paying tuition all the way along. Paying it while we are taking classes is one thing but having to keep paying it even when there are entire semesters when we have to step away from our studies to work, makes it a zero sum game. Working as a sessional provides me only a bit more than half of what I need for my tuition but means that I can barely get to my studies (as a full-time parent too). PhD students in their 5th, 6th + years should be exempt from paying tuition, let alone tuition increases. Thank you

I see this fee to be unjustified as many of the faculties already have an adequate amount of funding to provide a strong education for undergraduate students and increasing the already high tuition fees will only be more of a hindrance to those in financial need rather than "improving the quality of their education."

I understand that economics go up and down and the prices at UBC have to go accordingly but please NO TUITION RAISES FOR ALL STUDENTS. It's bad enough already. Anywhere else but NOT TUITION!!!!!! I don't agree with this.

I do not agree with the increase in tuition for domestic students. I realize the government funding is decreasing while costs are rising but formal education is already unattainable for many Canadians and this will deter people from attending post-secondary further, which in the long run hurts our society and our economy.

The increase in international fees may make more sense since these students (or their parents) have not been contributing to Canadian taxes all of their lives (and therefore not contributing to the little our government does pay for education). Providing education to domestic students should be a priority so if that means charging international students more to cover these costs, this is what I would vote for.

Every year, UBC raises the tuition by 2-3%, stating that this is due to inflationary pressures. But wage increases for UBC student jobs increase at most by 0.5% & not every year. If UBC recognizes inflation as a reason to increase its own revenues, there should be a reciprocal obligation, as a responsible employer, to recognize inflation in the way it pays students as well. Every year, we students have to just absorb more & more of the rising costs of inflation & globalization (etc.) from our own pockets (usually by taking on more & more debt), while the UBC does not pay its share.

Also, in grad programs with no research component (e.g., [...]), there is virtually no funding available to help manage costs (despite excellent grades), while there are a huge number of awards for students doing research. While I understand that doing research has extra associated costs, this grad program is a 2.5-3 year program, with a large number of associated practicum hours (generally unpaid, except for a few lucky students). Even undergrad students who are doing coop are paid a wage for their work, but there is no support for an applied program such as this. If UBC values mental health, as many messages around campus say it does, there should be support for [...] to train for the profession in the same way there is funding to help train other professionals (e.g., engineers).

I think the fee increase will be too much. Many students are already in debt and even adding a "small" increase will affect students

It is reasonable to update fees

The tuition increases are unfair and are NOT necessary as the proposal has suggested. The greed that this university has shown me since I enrolled in 2014 is unbelievable.

Every tuition increase makes it more difficult for young adults to attend school. I have been in school for [...] and every single year there has been a tuition increase. As students we leave school with crippling debt and, I have never seen any type of advancement or benefit from the increase I have paid over the years. I am strongly against any type of tuition increase, it makes post secondary education unattainable and a life sentence of debt to pursue an education.

Can you please actually use the increase in tuition to equitably fund faculties and increase bursaries to low income students from the Lower Mainland? The current demographic makeup of the school favors with distinction the needs and priorities of international students due to financial incentives and it's shameful that a university that prides itself on diversity is abandoning its local students in favor of short term profits.

I do not support the tuition increase for all domestic students, regardless of program. While it may be appropriate for undergraduate programs and some graduate programs, I'm completing a research-based PhD with minimal course requirements (and the courses we do take do not require significant infrastructure support or faculty time), and think the majority of the cost increase should be paid by students in programs that generate the cost. Furthermore, I'm sure the highest earning faculty members would feel a pay decrease a lot less than students would feel a tuition increase.

Just wanna say that tuition for international students is almost 4 times more than domestic students is really an stupidly unfair amount to pay. It's really like international students don't have any rights. Although, I know it's impossible to change but still want to say, please kindly or not increase domestic students' tuition fee by 50 percent.

I cannot afford tuition as is. UBC does not offer nearly as much as it could in terms of financial aid to those who need it. Similarly, Student Aid BC does not support students, giving them thousands less than what they need for the year (studentaidbc gave me only 1/2 of what I needed), so the students who need support the most do not get it. Combine this with tuition INCREASES-- I don't know what I'm going to do.

Please don't, it would be okay if my employer during the summer increased my wage by 2%, but that's not going to happen. We are students, most of whom can't afford to live here in vancouver. Please keep tuition as is, no 2% inflation.

I studied in [...] department for 2 months during the summer vacation. I think the tuition and fee proposal are good.

I don't understand why there is a hike in the tuition fees for continuing international students. Even though we have the same merits as the domestic students, most of us already pay more than five times what the domestic students pay. On top of that, we have to manage international flights and adjust to a new lifestyle. UBC is a university that embraces diversity, but the disparity between its treatment of domestic and international students is going to be detrimental to this stance. Not only are more international students going to turn away from UBC because of its ever-increasing tuition fees, but even the current batch of undergraduate students will start to feel displeased and this might eventually cause friction. I can live with the fact that I end up paying nine times more than what domestic engineering students pay, but even after this I will continue to have my fees increase every year? What if an international student wants to take part in a co-op program? By continuing to increase the tuition fees, you will be stripping many of us international students of the option to extend our degrees and take part in co-op, which was one of the biggest draws for me coming to UBC. To me, the hike in prices for continuing international students seems unfair, especially since the domestic students are being treated in a fairer manner.

I really don't think tuition fees should increase annually at 2%. The committee is making education harder and harder to be affordable, putting stress on working students and family members. Please consider revising the tuition increase proposal, thank you.

Please don't increase tuition fees. I don't see the point when all you guys do is spend it on construction anyways.

As an international student, I understand the experience of having domestic fees because I'm experiencing the overinflated international ones. I do not want to bring personal emotion into this problem, however the suggestions of having the international fees re-inflated seems disgraceful.

International students are paying almost tenfold of the domestic fees. The initial raise of tuition cost because of tax purposes is understandable, quite cruel, but still understandable. The decision of having the cost go up by 100% again because of financial profit for the University is childish, and not to mention, very backwards thinking.

That's just my opinion though. I hope most international students are actually happy and don't have to carry the weight of the world that this financial burden brings.

Don't raise it. Cut administration instead.

I am absolutely against all tuition increases. I am an international student that has been forced to take private loans in order to attend due to the ridiculously high cost of international tuition.

Coming from a low-income family, I literally have to pay off my tuition by getting student loans. This doesn't help if you keep increasing the tuition?!

I don't think there should be an increase in tuition for domestic students, as the tuition is already high enough. More domestic students should be encouraged to attend UBC, as it educates Canadian students, which benefits the whole country. The increases in tuition for international students could be increased, as it is cheaper for them here as international rather than being domestic in their own countries. That doesn't seem fair. International students often get funding through their own countries to attend or they are dual citizens or from wealthy families and can afford to pay more. The tuition for all international students could be increased at least 2 to 3% this upcoming year. (maybe even more such as 5%!)

As a graduate student, I'm not sure what my tuition really covers. Most of the courses I take are small seminars taught by professors in our department. If the increase in tuition means that my department, specifically, gets more money - I am neutral on this. If it doesn't, I am against this. Our department could use more money to fund student research. Amping up tuition is not going to help this.

I don't think that fees should be raised as students are already drowning in debt and financial issues. Increasing tuition fees as well as non-academic fees will not only put pressure on students, but create a negative attitude towards the societies and resources that run on student fees. It is not fair to incoming students as well as existing students to have to pay more when prices for food, housing, transportation, gas, textbooks, and all other essential student items are also increasing!

I am disappointed to learn that tuition will yet again be increasing. Although inflation is a reality, it is incredibly disheartening that UBC charges so much for tuition. Education should not cost this much.

The school already makes money off not only our tuition but also fees that we as students, and me in specific cannot opt out of but will never benefit from. For example each course is around a little over \$500 \$217.50 for "Athletics and Recreation Fee". I don't even know where i would go to be a part of any athletic past time. I have not and will not ever use a building dedicated to recreation on campus ever yet i still have to pay a fee for the building. Little fees here and there when I already pay so much in tuition. Not to mention I have a lot of international friends and it's is extremely unfair and unethical in my opinion to make a profit and drain students who are from another country, don't have any family here, are new to the area and just becoming situated with the ridiculous fees for international students. I know that you have to make your money off of tuition and building fees and things we'll never use but its unfair. They pay also twice of what I pay and its ridiculous. People want an education but at what cost? What's the point if you're crushed under a crippling debt. I wouldn't mind but its become very obvious to me through personal experience that all we are is some student numbers unattached to actual people who may be going through immensely hard times and personal matters but still want an education that line someones pockets. I'm fine with having to make the campus more enjoyable and functional, but stop charging so much for a four year degree that you can get anywhere and that is useless anyways. And universities know that which is why they charge so much for masters and later programmes.

UBC has enough money. We can't afford tuition increases.

As a young student from a low income family who is paying for my own tuition, any increase in cost is extremely difficult to me. I understand that UBC may be pushed for financial reasons to increase the tuition costs, but I truly hope they can avoid this. I am working extremely hard to be here, and any added pressure would be very challenging. I turned down scholarships to other institutions to be here, because I found that the values of UBC hold closely to mine. It would be upsetting to have my tuition increased.

I think the tuition is really too expensive and it increases too fast.

I understand the tuition increases and assume that the increases accurately compensate for the inflationary pressures and these pressures alone.

However, I would like to raise the point that many full-time students whose parents are giving it their everything to get their kids through college do not always have inflation taken into account in their salaries, especially when said parents work from overseas like mine.

I feel it unfair that my family's costs are increasing and am not compensated accordingly income-wise as both my parents work full-time jobs in China (as foreign staff) where salaries are rarely made to adjust for inflation.

I understand, in the grand scheme of things, I'll be paying around 800 more dollars per semester, but for a student that runs on a strict 200\$ weekly budget for living expenses, lodging, heat, hydro, and food, 800 dollars can go a long way.

The tuition increase occurs every year with rarely any wage increases in BC which seems absurd. We clearly do not actually have a say in things but if we did I would recommend paying the staff from the old Okanagan college university less. The ones that received tenure even though they clearly do their jobs to the poorest extent they can be performed and they treat students like shit. Balance out the excessive amounts that profs are paid, stop trying to be in the big leagues like UBC Vancouver and start acting like the small campus we are. We shouldn't have to pay for every head of department's raises, the government should be covering all post-secondary schooling so why don't you take a step in proposing that to the government and try to make some greater change rather than sucking the life and money out of students who work 2 jobs while in 4 courses a semester just to get by like myself.

I do not support this tuition increase.

Tuition should not be raised for domestic students.

1. Costs already limit access

Cost of post secondary education already exclude too many working/ lower middle class students. Add to that the cost of living (esp. housing) in lower mainland is incredibly high - domestic students can't afford to pay higher tuition.

2. Does UBC need more money/ if so, what for?

- any additional gained through tuition increases should fund UBC education. Education DOES NOT equal luxury buildings, restaurants, residencies. Honestly, parts of UBC look like a resort for rich people, rather than a University. I would support extra money being used to increase faculty salaries/ compensation, including post docs and adjunct professors.

I think that if any kind of increase is to happen there needs to be something that gets decreased. Because if there is no give and take the university just appears to be a business. Which we all know it is. but it will just confirm my thoughts and opinions. My largest problem is not with tuition, but with parking rates and parking pass costs and how ridiculous they are.

I believe such a drastic increase in international tuition is a poor decision as the tuition is high enough as it is and much of the draw to UBC for international students is the tuition prices compared to other countries. Raising it will detract from future students' interest in the university, so I highly implore you to reconsider the tuition increases.

No need to increase the tuition for international students. The fees are already high. We will appreciate it if UBC learns how to freeze the fees like Univ of Illinois does.

As a student in the [...], a professional Master's program, I already pay large amounts in tuition and student fees, in addition to the high living expenses of living in Vancouver, UBC also does not offer scholarships or bursaries for students in my situation which makes affording the program and life in Vancouver quite difficult as it is. A further increase in tuition can force me to discontinue my studies and seek alternative, more affordable universities or degrees. If UBC is going to raise tuition fees, this has to be accompanied by a system that takes into account the individual cases of financial needs of the students and assess their fees accordingly, especially for professional programs with excessively high fees.

Stop raising tuition prices. Education is necessary for a well paid job, and it's being treated like a privilege. UBC makes enough money to stop raising tuition. Stop re-modelling buildings and doing lots of construction when you could be trying to keep students being able to afford to come here.

I am against tuition fees increase and think UBC shall look into using other sources of revenue.

I do not endorse the increase in costs. I am particularly against the increase in co-op fees. I am proud that here in Canada school fees are somewhat manageable at the moment but I am fearful that this will not be the case in the future. The choice to go to university is often made at a relatively young age with great consequences both good and bad. I am fearful that in the future if the costs go up and continue to increase that young adult will be left with large debilitating debts after making weighty decisions before they fully comprehend the consequences.

There are some things that I do believe would justify the costs of increased fees. An increase in research spending for labs and student research grants. Research is beneficial to students, faculty members, and the University's profile. The increased budget would help researchers acquire tools to help become world leaders in their fields of study, and the grants would help undergrad students who want to do research but must work during summer/school terms to pay for schooling and the costs of living.

An increase in spending on recreational equipment and facilities. I would like a larger workout gym, table tennis, and a swimming pool. These facilities would help me and many other students stay healthy in body and mind. The current facilities are lacking in variety, and size for the growing Okanagan campus.

Working on reducing the cost of student resources. The price of textbooks has continuously increased much faster than inflation and as costs to produce textbooks has decreased due to new technology. Here are some sources that show just how much the price has increased over time:

New, free options are becoming available such as MIT's course materials and openintro's course materials/textbooks. One of my professors switched to using one of openintro's course resources and textbook this year and it has proven not only to be cost-effective but a superior resource to previous textbooks. I would like the university to help students by either pushing professors to use new technology-based cheaper resources or to help students by heavily subsidizing textbooks and help put a stop to anti-student practices such as: semi-annual edition updates regardless of need, custom course/university specific textbooks, and online one-time-use access codes for mandatory course materials provided only on textbook purchase.

Reducing the cost of food on campus. The food on campus is expensive. This is partly due to the fact that currently there are few options on campus and only a limited number of students have the opportunity to buy food off campus and prepare meals. The limited stores know this and have adjusted their prices accordingly. I would like to see more variety and competition with new stores to help lower prices and keep up with the demand of the growing campus.

I understand that the university requires a lot of money to function, but, to be honest even the slightest increase in fees would increase a lot of pressure financially. Therefore it'd be great if the fees increased more slowly and the revenue was made from some other place. That said, 2% is a decent enough increase, but it'd be easier if it is done in 2 years than 1.

I am not really expert in economics but I believe inflation is double-sided. So if you increase the tuition fees, I think my Research Assistantship/Teaching Assistantship and my scholarships should increase as well.

As someone who works five and if need be, sometimes 6 days a week for typically 9-10 hours so I can meet tuition payments, do not raise the tuition rates as its already difficult to meet them.

What will happen if the tuition costs remain as they are? Will the University's financial security destabilize? Will its reputation be greatly diminished? Will academic quality be lessened too? I genuinely would like to know what the detriments will be if the current rates stand, instead of having a higher rate implemented. UBC is among the top 50 academic facilities in the world according to Times Higher Education, thus I highly doubt that reputation will be affected. If rates are not risen, then will the University go bankrupt?

I'm aware where its being allocated and what the costs are thanks to the information provided, by the way (and to be clear). Again, inquiring what damage will the University suffers if it maintains its current rates.

No student is attracted to an academic facility for its rates. When people are looking to enroll, they do not immediately look at the prices and see a high one and think "Oh my! Those tuition costs are higher than others. I'm strapped for money, but, I think I will I choose this one simply because the rates are higher!" People look in the quality of academia, and you, the reader, and I, can confidently assert that UBC has a very high academic quality.

Raising the rates will make the gap to meet payments even larger. It likely could even be the determining factor of whether someone will attend or not. 2% or 3% may sound minimal, but it can really make a difference (as evidenced by your own reasoning for wanting to raise the rates) and will, if not raised and maintained, reduce the strain on students to make payments -- and attract prospective students to a high-quality-education and fair pricing.

2% may seem like a small amount but it has hidden implications. Student earnings must provide for living expenses which also increase. Student income has not increased to provide for these additional expenses. This results in student debt being increased with all it accumulating interest. Knowing this, tuition increases should never exceed the rate of increase given Canada's CPP recipients. I believe 1% was this year's increase. Better yet, have a fixed tuition for four years for each student. Each year new students would have a fixed tuition rate plus the % increase for another four years. This would at least take the debt's accumulating interest off tuition % increases.

This is horrible. Already paying extensive amounts of money on tution. How are we supposed to keep up with these accelerating prices?

I'm already paying 60,000 a year in tuition and fees (plus additional fees the school just happens to leave out and including printing fees that will not be fully utilized), and the faculty and administration are falling over themselves to the point that our schedule changes daily. Passing the burden onto the students to adapt rapidly to emails regarding changes that come to us after 5PM or later on most weekdays as well as on Sunday nights. The situation will not improve simply by throwing money at it. Instead the administration and faculty must properly organize themselves and be prepared in advance just as we are expected to.

I thought the NDP government was putting a halt on tuition increases. Clearly I am against this proposal. My program of study already doesn't allow awards or bursaries.

A lot of my friends are trying all they can to balance out work and study schedules in order to pay for our expensive food, housing, and tuition fees. For myself, I am trying really hard to save to pay for my student loans. I work 10 hours a week for minimum wage as well as tutor all day on Saturday, so that I can pay off my debt as soon as possible and have a bright future. Please. Do not raise the tuition fees on us. If we need more funds, try other ways. Maybe raise the fees for international students since they have plenty of money to spare if they can afford to buy expensive cars and fly planes.

I think that the tuition proposals are very reasonable. The % increase has been kept low. For students who have the money to attend UBC internationally, this 2% should be of minimal concern. As for domestic students, it can easily weight out with benefits of the Compass Card, the education quality, and ability to attend a top tier university. For students who are attending that are on financial aid or are currently being effected by poverty should receive an opportunity to become exempt from the extra payment by scholarship.

One of several reasons why I've had such a negative experience studying at UBCO is due to the cost of tuition, the cost of textbooks, the cost of parking, and cost of putting up with rude, selfish, impersonal, and unhelpful staff members who are unwilling to accommodate to student needs.

This institution expects young people to take highly-demanding course loads for outrageous prices, when many of these students are relying only on part-time work that they have to balance with heavy academic timetables. There are only so many scholarships that can accommodate those whoa are less financially fortunate. In reality, the majority of the student body is unable to pay for the cost of education at UBCO on their own. A 2% rise in tuition for all programs is criminal.

An academic adviser prompted me to take a fifth year instead of graduating this year because she believed it would be too difficult to manage six courses in each semester, on top of a job and volunteering. She's right, but the alternative is paying for a fifth year. This is not an option you can honestly expect most of us to actually have in our positions.

I purchased my textbooks from Chapters this year because their prices for NEW books were less expensive than the prices for USED books at the UBCO bookstore.

Please consider this sincere response from a concerned student. If you value feedback from your customers, then don't take this complaint lightly.

Do not increase tuition for domestic students. The primary reason many domestic students attend UBC is due to the costs avoided from going to school further away. For example, my goal university was originally the University of Toronto, however, I did not want to pay several hundred dollars a year to go back and forth between Toronto and Vancouver during holidays and semester breaks. However with this increase in tuition I could use the money to make this commute instead and will promptly transfer schools.

I mean I know that this is the max you can legally raise it and that you have to consult us and that none of what we say matters anyway cause you don't care and are going to raise it anyway, but like, can you not? Or at least be more clear about where the money is going? Or maybe not spend nearly \$30000 on advertising for the football team and instead give someone a scholarship with the money instead? Or just use the saved money to not raise tuition.

Please make sure graduate funding including the international partial tuition scholarship increase to keep pace with tuition increases. Graduate students are far more likely than undergraduates to be without support from parents or other family members. Adding a few hundred dollars to tuition/fees does make a difference when you are just barely breaking even each month.

This raise in tuition is a major inconvenience to me. I come from a family that earns less than \$50,000 a year, so we are struggling very much to handle the expenses right now. A raise of even 2% would put is in an even worse situation. I hope this does not go through.

I do not believe that tuition should increase, as university should be treated as a form for education and not a business. With the constant tuition increases students are not getting the chance to concentrate on school as much because majority are worried about debt.

My tuition is already super high. Please no increase.

International students are already paying a lot of money to attend UBC. Increase in tuition will not only make some students struggle very much and eventually have to take a break from the university in order to work and accumulate money. However, it will also make it less desirable for all the incoming international students due to the increase in tuition fees.

By increasing both tuition and student fees by 2% annually, students will be out by over an extra \$600 for a 4 year degree. Although that is an inconvenience to pay, since I am already paying so much for student loans, working another 2 weeks isn't going to bother me that much. What does bother me is the fact that our current generation is struggling so much to pay for our education. I'm already paying 50,000 a year. I don't understand why coming from another country automatically makes me have to pay 5 times domestic tuition. If I already am struggling to pay for four years of education, I can only imagine how bad it is for students less fortunate than me. This is outrageous, tuition fees are already out the roof and barely affordable as it is. Is this going to happen every single year? Last year I received an email about proposed tuition increases as well. Though I understand very well that prices are increasing and everything is becoming more expensive, I do not believe in this increase. I am very happy with the way things are currently running at this school and do not feel the need to pay more because I do not think I will be better off with extra services. If tuition is increasing, UBC must do a better job of providing scholarships to not just students in financial need, but to students with outstanding academics and extracurriculars.

Every year tuition goes up and people in upper management still make huge salaries. I do not agree with this raise in tuition as the result is pricing students out of an education.

Tuition needs to be kept low enough so that all students can afford it and should be a last measure. There needs to be a commensurate rise in scholarship and bursary money and availability as well. Given the very high costs of living in Vancouver, UBC students are already adversely affected by inflation, and a tuition increase will only exacerbate this.

TUITION SHOULD NOT BE RAISED!

Firstly, students have a tough enough time paying for their post-secondary education without fees increasing on a regular basis. Wages for working students (i.e. often minimum wage jobs) have not increased significantly since 2010, with the latest increase in 2016 only bringing minimum wage to 11.35/hr, they do not increase on par with inflation rates (esp. not inflated university prices) and it is very hard to pursue a post-secondary degree without incurring massive student debt.

Secondly, rising housing prices in Kelowna, and the lack of affordable student housing for UBCO students puts added pressure on students at this University. Raising tuition and affiliated costs will simply increase the financial pressure on students, impacting overall student health and success at this institution. As it is, many students struggle with balancing their finances and stress levels associated with school commitments, work commitments, family commitments and attempting to maintain a healthy lifestyle, while working towards their degree. Increased tuition would compound this issue and be an added pressure to students already struggling to maintain balance. If this institution strives for a healthy and successful student body, it should be creating more flexible financing, bursaries, and varied scholarships to encourage and support student success.

Lastly, proposed increases in 'non-instructional fees' will likely be an added frustration as well as an added financial burden for students. We understand that we pay set fees like transportation and library fees to the benefit of the entire student body, and mostly these fees are taken in stride. However, when we don't see our student fees reflected in the services we have access to (i.e. paying a significant fee for sports & athletics and then having to pay an additional 'membership' fee to actually have access to the facility) frustration is common. Increasing these types of fees may seem trivial, and I understand the desire (and recent projects) to update and ameliorate our campus, however this increase would be felt as a significant blow to many students, especially if compounded with increased tuition prices. Increases in 'non-instructional fees' for specific projects and/or changes to campus should be put to the student body as a vote, with the financial impact to students clearly laid out, and the student body should be able to use their democratic voice to decide whether this is a project which they desire and are willing to pay for.

Living costs are continually rising and UBC is becoming a school where only privileged people can attend. Education should be a right not a privilege. The construction around UBC is NOT as important as education is so please consider this when you make a decision that could potentially take UBC off the table for aspiring students because it is no longer in their budget.

please stop raising my tuition i'm too poor for this

I am thoroughly against this proposal.

The increase of tuition limit the diversity of this campus. Although we have a lot of nationality, most of them are from high-income family. I always feel most of my friends, who are international students, have narrow vision to the world. I don't like the increase of the tuition as the purpose of making this university better. You can find another way to use the money efficiently (the current way is not enough efficient) and save our money. Thank you.

The tuition fee for international students is far more expensive. And it is so unfair that we have to pay nearly one-tenth of the tuition that the domestic students should pay. For each credit it is over 1000 CAD and for one course we have to pay around 3500 while the tuition is increasing every year. If you increase every year, the fees might be out of our budget. Our families will be stressed because of being afraid of not able to pay the tuition for their children. THIS IS NOT FAIR FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS. Stop increase the tuition fee for international students. Please.

Please do it in a way that can protect those who take the loan as the largest proportion of their funding tuition.

Hello, the Board and the administration, I am an international undergraduate student in engineering, I think the tuition for international students is already so expensive and should not be increased so much. For me, my tuition is 1100 Canadian dollars per credit, and this year I have 48 required credits, it costs me more than 50 thousand dollars one year, it is really a burden for some of the students, which might due to the result that the university enrolls more and more rich-family students instead of excellent students. And the tuition for international students is more than 10 times of domestic students, however, we do not occupy more resources than them(sometimes even less), so I think it is unfair and so expensive to increase the tuition. Thank you.

If we are going to have another tuition increase, even due to inflationary pressures, I'd like to see UBC construct less flashy structures for alumni relations (hebb building light display, nest building quad lights, canoe in forestry building, alumni monuments outside alumni centre, fountain resurfacing) and more affordable housing (on campus, accessible options-- Wesbrook Village is not even remotely attainable for most students, and on campus housing after first year starts at around \$800 a month for Thunderbird), environmental initiatives, better (mental) health support, healthier (and affordable) cafeteria food, or even evaluate hiring standards for professors. Since coming to UBC, it has seemed to me that there is a disproportionate value placed upon campus aesthetics and true sustainability is overlooked...Yes, BC is beautiful, but I came here to learn and grow as an intellectual and adult.

Please do not increase the tuition fees. We, the students, are already under much financial distress. Please do not increase it any more. Please. I beg of you. Please.

I would highly suggest against any raises in tuition.

UBC tuition is already prohibitively expensive. It is unacceptable to continue to raise fees, particularly for a graduate program classified as a "professional degree" by the university and therefore ineligible for any funding through the university. The program I am enrolled in required me to pay for specific prerequisite courses at UBC, and unbelievably, after paying for 2 years of campus based study it also requires me to do 8 months of unpaid work in the community, during which time I will continue to pay tuition to the university. This is absolutely exploitative. And while we're on the subject of the astronomical cost of education, the additional fees tacked on to the cost of tuition are absurd. There is constant unnecessary construction on campus. I am being forced to pay for buildings I will never step foot in. Honestly, just stop.

I'd rather a compromise with a lesser increase in tuition. I don't feel like there is an immediate need to improve anything.

This response is written in hopes to acknowledge how little of an impact that can be made from a student's voice. Unnecessary renovations of Martha Piper Fountain, new public structure in place of the carbon filter box between Saulder and Scarf building, repaving of bricks on main mall. Yet most buildings in the engineering faculty are old and outdated, with the increase in tuition every year. What're the odds that voices of students are going to change the board's decision? Too much is forcefully taken and too little can be offered.

Seeing how such a small amount of your total funds are from students, raising student tuition will contribute a small, and negligible amount to your overall 2.4 billion in cost. At the same time, it will cause wide dissatisfaction among students. I recommended (especially under the current political conditions) to try to apply more more government grants (or other places) for the \$30mil. Any remainder can be placed on the students, at a smaller, harder to notice percentage.

too much money is being charged.

After reviewing the details, I am confident that increases in tuition are necessary and will be allocated to important pieces of the budget, but as a person living on a low income it worries me because it increases the barriers to obtaining postsecondary education for those in a position similar to mine. Money was the only factor that gave me pause about returning to UBC to further my education, and I am still worried that it will be difficult to complete this year while avoiding financial distress. As long as some of the tuition increases are put toward student financial aid (specifically need-based), I support it.

After my first year of University, I struggled to pay for my tuition fees every single semester. Every year I also notice this increase in tuition fees which worries me about my finances for the upcoming year or even semester. After I pay for each semester there are two things that strike me the most: I am paying for so many things that I don't even use, and if I decided to use these amenities I would consult a UBC staff and stay in line to even pay for it, and the second thing that worries me are the fees I have to pay for the next semester. It's hard enough to keep up with grades with 5 courses without a job and I really don't want to rely on my parents for money so like many students i'm taking student loans. By keeping the tuition the same or even lowering it would be more beneficial for students by lowering financial stress. However By raising it by 2% one year, how will we know if UBC won't raise it by another 2% the following year? If we are the youth that shape our world while the working generation is retired, how can we help them if we can't even pay off our loans after we graduate.

-International students are driving around Lamborghinis; i see no reason why a greater tuition increase is not in order

I am highly against the proposal of a fee increase as university is very expensive already and any increases in fees will be detrimental to most if not all students as well as provide an increasing amount of burden on families.

Uncertain if the university is aware of the amount of difficulty students face in order to be able to pay university fees: the government is very stingy when it comes to giving out bursaries and scholarships are very difficult to obtain as they are only given to a very minuscule number of students.

To increase student fees is to put more financial stress on students.

It is not the student's responsibility to carry the burden of the financial pressures felt by the university. With better budgeting, it is possible to reduce costs. The proposal of an increase means the realization of a problem and not trying to resolve it themselves. Rather, getting someone else (in this case the students) to pick up the pieces of the mess and carry the weight. This behaviour is not justifiable.

Yes, there is an increase in financial pressures for the university as the years have passed. However, look at the rest of the city/province, there has been a price hike and thus increase in financial pressures for everything. However, after 8 months of work terms, even if I save 100%, which is impossible, I can barely earn a year of my tuition fee. From the international student point of view, the tuition fee is already too high. Please do not further increase tuition fees.

I strongly believe that the increase in tuition is unnecessary, and I do not support it. Lots of students are already struggling to pay their tuition, and so increasing it is only going to add to their financial stress.

This is my fourth year. And the third time I receive proposal for increasing tuition fees

Why is it fair that wages have not increased but cost of education and living have all increased? Many of us are working students and we cannot afford to attend the school we worked so hard to get into. Please reconsider this increase.

I am against the tuition increase.

Tuition fee is too high

As a student who is financing my education on my own, this is an extremely painful notice to receive. I have a strict budget and have to make difficult decisions on the things I am able to spend money on based on the amount I have in my bank account. On a daily basis this means sacrificing things I would like to spend money on - including food and housing. What I don't understand is how the university cannot operate on the budget that it estimated for the next two years of my program. I am not as offended about increasing the fees for incoming students as I am that UBC would see it necessary to renege on the agreement sent to me in my letter of admission.

I don't really know why you are collecting this feedback, because I assume most students will have similar reactions and that the university will simply do what it likes, since technically our letter of admission includes a disclaimer that program fees could change. I just think it looks very poorly on the university that just a few months ago it sent me a letter of admission with a certain price tag that I budgeted for and now that I cannot go back and change which school I chose, it is increasing the fees I have to pay.

I believe the increase in tuition should not take place. I am a student who is back to UBC for my second degree. I am a single mother student who has no financial support from the family. Hence, I work throughout the year in order to pay for my tuition while studying to maintain a good academic standing. It is difficult. I am aware about student loans, but I don't like the stress of loans which may be even difficult to pay off than working while studying. Also, I know other students who are in the same boat as myself. Thus, I strongly feel there should not be an increase in tuition.

I would like to vote for a 2% to 3% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year. Thanks!

I think increasing the international student tuition fee by 2-3% year over year is not justifiable, even with the inflation costs in Canada. It should be capped at 1% at most. I've come to Canada for getting the best education possible but with rising costs, I'm not sure how long would it be until I'm unable to afford it.

Increasing tuition for domestic students is regulated by the Provincial Government to a maximum of 2%/year, while tuition increases for international students are unregulated. As such, this survey really only has any bearing on international students. Unless of course, UBC decided to increase domestic student tuition less than the 2% maximum.

Thank you for allowing domestic students to participate in a survey that otherwise checks the "student consultation complete" box in the checklist of UBC Budget deliberations.

As a UBC [...] student I am very opposed to the proposed tuition increase for the upcoming years. This is specific to my program, because as [...] students we are paying one of the highest tuitions in all of Canada for our education. At the UBC [...] our tuition is already \$20,000 higher per year than other [...] programs in our own country! This is an absurd amount to already try and justify, when other programs giving the same education costs much less. In addition, as [...] students a 2% increase for us is a much larger dollar value than any other undergraduate programs. We would be paying a lot more extra than the average student at UBC, so this would be affecting us much more. I thank you for your time and consideration, but I feel like this proposal is very unfair to try to apply to all faculties that are in different circumstances than most.

I oppose all tuition increases, particularly for domestic students. UBC is a wealthy university with sky-high enrollment. I am happy to see all the ongoing developments on campus, which I interpreted as a sign of UBC reinvesting profit toward better infrastructures. However, I oppose these developments if having a new building versus an old one in working condition means hiking tuition. The money is better spent in maintaining tuition levels and protecting students.

UBC tuition has been increasing every year, and it's quite ridiculous how expensive it gets. Yes, UBC is a prestigious post-secondary institution, but it seems like they are not making it easily accessible for those who wish to have quality education.

The proposed ideas make intuitive sense, however, as per the 3% increase, I wonder if we could explore methods of reducing textbook costs, or removing the costs altogether? This would help others to understand, and consent with the proposed ideas.

Graduate students take a smaller number of classes relative to undergraduate students. Considering the allocation plan is designed to ensure the bulk of tuition flows directly to the Faculties to support direct teaching costs, I do not see this increase benefiting graduate students to the same extent as undergraduate students despite their tuition increase by the same percentage. As a graduate student, I do not support this increase in tuition.

I understand the tuition could increase, but the speed is a little quicker.

I am pro-tuition increase.

I object to the fee increase as international student fees places increasing pressure on my peers and I. Ever year I see my tuition jump by the thousands and I am enraged. The fee increase skews the population of international students at UBC even more towards the economic elites of the world, pushing out valuable contributions from a diversity of non-Canadian voices. For a number of international students continuing their studies at UBC, our studies will be even more affected by increasing number of hours that we have to work to compensate for the fee increase. How can UBC remain a leading global institution when it puts up barriers to the world?

I vehemently object to the increase in tuition you greedy no good demons

2% seems appropriate for an increase this year. That said, I would prefer to see it at or below the rate of inflation over the next decade, seeing as minimum wage has not kept pace with inflation, and while some students are lucky enough to receive help from family, those who need to take on debt are going to struggle as their wages stay low but their costs increase.

Where can we see the breakdown in how the tuition is spent and which costs are increasing?

Please no more increases in tuition!

The fees that international students are subject to is unprecedented. It is impossible for students from a variety of socioeconomic backgrounds to attend UBC. I'm not in support of these proposals.

No, don't raise tuition. We already pay enough as it is, and a lot of it goes towards things that don't directly affect education itself at UBC.

Not agree

It was interesting to see UBC's budget breakdown, and it was not as I had anticipated. I have three major critiques.

1. There is far less money allotted to student financial aid than I imagined, especially considering the amount spent on "Alumni and Donor Relations". This tuition increase is supposedly due to inflation, but this tuition increase is in addition to an increasing student load, and an increasing number of paid masters programs, and likely increasing costs of professional programs as well. Therefore, there is an increase in the total student expenditure that is not related to inflation. In my opinion, financial aid should be relative to this number, and I don't know if a tuition increase of only this amount will be enough to balance this.

2. The 28m spent on "Alumni and Donor Relations" doesn't quite make sense. It says it is for fundraising, but the numbers don't quite add up on the charts given. Where is this fundraising coming in? From government grants? Hopefully not business revenue, which only makes 24 m. Furthermore, the total private revenue for scholarships is only 45m (which doesn't appear on the first total income chart), which isn't much more than the running budget for fundraising and is just under the 40% overhead of a normal charity. Considering how much is spent in this department, it seems like this money should be better allocated, as it is approximately the same amount as what will be received from the 2% tuition increase.

3. I realize that a significant amount of this will go towards faculty, however I am not content paying the UBC more just to keep current trends in this area. Like many universities around the world, UBC is heading in the direction of more online teaching and less interactive (lab work or field trips), which I think is not the direction of good quality education. Furthermore, UBC is also following the trend of hiring less faculty, and instead relying on the same number of faculty to teach more students each year, or hiring "contract professors", on less than a year contracts and making not much more than a PhD student. I think that if this trend continues, the quality of student education in the classroom will decrease, not to mention the impacts on research, or on professor mental health.

To sum up, I would agree to an increase in tuition if it made more sense financially, and if I knew that the extra money I will be paying will be spent wisely, or will have a significant impact. However, based on this proposal alone it doesn't appear that this tuition increase will change many of the concerns I have. Even worse is it appears that some of this budget could come from elsewhere.

Sorry but can't see meaning to increase fees. It's already ranking high in Canada especially for us international students and it could already be a heavy burden.

NO, tuition is high enough as it is. We just had an increase recently.

I think that this school is expensive as of now and not really accessible for low income families or students putting themselves through school. It is already much more expensive than some other schools in Canada and I don't see why this is something that should be increased. From what I have seen and what is available (news articles, etc) it can be seen that professors in BC make among the largest amounts in the world. While I do see great value in professors and I believe that teaching is one of the most important professions in the world, I do not see the need for professors to be making a quarter of a million to half a million dollars a year (nearly as much or more than the annual salary of the prime minister of Canada or members of parliament). Professors are incredibly important but so is an accessible education and by steadily increasing tuition it will become less and less accessible. Professors should not be being paid \$500,000 dollars a year while students are being put into hundreds of thousand of dollars worth of debt in the process of obtaining an education which is a right that everyone should therefore have access to.

As the only first generation Canadian in my family, it has been very difficult to pay to school. I have three older siblings, two of which attended and graduated from UBC and we all had to use government and provincial student loans in order to get us through school. In times like these, it's difficult to keep up with student loan payments, growing interest rates, and overall health. The increase in tuition fees would greatly impact all students at UBC and, as a school of diversity and inclusion, this would impact many students like me in a negative way

I do not understand why tuition needs to be raised across the board, it was raised last year and I have neither seen nor heard of any real improvements or tangible changes. One of the main reasons I and many other international students chose UBC was the affordability, if you take this away I can guarantee that UBC's number of international students will dramatically decrease. For example, I myself and several other students I know did not even bother applying to UToronto due to the extraordinary international tuition costs. As the Canadian dollar gets stronger this would be a disastrous move and would deter many students from even applying, nevermind considering coming. UBC claims they offer plenty of financial assistance to international students, but I have not found this to be the case at all.

It is frustrating to see the amount of student support contained within the expenses breakdown. Many of the programs do not receive enough student funding support, even though they are contributing to the research fields of their areas to great success. UBC seems to be willing to take the credit for their work, but without considering support for those smaller programs. A 2% increase may seem on the face of it a small amount, but coupled with the previous increase and the apparent lack of increase to student support, the weight continues to be shifted to the student body. I would highly encourage the UBC administration to bring these financial concerns to the attention to the Minister for Advanced Education in the province of BC, and press the current government to work to support post-secondary education without putting the pressure on current and incoming students.

Tuition for international students should be increased by 4.0%, and tuition for domestic students should be increased by 1.4%.

Hi, I am receiving the fellowship from my department and tuition is payed by this funding. I can use up to about 1500 dollars per month, but as the rent in Vancouver is getting higher and higher, I feel more pressure and stress that I have to buy less grosaries and go to less social meetings. I live like a social withdrawal and feeling really depressed some times. I heard the average rent in downtown has gotten up to \$2000 per month. Luckily, I don't live in downtown but my friends are doing extra work to keep up their room in downtown, although they are supposed to focus on their own research. I understood it is necessary to increase the tuition, but I would really appreciate if you consider increasing the scholarship accordingly. So that we can be free from this stressful situation.

Tuition costs should stop increasing for continuing studets of all types. It's unfair. Feels like we have no option as we want to finish our study and we're being pressured to pay more if we want to continue studying in the same school for the rest of out degree.

Fee increases should apply to incoming students only. Atleast then they have a chance to decide whether or not to come to UBC.

I do not like how UBC is increasing my fees more without transparency in spending. I have already watched my tuition increase by 2%/year since I've entered in 2016 from a board of governors vote. Furthermore, my program is required to pay ~415\$/credit instead of the normal undergraduate amount and the interest compounds (it started at 397\$/credit). My program also has some very nebulous fees (eg. a 1000\$ fee that was tacked on last year without any explanation) that have also grown with the 2%/year (eg. the 1000\$ fee will be 1040\$ this year). I don't see any improvements to my classes or buildings, all I see is UBC building more on-campus housing and charging exorbitantly for it. I have contacted my faculty about the fee and they have kept quite tight lipped about the whole thing. Will this 2% fee compound on the current 2% already voted in, thus being a 4.04% increase? I think the board of governors and UBC needs to make the finances of it's various faculties and facilities much more accessible and should be looking to cut inefficient spending and consolidating held debts instead of saddling incoming generations of budding academics with increasing amounts of student debt.

Being a university student, especially an international one is too hard!!!! Both local and international inflation will have bad effects on us.

I have been attending UBC for the past 5 years. Every single year there's one construction site or another around each bend. I don't see how milking students of all their money is in keeping with the core principles of a higher education institution. Instead of making school accessible for students, these tuition hikes are only increasing student debt and increasing socioeconomic disparity. I'm not one to speak up on electoral issues but enough is enough. I refuse to pay more money for school. These 2% hikes have been coming my way for too long. I keep paying fees and yet when I need access to a counsellor for the anxiety/depression I have to wait 2 weeks! When I'm having thoughts about killing myself and literally hold on because of the "investment" I have made in myself, there is nobody from the university to help. I'm fucked for life because of the lack of psychiatric support UBC offers. Start allocating tuition to issues that matter to your students and I'm sure UBC can do without another student residence.

I am in UBC DMD, and the projected costs for the 4 year DMD program is \$240,788.39. Two hundred thousand seven hundred eighty eight dollars. If there is a 2% increase in tuition, I would be paying an extra \$4815.77. This is unacceptable. Not only do I have to pay back this amount of money, I also have to pay off my undergrad debt, and save up money to purchase my practice and provide for my family.

NSERC [...] funding has increased \$800 over 27 years, from \$16700 in 1990 to \$17500 this year (http://www.nserc-crsng.gc.ca/ase-oro/Results-Resultats_eng.asp). Tuition has gone up by much more than \$800 since 1990. How are graduate students supposed to keep up with tuition that is rising faster than an award that only about 7% get? What about students that only receive minimum funding?

I am very disappointed with the continuous increase in tuition from this university. I understand that ubc likes to hold a prestige however this is prestige is negatively affecting it's fundamental values which is to provide education for it's students. There has been consistent concern during my stay at UBC regarding mental health services provided to students. The limited availability and unconcerned tone of communication makes it feel like UBC does not particularly care about students' mental health, despite continuous comments from our President and Vice-Chancellor. Perhaps more funding would allow students to get the help they need, without going to private sessions off campus.

As well, I would like to advocate for increased spending in student financial aid. Our generation is often characterized by our financial anxiety, and I find my finances are a source of great stress during the school year. It feels defeating that I will graduate with more than \$40 000 in student debt, despite an average well into the A category. Merit-based scholarships available before eligibility for the Premier scholarships could help younger students significantly, and an expansion of needs-based financial aid would be of general benefit to students, allowing us to focus on our studies, and reducing mental health issues associated with financial pressure.

In order to support these increased costs, I propose that new donors for scholarships be solicited and brought into the financial aid network. I don't presume to understand exactly how this process is undertaken, and I know that our representatives are working very hard to obtain donations; however, perhaps there are incentives we can give to local and international companies that could allow them to participate in student financial aid. As well, I would not be opposed to an additional fee, no more than \$100 a year, to go directly towards mental health services for students.

As a domestic student, I am thankful for being to attend UBC because of its low tuition costs. It is one of the major reasons why I chose this university over other Canadian schools. While I am enjoying my benefits as a domestic student, I feel that it is slightly unfair for international students who would like to study here but need to pay exorbitant tuition fees. I know that it is for the sake of keeping the educational institution running, but must tuition fees increase every year, making it harder for international students to come? In my opinion, I feel like domestic tuition should increase instead, as a way to balance the money from international tuition (Perhaps increase domestic tuition by a certain percentage while allowing the international tuition to remain the same). Thank you.

International students are already paying tuition fees worth five times more than domestic students. Most of the international students have budgeted a certain amount for school, and even a 2% increase could prevent access for many. Unlike domestic students who have access to governmental loans and bursaries, international students have to rely on finite funds from their home country (mostly their parents). While a sudden change in the employment status of domestic students or that of their parents could make students eligible for need-based scholarships, that is not the case for international students. Such unforeseen change in status mentioned above has no affect on international students' access to funds, thereby, preventing them from completing their degree. Most of the international students chose UBC for quality education, but if the university structure is preventing them that access, is the university really promoting higher education?

I am opposed to any increase in tuition to domestic or international students. I don't use enough of additional services provided by ubc to justify increasing it.

The increase in tuition payment rates is not reflected in the amount of financial benefits and support that students receive; Rate increase should lead to increased financial support and not more financial pressure for students. Hence I do not agree to the increase in tuition.

Personally I dont feel it is necessary to raise school tuition because us Domestic students are paying for taxes and some of us have to work to have enough money for school. Alongside this, we are paying for little school fees that add up to hundreds of dollars. For example AMS fees and other related school costs.

There is a need for funds to be allocated to upgrading parking and putting in student overpasses. It would be a shame for a student to have to be injured, or worse, in order for this issue to be addressed. It is a huge issue trying to drive over the student crosswalks; pedestrians do not give way.

I am aware that increases in tuition and other services are likely to occur at different times during a program of studies. However, UBC should present to all students, especially internationals, the possible percentages of increase when they apply for admission to the University. A sudden or unexpected increase could be disappointing to student. They budget for a certain amount each year, and if increases are not presented to student at the appropriate time, they might not be calculated in the budget. This could mean the students might not be able to finance there studies and might eventually have to withdraw.

It is very difficult for me to cope with paying the already absurdly high international tuition fees.

I understand the rising costs, but you should consider the fact that for distance learning, the cost is already fairly high considering the cost of running. It seems unnecessary to raise the fee for fully distance-learning courses considering the medium.

There is a 2% increase in tuition every year while students see no benefit. The services are no better. The buildings are largely the same. The teaching is of the same quality every year. 2% increases every year are ridiculous and unacceptable if no benefits are seen to the students actually paying you. You largely force the student body with these fees every year whereby if we do not pay we cannot take the courses and graduate.

Graduate students take very few classes and yet are still charged hefty tuition fees, essentially the university is already charging us for services we do not use; in fact most of our time is spent performing research that actively benefits the University of British Columbia. Considering for the vast majority of graduate students the only sources of income we have are our student stipends and any award money that we independently earn and that Vancouver is already one of the most expensive cities in North America an increase in our tuition fees would further strain our already slender resources and could negatively impact our studies, especially for graduate students who have dependents of their own to support.

I feel as though considering how much international tuition already costs, increasing the base international tuition for continuing and new students by 3% while only increasing domestic tuition by 2% is not really fair. Considering inflation, if 2% is sufficient for domestic students (and considering the provincial policy), 2% should also be sufficient for international students.

As an international student, I'm quite conflicted as to how I feel about this. Without scholarships I would not be able to attend this university at all. Which does lead me to firstly disagree with tuition increases (even though it is necessary), as it causes more students to opt out of coming to UBC due to affordability issues (in the cases where they just don't get the scholarship, etc.). However, since there will be many other students who will I guess pay their tuition fully (without need of scholarships), I guess there won't be that much harm to the overall revenue. It definitely will improve the campus overall, but I don't think it is really worth it for the students

the consumer price inflation rate in 2018 is projected to be a 2% increase on 2017 (Scotiabank Forecast).

the rationale given for for tuition fees increasing is that they must be pegged to inflation rates in order for the university to make enough revenue to cover costs.

the proposed 2-3% increase for international students fees is not in keeping with this rationale.

the increase should be capped at 2%, in keeping with the projected inflation rate.

The tuition fees have been going up every year if I recall correctly, and these increases pile up although it does not seem like much. Many students do not associate themselves with some of the activities that the fees go towards, and although I understand to a degree why all students still pay the same fees, I believe that this years tuition increase should not happen. Also, a system should be thought upon where students can choose to pay or not pay some of the fees associated with tuition, and if they do not pay, they simply will not have access to those resources.

I suggest increasing tuition cost more so for international students than for domestic students, since the former is more likely to be able to afford the increased cost. This may also serve to readjust the proportions of international and domestic students for the future.

Personally, I don't think it is reasonable to increase tuition fees for continuing students since we have already in this school and we don't have a choice like transfer to other universities with cheap tuition. I am, by principle, against any increases in university cost beyond inflation (1.4% for the last year according to BoC). A lot of non instructional fees just seem to be really questionable so I don't quite understand why it's so expensive.

I'm tired of feeling gauged by the university. These constant increases across everyone's tuition is unnecessary and I strongly believe those in charge of them should feel ashamed. I'm not dealing with any struggle to keep up with these costs, but rather my opinion stems from my belief that the students aren't getting their tuition's worth from this school. I sincerely beg you to stop this crime.

I think the present tuition fee is reasonable both for students and the school. The tuition fee has been increasing continually for several years. Though 2% seems a small amount, but the base the percentage multiplied on is too large for international students. At the same time, the high tuition fee will seriously influence our international students' study budget. For example, we might plan to apply for a minor degree before, but afterwards, we need to pay another \$1512 for 18 extra credits. Some students may diminish their minor plan, which is a pity for the students and the school. I hope the tuition fee should be controlled in a reasonable range, and I hope our school can be better in the future.

The fact that tuition prices need to increase by 2% doesn't really bother me as I am a graduate student taking courses at my own pace when I can afford them. What does bother me is that fact that there are a bunch of extra fees that I pay into that do not apply to me, for example Library fee, Athletic fee, credit card convenience fee etc. I only visit the University every second Saturday plus a few full weeks in the summer simply to attend my course and leave. It infuriates me that I have to pay for these fees which have no use to me not to mention any of the services I actually need on Saturdays are not available to me. Last year there were multiple times where there was not ONE available food option, no internet, garbage everywhere in the buildings while my classes were still going on. I expect that if I am paying a certain amount of money to attend university not to mention pitching into the 'useless' fees, that the university be able to provide at least one amenity (cafeteria or simply a coffee shop) to be stay open for weekend classes and spring classes. OR if you are going to basically 'shut down' in the spring and discontinue services then don't charge as much to attend during those times. I expect when I attend my spring weekend classes that are being offered that I be able to hook up to the internet in order to do the required work to pass my course. Doesn't seem like that much, but professional programs such a pharmacy and med has already higher tuition costs because of the program they are in. Since the switch from the BSc Pharmacy program to the Entry-to-Practice PharmD then tuition has almost doubled. Using a percentage to increase tuition for all students means that the cost of tuition is getting further out of reach. The government student loans haven't increased the amount that they are giving to these students, but yet the university charges them more. The financial aid given is not increasing proportionately to the amount that tuition is increasing. If you are going to increase tuition by 2% then you should increase bursary and other financial aid by 2% as well. I think it should be an increase by a dollar value per credit so that it is standard across all programs. I have been fortunate enough to have assistance from my family otherwise I would not have been able to afford my program. But if tuition keeps going up and up eventually you will have people that are a perfect fit for the program, but can not afford it. I believe that is what happened in the US and I don't think that is what we want for our country's education. Right now so many students are struggling to pay for tuition at the rate that it's at right now, me in particular. I don't feel like it's fair to up prices because I am working my butt off in summer to pay for my tuition, books, uniform and transportation when I'm in school. Plus I have unnecessary fees such as a U-Pass, student union and various hidden fees that have nothing to do with me in school and I can't even opt out of it. I can't even apply for financial aid because of my parents income (which they don't even pay for my schooling) so I feel like it's very unfair to up prices for domestic students that are trying so hard to be able to afford school. You could potentially be taking away the opportunity for me to finish my degree because I won't be able to afford it.

The impression that most students I am acquainted with have is that the majority of our tuition proceeds are going towards the construction/beautification of campus as well as the funding of graduate/professor research. Speaking for myself, an undergraduate who comes from a lower-income household, I want UBC to be known for placing value on - above all - the accessibility of education for domestic and foreign students alike.

Whenever possible, it is international tuition that should be increased. Domestic students already have enough financial burden, and we do not have the luxury of taking a four-year trip to a foreign country for our education.

I think to fairly assess if UBC should increase tuition by 2%, UBC must be transparent with what these funds will be allocated to. From what I've seen around, UBC is spending our hard earned money on beautifying the landscape of our university. While these efforts are appreciated, I don't see why the university must continuously increase our tuition to fund these unnecessary projects. I have three siblings with one parent who struggles not only to pay not only for school, but what will be our next meal. I work part time to fund my schooling and give what little I have remaining to support my family. When I came to UBC back in 2014, courses were roughly \$400. Now I pay roughly \$500, and now UBC wants to continuously increase my already expensive tuition. When will these tuition increases cease? It may not seem a lot of money to you, however, many of us are low-middle income earners who have the bare minimum to pay for our education. I implore you to reconsider this tuition increase as this move makes affording a quality education even more difficult than ever.

The increase in tuition every year is becoming hard to cope with. I am burning through my loan and budget to keep up with the increase in tuition and housing fees.

UBC should have given us a warning atleast that the tuition is subject to increase every year in the pamphlets and admission letter before year one.

The only reason I chose to come to UBC or yet come to Canada to study was the affordability. And I think this resonates with all international students.

Please do mention the increase in tuition in ur website and pamphlets so that the incoming students are prepared. Getting loans isn't easy and going over board the budget isn't going to make paying off the interest and the loan altogether any easier.

To whom it may concern,

When considering budget increases, I think it is important to consider the ability of certain types of students to meet increased financial demands. During my undergrad, I was a student who always held down a job, at least 3 shifts per week to help pay the tuition costs, even when taking 6 classes a semester. As challenging as it can be, I believe it is possible for a student to work part time while completing their undergraduate degree. I am now in an professional graduate degree program, and because of the demands of the program, I am unable to work to help pay my tuition costs. I have taken out a student loan, but the loan does not cover living expenses, and because of a variety of factors, I am not able to move back in with my parents. I understand that many students struggle to meet financial demands of post secondary education, but I do think that students in professional degree programs are in a unique situation, as working during the semester is generally not possible, and part time studies are not usually an option in professional degree programs. In addition, because many of us are older than the majority of undergraduate students, many of us are responsible for funding our own education, while paying living expenses, all without income. To summarize, I think a tuition increase for professional (graduate) degree programs should be avoided as much as possible, given the unique circumstances that students in these programs find themselves in.

I really don't know how you could suck any more money out of students.. but somehow you're trying. Everything on campus is designed to cost students a fortune. It's a no from me.

Why increase continuing international students' tuition by 2% - 3%. Seems unfair that continuing students will have a potential increase of 3% in tuition while others only have 2% especially since international students already pay a higher amount.

I am not sure if I approve of another increase in fees especially since the last one happened since the 2015/2016 academic year. As an international student, another ridiculous rise in fees may cause me to leave my studies here because I won't be able to afford to stay. I suggest not increasing international student fees because we already pay thrice as much as domestic students and most of us aren't from rich families. I would like to stay in this university but I will most likely leave if my fees are increased again.

It is hard to adapt to tuition increases for many international students, please keep in mind that budgets are prepared ahead of time. Also, please note that as international students we have the added pressure of exchange rate differences which alone make a substantial difference in our budgets.

It should be cheaper for all domestic students. We should be valuing education and making it easier for Canadians to further their knowledge through post-secondary.

As an international student studying in [...] engineering, I understand the opinions of many other international students here at UBC of increasing tuition. One of those opinions is that it is already very expensive to study here, setting aside the costs for living and food. One of the big factors of me choosing UBC is that it is a highly recognized institution with a tuition that is affordable for the education received here. If the tuition is further increased, many others like me might make other choices and pass up the opportunity to study here. So I think increasing tuition would make it more difficult for students to study here.

I find the tuition increase to be too much especially for international students. A 2% increase for domestic students is not the same as a 2% increase for international students. On top of that, the Canadian dollar is getting stronger relative to other currencies, making it exponentially more expensive for international students. As an international student, the shift in currency alone has increased my tuition by approximately 7000 CAD in the past year, adjusted to inflation. On top of that a 2% increase will greatly affect this number to possibly 5 digits.

I am deeply upset by the proposal of a increase in tuition. As a second year student I am shocked that this is the second increase I have experienced since my short time here at UBC. This 2% jump in the short amount of time is to be completely honest, terrifying because I am concerned that it will limit my ability to continue at school or put financial hardship on students trying to further their education here. As an International Student, we pay a significant amount more in tuition comparatively to local students. I understand this is for logistical reasons, (we are taking the spots of students who live here), however as a place of education, it must be considered that students who do not have equal opportunity (financially or academically) come to UBC to seek a place to learn and work past those disadvantages. I would hope that this is taken into consideration when proposing to increase the tuition for a second time in the past year, because this could quite literally inhibit students ability to study here, or cause stress and financial hardship to thousands of students and families. Also, other than school-sponsored scholarships and awards, there are very little opportunities for International students to receive external funds to help support their education, which adds to the dilemma of an increased tuition. Thank you for your time and I hope you take these points into consideration on behalf of many International and local students at UBC and for years to come.

Absolutely NO MORE tuition increases. There should be a tuition freeze. This is ridiculous.

Please do not increase the tuition. We students are financially pressured as it is.

One of the major reasons I came to UBC was because it was one of the most affordable universities in terms of tuition fees in North America for international students. A very high proportion of the international students who come to UBC, come here because of that very reason. However, over the past few years UBC has unfairly kept increasing its international tuition fees making the already considerable tuition fees even higher. I will not recommend any international student that I know to come to UBC because the university is putting too much financial pressure on international students.

I started my undergraduate study since 2015. Tuition fee keep increasing year after year. I become have difficulty to afford tuition. I believe that high education quality is not equivalent to high tuition. And high tuition will hinder people on academic developing.

I strongly disagree with all proposed tuition and fee increases. Compared to the schools that I attended previously, all the important aspects of my UBC experience have been second-rate: from grossly incompetent and unethical instructors, through poorly drafted and badly implemented university policies to token student services and sweatshop-quality graduate student offices. From my perspective, the consistently shoddy service that is being provided by UBC does not merit additional funds.

Please only raise tuition for international students. They are the ones who have the resources to come here and stay in the new expensive residences, drive Spongebob mazaraties, and own million dollar homes, so the burden should fall on them to pay the cost of tuition.

In Vancouver, the cost of living is always increasing. Rent has almost doubled since 2010. You can't expect domestic students, many who are on student loans, to pay more tuition especially since there is a mechanism to collect funds from the global influx of wealth that is no stranger to this city vis international students.

Should not increase tuition. Is already way too expensive as it is.

UBC makes 603m in revenue from four categories alone: 24m in business revenue + 42m in investment income + 335m in revenue from central units + 202m from faculty revenues = 603m.

And yet UBC spends a paltry 36m on student services. That is an abysmal and senior administration at UBC should be ashamed that this is the reality for undergraduate and graduate students. The numbers don't lie and UBC can't pretend to be a campus that cares about student well-being and learning when the University is too busy overcharging students for central services like food and books, and there are huge numbers of students in distress who can't access the services or advising they need because there's "no budget."

Alumni and Development spends 28m - almost as much as what UBC allocates towards student services - when they should be a self-funded unit. It's obvious that donors are required for some scholarships and buildings to be built on campus, but senior administration at UBC should be ashamed that so little is allocated towards student services. For a university that talks about mental health, it seriously does a terrible job of creating services for students that ACTUALLY serve students. Student tuition should not be allocated towards Alumni & Development. Student tuition should be allocated primarily towards services and administration that serves students.

The chart that breaks down financial support for UBC students is also worrisome. Of course many scholarships are funded by donors (and thank god they do) but why does UBC not put in any significant amounts towards financial aid, and instead relies on external sources when the university obviously makes a significant amount of revenue? Again, the University is illustrating that it cares more about revenues that servicing and supporting students - which, if a reminder is necessary, is one of the reasons why the university exists: to teach.

Other questions:

- what is the 10m being spent on community engagement? How is Alumni & Development separate from community engagement? These two things are a total of 38m. Where is the information proving that this money has been spent wisely and has resulted in return on investment for UBC?

- why is this information page attempting to be transparent yet so much information is not included?

- why isn't more revenue allocated towards student financial aid?

UBC is already an extremely expensive place to go to school because it is in Vancouver.. Are our wages also getting increased more? My rent just went up. The tuition is much higher than other places in Canada.. How am I supposed to live when my rent goes up and my tuition goes up?

Please don't make me pay more !!! I don't have enough money because you people took it all.

Do you really think you need more money?

Do not increase tuition for domestic students. Increase the international student tuitions as much as you want but don't touch the domestic student tuition. The only response that domestic students like myself attend UBC is that UBC tuition used to be affordable.

It's also so difficult to plan financially if tuition changes each year. The amount I saved through high school and the scholarships were supposed to cover the tuition fees that were presented to us when I started at UBC only a few years ago (I am a third year). Why is it that tuition had to change again and again so that even the most careful planners are now scrambling to find more money to pay.

University is becoming increasingly expensive for us. My parents are unemployed and can't handle the pressures of increasing tuition even though it is as a result of inflation. I am doing my best to help my struggling father and I would appreciate the support of then university in this situation by keeping tuition fees where they are.

I personally do not like the concept of increased tuition fees. School is extremely expensive already, and adding 2-3% to tuition really adds up.

I don't agree that domestic students should be paying more for tuition. It's not fair for students that live and have contributed to British Columbia economy to be once again paying out of our pockets. I do understand increasing tuition of international students, since they chose to move elsewhere.

I believe that we should NOT be subsidizing foreign/international student tuition fees. Here is my break-down of what I think the fees should be:

a 20% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in graduate programs with standardized rates;

a 20% increase in tuition for new incoming international students in certificate programs;

a 20% to 30% increase in tuition for new incoming international graduate students in specified graduate programs;

a 20% to 30% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year; and

a 2% increase in non-instructional fees for all students.

I do not believe that anything I could write here would contribute to any likelihood at all that these tuition increases will pass. But I will share what I believe to be true and important.

There is no way to justify these increases as a necessity, they are entirely a profiteering initiative, because in this society and epoch all organizations are obliged to increase their profits annually or else risk their survival. Any rational person immediately identifies these increases as in line with the neo-liberal profiteering that UBC has made itself known for.

I am a scholar recipient, I live in poverty and would not have any ability to afford UBC tuition without this assistance, even working full time all summer I barely made enough for my first semester installment. By my estimated calculations these increases will take \$500 out of my pocket, which literally is TAKING BREAD OUT OF MY MOUTH. These increases will severely impact my meal plan and hamper my access to resources at UBC (since many of those resources are locked [even to tuition paying students] behind decently fair pay walls). \$500 less every semester will HARM STUDENTS. There is no way that the money doesn't already exist in the board members' pockets and profits, the only purpose of taxing us students is to increase profit margins.

Please DO NOT increase tuition for current international students. Tuition increases every year are making it harder and harder to afford contributing my degree at UBC, especially with the exorbitant cost of living in Vancouver. When I decided to commit to UBC I thought I would be paying about the same price every year, but costs have been going up since I got here. There was already an international student tuition increase, we don't need the cost of education to keep going up for those who are already here.

Should be done a different way, and not by raising tuition costs. This is unfair to students. Student debts are already a thing and raising tuition costs is outrageous. I understand the money has to come from somewhere but it always seems to be the students that have to suffer.

Not support at all, the study work is stressful already, please don't add more stress on financial aspect.

I feel that the 2/3% hike in tuition should be absorbed by the university by doing some cost cutting. For example, increase rentals in shops on campus and be less eco-friendly (I'd rather pay less than be eco-friendly). Education price is already very high for international students and hiking that can demoralize international students.

I don't think it's reasonable at all that it keeps increasing every year.

The tuition fee is too much for international students!! Even though our fee should be higher than domestic students, but that's too much higher than them, and it's unbelievable that it's still increasing:(

Tuition increases have already burdened both international and domestic students since last year and students are trying to find more ways to lessen student loans. I know myself that my scholarship counts for less than it did last year and, with this increase, will probably count for less in the years to come which is both a burden to me and my family.

The tuition is far too expensive to pay by working a job, and it seems like graduating in debt is the only option. On top of books, we have to pay for unnecessary things I will never use as apart of tuition (such as recreational etc. fees).

a 2% to 3% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year.

I think international students pay a whole deal greater than the domestic students. Raising tuition cost per credit disincentivizes electives when its requirement are fulfilled.

I think these tuition increases are extremely unfair and unrepresentative of the conditions we receive in return from UBC. Many facilities are not up to standard and most are extremely unaccommodating to lets say someone like me who is a commuter or someone under specific circumstances. Things are made as hard as possible and even though the numrous resources that we are said to provide are only available on such a small scale(mental health/Counselling for example) that they are nearly impossible to access. I can go on but you could get in touch with me if you would like to hear more. [...] Therefore, no I do not think these tuition increases are justified in any way or necessary.

I find it ridiculous how just over half of our tuition goes to faculties. I understand the need to fund research and supplies/equipments to provide a better educational space for students, but that is not reflected in the program that I am in. I changed from the [...] to the [...] because I felt that my IB program in [...] provided better teaching than UBC does. Now, as a senior in [...], I still feel that there are a lack of opportunities provided by the faculties to students. For example, why is the program limited to Western European and (sometimes) Canadian [...] ? There are not enough courses for me to specialise in South Asian [...] ; nor are there any in Indigenous or African [...] --the only way for me to graduate in time is to do Western [...]. If our tuition is going towards the improvement of faculties, how am I not seeing it for the past three years that I have been here? It baffles me how a majority (about 900m to be exact) of our money goes towards salaries and benefits for faculty and staff and very little is put for student housing. As many of you already know, there is a huge housing crisis in Vancouver and yet not much is being placed to help accommodate students' living condition. To be able to live comfortably, as an international student, many of us have to move east because landlords keep increasing rent. That, in itself, makes it quite difficult for us to work, go to school and study all at the same time because we spent half of our lives commuting. It is already hard enough for us international students to be paying as much as we are, given that a lot of us are studying outside because opportunities back home are worse and conversion rate really takes a toll on our families financially. I don't see how the money that we are paying to UBC are used what-so-ever to help the students. The other problem that I want to point out is the allocation towards the category you call "Student Services." Why is student services the third least funded category; there isn't much support provided by the university for students' health (mentally and physically), counselling. And this is reflected heavily, as I find the counselling to be sub-par, to say the least. I took a gap year during career here as a student because I felt that there was little-to-no support from the university based on experiences my friends and I had. Just look at the sexual assault that happened back in 2015, how long did it take for UBC to respond? How long did it take for students to feel safe on their own campus; on a space that they have heavily invested in with these tuition costs? Why is it that if there are any academic misconduct, a student will be expelled immediately, but when it comes to the safety of students' mental and physical health, it takes forever for the university to step up. Why was the rapist only 'temporarily' banned from school as the investigation was happening--and even then, he wasn't even in the country. These are just some of the examples where I feel like my money is not being used to benefit me at all, but to maintain the idealistic imagery of the campus and to increase faculty salaries at the expense of the students' education.

I do not agree with this tuition increase at all. Ubc have been adding fees since my first year here (and I will be entering fifth year next year), yet we are not benefiting from any of the benefits. The facilities are still more than 30 years old, and none of the fees actually benefit the students themselves. If anything, they'll go into the pockets of profs and other ubc workers and that is completely not fair. Re evaluate your budget and think about the students for once.

If the cause of increases in tuition is inflation/ increasing operating costs, there is no reasonable way to say it is fair to increase international tuition by a percentage larger than the percentage change in domestic tuition. If there is a necessity for an increase in tuition due to inflation, please distribute these costs equally across domestic and international students. I realize the plan does not necessarily imply the change for international students will be over the 2% increase domestic students will experience but I strongly urge that the increase is equal across all undergraduates.

Tuition is high enough as it is, please stop raising it, us students are struggling to afford tuition as it is!

University is already expensive enough. Please don't increase the tuition without giving out more scholarships.

Increase tuition for incoming students. That's fine. Because then they would be able to decide wether or not they are still able to afford studying at UBC. Please leave continuing students alone, domestic and continuing. The more you increase our tuition the more uncertain we become of our ability to afford tuition.

Fees for international students are very high as it is, considerably more than what I would pay for if I went to University in my home country (the USA), especially if I stayed in-state. I chose to come to UBCO because I feel that this institution offers a great program in which I can excel in. I didn't just go to University in a different country because I have the funds, because frankly, I do not.

I understand that Universities are private institutions, not funded by the government, but largely by the tuition fees students pay. Raising tuition fees, no matter how small a percentage, puts difficulty on students. Instead of worrying about their studies, they are constantly reminded that they need to find ways to pay for their higher education.

I do not think tuition should be raised. Students can barely afford university as it is.

Dont increase domestic just international

For those of us receiving (and depending heavily on) funding from which tuition is deducted, for example the 4-year fellowship award (FYF), will the award be increased accordingly? I cannot find information on this. Please make this available and note, that if not, this is essentially taking away funding that we were already awarded prior to the increase.

I do not agree with the raising of tuition fees at all. It's already such a financial burden to me and my family and it is extremely unjust to turn students away from receiving higher education, especially those who are in a less financially stable situation.

The tuition increase of 2.0% for domestic students is unacceptable to me. It is already a stress to pay the current cost of tuition. Thr Bank Of Canada predicts annual inflation for 2018 to be 1.8%. If UBC were to simply follow this target, tuition should rise 1.8%, not 2.0%. Please reconsider this exorbitant increase as it will have a detrimental affect on many students and their families.

I hope the tuition fee for international continuing Student increase the same percent as the domestic Student.

I find the argument for 'keeping up with inflationary pressures' to be vague, particularly when considering UBC's initiative to decrease costs (yet utter failure to do so). The rationale for 2% seems flawed when considering the Canadian inflation rate has been below 2% for the previous 7 years (and averages across the previous 20 years has also been below 2%); yet UBC has had an operating expenses increase by an average of 3.4% year over year since 2008; and 36% expenses increase since 2008 (<https://consultations.students.ubc.ca/consultations/tuition-consultation-201819#Tuition>).

In the effort to ensure there is informed and transparent dialogue, other questions that are not discussed in the Consultation:

What costs are being incurred as a result (ie compensating for unpaid/defaulted tuition fees, creating further barriers to low and even medium income students)?

Why does the proposal not include discussion about the consequences (both good and bad) of increasing tuition fees?

Why does it not discuss targets for improvements to operational costs?

Being an international student, the most significant part of the proposal that stood out to me was the 2-3% increase for all continuing international students. The price for domestic students as opposed to the price international students is far more affordable, and understandably so. The domestic students and their families pay taxes in Canada, which dedicates 2.5% of its GDP to post-secondary education, something that I wish my home (the USA) would do as well. I understand that with inflation, prices must change, but what I fail to understand is how UBC, which heavily prides itself on being one of the most international schools in the world, thinks that an additional increase on continuing international students is the necessary step. If all students faced the same increase, that would be fair, but this is not. We are UBC students too, and we are here to better ourselves and contribute to an institution that we care about and believe in. While I've felt that this school has done an exceptional job welcoming and assisting international students in my time here so far, an additional increase on ALL continuing international students would simply be unfair and unjust.

No, stop raising it!! Stop you're basically stealing from students, you're making the university into a glorified bank, and every time you raise tuition you make it less and less likely that I'll ever "donate" to you once I'm alumni.

I believe that increasing the tuition fees again is unreasonable since most of what the increased fees have covered benefit not those whose fees have been increased.

The tuition hikes are unreasonable, especially if scholarships will not be raised in accordance. I have been here for the past seven years and am struggling to pay tuition as a PhD student as it is. I do not support this. Tuition should only go up if you have plans and financial measures in place to support your graduate students who are struggling to pay tuition as it is.

Every year the university increases tuition, citing inflation as the main reason, yet despite this, there is no corresponding increase to wages of student workers on campus to reflect this added cost of living. If the university is going to continue increasing tuition year after year, they should also acknowledge the student workers increased costs by increasing wages.

Also, increases to tuition would be a lot easier to justify if I felt it were actually going to something useful. For example, the university is continuously updating buildings and tearing things down and building new things that did need to be rebuilt, yet the school of Kinesiology STILL does not have its own building on campus. Instead, we are spread out across campus in osbourne, war memorial Gym, and Woodward. If I felt the university actually considered the wellness of its students and what areas were really in need of funding, I would be fine with the proposed increase in tuition. This is not the case though, and I feel the tuition increase is unnecessary and only serves the interests of lining the university's already deep pockets at the expense of its hardworking students.

Every year, tuition and residence costs increase, specially for international students. It is unfortunate that Ubc is once again raising tuition fees and inevitably cutting students who lack financial support and cannot afford to pay higher tuition fees. For a university that supposedly prides itself on diversity, why would you make your education available to only wealthy students of the upper class who can afford to pay. Inflation is a real issue but students just trying to get an education, are already in heavy debt due to the lack of empathy from universities such as UBC. The tuition proposal looks quite professional and sanitized. I don't have the time to read it, of course. So I can only comment on my perceptions and readings:

1) UBC apparently has a much larger staff-to-faculty ratio than even Toronto or (shudder) McGill. There is a rumour that the last president investigated this situation, and was encouraged to resign. Staff wages, of course, don't come from nowhere, so bloated staff numbers get billed to us.

To whom it may concern,

Please do not raise tuition. While governments should be providing additional funding to universities in order to ensure institutions can address rising costs, students should not, and many cannot, provide this additional funding. Student debt is at unprecedented levels, causing significant stress for many students. In addition, student loan programs do not provide enough support to allow students to pay tuition and pay rent in Vancouver, forcing many to work while they study. Raising tuition fees further will force students to work more and take on more debt. This will negatively effect the mental health of students and reduce the time students have to focus on their studies. Please re-think the plan to raise tuition. Instead, UBC could ally with students in putting significant pressure on the new provincial government to increase funding to universities. If UBC committed to using increased funding to lower tuition costs, it would be a strong indication to students that the university truly cares about their well-being.

I am outraged by the continual tuition increases, as well as skeptical that anything I write here will make a difference. This poll is merely a way to demonstrate fake interest in the opinions of students-- just the fact of administering it full fills the checklist.

Federal data shows that both the average amount of student debt and the number of borrowers are increasing. This is a general trend and universities are now are increasingly more about generating profit then they are at disseminating knowledge. Surely, without profit it is difficult to have the amenities and resources, but what is happening now is just going too far.

This is my 8th year at UBC. I did my undergraduate (double major) for 5 years and immediately entered my masters degree (this is my last year). During my 8 years, I spent an incredible amount of time here--also living on campus for 4 years. The university, in my opinion, has not offered me more than it did when I first started. In fact, the community and general logistics of getting around where diminished by the constant construction around. I do not feel like I matter here, since this university is now continuously constructed for international students.

UBC firmly believes that international engagement benefits both domestic and international participants in post-secondary education. The diversity of opinion, perspective and circumstance improves the educational experience for all engaged in the exchange of ideas. I absolutely agree, and that is definitely a plus of being in a multicultural city and having many international students here.

BUT, the problem of access for domestic students is acute in many of the programs most popular with foreign students, such as economics, as well as business and engineering. How can UBC, a public institution heavily funded by B.C. taxpayers, justify nearly a third of its first-year undergraduates coming from abroad when only 11 per cent and 17 per cent, respectively, of Harvard and Oxford undergrads are international students? UBCs numbers seem disproportionately high.

The facts is, there is a large supply of wealthy international students trying to access this school. But the construction, amenities and organization of this university is increasingly catering to those students. It has not been confirmed yet, but it is increasingly obvious (and I have talked to people who confirm their cases) that people are entering with lower averages and no adequate language proficiency. While I am all for giving people opportunities despite averages, the same is not happening for domestic students. The university is spending increasing amounts of money rebranding itself, (big UBC sign...) and while we can pretend it is for a increased identity for the campus, it is meant to market the university. All that matters is the dollar bills coming in, and all the new buildings are not responding to current need--- they are here as signs of aspiration, of what UBC wants to become in the future. And the future is about \$\$\$ and not me, a person who has given the university 8 years of tuition, community participation, representation and heart.

I personally am against the tuition increase. As an international student without any scholarship, my parents are already struggling to pay for my brother (who is also studying abroad elsewhere) and I's tuition this year. Obviously, most people would say to pick a university with a cheaper tuition, but when we are already both at our dream schools, it would be so inconvenient to have to shift our plans and budgeting again. Moreover, it is very difficult to get financial aid as well as pay it back. I feel like most things here are already overpriced, and to increase tuition payments would be unnecessary. All social and financial classes should be considered when the board is making this decision as not everyone may have the same financial aid as others, and the focus should be on what every school should prioritise, which is the quality of education.

The tuition is way too high for international students compared to other universities in Vancouver. We need UBC to cut at least 20%-30% of the tuition for international students.

Domestic students are already struggling with paying bills, food, and other costs of living. Tuition increases for domestic students would make things incredibly more adverse. Many domestic students are currently struggling keeping a job to support themselves while trying to stay on top of school work. In contrast most international students have financial help from their families at home and can afford the increases to their tuition.

The increase will hurt the students. I have so many friends who are accumulating debt which they will struggle to pay off years after their degree. I am lucky to have some financial support, but it is not enough to get through my degree. The increase will put me into debt as well. Additionally, tuition increases every single year! I personally feel that it is unnecessary, or at the least that the 3% increase is too large.

Perhaps you should be looking for ways to decrease spending and provide a decrease in tuition for students struggling to pay Vancouver housing and living costs.

| I find the proposed increase, which is approximately twice the rate of inflation completely unreasonable. The primary reason given for the increase is inflationary pressures, however that you are attempting to counteract that with institutional efficiencies. Despite this you have decided the increase should be approximately twice the rate of inflation. This is without even considering the considerable overcrowding at the Okanagan campus. The campus has gained more than a thousand students in the past few years, without any expansion to facilities. By increasing the tuition fee that frequently, I feel difficult to continue my study because I need to work extra hours part timely to pay my tuition. That's not very fair.

Why are you even increasing tuition? To build a crap load of buildings we don't need, or to service buildings that we don't want and/or will collapse in an earthquake anyway? Obviously you wasted money somewhere, because this school hasn't changed at all, yet somehow need more funds. Maybe you should go ask the contributors of the beautiful alumni building. You know, the one NOBODY USES. What am I even saying, you probably won't even read this. Just throw it on the pile while your burning the money I helped provide.

Although increasing tuition to cover for inflation makes sense on paper, it does not do add anything of value to the students. In fact, it only puts more financial strain on the students which affects them negatively.

Every year tuition increase to adjust for inflation, however, graduate student stipend remains the same. With a official stipend of \$22,000 per year, we have to pay \$5000 in tuition every year giving us a net income of only \$17,000 to live. This is not even close enough to be affordable in Vancouver, we have to use 75% of this just to cover rent that is within 30m of where we work. Most graduate students must take a second job to live in this city. That means ~40-50 hrs in the lab plus another 10-20 hours elsewhere, every week. This puts an enormous strain on the student leading to many psychological stress.

If this tuition actually went to services that we can see as a student, it would be acceptable. I have yet to see where this money has gone besides construction on campus. In terms of student support, UBC is severely lacking. I recently went to a counselling service (brought on by the stress of overworking 2 jobs) provided by UBC. The service itself was terrible, it was only there as a thing that UBC says it have. I can not see how this is good for students at all. In addition, I do not see any new or increased financial support offered to graduate students other than the scholarships that are already in place. More is not offered despite the yearly increase in tuition, but somehow there is money to keep building new buildings.

All of this is absolutely unacceptable, its just straight up abuse to students.

I believe we already paid enough for tuition as international students already paid way more than domestic student. It does not sound fair if we still need to raise our tuition.

Don't raise the prices for International students, they're already super high.

Are you kidding me? What kind of feedback do you want? 2 or 3 percent increase is not nothing. We are not money bags. I am on coop and I pay 1500 of tuition and I DONT EVEN GO TO THE SCHOOL RIGHT NOW. I get that UBC is a private institution, but I would love it if we could stay away from the US system.

Tuition is already so expensive and it is crazy expensive to live in this city. Pretty soon we will get close to the astronomical pricing of American schools and many will no longer be able to seek higher education. I think they should stay as is and maybe build one less brand new building.

Following comments are addressing tuition increase for continuing international students. Increase in 2% as adjusted for inflation is understandable and notified before enrolment. However, any value above 2% is unfair and unjustified because most of international students signed up UBC with the expectation of tuition increase only based on inflation. Although students are less likely to drop off because of a 3% rises, it would undoubtedly suggest UBC's reputation as a school that breaks the promise and tries to exploit international student. Given the fact that UBC's tuition is not of any comparative advantages comparing with other Canadian universities, unfair treatment for existing students are going to influence its attractiveness to future students which is an important source of funding.

Hi there,

I understand the gradual need to increase tuition to be able to fund various services, but as a principle, I do not believe that tuition should be as expensive as it currently is, nor should it be increasing. This is likely more of a provincial/federal issue rather than an institutional issue, but I believe that this type of feedback should be heard.

I am strongly against the proposal to increase tuition in 2018/2019. I already find that I am paying more and more tuition each year. Since my first year at UBC, I have noticed that there has been more and more miscellaneous fees each year. This year, aside from my tuition, I have had to pay \$927.96 in miscellaneous fees. I am already finding it hard enough to pay for my current tuition and high living costs in Vancouver. I dread the idea of having to rely on student loans or financial aid to continue studying at UBC.

I do not agree with raising the current and incoming international students' tuition by 2-3%, considering in the past it has already significantly increased by 30% in the past two years, as proposed (and approved) in 2015. We international students are already paying a significantly larger amount compared to domestic students (more than double the amount), and to increase it even more puts a bigger financial strain on my family who is supporting me from overseas. A 2-3% increase means in the next upcoming school year I would be paying several hundred dollars more just to get a good education. This tuition increase also looks unattractive to future incoming international students.

NO THANK YOU.

I see each year an increase and an increase in tuition at UBC. This new message seems to try to sugar-coat it with "we are trying to reduce prices"...sure by increasing tuition again. No, I do not like this proposition and increase in tuition fees

When I was told about UBC, I was promised by no less than three admission advisors that my tuition, even as an international student, would not exceed a 5% increase across 4 years. With this increase for 2018/19, my tuition increases would exceed 5% after only two years. This school is one of the only ones I could afford to come to as an international student and by increasing my tuition by so much you, as a university, are not only making my education near-unaffordable, but also admitting that you lied to me when I applied. That is not the kind of school I applied to and is not one that I would readily continue my education with.

I do NOT support any of the proposed fee increases. First of all, international students already pay a lot of money for education. The difference between international and domestic students is very very big and significant for a degree at UBC. Second, every single year UBC proposes to increase fees, and from my perspective it should not be like this. Education should not be a business, education must be affordable for everyone and anyone who will like to study and become a professional. I understand that UBC is very big and spends a lot of money on many resources for students, building new buildings (maybe some unnecessary constructions), etc. Also, this increase in fees is in many areas which will end up adding to a lot - so I am wondering if it is necessary to increase in many aspects every single year.

Again I do not approve this and I think UBC do not usually listen to this - despite of the responses of the students. Thank you.

I understand inflationary pressures require periodic increases in tuition. UBC should simultaneously consider the impact of inflation on the minimum graduate student salary. Graduate student salary as it stands is \$20,000-22,000, and in most graduate programs tuition is still required to be paid. This makes the take-home for a graduate student ~\$15,000-17,000 which is un-livable with the inflation combined with Vancouver's prices.

Graduate programs, specifically in sciences should be exempt from paying tuition. Furthermore, the graduate student salary should also be increased to match this "inflation".

These programs are critical for UBC's image as a leader in scientific discovery in Canada, and the students doing the research are living in poverty. This is unacceptable.

Tuition has gone up a tremendous amount since I first graduated and although I know there are inflationary costs, but wages are not keeping up with cost of living either so students are increasingly strained. Better lobbying for funds from the government or putting more into the international students' increase would be better. After all, we should only be filling international seats (except for the exceptional) and educating those who live here first. Don't take more internationals just to make ends meet like school districts do. We should not be excluding domestic students to make your budget.

If this rise is due to "inflationary pressures" why is it 0.5% higher than the projected national inflation? At least be honest with us. How much more are the executives at UBC getting payed out of my pocket? What's Santa Ono's salary look like next year? Give us a detailed budget please. What exactly is the UBC Excellence Fund? 2. International students should be experiencing more of the increase, as the University should be contributing to its own local economic growth through education, not in those who are not necessarily going to stay and help our local economy. Even as a domestic student, I am struggling to pay the tuition fees as is. I am currently looking for cheaper options to live off campus because the residence fee on top of the tuition fee is too much. I have been working all year, got a student loan, and also am using my education fund to help pay for my school fees. Not only am I worried for myself and fellow domestic students, but also the international students who have to pay a substantially larger tuition fee simply due to the fact that they do not hold citizenship in Canada.

Lower residence fees if you are raising tuition fees.

International students have already paid way more than domestic students and that gap is extreme. I don't think it's really fair you keep increasing tuition fees for international students every year despite that you claim to do so because of the annual inflation. I would like to prefer the tuition fees to remain at least the same however, I doubt my opinion will matter. I hope it will. Thank you.

Please don't raise them any more.

Keep fees low. Students are already struggling to pay for fees as it is. We don't need more construction and we don't need 'new' things, we need cheaper fees for students can afford to go to this very highly regarded school. Fees go up every year, this year its 2%, and it continues every year, and what have I gotten out of this? I sure haven't received a new gym to workout in, or cheaper books, or smaller class sizes, and the structures being built I haven't used. Keep fees low.

As it stands this year, my student loan from the government does not cover the first set of residence fees. If I was not able to get any funding next year then I will not be able to attend university due to lack of finances. Increasing tuition will not help those in similar situations to mine.

No. Please don't increase the fees further more. Isn't it enough what we already pay for each course? It must be more than enough, you should be decreasing the fees not increasing them.

A lot of international are already struggling with the base tuition and accomodation fees, in addition to the expensive text books and accademic tools. This raise in tuition will make it a lot more difficult for these students to continue with there degree. And as many people have pointed out, it's depressing to see inflation use as an excuse by an higher academic institute.

no for all of it, it should be possible to save budget somewhere else rather than make this institution a more exclusive one. theres no need to keep increasing the tuition every year. we would rather see whatever you are building take longer than see those who are here struggle more with being able to afford it.

I honestly think the 2% increase is fine but we should restrict it to prospective students rather than current students.

I am strongly opposed to the proposed increase in tuition for domestic, international and unclassified students. I am one of the students who will graduate from UBC with over \$75,000 in student debt. While I understand there are rising costs that the university must cope with in order to continue to provide high-quality education to a rising student population, there are options available to support students in reducing university costs. For example, the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives released a report in 2013, entitled 'Degrees of Uncertainty', wherein they state that the fairest way to fund higher education is through upfront public funding. Canada has the 5th highest average university tuition in the world, falling way behind the more progressive education systems of countries like Sweden Germany and Finland. While of course the funding structures of these countries cannot be applied directly to a Canadian context, BC and UBC specifically can learn from the progressive goals of these countries in instilling affordable education as a basic right through collectively funding tuition. UBC should be taking a stronger leadership role in calling on the provincial and federal governments to implement universal low-fees polices and maintain or decrease, rather than increase, debt caps and creating programs that minimize the need for students to seek private loans. Facing uncertain job markets, and a lack of entry-level positions with guaranteed long-term job certainty, students already carry an enormous burden of responsibility and stress upon graduating from post-secondary institutions. A cap on university tuition should be put in place immediately to avoid causing further financial stress on UBC students as future leaders and working professionals.

Already paying over \$6000 per year (commuter) for tuition and there are so many things that are absolutely trash about UBC and you're telling me to pay more for trash? No.

You have already increased the tuition every year i have attended ubc. Inflation isnt that bad and i think you are increasing our tuition unnecessarilly (except to make more money).

\$28 million allotted to 'Alumni/development'? What a joke. If UBC is spending \$28 million a year on fundraising, where's that money going? Certainly doesn't seem to be a very effective \$28 million dollar project.

Student fees should not be updated, unless it's to DECREASE tuition costs. I am sure that most of the feedback that's been sent in is of the same opinion.

With so many countries in Europe offering free university to its students, what kind of example is UBC setting?

UBC is a hugely corrupt institution.

I opposite any increasement in intuition fee. UBC is over-priced.

Students are planning to leave UBC for further degrees because of high cost. More and more UBC professors leave UBC because of low salary. At the same time, the teaching quality and rank of UBC consistently drop in the last five years.

I suggest the UBC decrease intuition fee and residence fees. At the same time, hiring good professors with high salary is also important. It is a time to decrease the cost on new buildings. Without good professors, university is just a place.

International students have already paid a lot than domestics. ONE YEAR of International student's tuition = FOUR YEARS of a domestic student's tuition. PLEASE DO NOT INCREASE THE TUITION FEE FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ANYMORE. The money didn't come from nowhere..

Get more public aid instead of relying on the students or private corporations to fund the ridiculous overspending on wasteful expansion year after year.

Please do not increase the tuition for students attending UBC. For those who are not supported by parents, this is a terrible ordeal and can put students back for decades when paying off their loans. Furthermore, degrees conferred do not automatically mean a job that is reasonably paying in that field so it takes awhile to pay off student loans. I believe you should see if there is any other way to increase revenue without penalizing your students.

Why the tuition fee is increased for every year? I do not see any benifits been improved for us graduate students. My reasearch stipend and TA rates have not been increased for the past three years. Life is hard!!!

I feel that rising costs for tuition are creating additional barriers for less privileged students to pursue post-graduate education. I can understand the fiscal constraints, but personally support reducing barriers, not adding to them.

Domestic students should not have to oay extra every year!

I think that raising the fee for domestic students by 2%, at least within BC, is not a good idea. Personally, I had a really hard time being able to afford university at all, and a major factor for me in going to UBC, having grown up in point grey, was that I could actually get a good education without going into debt. I was really thankful that the tuition wasn't too expensive, because I had to fund my entire tuition by working and through scholarships and am living at home to save money, which for personal reasons is not ideal. I think that a lot of domestic students are going through the same struggles as me in barely being able to afford an education at the school closest to them, and so raising the price for those who already have a hard time, and especially considering how few scholarships UBC offers, would not be in the best interest of the students.

This is ridiculous. You're making money hand over fist already, there's no need to hike up tuition any more! Provide more on campus services (such as shuttle, parking, access, sports and recreation, mental health and more broadly health services) that you can make money on as opposed to taking it out on students in tuition. Most students commute more than half an hour to campus, you have no options for alleviating this at all, and it's a huge market you could be making money on.

Tuition increases for international students are beginning to border on the absurd. UBC attracts top tier students from around the world because it's tuition prices are reasonable relative to the global market. I came here instead of NYU because I didn't want to spend nearly half a million dollars on my B.A, but that comparison is no longer fair. If I had applied to UBC next year as a graduating senior, and had to choose between a higher-ranked American school (like NYU) and UBC, I'd choose NYU hands down. The availability of aid, scholarship, and bursaries to international students has also not kept pace with the rapid expansion of international fees. A \$10,000 entrance award means a lot more when tuition is \$25,000 than when tuition is nearly \$40,000.

Opposed to rate increases for domestic undergraduate students

Rather, tuition hikes should be applied to graduate and non-degree programs to offset rates for domestic undergraduates.

Additionally, non-instructional fees should be broken down into categories such as buildings maintenance and community spaces. Building maintenance and provision of learning technology should be applied whenever funds exist, but services such as athletics and recreation should be charged on a user-pay basis as commuters typically spend 1-2 hours just on the commute, sometimes more. Upgrades and funding for athletics and recreation just don't benefit commuter students as much as they do for those on campus

Although inflation does pressure UBC to increase tuition, this same inflation does not affect the hourly or salary wages that students are being paid in. This results in an ever growing struggle for students to afford a post secondary education. My thoughts and views are that UBC tends to either over budget or exceed their budget for numerous projects. I am feeling that tuition increases just go towards increasing the budget for projects which would not cost as much as the bid price or proposed price. I think that UBC could be more thoughtful about where their money is going and the uses that it is being put towards. Not all students have wealthy family or the financial state to apply for student loans. Increasing the tuition is just a way of weeding out lower income students (Yes I do understand that it is necessary from time to time, but every year is unacceptable). This University is becoming a business rather than an institution for furthered learning and research.

The tuition fee is somehow so high that many cannot afford it. Therefore, some talent students may be lost because of it.

Tuition increases for continuing international students should be no greater than 2%.

I think the fee structure could be really well planned and structured given that the domestic students pay slightly more than the massive cut all the accounts of international students suffer. Its almost 7 times more than the domestic students to which I personally feel is disheartening. Only the international students should not face the brunt of inflation, domestic students should pay significantly more than they are paying currently.

I disagree with raising tuition

The Canadian inflationary rate is about 1.2-1.5% each year therefore the tuition increase is too high based on inflationary pressures. The University has increased tuition by 2% every year since I began my schooling here despite a massive student debt bubble and heinous international fees. Cut us some slack...

Tuition is already really expensive and you guys almost never give any scholarships. Stop increasing tuition and give better financial help to students!! Especially ones with families/children

As I said last year when this issue came up, I am in the Doctor of Dental Medicine program and a 2% increase in tuition for me is almost 6 times more for my program than it is for someone in a regular undergraduate program. I pay about \$40,000 in tuition per year. I honestly believe that these tuition changes should only apply to regular undergraduates and not professional programs like Medicine, Dentistry, Law etc. Professional programs already pay significant more in tuition than regular undergraduates, Dentistry specifically.

Keep fees for domestic students tied to inflation, increase international student fees.

I am a student who lives off campus. I do not have financial support from my parents, I am a mature student and I have enough savings to not qualify for any student loans, and thus I am exempt from many grants and scholarships.

Cost of living in Vancouver is already very expensive. I am lucky enough to have enough savings to pay for housing and school, but I have no other source of income and when my savings are gone I no longer have any money or financial support. Working while going to school is difficult and stressful which I have found in my experience reduces the quality of my education and my work.

Tuition is already too expensive. An increase is only making it harder on students that have to pay their own way and students that have to go into debt in order to afford an education.

Unfortunately, this is an ongoing trend of increased tuition, making schools more accessible to the "elite." It would be nice to see a tuition structure more like some European countries. My experience so far at UBC has felt like it is very much a profit-focused university with little care for actual education.

A 1% increase in tuition for all domestic students across all programs will be enough.

Stop spending money on things UBC does not need. Of course EVERY student is against the tuition increase. Im currently 70k in debt I cannot afford to spent more money on tuition. No more increases please

Do not raise tuition. We pay enough to you fools.

Take the money out of the ridiculous budget for new buildings. I'm tired of living at a construction site.

I think that the tuition increase is ridiculous as international students in particular are already paying obscene amounts. I detest the tuition increases and urge the University to take into consideration not in ways to make more money off students but more into improving student services (such as, but not limited to: counselling and support services, mental health resources, financial services, etc.)

Tuition fro international students is already so much more than domestic students. I know this makes sense and is pretty uniform across universities but it makes it difficult to travel and attend university far away. The current international tuition already comes as quite a burden to myself and my family. To see it being consistently raised only contributes to greater and greater financial stress to my, and many other student's, wellbeing. The university only increases tuition without offering more scholarship opportunities of any kind for international students. The per credit difference for international versus domestic students is so great that to see it increase could affect my financial ability to attend this university at all. I am sure I am not the only student with financial stress and as an international student, I feel I already pay a great deal to attend UBC.

Given that inflations is tending towards 1-1.5% a year, a 2% is acceptable, but what I do not understand is why international students, who already pay around 10x more per year than national students, have an even higher (2-3%) increase in certain situations. Imagine what would happen if the university proposed a 20% raise in tuitions for national students. That's the amount you are trying to change, but in a sneaky way.

Unless it is made very clear what the specific reason for the increase is and what the money is being used for I don't see how anyone would agree with this.

Tldr; don't milk international students more than the current prices already do. Show that you care about attracting international talents.

I understand the idea of keeping up with inflation with an increase in fees of 2% (I'm an economics student, so I completely understand). However, over the past year, inflation has only been increasing by a little over 1% from 2016-2017, and for several years, tuition fees have increased by 2% and inflation has not been keeping up with that pace. If employees wages are adjusted for inflation, then tuition, which is mostly the student paying for the service that you provide, should also follow suit. 2% is high in comparison to the CPI calculation of inflation.

Inflation this year was recorded as ~1.1%, therefore claiming that a 2-3% increase in tuition charges is due to "inflationary pressures" is blatantly incorrect. Moreover, stipends and resources necessary for students to live have not been growing over these last years, making budgeting for lower income or self-sufficient students increasingly difficult. International students are already paying 5 times more tuition than the domestic students. UBC is financially relying too much on tuition from international students. There has to be appropriate improvements in facilities and services in order to compensate the increase in tuition. I would still prefer the same tuition as how it is right now, and keep the quality of campus the same.

Stop raising tuitions

University education is becoming increasingly expensive and unattainable to a large population of people. This effects not only the individual who is unable to pursue higher education due to financial limitations, but also the work force, university and Canadian economy. UBC tuition does not need to be further increased. The university can and should look at ways to reallocate their current budget to avoid an unnecessary tuition increase that will negatively affect a great number of aspiring academics.

I believe that domestic students' tuition should be raised by 1.8% and international students' tuition should be raised by 2%.

I am not in favor of tuition increases until greater visibility is given towards the university's cost cutting initiatives and its long term impacts for the students.

Based on the figures provided, the university is poised to gain approximately 10 million additional dollars to offset inflation (which I calculated to be ~30m dollars). Considering that revenue from students is roughly 1/3rd of the university's income stream, this is a proportional increase of cost, assuming no cost cutting initiatives are taken. However, the proposal clearly states (but does not specify) cost cutting is occurring to reduce operational expenses.

As a student, I would like to university to demonstrate how these savings come back to reducing yearly tuition increases. Why can't the tuition increase be 1.5% with 2.5m coming out of savings from operational overhead and recurring expenses? Where are these savings being attributed if not towards the students?

Student tuition costs continue to increase with no direct benefit to students. It is unfair for students to have an increased cost to their already expensive education just to pay mainly for professors salaries that don't care to teach us to the best of their abilities as they are busy with their own research.

Not ok with increase in tuition, already paying a lot.

Many other countries provide a lot of support for students and it is embarrassing that Canada doesn't do more.

The cost of living in Vancouver is already so much so increasing the tuition is quite a lot to ask of students.

I find it difficult to justify a price hike for tuition, when I also pay large sums of money for parking, and yet half the time, it's impossible to find a spot and I end up being late for class while waiting for a space to open up. Textbooks are wildly priced and nigh impossible to buy use, due to the "mandatory" online component. Scholarships are barely available and finances are hard enough to manage. Don't make it worse.

I think that the increase in tuition for domestic students is entirely unnecessary. The amount of tuition and fees we already pay is very high. This semester I am on a co-op term and yet am paying over 1000\$ worth of fees. This amount is also far more than what I was told by UBC to tell student loan my fees would be, which results in my student loan not being enough money to cover them and cover my living expenses.

Going to UBC is exceptionally expensive because of the very high housing costs in Vancouver and UBC has failed to provide adequate access to student housing for students, especially those who are entering a second-degree program. Increasing the fees and tuition only serves to make UBC even more unaccessible for low to middle class students than it already is.

This increase disproportionately effects international students and puts a strain on already high tuition costs. The vast difference in domestic and international tuition costs shows how unnecessary a raise in international tuition is.

I understand that the increases suggested wants to be correlated to an increase in cost. But why is the university having a seemingly constant increase of costs across the last decade? The university can make a much better effort on cost reduction without affecting education quality. In particular, there is overstaffing in most expense divisions (faculties, ancillary operations, etc). If the university were constantly hiring to increase faculty-to-students ratio, it would perhaps justify a tuition increase, but that is not the case, as even those new teaching positions are usually funded by donors or endowments.

The UBC Excellence Fund seems like a good initiative, but also an initiative that is way better tailored to attract donors than to extract money from tuition.

Stop increasing tuition. You only make the university less diverse and more likely to become a beacon of inequality instead of a beacon of excellence.

That's a lot of increase. Many people won't be able to afford that, and my family will on even more pressure too.

It is already extremely difficult to afford post secondary education. With increases in fees due to "inflation", you must consider that costs of food, rent, travel, and utilities are also increasing. While an increase in tuition of 2% may seem minimal to you, it is certainly going to be a major deciding factor in the ability for many students to attend UBC. Many will likely have to find another lower cost university or forego further education all together. With the massive increase in cost of living in Vancouver and surrounding areas it is rather ridiculous to put this increased financial strain on students.

Please please don't increase international tuition, it is already expensive at over 3000 per credit. Additionally, the cost of housing in Vancouver is increasing so student budgets are already stretched thin. If you carry through with this increase, you could very well make the cost of coming to Vancouver to study too much for many students.

Rasing the international tuition by the same percentage as domestic puts more financial burden on international students since the international fees are higher.

In my opinion the percentages should be adjusted so that the actual sums would be equal for both domestic and international students.

A 2% increase for students seems like a small amount, but for students who take a full course load and can only get part time work, it's much more taxing on their finances. A 2% increase amounts to over \$120 dollars in extra tuition alone for a student with a full course load, not accounting for the 2% increase in extra fees that is incurred on each student. That is a lot to ask for students who have to pay tuition, and housing fees on top of that without any sort of financial help. I would like to request that the increase in tuition and fees decreases, as the increase is a strain on my (and other students) finances that cannot easily be made up.

I think its completely unnecessary as we already pay a heavy load on the tuition. Specially coming from engineering where the courseload is quite heavy and tuition ends up being around 8-9 thousand a year. Not including residence which adds on another 6-7 thousand.

If anything I think it would be great to be able to opt out of certain fees and upass, as they are not needed and sometimes not even used (same goes to the fees that sometimes end up being a thousand a year)

In regards to the inflationary costs of running UBC, I would prefer if the costs be minimized on domestic students, and the International students face the increase in tuition.

I do not agree with the increase to domestic undergraduate or graduate tuition fees. Stop building baseball training facilities, rugby fields, alumni centres, and re-furnishing presidential suites instead. Start focusing on your core student body and student learning and research. Start lobbying with the government. Cut down on the corporate image that UBC has taken on in the past 5 years, and share the money that 'rich' faculties like Business or Computing Science have amongst other non-lucrative, but extremely important departments like history, philosophy, education, etc.

A 2% increase on both the tuition and student fees for domestic students does not seem outrageous. But it is. Tuition is already unaffordable for most students, especially those whose parents do not provide financial assistance. 2% extra for every course, multiplied by 10 (the average number of courses one takes), multiplied by the tens of thousands of domestic students at UBC. I can't even begin to imagine how much additional money UBC will be collecting from this increase, just from the domestic students alone. There is no way that inflation requires UBC to continue to substantially raise tuition rates every single year. This is uncalled for, and is making the already difficult task of paying tuition even worse. It is very challenging to attend a place of higher learning when one cannot afford it.

Please stop increasing tuition on those who can't afford it and placing more value on international (such as the rich Chinese) students because they have more money, than your own domestic citizens. UBC = a business

I think the international student increase is exorbitant. I feel that the annual increase for domestic students is also excessive given that every year throughout my grad studies tuition continually increases with no apparent end in sight. given the also the exorbitant cost of living in Vancouver the school should be cautious not to become cost prohibitive but for an elite few. this would serve the strategic plan goals of UBC.

ARE Y'ALL SERIOUS?!?!?

Rising tuition costs holds students hostage, especially international graduate students who are expected to pay over \$7k out of pocket after the fourth year of their PhD.

I know graduate students who are struggling to put food on the table. And lest you counter by saying a PhD should only take 4 years, for which funding is provided without out-of-pocket tuition costs, the average completion time in my program is six years. Finishing in five or six years is not a sign of incompetence, it is the average for a group of highly competent adults who are preparing for a competitive job market. DO NOT ADMIT STUDENTS YOU CANNOT SUPPORT.

I myself do not live in Vancouver. I have had to move home to finish writing in my fifth year to keep costs down. It is preposterous to me that I have to pay UBC over \$7000 in tuition this year, without taking a single course, or even stepping foot on campus! I have stayed on track and will graduate in five years, which is ahead of schedule for average completion times, and still must pay this tuition.

Tuition for international students does not get students graduating sooner, despite what neoliberal logic says. Instead, we have to get jobs just to pay tuition, much less live and care for our children. This slows us down even more!

If the university cared about its graduate students at all, it would abolish tuition after the fourth year of the PhD for all students. It would recognize that \$7k/year tuition for international students only slows down completion time and contributes to high rates of depression and anxiety, related not only to providing for ourselves and our families, but also to the fact we will have to leave Canada after graduating. I know someone who has had to take out \$40k in loans to cover tuition and the most meager subsistence in Vancouver possible just to be able to continue full time in her program for the fifth and sixth year, again, which is AVERAGE completion time.

If the administration had any idea of the kind of hardship tuition induces for international students in their fifth and sixth year, they would revoke it immediately. It is a safety issue.

First of all the distributions of financial aid are the worst I have seen so far. The tuition is very high for international students and the financial supports are not given to the ones who deserve it. The research for distributing this financial aid is not done properly. Some genius people I know didn't choose to come here just because of the tuition fee and many people who don't deserve scholarships were given large amounts of aid. It is not fair for applicants at all.

I don't quite agree with the increase of tuition fee these years. As an international student, the tuition was already very expensive for us, it is still increasing by percentage makes us feel very stressful.

I really wonder how much more UBC is going to increase the tuition fee. Almost everyone, including domestic students, are saying that it is already so expensive, but still UBC is continuing to increase it without thinking of students. I myself am NOT a child of a millionaire, and my single parent mom is paying the international student fee, which is 40k per year, just because she wants me to get a good education, not because we have money to waste. I understand that UBC wants the rich international kids to study here and that's why the tuition is that high, but I think that perspective is unfair. There are people, like me, who were not lucky to be born in Canada but still want to have a great future. I really dislike this proposal and think that it just puts more pressure on students.

Don't raise domestic student fees as they are already high enough. However, I do think you should raise international student fees. Also maybe implement a fee on clubs and associations.

This is horrible, I can barely pay this overpriced tuition as it is. What a stuck up school, only thinking of the profit, especially with international students. My 3 classes shouldn't cost \$2,500.

There is no justification for why there needs to be 2-3% increase and this big of a jump every single year is making it more and more stressful for students who are trying to pay their own way through university.

I'm not sure about domestic fees, but the fees for international students are already 5 times as expensive as domestic fee already. I certainly consider UBC's multicultural society a huge plus, and I know many of my friends came to UBC because it's cheaper tuition and multicultural environment comparing to UT. The increase in international student fee which decreases not only decreases people that are willing to come due to price, but also causes less international students present on campus and weakens the intentions to meet international students as well. I do not consider this a desired move for UBC, nor for existing students and incoming students.

I do not support an increase in fees unless graduate student stipend is also increased to account for inflation and rising cost of living in Vancouver.

Hi,

For the past 7 years, almost every year I remember that UBC has increased tuition. I am about graduation but certainly against this proposal due to these reasons :

1) Vancouver is getting unaffordable : Cost of living in Vancouver has been dramatically increased. 7 years ago graduate students could live by 16000\$/year (basic RA-TA package) , today students cannot afford basic living expenses with 25000\$/year mainly due to the fact that cost of accommodation is almost doubled.

2) Staff/Faculties are getting bigger and lazier : Staff/Faculty salaries have been increased every year without any significant improvement in their quality (according to UBC Sauder business school report) . This helps professors to feel more stable (on top of their Tenureship) and in most cases they become more lazy and non-productive, leaving students with less support. I recommend to conduct another survey, especially among graduate students, about this issue. It is expected that you hear a same comments from other students . A general feeling among students is that professors are well stable on the pocket of students (tuitions) and the tax money (government money) which does not make a healthy atmosphere for doing an effective research.

3) UBC is losing his way : UBC policy for past 7 years was to expand the school so they can attract more abroad money (Point grey is now for sure China Town) . The school built lots of new dorms . Part of Acadia forest is demolished for building new dorms . New high rises are built for more undergraduate students . Although all of these expansions makes new opportunities and seats for students, it has number of down effects as well . First and foremost is that the quality of the education will be scarified and the school , which its true meaning is "a place to gain knowledge" is being changed to "business department".

All in all , considering above mentioned reasons , I believe it is wise to give more financial room to students and their family to breath.

STOP RAISING TUITION

I am against the tuition rise

The Bank of Canada expects inflation to average 1.6% in 2017, I do not understand the means of an extremely profitable University, such as UBC, to justify increasing fees 20% (for domestic students) above expected inflation... in my opinion, providing affordable education for university students across Canada should be more of a top priority for our institutions, however, I do not feel my views are aligned with the top executives at UBC.

I respectfully, and absolutely reject tuition increase. Most students suffer from student loans and are in debt; this only adds makes it more difficult for those students.

2 to 3% of increase for international students is too high. Please drop a little bit!

The tuition is too expensive.

No tuition increase please

The 2% to keep with the cost of inflation is fair. However, the charge to international students is not justified for parity reasons as there are no significant changes to the overall value offered by the university. The increase in price per credit must be first justified by an increase in value offered to the international students. If not, it will systematically decrease the diversity on campus which is one of the main drivers of UBC's prestige. Moreover, discouraging the intake of international students would erode the meritocracy of the university which is crucial to maintaining the global standing of UBC. It is crucial that acceptance into university is filtered by capability and potential and not privileged and socioeconomic status or nationality.

Instead of raising tuition, stop constructing new buildings. The money saved from the cessation of projects that are clearly oriented toward optics and attracting more students, and not toward scholarship and research, could be used to offset the effects of inflation that these 2% tuition increases are alleged to offset. Not only would a freeze on frivolous construction offset tuition, but it could free more capital for investment in renovating and improving existing structures and spaces. UBC is far from the only university that considers its mission in two parts---first, to make a profit from student tuition and to do everything to further that goal, and second, to produce world-leading research (at least insofar as doing so supports the first part)---but it could be a leader in rejecting that trend and reestablishing what it means to be a university and to be committed to intellectual excellence.

NO INCREMENT PLEASE!

The 2% increase in tuition is unfair to students like me coming from low middle-class families. I either have to apply to scholarships which are very competitive and almost impossible to get or I have to increasingly rely on student loans which would probably take me years to repay. I do not agree with the increase of tuition. I feel that UBC has enough money to go around, and our money is not going towards things that actually help students, but instead to things that make UBC look good.

Get it together and use our money properly. Treat us like students, not customers.

Students who are already enrolled should be grandfathered at the current tuition rate. Many made decisions to enroll here based on cost.

Go for it. All the best.

Students shouldn't have to shoulder the costs - perhaps UBC could scale back some of the constant development underway to absorb this pressure of inflation. As a graduate student in the Landscape Architecture program, we have less-than great facilities to work in - The Landscape Architecture Annex for one requires a lot of attention - there are broken windows, breakers that constantly trip and heating that goes in and out of commission. Asking ME for to pay for an increase and failing to attend to very basic safety and maintenance measures for facilities is not something I agree with, no. So in short I disagree with the 2% increase given it is not easy to afford to live in Vancouver as it is, in addition to all of the marks UBC falls short on providing the Landscape Architecture graduate program.

I'm not completely opposed to the planned increase, however there is a need for students to feel like their tuition money is going towards projects that benefit them. Something that I would like the AMS and GSS to have control over is the Excellence Fund. Although there is now annual consultation with both organizations, a body of our peers should have final say if the fund is going to be levied from tuition.

While I am generally understanding of tuition increases for undergraduates, as their financial contributions to the university are limited to tuition payments, increases in graduate student fees and tuition are less forgivable. In the sciences, we are full-time employees of the university. I grateful for the science graduate award covering all tuition and fees but this does not substantially increase our take-home pay. We remain entirely dependent on the stipends and scholarships awarded to us and without a corresponding increase in these, the ability for us to conduct our work -- thereby benefiting the university's research, ability to receive grants, etc. -- is inhibited. We are not immune from inflationary increases, and our situation is further exacerbated by the Vancouver housing market, causing us to easily spend between 30-50% of our wage on rent alone. To balance our books, we often need to live far from campus in sub-standard units causing undue stress. For these reasons, I am not in favour of the 2% increase in fees for all domestic students - students who will likely be benefitting Canada's economy and society in the near-future. A top-up of even \$1000 would make a huge difference to those of us earning \$18,000-\$22,000. Thank you for reading.

Although I do not want my tuition to increase, I understand that this is common due to inflation and increased costs for increased services.

Tuition costs are already RIDICULOUSLY expensive, DO NOT increase them. Especially for international students who pay at least twice as much as us domestic students, it's atrocious and unfair. | The "2% to 3%" language regarding tuition increases for us international students is vague and represents a variance in cost increase of thousands of dollars. For many of us international students, cost of attending is a large factor in where we decide to receive an education. When the process by which tuition and fees are adjusted is opaque and not consistent, us international students are often burdened by thousands of dollars of extra tuition costs we now have to budget for, and often take out more loans for. Tuition costs should not be re-evaluated for current students - they should increase exactly with yearly inflation and this should be set out in the initial paperwork for attending the school. Adjusting tuition rates for incoming students is acceptable as incoming students get to see the new cost of attending before choosing to do so, whereas us students already locked into receiving an education here do not get to easily choose to seek an education elsewhere when tuition increases mid-degree. Additionally, UBC has over a billion dollars of endowment. When meeting the yearly budget becomes more difficult, the cost of doing so should not be placed on the students (most of whom are not particularly wealthy) but instead should be covered by the University and its immense wealth, as budgetary issues are not the already enrolled students' faults, but the school's. |

Against the increase for all domestic students across all the programs...

I don't agree with the continuous raising on fees. I think the University should find more creative ways to deal with inflation. Right now it is left to us (students) to deal with it, so the pressure is put always on individuals. A personal example: I have been studying and living at UBC during the last 5 years. My tuition fees have increased every year, as well as my UBC housing rent (last year it increased more than 10/ at once). However, both my salary (as a TA and GAA) has not increased, neither has increased the amount of the scholarship I received. This means I am poorer every year without having the possibility to apply a "quick fix" to the situation, as the University does when raising the fees.

Inflation is a problem for everybody. Just raising the fees is a quick and easy solution that solves the problem for the institution, but transfer it to the individuals. In this sense, the problem is not really solved, it is just put on the shoulders of the weakest members of the system.

It's already expensive enough. Stop.

Classes are overpopulated, # of chairs not matching # of students. Rooms are packed, resulting in humid and hot environments for up to 80 students for 90 minutes. This is not ideal concentration environment. Constructions also affect traffic and study.

For those attending school now, they will spend their school years in construction dust and graduating without seeing any work completion

Clubs cannot host events due to lack of space/storage resulting in lack of growth and innovation. Corruption within the students union does not help the matter

Requiring these students to pay more for a school that has not address any of these problems seems unethical.

Increasing Fees should be pushed to when school construction is complete at the minimum.

Funding should be pulled from the students union and proper oversight administration should be set instead of the current vague one.

I do not think that we need to increase tuition - especially for international students who already pay a ridiculous amount of money to attend UBC.

Honestly it is already difficult for me and many other international students to afford UBC. I do not think it is fair to increase the tuition and fees for continuing students because we have planned our finances according to the current tuition rates. Increasing these costs would affect the ability of many students to continue their studies at UBC and/or put us under much more stress. It is different for new incoming students because they have the chance to look at the new rates beforehand and decide if they can attend UBC.

This is probably utterly futile but I thought I should take the opportunity to speak my mind on the off chance that someone actually reads these responses and considers them seriously.

I understand that the costs inherent in running a University are increasing due to inflation, however, student incomes are not increasing proportionally and the cost of living in this city isn't declining. As a result, this tuition increase will result in an undue and unnecessary burden on students.

Before you proceed with squeezing students for more money, I would like to propose a novel idea. Why not cut down on unnecessary spending? If all the little perks disappeared, you will find that you have a nice chunk of change left in the University coffers. It might seem like a couple of dollars here and there but it all adds up. Consider further limiting travel expenses for University personnel. In addition to saving money, it would demonstrate UBC's commitment to battling Climate Change. Sure, we do a ton of research on Climate Change and all of the food on campus is served in flimsy compostable containers, but what is really going to make a significant impact? Let's encourage people to attend meetings virtually. We have the technology. Academics and the institution that they represent need to pave the way for everyone else. It is certainly an inferior experience to participate in meetings and interviews remotely but we cannot escape the simple fact that years of riding a bike to work won't make up for a single trip to and from Spain for some conference in terms of green house gas emissions. Also, let's talk about spending for catering for various events. Attending meetings is a part of the job. Sure, it's nice to provide a treat for people, but let's think of all the hard working, low income students who are struggling to make ends meet before you go and order \$10 a piece panini for professors who are attending meetings that they are already being PAID to attend. Trust me, you won't lose Canada Research Chair professors because you stop providing Nanaimo bars at faculty meetings. Also, with regards to the recent uptick in spending for varsity sports, you need to seriously consider what attracts most students and research faculty to UBC. It certainly isn't football. Pretty much every one I know at this University would go out of their way to AVOID crowds at sporting events. Canada simply doesn't have the same sporting culture that is present in the US, nor should it. I know that participating in sports is generally good for students' physical and mental health but as a teaching assistant, I have directly observed the negative impact that participating in varsity sports has on undergraduate learning. I advise all of the high school students that I know to NOT participate in varsity athletics if they are serious about academics because I have seen my students struggle.

Please don't increase the tuition fee

I do not agree for increasing 2-3% for international students who have been in UBC. It is okay to increase the tuition fee for new international students because they choose to graduate from high school this year so that they should accept the new policy or decision. However, tuition fee for international students who have been in UBC should not be increased as much as new ones. I think at least the range should be 1-1.5% lower than the amount of increase for new international students. Not every single international student is rich, most of us have to suffer from the high expense for renting houses and difficulties of studying with second language. Therefore, I hope the school can reconsider the decision.

I think it's more fair to charge international students coming into graduate programs because they are further in their degree and have more diversity in the programs they can choose if it does not fit their budget.

I am not in favour of a tuition increase for the 2018/19 school year, I feel as though tuition is high enough as it is, and a lot of it is allocated to programs which are not even being used by most students such as the \$500 fee for athletics.

As a working student, tuition is already a massive cost. Additionally, UBC offers almost no scholarship or financial aid options unless you are pursuing research. I would like to see an increase in scholarships and bursaries that I can apply for before my tuition is raised again. As for the international student rate, 9.2% is a significant increase in an already inflated tuition cost. Raise this only by the same amount that you would raise domestic student rates.

In the context of a housing crisis and significant student underemployment the proposed fee increases could cripple already strained student resources. The general poverty facing students means many face very difficult choices and compromises between necessary medical expenses, housing cost and food choices.

I urge you to reconsider any fee increases until the housing crisis subsides and domestic students can find suitable employment. Your annual reports show revenues of over 2 billion dollars with a surplus after subtracting consolidated expenses. In the context of university profitability and student poverty, the proposed increases levelled at students seem to disproportionately adversely affect the vulnerable group of people who should be the primary concern of your mandate. If the university is having difficulty maintaining expenses given inflation etc, imagine how the average student feels with no benefit of pay increases to match inflation (for years), or even stable employment at all.

If the university requires more funding, perhaps it could spend more time thinking about finding methods to raise said capital without undermining the financial resources and dignity of their student body. There are countries and universities in the world such as Denmark, where students are actually paid to go to school. Administrators having taken their job seriously and understood their purpose is to aid students, found a way to cooperate with industry to create programs that produce value for the students, industry and society. Perhaps our administrators would benefit from some homework. Perhaps it is time to take your job seriously and stop passing the buck to those least able to manage it. There is a better

way if you sincerely try. The proposal shows no effort except in marketing. Let us now see if this is another exercise in democratic futility or if anything comes of our feedback.

A 2% tuition increase every year is absolutely ridiculous. UBC is ripping off innocent students trying to get a good education and the cost of tuition is already ridiculous. This student is very upset with this increase and even more outraged about receiving letters in the ma and phone calls asking to find your library. If you need our funding then what is this increase going towards. Outrageous.

It's cute when the university increases tuition every year but sends out this stupid form for comment. I would like to say that cheaper is better and as an international student, a 2% increase is still a bit of money out of 35000 dollars.

Dear UBC,

I understand if the tuition has to be raised. The problem is that tuition is extremely high even now.

I personally struggle to survive and I am only on my first year of PhD. My annual salary is fixed and it is determined by my supervisor, however, basic living expenses are so high that I cannot afford even to visit my family or to go on a trip to see the surroundings of Kelowna. I can barely cover the food for each month and it's hard for me even to buy necessary household extras (detergents, cleaning extras..). I don't even buy a clothes because I cannot afford it. Even if I do TAing, my salary is not being increased. In that case, my supervisor pays me less for that term. I can keep an extra money only if I do FULL TA (which is rare in my department of UBCO) and only if I get high scholarship. For the most of scholarships I cannot apply since I am an international student. For the first 9 months of my PhD, I got part time TA for Term1 and got Deans entrance scholarship worth of 5 000\$, still, for the period of 9 months I spend 3000\$ extra of my own money that I brought with me from my home country. So, right now, I am already in debt and there are no financial aids for internationals at all to help me with that.

Also, in other countries (talking about[...] where I come from), PhD student that is research assistant is hired by University and doesn't have to pay tuition at all. Furthermore, each PhD student get their own research laptop/computer/screen (that's the case for example also in Canada - e.g. McGill) while here, at UBCO, I am forced to invest my own money in the equipment for my research.

Saying all that, I just want to note, although UBC has providing big support to students regarding workshops, health & wellness, librarians aid, aid of educated staff regarding your research writing, I am deeply disappointed with situation at UBC regarding support of PhD students (and Master students) and I am struggling to survive so badly that, unfortunately, I wouldn't recommend anyone to study here. I am not even sure if I will be able to continue with my phd, I discussed my financial problems and concerns with my supervisor but he is not able to help me. Instead, he said he will understand if I decide to leave UBC. I think this is really sad.

I know, by talking to other students, that I am not the only one with financial problems. By not providing more financial support to your students and by not understanding that living expenses and tuition are getting higher while financial support of student (and scholarships) keep the same level, you are affecting our research directly and sabotaging our potential to develop as successful researchers.

I would wish to continue my research at UBCO, but honestly, I am worried more about my financial situation instead of focusing on my reseach project, which have huge potential of producing important findings.

I disagree with the increase in fees. As an international student, in a year I pay as much as a Canadian could pay for their whole degree. Now sure, domestic students' families have been paying taxes. Yet it does not explain the huge difference between the fees. It could be argued that as an international student I help the Canadian economy even more, because I pay for a lot of things locals don't have to, simply because this is where their home is. So your decision to raise the fees doesn't really explain what students are getting in return. In addition, increase for non-instructional fees for all students wouldn't affect domestic students as much since normally, the non-instructional fee for us is around \$1300 so a 2% increase in tuition there wouldn't negatively impact us that much. But for international students, it is close to quintuple our cost increase, equating to roughly \$100.

These tuition hikes are justified by "inflationary pressures," yet the inflation rate of the Canadian dollar is roughly 1.5%, (and it has only recently risen to that level due to a strong economy as of late. Since December of 2015, which appears to have been the last tuition hike, from the limited resources available on the matter, the inflation rate has been far below 1.5% on average) and tuition and fees hikes are 2 to 3%. This increase cannot simply be justified by inflation. Despite this, if I was confident that those margins would be going towards new and updated housing for the students, (an issue that desperately needs to be addressed) I would still support it. However, without a proper analysis of precisely how much revenue will be increased, (and from which groups it will be drawn) and how much expenditures will be altered, particularly with regard to housing, I cannot support this change.

Do not increase tuition.

Increasing tuition by 2% to match inflation does not make sense when current wages earned by non professionals are not increasing proportionally. As an undergraduate student and a part time worker, this continuance in increasing tuition is almost impossible to allow for students to pay for school without parental support. Bright futures are helped by education and it should be attainable for students who wish to educate themselves to do so at a university level.

International tuition should be rising at a much higher rate than domestic tuition thus offsetting the need to increase domestic tuition every year. Additional fees such as athletic and law fees should be removed for students who do not have as much opportunity to use them, such as part-time graduate students. Charge the students who use these services for their use, and offset the cost for those who are unable to use them.

International students already pay quite some money more than locals. A 2-3% increase for international students is much more than a 2% increase for domestic (given it's already higher, so the same percentage results in a higher payment). We are already accounting for 50-50 of the income that the university has from tuition while being less of us.

The annual increased tuition is still affordable; but the graduate school should also increase the tuition award amount along with it. Otherwise, it ought to waive the tuition fee for the advanced program(e.g. PhD program) or provide more waiver plan/quota.

For the certificate program, course-based or project-based program, the increasing rate could be adjusted higher. But for thesis-based program, it does not make sense to ask the program taker to pay more. (Otherwise the stipend should be increased as well.)

That is my own opinion on this matter; I am afraid that my friends all agree with this thought.

With these increases UBC's tuition will become absurdly high as they have been making similar increases every single year- and their expenses (which are not specified on the link we were given) do not justify these increases. We have not seen any increase in need based or merit based awards either.

It's extremely painful to pay for international tuition as it stands. Some of us have parents who give quite literally all they have for their children to study here; not all of us have Mercedes/BMWs at our disposal.

I think that tuition costs are not really the concern of a lot of students. For me, I am spending the same if not more money for housing and food within my residence plan. I am from Kelowna, but was forced to come to Vancouver due to the program I wanted not being offered. Textbooks are also adding unnecessary costs. Textbooks that could have been bought second hand now require access codes for online sites in order to complete homework. Is it fair to charge \$60+ for an access code that costs more than the book? I feel that there are more options available to UBC to streamline the homework and textbook process so that it doesn't require students to pay over \$1000/year for books and access codes unique to each course so that I have 7 different websites to have to manage for homework. I would rather have to do everything on paper than constantly be checking websites.

In relation to tuition, maybe ask yourself where students can get that money? If you increase the costs for graduate students, where are those students going to find the opportunity to get that money? Myself, how am I going to make \$25k in my summer months, as I cannot receive financial support from my family? What if I suddenly need to take summer courses? Or a fifth year of study? Where is a student going to legally acquire \$125k over five years with only a highschool diploma?

To be fair, I don't think there's a thing that anyone could say in this survey that has an effect on your decisions. UBC manages its budget as it manages its budget. \$25k is very insignificant to you.

The Bank of Canada expects 1.6% inflation for the 2017 year and 1.8% for the 2018 year. By increasing rates by 2% for domestic students, tuition increases faster than inflation, which over the long term is unsustainable. Instead, tuition and fee increases should be adjusted to, at most, a 1.8% increase for the 2017/2018 year for domestic students. For international students, I propose a rate and tuition increase of 2.4% or more, matching 1.5 times the inflationary value.

I am beyond sick of UBC's faux concern. Every year tuition goes up, and every year UBC send out these token consultations. It is completely disingenuous and disgusts me. NOTHING EVER CHANGES and that is why UBC will never be a world class institution, and will never receive a penny in alumni contributions from me. The fact that international students are paying more than 4 times the fees of domestic students and people with indigenous heritage pays nearly nothing, the tuition fees utterly scream "INJUSTICE!" I find it unfitting, more frankly speaking disappointing, for a highly praised university like UBC to take part in this discriminatory behavior. What's even more disappointing is that UBC also acts as if they take pride in their racial, cultural and national diversity. It is nothing but contradictory and hypocritical to both make that claim in the previous sentence and charge those people who you use as some form of commercial to convey this pseudo sense of equality and freedom. Another "funny" thing to notice is that it is tremendously harder for international students to both be accepted into UBC and to preserve their well being within, as we also have to deal with currency exchange rates, cultural adaptation, homesickness, loneliness and possibly language difficulties. Therefore, instead of what an intellectual and virtuous university should do, UBC punishes more effort and possibly more intelligence while rewarding traits that come without any effort put into to achieve, such as heritage and birthplace.

As an international student, one of the major reasons (perhaps the major reason) I chose UBC was because of the cost. Compared to universities in the United States and Canada, the university is far cheaper. From speaking with other students, this is one of the main reasons why students choose UBC, possibly the main one.

We now live in a reality where students don't view higher education in terms of quality, but in terms of cost. I earned my undergraduate degree in The United States, and I will be paying off my loan until I am 35. I know peers who are on a program where they make 20 years of payments, and then, their loan is forgiven. This means that, despite paying until they are 42, they will still have not paid off their debt - only through loan forgiveness can they escape the economic burden.

With increasing rents and cost of living, today's youth is pressed into tight economic circumstances. The extra burden of student debt adds to their struggles. With less disposable income, millennials spend less on other goods, like cars, food, and luxury items. We're already starting to see the effects of this. There are many articles online about how Millennials are 'killing' certain industries - simply because they don't have the money to spend.

As an international student, I have an extra burden because of increased tuition compared to domestic students. There is also an extra restriction on my study permit - I can only work 20 hours a week, which means I may graduate with even more debt, even though I could potentially earn enough to pay off my loan when I graduate. While I understand the restriction is to keep me studying, we have to face the reality that increased tuition means that less students will want to take the financial risk to attend UBC, and those that do may face economic hardship that won't just affect themselves, but have ripple affects throughout the economy.

I implore you, that if you do seek to increase tuition in the future, year over year, that you lobby the federal government to lift the 20 hours a week restriction on international student's work. This prevents them from both living at a decent standard, gaining industry experience along with vital contacts, and potentially getting the cultural experience they need to stay in Canada if they wish to do so after they graduate.

The tuition fee increase should be followed by an increase of the minimum guaranteed income that supervisors must provide for graduate students. As it is, some (if not most) graduate student live with an income inferior to British Columbia poverty level of income (around 18 500 CAD per year) after they paid their tuition fees.

In other countries like Germany, graduate PhD students are considered employees of their university to better reflect the fact that their University benefit from their work. Performing grad students contribute to the reputation of their University and therefore help attract undergrad students.

I am generally not supportive of any tuition fee increment of more than 1.5%. As an international student first received the offer of admission to the 2015/2016 Winter Session, the admission package stated that tuition fees for international students are at \$799.99 per credit. Now I am in 2017/2018 Winter Session and tuition fee is at \$1163.76 per credit. This averaged out to an increase of over 20% per academic year for the past 2 years, which is definitely not in line with what the University claimed of 2-3% increase per year for the past 2 years.

I am against it. It's already extreme difficult to pay tuition, I can't even begin to worry about how to afford an increased fee.

Why are you building a new huge buidling if you have financial struggles? Tuition is already high, especially on top of the absolutely INSANE cost for parking. You are spending your money in needless ways and you do not care about the well-being of your students. You are greedy.

The proposal mentions increases for international student fees, which are already significantly higher than domestic fees. UBC prides itself as an "international school," and should not be doing anything to discourage potential international students from attending. What should be done to raise funds is limiting the criteria for who qualifies for domestic tuition. For example, I know of someone who was born in Alberta but lived in the US for all but the first two months of his life. People in scenarios similar to this should be paying full international tuition- the rest of us should not have to pay more.

I find it ridiculous and peculiar that UBC proposes a tuition fee increase virtually every year due to "inflationary pressures," but don't propose the same increases in student awards for **current recipients and future recipients**.

I think it is very unfair that the tuition costs continue to rise at UBC, but the student wages have not followed suit. Most students are struggling to get by between tuition, the outlandish cost of required textbooks, and living costs, yet every year UBC raises our tuition and I'm not really seeing what we are getting in return. We don't have professors making textbooks less expensive or accepting the old version of a book. Instead we have custom course pack that change every year and 400\$ science textbooks. I don't see student jobs at wage levels that are a helpful contribution. In the time I've been attending UBCO the tuition costs have risen by 10%, I just don't see how costs have risen that much.

2% increases seem in line with inflation, and thus reasonable.

As for increasing the specified cases by 5% and 9.2%, the argument for it appears to be bringing things to equality, but I am not sure that this is the case. By not getting a degree out of the program, such a student actually receives less than those in the degree program. While knowledge and improved analytical skill are the core of education, an actual degree has a lot of worth in the modern economy. Non-degree programs should have tuition reduced accordingly.

Thus, while increases may be warranted, making the cost per course equal between the degree and non-degree programs appears to produce inequality: the non-degree program should cost less.

I'd prefer no increase in any amount of money I pay. School is expensive enough as it is.

The 9% increase for international students is an absolute joke. This University needs to increase diversity in fund development, not merely through international students. It further creates a corporatization of education for those with high economic backgrounds. Not what Canadian education stands for. And I am a domestic student.

The increase in tuition does help fund the current studies that are being done in the university, as well as support students in financial situations by providing awards and scholarships. The only problem that evidently will occur is the selection of students able to attend UBC. UBC students are only able to be financially supported at UBC because they have enough money to pay tuition fees. Unfortunately, some students are unable to attend UBC because the tuition in itself is too expensive for their household. Increasing the tuition fees will nonetheless cause toll on the majority of the population that works part time jobs to satisfy payments. Many students have a lot of potential, and yet they are deprived of the opportunity to attend a well-known university such as UBC because they cannot afford it. To conclude, the magnitude of the negative consequences of raising tuition must be considered in great respect so the students are able to continue pursuing their goals.

Many students are already struggling to pay off student loans, if ubc chooses to increase tuition, increase international tuition and give BC residents who pay taxes a lower tuition. Why should there be a 2% increase for domestic students when it can easily be covered by internationals willing and able to afford ubc?

Considering the already high tuition fees for international students, I don't agree to increase the tuition fees for international students since a 2% or 3% increase in the tuition of international students is much more than a 2% increase in the tuition of domestic students, who pay much less.

Vancouver is an extremely expensive city for international students to live in and my stipend as a graduate student is not enough to cover my living expenses. As someone new to the city and without any connections, the cheapest available living situation I found costs me \$1400/month. I make \$1600/month as a graduate student. I have already had to take out US federal loans just to make ends meet here. An increase in my tuition would make my living expenses that much more difficult to cover and would dramatically increase the amount of stress in my life even after I receive my degree. I have worked really hard to be a part of UBC. Please remember us students when evaluating a tuition increase. Thanks for your time.

If El Salvador, a country with an immensely lower GDP than Canada, can provide free tuition for its citizens so can Canada.

The tuition hike -- especially for international students -- is shameful. You are rendering education inaccessible and unaffordable. The student body will protest the ongoing erosion of affordable education. I would not attend UBC if I had to make the decision again.

I budgeted for this program with the given tuition rate, not expecting an increase for the 2018 portion of my studies. I imagine others will feel this way as well. Tuition hikes should be made with more notice to incoming students so they can prepare and plan accordingly. For that reason, I do not support this rate hike.

Please note that the tuition is increasing every year without a parallel increase in the salaries of the graduate students. Those salaries that are already low and much below the minimum wage if calculated per the actual worked hours not the hypothetical working hours.

In addition, the international graduate students at UBC Okanagan do not have the same treatment of having the "international student scholarship" that is applied in Vancouver for most of the international graduate students reducing their fees to that similar of the domestic students, which is actually half fees. And hence, the UBC-O international graduate student is already paying double fees comparing to domestic and UBC-V international students.

| To whom it may concern, Thank you for offering the option for students to respond and provide feedback to the proposed tuition changes for 2018/2019. As an international graduate student, my concerns with the proposed changed stem primarily from a lack of access to grants and scholarships available to international students to offset these tuition changes. As you may know, international students do not qualify for many scholarships, such as the Tri-Council awards, and current available scholarships provided through the university are limited. The Affiliated scholarships are very specific in which types of projects or students qualify, and they have only grown more competitive in the time I have been a student. In addition, by choosing to attend an institution outside of my home country, I also no longer qualify for many scholarships I could receive including government funding for higher education. This gap in funding opportunities has not improved in the time I have been on campus, and I anticipate the proposed changes will only exacerbate the problem. The International Student Award is an immensely helpful funding source and, while it does not cover most of tuition costs, I would ask that you consider increasing this award in future years to match the proposed increases in tuition for international students. I would also ask that you only raise continuing international graduate student tuition 2%, rather than the proposed 2-3%, given the particular difficulties students have in finding outside funding opportunities they qualify for. The continued tuition increases from UBC are unacceptable. If UBC continues to raise tuition like this, it will only attract very rich students, no other students will be able to afford this tuition, on top of living in a very expensive city. This might lead to a decrease in capacity and excellence at the university, as applicants will no longer be from the true pool of talented people, but will only include a small range of very rich families. UBC's claim for diversity will not be able to be fulfilled and class diversity will decrease.

Furthermore, the financial hardships that follow from this continued increase in fees in particular for graduate students with long degrees will reflect in the academic behaviour. No person can provide world-class excellent results while being under significant financial pressure. Every year UBC increases student fees and to be honest, no real return benefits are obvious for students. In contrast, this continued hardship leads to ambiguous feelings towards UBC, and many students can no longer identify themselves with this university that continues to suck out as much money of students it possible can.

Another issue for graduate students is that tuition fees increase, while TA and RA salaries do not increase. Furthermore, often limited funding is available for PhD students towards the end of their program. These financial hardships cause significant mental health stress for students, and again, this will reflect in the academic output and publications students can provide - and might ultimately lead to decrease in UBC academic output, which in many ways is supported by graduate student research.

Every year UBC argues with the financial stress on the university and tries to justify tuition increases with this. However, I can see no efforts of UBC trying to save money so that it does not constantly has to increase tuition fees. Constantly, new and more and more fancy buildings are built, to attract more students that will pay even higher student fees. This is an endless cycle into a more and more expensive and selective university, where all calls of diversity seem very hollow.

As much as I dislike having to pay even more money, I understand the need to increase costs. Therefore, I do not oppose these propositions.

It doesn't make sense to me to see another two to three per cent increase in international student tuition. It was just increased this past fall. We already pay three times higher than domestic students, and yet, I still don't see how our money is possibly used to benefit us. It's not used to provide career guidance for international students post-graduation, it's not used to solve the urgent housing issue (yep, still at 1600 something on the waitlist for housing), and you don't even provide scholarships or financial aids to international students. Yes, UBC is building new residences, but when they are finally finished, we'll be gone already. So where is this money actually going into? I read a report saying that UBC largely depends on international students for financing daily functions, and is that all who we are to UBC? Fast cash? Very disappointed at UBC and such decision. Please think of a better way to finance your school, other than draining all money out of international students' pockets.

I would hope this increase in tuition can be a little less for all of us, especially for international students... our family already have a huge burden for sending us to Canada for a better education. I don't want my family to suffer more because of me. I would like to see the tuition increase less (1.5% for international students compared to domestic) since we originally already pay around 6 folds of the domestic tuition fee.

Maybe less constructions i.e. installing meaningless art pieces could help the school to save a bit more money?

There has been a 15% increase in the international student tuition fees in the 2016 and 2017 academic years, which are expected to increase again by 7% in the 2018 academic year. Michelle Suderman, the international student development director at UBC, informed me that while there is a cap beyond which the provincial government cannot increase the tuition fees for domestic students, this is not the case for the international student tuition fees. Furthermore, international students are not eligible for most Canadian government loans and/or bursaries. Thus, as an international student, whose tuition fee expenses were already increased by 22% for this academic year, and who does not enjoy the same financial advantages as domestic students, I kindly urge you to consider the financial struggles and stresses of UBC's international students in light of this tuition-fee-increase-proposal. As any further tuition fee increases will merely work in favor of UBC but only worsen international students' financial struggles, I would support and, once again, I strongly urge you to at least consider my vote, to NOT implement a 2% to 3% increase for all continuing international students across all programs for the 2018/19 academic year. • I am in favor of a 2% to 3% increase in tuition for NEW INCOMING international students • or a democratic and fair 2% increase in tuition that is to affect all of UBC's students (i.e., both domestic and international students).

I am in \$26,000 in debt from a 1 year programme. If I was in the same situation to choose whether to do the program or not, I don't think I would because tuition is too expensive for the quality of education received. If you raise tuition even more, then you lower your chances of getting exceptional students to UBC. I went to Oxford University and paid less tuition per year as an international student there. With your prices, you should be providing a much higher quality of education than you are.

I am an International Graduate Student from [...] and I would like you to invite to live a day as International student since many of us live a day thinking about how we are going to pay the next rent bill, MSP health insurance and simple living expenses as groceries and utilities. Every day we wake up with our bodies fill up of worry, uncertainty, stress about how we are going to pay the next bite of food, the next rent as well as the tuition for the next term. This whole year my account has been on hold just because I haven't had enough money to pay, my grades have been affected and my health is very vulnerable right now just because I simply don't have the money to pay. I wish you could have better options for international students, more economic resources and support to guide us through this financial stress that we live. I am [...] and I haven't dropped out of my program and my courses just because God has granted me with faith and courage, as well as wonderful people who is holding me right now to finish my program in this December, otherwise, long ago I would drop out or even make a decision that put on risk my health and personal and professional goals.

I think that you, all of you, stakeholders, administrators, Honorable Board of Governors should have the humility to ask face to face to some international students how is to live with few coins in your pocket, or invite us to a table in which we can expose our ideas about how to create better opportunities and options for international students who are in risk of dropping out of their courses just because they don't have the money to pay. If you see well your proposal in increasing tuition fees, the most affected group is international students, in which there is no legislation that can protect us from sellers of education and marketing and neoliberal ideas of education. In this 21st century, Education should be for all and not just for those who can pay it, especially Higher Education, I still believe in public education, in education for those in the most vulnerable situation, because we all have something to learn and something to share, higher education institutions are those spaces to create democracy, freedom, social justice, equity. I hope this feedback you have asked online to UBC student turn into new policies, approaches and really helpful ways to support student learning and student success, those students like me living in the limits of their pockets but moving on in their professional goals and moving against rigid structures that legitimate heartless policies for learning and knowledge.

It is true inflation is inevitable and the plan does sound nice however I do not agree with the tuition increase for three reasons. First, student services used 36 million however student services does not actually help the students. Just the past year the president of UBCO embezzled a significant amount of money from the students and the university. So why should the students be paying more for what is not actually going to them. Secondly as a prestigious university I would expect the system to be run more efficiently, some of the services can be automated such as paying tuition to be only online. Or if we actually need librarians. I think that there needs to be revision to how things work at the university and this is largely due to a discrepancy with how UBC is run versus how UBC is imagined to be run, this goes back to the thought about how this plan sounds nice. Lastly, with more students each year should increase in students maximize profit per class.

I am currently a domestic graduate student in my first year of a two year program. My tuition fee for the 2 year program is around \$44K. I am strongly opposed to the suggested increments in tuition fees as the current fees in place are already a staggering amount and very financially unaffordable for someone like me who still has their undergraduate loan/debt to pay off and needs to scavenge and muster any and all external financial resources (which are scarce in the form of savings) to finish the program at hand. I simply can't afford this as it is yet alone to have it be increased next year.

I believe there is absolutely no reason at all to raise tuition for any group of students but a very real need to lower it instead. There should be better allocation of resources and management should differentiate what are real necessities to students and what our lower priorities are. To be honest, many students are not impressed with the amount of 'useless construction' all around campus. The construction on the fountain area by the bookstore, the huge number of random fenced off areas scattered around campus, that make students wonder, what even are they constructing there?? A more pressing concern would be our dorms instead, for example, I live in Vanier and the living conditions are not great to say the least, broken heating that won't turn off, lack of ventilation (my room is like a tomb), strangely shaped windows that allow no wind to come in but instead has no netting to stop bugs from coming in! General cleanliness is also an issue as there are bug infestations; my friend in the Mackenzie building found an entire family of larvae living in her drawers. Please don't raise tuition.

I believe it would be better if the university could apply the new tuition standard among incoming students, and keep the original tuition standard for the continuing students.

Dear Mr. Szeri, dear Ms. Cowin, dear members of the board,

I'm an exchange student from [...], so far enjoying the first two months of a wonderful yearlong stay at UBC. I'm very glad to have the chance to comment on UBC's tuition proposal and I'm looking forward to attend the next meetings of the Board to see what happens with the student feedback and what the discussion generally is like. I dispense with all confidentiality if otherwise any information would be cut off.

I strongly oppose every proposal to raise tuition fees. In Germany, like in several other European countries like in Denmark, Irland, Poland, Sweden, Finland, Hungary etc., we require no general fees to continue learning after school. Like the majority of the people of Germany, I'm convinced that education is a basic right to that people should have the least complicated access possible. Today education more and more becomes an important factor for the distribution of chances in life. Therefore everybody should have the chance to learn as much he or he wants and should be supported in doing so. However, tuition fees complicate and restrict the access to education and hence should be abolished.

Education is an enormously important factor that enables or facilitates access to many aspects of life. In a society where we define ourself and our fellow human beings so much by work/job they do and where degrees count that much, we should give people all the chances they need. We know that people with an university degree enjoy a lot of advantages in life: they live more healthy, they live longer, they can participate in the cultural and political life more easily, they can find better jobs. Education helps people becoming mature and responsible members of our society. Better educated people have to fear poverty less. For that reasons we should help people participate in the educational system as much as possible. But being confronted by fees of about 20.000 Dollar for a degree additional to the other costs of studying is unquestionably a big obstacle that will deter many young people from beginning a program.

What is especially important about this point is that these costs result in a social segregation of the prospective students. Affluent or even wealthy people can much more easy afford the expenses of studying whereas poorer people just can not afford the expenses at all or are offen more insecure and less courageous towards an uncertain future. This way tuition fees promote a social division of the society. The fact that only of \$19,8 million out of \$119,5 million (16,6 %) of UBC support for students is allocated based on needs suggests to me that UBC should care more about their students' financial woes. A much greater deal of the awards should be given to the students that really need them to be able to study.

This reasoning doesn't contradict the general claim that students should pay for their education because of the big financial advantages they gain. And, of course, the universities have to be paid. The solution to this problem is a fair system of taxation. Education - from kindergarten to university - should be paid by the community, represented by the state. We need a state capable of acting to ensure rights to all people, to offer good education for everyone and to mitigate the social segregation of society. The money needed therefore should be collected via taxes. For this reason the University and it's Board should advocate a better public financing to enable more public spending on education.

Studies suggest that universitiy alumni already pay their education anyway because they pay much more taxes over their lifespan that they degrees had cost.

To whom it may concern,

I have reviewed the financial information provided by UBC regarding the Total Operating Revenues vs. the Total Operating Expenses and the reason why UBC is asking for a two percent increase yet I remain strongly against the tuition increase. The institution of UBC is currently not running a deficit and although costs are going up, the Canadian inflation rate has not been 2% since 2011, which means that a 2% tuition increase is over the amount that would be required for UBC to address the issue of "inflation." As such, I see no need for a tuition increase for the plain reason that it is not absolutely necessary at this time and as many students, myself included, are already struggling to pay tuition and university bills as it is. The fact that UBC, an institution which gets over half a billion dollars in government grants annually, is still claiming that it needs to increase tuition to maintain their budget is disappointing. An institution of this size and magnitude should be more capable to manage its revenues and expenses so that is never in a position where it believes that a tuition increase is the best option. Frankly, I am disappointed that the idea of a tuition increase was proposed and is even being considered, and I know I am not alone. The bottom line is: forget the 2% tuition increase and pull yourself together UBC. We have no more money to give to you because you have already taken all of it.

It would be great to have more mental health support on campus; I know many people who want to make use of the excellent counselors on campus, but the wait time is up to a month between appointments.

I strongly disagree with the proposed increase. I do not feel that UBC has done enough to attempt to bring costs down elsewhere, and I feel that UBC students should not have to shoulder this financial burden. Postsecondary education is increasingly vital in today's world, and increases such as this raise barriers for disadvantaged students. Additionally, I do not think UBC has adequately consulted students the time frame for this is very short, and no town hall is being held. I ask UBC to 1) hold a town hall to ensure students are fully consulted and 2) rethink any and all tuition increases.

Any tuition increase is unacceptable. Education is a right, not a commodity. Student Aid is horrendous at assessing financial need and does not provide adequate loan funding for basic existence in Vancouver's expensive rental market, let alone enough to cover tuition and education expenses.

I fully support any student effort to pressure the university, province or federal government to fix or eliminate tuition fees, including student strikes and other acts of civil disobedience in solidarity with Quebec's Red Square movement. Any tuition increase will be met with protest.

In regards to the 2018/2019 Tuition Proposal, I understand that the university faces rising costs, partly attributable to inflation rates. Addressing the 2-3% increase proposed for continuing international students, I personally feel that it would be fair if the tuition increase does not exceed the proposed increase for continuing domestic students at 2%. Although international students are not Canadian citizens or PR holders, for the duration of our studies and stay in Canada we are paying Canadian taxes and living costs. Thus even though we may not have contributed to the Canadian economy prior to the start of our degree program at UBC (in the form of taxes and the like), we are currently making such a contribution at the same rate as Canadian citizens. It should also be taken into consideration that the general international undergraduate per-credit tuition rate is already 6.7 times higher than the domestic rate (at \$172.99 and \$1,163.76 respectively) for the 2017/2018 academic year. (As an international student entering UBC in 2015 in the Faculty of Arts, I currently pay \$933.56 per credit; still amounting to over 5 times the domestic 2017/2018 rate above, and a 6% increase from the \$879.97 rate I paid for the 2015/2016 academic year.) This means that applying a 2% increase for both continuing domestic and international students still amounts to a greater increase in total dollar contribution to UBC's income by international students compared to domestic students (at an increase of \$23.28 and \$3.46 respectively from 2017/2018 per-credit rates). Another factor that should be taken into consideration is the recent strengthening of the Canadian dollar around the second half of 2017. This has affected the Canadian exchange rate and made tuition and living costs considerably more expensive for international students like myself, particularly if our home country's currencies are relatively weak. In my own experience, my parents have found it harder to amass the necessary fees for this term.

As a graduate student who is no longer taking courses and is fully active in research, any increase in tuition seems unreasonable. Registered graduate students continue to have to pay full tuition costs even when they are no longer taking courses. While certain services are still provided like access to libraries, databases, etc., it seems unreasonable to keep charging higher and higher amounts for tuition.

Is there a reason why the tuition fee is increasing? I feel like most of the UBC students already feel like the fee is very high. Rather than just stating "we are going to increase this much of percentage," it would be great if students could actually read the reasons why there is an increase of the already demanding fee.

Too much increase for international tuition fee. Already a lot.

As a science and engineering graduate student, all I can really see from this increase in fees is targeting international students with the assumption that we are all here only to get PR in Canada and pay any price for it. While in reality many of us have come to UBC for a good technical education and the affordable tuition that comes from a Canadian public university.

Moreover, you are rendering the university even less competitive on the international scale with increases in tuition.

In technical/STEM fields, where graduate students are receiving significant financial support in return for research done for the university, most top global universities do not require that graduate students pay tuition, or at the same rate as other graduate disciplines without the research component.

In fact, to truly be competitive, on a Canadian level, and even more so on an international level, you should be decreasing tuition fees or granting tuition waivers, to truly attract the top graduate students from across the globe. Otherwise, it does not make financial sense to come and struggle along as a graduate student in one of the most expensive cities in North America where industries will probably start moving out of as operating costs, especially those associated with land/rent costs, become unfeasible for many businesses.

I do not agree with increasing the tuition each year. Tuition is already expensive enough and each time the it increases, it makes it more difficult for students to afford it. The minimum requirement nowadays is often a bachelor's degree and people should not be denied a job because they simply were unable to pay for their education.

I'm tired of this fatalism about "inflationary pressures." There's an alternative to shifting the burden more and more to students: cut back on administration. I would also like to suggest cutting back on excess expenses for leaders at UBC, as well as "fun" student events. This is an educational institution. As such, the priority should be on education, not bureaucracy, creating some artificial sense of student community, or maintaining a relatively luxurious lifestyle for people closest to the top of the hierarchy. In fact, it must be the administration and superfluous activities that get cut, because, without additional government funding, "inflationary pressures" will continue to pose budgetary problems, and UBC cannot continue to burden students more and more every year. Doing so makes a university education increasingly unreachable for many people in society.

I believe that the tuition increases in line with inflation are fair. However, tuition for international students is already very high, combined with high living expenses and a strangely expensive meal plan, and the costs are almost too high. I believe that the increase for international students should be as per inflation only as a result.

Alternatively, the university could consider reducing the cost of housing and meal plans to counter the increase. The meal plan in particular offers opportunities. Considering the scale that the food services have in UBC, their costs and prices should be much lower simply by utilizing economies of scale. Instead, the cost of dishes is as much, if not more expensive than what I could get at a eatery outside.

I feel a larger increase should be placed on International students. This is not to say I disagree with the inflation related increase to Domestic students. I just believe that higher rates may deter international students and open more spots for local students.

Increases to graduate student tuition fees, whether domestic or international, further restrict our already meager stipends. As it is, cost of living in Vancouver makes it difficult for graduate students, particularly international students who already pay increased health care costs and additional fees, to live comfortably. There is already disparity amongst graduate student salaries - students may be paid thousands more or less than others depending on their ability to draw external funding. A tuition increase would further increase that disparity, and add additional stress to students who should be focusing on their research and/or study.

Don't raise the tuition more.

I think an increase to fees would be upsetting to most people as university expenses are so much already just to be able to learn. Even with scholarships and financial support many people struggle to pay their fees. Also seeing that some of my tuition fees are going into scholarships and grants for other people who ubc wants to keep while I am struggling to pay for ubc is rather upsetting. I may have misunderstood the data provided or the actual impact on my own personal fees but either way I believe that more support should be given to those who need it rather than such a large portion of scholarships being merit based and given to the top smartest students. Everyone deserves a chance to attend university and with ever increasing costs for general living that idealization becomes far less practical. If it has to be done to satisfy requirements for provincial funding then so be it but if not I see no benefits to us the students who already have so much access to services and technologies.

While I understand inflation and the large amount of expenses required to run universities, any increase in fees is hard to accept. Being in engineering and paying more than average already due to the larger amount of credits I find fees to be extremely hard to cover even after scholarships and with savings. On top of the fees for courses we pay large amounts for residence or suffer commutes around an hour and a half for many people. There is simply no affordable way to attend ubc and live in Vancouver as it is so student loans are many peoples only option. On top of the fees stated in our actual payments to ubc we are expected to spend more money on our courses for things like professional printing and business attire or else we are penalized in our courses. I can't really see any student being for an increase in fees and I am no different. As a commuter I also don't get to benefit from many of the clubs and services that these fees are applied to. For example I had been hoping to join clubs and get involved. This is simply not practical with a commute and I simply cannot afford residence. With ever increasing fees and no benefits of the services provided at ubc which the fees are going towards, I would be strongly opposed to any increase in the cost to get an education. Thank you for considering my lengthy response!

I am a transfer student and overall the tuition seem okay. however as someone who also works and attends classes at the same time it be great if tuition increases won't increase much.

I think that it is ridiculous that you are considering increasing tuition again. I am an Indigenous student, and it has been so hard for me to study at UBC because it is so expensive, and I received no band funding. You are creating a situation where only rich people with rich parents can afford to study at UBC. It is especially terrible because I work for UBC and the rate at which you pay students is so low it is embarrassing. For work learn and for notetakers, you earn next to nothing, but then have to pay so much to attend. And there are very little scholarship opportunities for Indigenous students. I will be graduating with about 57,000 of student debt, and then another 30,000 of credit card debt, just so that I could fund my education. On top of this, I have to face the ever present discrimination from other students who think that Indigenous people don't pay anything for university.

The proposal of Increasing the tuition is not acceptable. It will prevent people people from disparate societies in particular financial minority from entering the university. This will result in making the university lose its diverse which is one of the most important values in the world.

Raising an already exaggerated tuition is going to prohibit those students who want to be here, but cannot afford to take out loans from getting a higher education. Frankly, streamlining administration and undoing unnecessary bureaucracy would be a better way to deal with budgets than overtaxing students.

Things like ancillary operations can't possible be this high considering that we ourselves are paying for these services already so where is the money going. The bookstore, for example, we don't get books for free and have to pay for textbooks and on top of that some of our tuition money is also going to that! Also a lot of services that are used only by some students and yet all students have to pay toward could be made into paid services instead so not all of us have to deal with tuition increases with a tuition that is already high enough that many can't afford. At this rate, some students will have to drop out or transfer to other universities due to such high tuition on top of dealing with commuting from cities outside Vancouver or paying inflated amounts to live on campus.

Using the increased funds to support students through scholarships, bursaries, and loans should be a top priority.

It would also be a great opportunity for special guest lectures (across the fields) to come more frequently to inspire students and show them what's going on in their areas of specialization.

I am not sure if there is ever any positive feedback to a tuition increase, nor have I have yet to hear about tuition fees being lowered as a result of receiving feedback from students after a tuition increase. This raises a question, which I hope UBC can address, of how our feedback has an impact on the decisions of the members of the Board and if our feedback has any impact at all.

My main concern with the tuition increases is if UBC is using the money in the best way possible to protect the mind and body of the students who are attempting to study here. It is understandable that with inflation the university would be required to spend more money as well, but from my experience as a student at UBC, I question how well my tuition money is being spent. It appears that UBC takes on many projects every year to add art installations around campus while it is well known among the student community that the university's professional counselling services leave much to be desired. UBC counselling's incredibly long waitlist, even for those who request immediate help, is well known among students. A number of us have also heard the story of a student who heard back from UBC counselling only after they had already graduated. With an attempted murder in the first year residences last year, knowledge of the stress and hardships we face at home, at work, and at school as students, the recent death of a student who jumped/fell off a crane this year, and common knowledge of UBC's counselling service's shortcomings it is clear that UBC is in need of better counselling services for its students than it has now. Additionally, the issue of security and lighting around campus at night and why money has not yet been spent on ensuring the safety of UBC students could also be brought into question. There has been multiple reports in the news over the years of intruders being discovered inside residence buildings and assaults occurring on campus at night. Especially as a victim of one of these assaults, I have first hand experience of what it feels like to be grabbed from behind on a dark street in UBC with my attacker's hand covering my mouth, preventing me from making any sound. The sense of dread washing over me and my heart falling to the pit of my stomach knowing that in that dark street, nobody could see what was going on, nobody could see what was happening to me which meant nobody could help me. Bright, well-lit streets may be too intimidating for an attacker to engage in an attack as such altercation would be easily seen by a passerby or someone looking out their window. I would prefer for tuition fees not to increase, but if they must, then I would be much happier knowing it is resulting in a positive contribution to my fellow students to help protect their mental and physical well-beings while attending this institution.

Why is tuition used to fund need-based awards? My money should be going to my education, not to other students.

Changing the terms of a contract, program, in the middle of the program is not fair. Fees for current students should not be increased. Students budget their programs tightly and this increases just puts more pressure on already tight situations.

I don't see the need to raise tuition as a benefit to the school. Even if it did increase, there would be no noticable effect to the students. Most students already struggle with current tuition costs. STOP RAISING IT.

I don't agree with increasing tuition prices once again. The cost of living close to campus or on campus is too high, so I think school tuition shouldn't put more pressure on students; it is not right, it is not sensitive to the common domestic student.

I don't think this level of increase is necessary at this time. Are there no other options to cover the costs?

I don't understand the need to increase tuition fees when most students already have trouble trying to pay for all the fees regarding the school, especially for international students. Of course, as a student, I would not like to pay more for an already costly education.

I believe that it is completely unfair and unethical for UBC to use revenue gathered from incremental tuition increases to existing students to finance patents and commercialization. Your proposition is to increase costs to individuals you have effectively entered into a non binding contract with, at the agreed upon initial degree price set out by your institution. You then propose to take that revenue and invest it in patents and commercialization projects that seek to improve the assets of the university in the long term. You are building your long term assets, not maintaining or improving operations for existing students, at the expense of those very existing students.

On the back of this, revenue generated from us, your students (customers) will be used to finance massive research projects that funnel funds into demonstrably biased and unethical studies. ex Autism in Mice study run by an incompetent biased individual on the dime of the student body. If you are proposing an increase in students tuition, there should also be a publicly published increase in researcher fund allocation scrutiny. The university is one of the best in the world for graduate research and it is the reason I am here, however I cannot abide an increase in my costs to pay for studies where data will be manipulated for political means. That is unacceptable.

As your existing students have planned long term to meet the previously agreed upon rates of tuition and sacrificed accordingly, it is completely unfair to raise these costs. If costs must be increased, the rates for newly admitted students should be increased at a greater percentage than those of existing students to account for this discrepancy. If not this is a case of institutional strong arming.

No, I would not like a tuition increase in the 2018/19 school year.

As an international student from a third world country, studying or even attempting to study abroad is already not an easy task. As I pack my baggage to move to Canada, I feel the weight of my parents on my shoulders: they have wrung their own bodies dry, collecting each and every cent to be able to pay for my tuition fees. They wear torn clothes, cut down on all costs, just so that I could get a valid education, to improve our lives. If the tuition fees were to increase even more, I couldn't imagine how my parents could afford it.

Since international students are already paying 5 times the fees that a domestic student is paying, I thought that if there HAS to be an increase in fees, it should be on the domestic students, instead of leeching on us international students which have already sucked dry.

It's gonna happen anyways regardless of what we say here.

I like it. It looks well balanced and reasonable. I appreciate the time taken to show how the money is used. Much better than how the international student rate hike in 2014-15 was handled.

As the university claims that the prices of providing education is increasing every year,

I would like to point out that the living expenses for students are also increasing every year. Each year the prices of getting accommodation go up, which means it is becoming ever more difficult to support your time at the university.

Such an increase in the tuition would definitely not help the students.

On the other hand, I would be willing to accept such a hike in tuition if other measures are taken on the campus to support the students. I find that the UBC bookstore and other stores on the campus are incredibly overpriced with respect to the market in the city of Vancouver. Essential things like notebooks, fruits and stationery should actually be more affordable on the campus, and not more expensive than the city. I have to travel far away from the campus to buy these essentials at the right prices.

First of all it is preposterous to mention that this increase is due to inflationary pressure. Inflation within Canada is at 1.4% and to tackle that the solution is an increase of 2-3% average being 2.5%? To make situations worse, a surcharge on international students and not just by course but an additional 5-9% per credit. Stop mistreating international students as cash cows, they're just students like everyone else here to get educated and make the world a better place.

I do not believe the justification for increasing our tuition has been made sufficiently clear.

I understand there is a need to increase in tuition but increasing tuition for international students should be higher compared to most of us domestic students. I have been with UBC Okanagan Campus for the past 3-4 years, there has been an increase about 2% on tuition each year. I am student that is on bursaries, student line of credit, and student loans. It is become even harder to attend this school as bursaries and scholarships are not guaranteed each year. I hope there would be a reduction on domestic tuition than international tuition.

I completely understand the inflationary pressures that the university is presently facing (and will continue to face). For students who receive financial support from family or similar measures, this increase will often not be a huge inconvenience. However, for students who are working and saving every dollar they earn to pay for their tuition, unfortunately an extra \$10.38 per 3 credit course slowly adds up. That is over \$100 that may come from a students food budget. For myself, my main source of income to pay for tuition and living is StudentAidBC. This causes the frustration of the increases in tuition and rent, without proportional increases in the amount of loans I receive. When increases are made for funding students through StudentAidBC, these decisions are made indecently of the increases in UBC's tuition and residence fees. I understand the need, however these small decisions have a major impact on my budget and whether I get to spend \$30 on food in a week or \$40.

Next year will also be my final year of undergraduate studies so I would be grateful if tuition did not increase for the 2018-2019 academic year.

For many international students, inflation seems like an irrelevant factor in deciding tuition increases. This is because a lot of the international students have calculated their resources prior to attending, and that the option of going to university has been made with the tuition of the applying year in mind. This is to say that the financial resources that were made available for each student to enter university, for the most part, already existed at the time of applying to UBC. Since inflation is often not matched equally in both income and in already existing financial resources, the tuition increases based on 3% inflation are outrageous, for this aforementioned reason, but also that inflation hovers at around 2% in Canada. Why then are international students even more negatively affected by the increased tuition proposals compared to domestic students?

In essence, the increased proposals are not indicative of inflation; are not taking into account that international students

do not miraculously have increased incomes; and that it is not conducive to academics you seem to strive for, as the increased financial strain on international students will cause more stress and will overall affect their performance.

I strongly feel that we should not increase tuition for domestic students because I cannot afford that financially as a full-time student. I feel as if with all the stresses of a university life, additional financial stress would make grades of students go down due to worry or balancing multiple jobs and there would be an overall general decrease in average for the student body. Increasing tuition would also promote income inequality because in today's world university degrees are increasingly becoming a requirement for jobs and an increase in tuition would make post-secondary education less accessible. The university is an institution meant to better the lives of individuals and overall society and lessening social constructed gaps, such as education, so it should not be promoting social or financial inequality. It can be also be argued that student loans will cover financial cost, but student loans do not increase when tuition increases. These are few of many reasons why tuition should not be raised and I strongly advocate for keeping tuition as is.

I do not approve of any of the increases in tuition. Last year ubc had an insane increase in international tuition "to stay competitive with other schools" which really isn't an explanation and I don't see any difference since that increase. So I really really don't get why there should be another increase. I hope you take this into account.

As an undergraduate international student, I obviously do not welcome an additional increase in tuition to the 15% plan instated last year. Moreover, as a diligent, and successful (if I may say so myself) student, who finds it terribly difficult to find financial assistance or scholarship, despite the fact that I, objectively, am more in need and deserving than many other students who receive scholarship or bursaries, another raise in tuition is a harsh blow to this effect. Please do not do it. Or dynamically select international students to pay extra based on their ability to do so. I assume you have the resources and ability to make every student happy, so please figure that out.

I disagree in increase tuition costs. Considering all the detailed info that you provided, the major costs annually for UBC is the payment for faculty. Professors have high salaries and I think that to increase the costs for students is ok. Many times students need to ask loans or use their little salaries to pay their tuition and I think this is not fair.

Tuition and fees increases due to inflation should see a similar wage increase for employed students. I think 2017 sees about 0.7% increase or so for workers under CUPE, much less than the 2% for domestics or up to 3% for internationals.

As with the previous tuition hike it is disgusting that there are different rates of increase for domestic vs international students, especially when it is claimed to be due to inflation.

High tuition costs are already keeping many brilliant minds out of university. Increasing tuition will only increase this gap. I strongly urge that a tuition increase does not go forward, as there should be less barriers to education not more

As a funded graduate student, I believe that if the university increases fees of various types to respond to inflationary pressures then graduate student funding packages should be increased in kind. If funding packages are not increased as fees rise then the university is only compounding (on top of losses due to inflation) the devaluation of the funding packages it offers.

The small increase in tuition to better student facilities sounds good and i would love better facilities, but the increase can be detrimental to international students and as a domestic student it does not affect me very much. But I still would not like the increase it is costing me extra money that will add up over a long period of time.

An increase in tuition would be detrimental to towards my financial situation and impact me and my family significantly. Deciding to attend UBC impacted my financial situation drastically and increasing tuition would further impact it. Many of us do not come from financially stable families and rely on government loans to attend UBC.

Please do not increase tuition. I cannot afford an increase in tuition. An increase in tuition would be detrimental to me. IF you increase tuition by 60\$ that means i will not have food for the week since my food budget is 60\$ a week.

I don't see any increased value in my education for the constant increases in tuition. My classes are too large, mental health services are sorely inadequate, and student supports are dismal. I strongly oppose these tuition increases. This is already a crippling expensive city and UBC has done nothing to help domestic students with housing. We can't afford to pay more tuition because the cost of living is so high.

I agree that costs for operating an education institution would rise every year and increasing tuition fees is a way to compensate, but it would make much more sense for students to decrease expenses on ancillary operations and facilities and significantly increase funds on student services and research support. The overall student satisfaction for the university is very low compare to other components and I believe the school should prioritize on giving an enjoyable education environment with sufficient supports. This will not only attract students and researchers with high potential but also encourage the current students, our future alumni, to contribute to the institution in return in the future.

I don't understand why tuition for international students should increase more, in percentage, compared to domestic students. Isn't the current inflation rate in Canada the same for both categories of students? This policy as is would be discriminatory.

I strongly DISAGREE the increase in the tuition fee of the international students. The financial burden on international students is heavy enough. Our tuition fees are as 6 times as our counterparts. Plus we are not offered the way to get the student loan and the chance to get bursary is very limited. We are already under the huge stress of both financial and academy (for using the second language learning and compete with the native students). I sincerely hope the school do not put more stress on us because I know almost all the international students around me are working so hard to earn the money for their living in the expensive Vancouver and the difficult school courses. Thus, I do DISAGREE with this proposal

I think the proposal is fair, an approximately 2% increase due to inflation is expected

I'm disappointed to hear about this for the first time. In the email I recieved there was no rational or budget breakdown of why the 2% increase is happening. New students did not have an opportunity to provide any input. We were also not able to provide creative solutions to addressing needs. Most importantly I'm very disappointed in the increase for international students. Such a high cost on an already expensive university fee will be detrimental for a lot of people. Have we seen any studies on how severe a 2-9% increase could be? Do you understand the real implications of this on students? What percentage of students will be impacts and how?

As an undergraduate student in my first year of university who plans to continue on into graduate school, I believe the tuition fees are high enough as they are. Further increasing the costs deters from the education experience and serves as a distraction from completely focussing on my studies as I have to worry about the looming debt.

Our tuition fees should be put to better use with regards to student services for mental health. I have seen far too many complaints online and heard many people express their discontent with the services offered at UBC. Many people have to spend months waiting for help and support that they should have received much earlier, which should not be the case in one of the best universities in the world.

In general, I do agree that the increase in tuition fees is necessary, but the university needs to adapt to the modern world by making sure that our tuition fees really do cover the cost of our courses by prioritising the use of online and free resources. These tuition fees can be a heavy burden for some, and reducing the cost of other expenses will help alleviate the effects of an increase in tuition fees.

Wages do not increase 2% per year to reflect inflationary pressures, yet every year since I began at UBC domestic tuition fees have. Why is that? Students (and parents) are expected to grin & bear the continued financial pressure from rising tuition, housing, and living costs year after year, "providing feedback" where none is truly wanted or wholeheartedly considered. Would it financially devastate UBC to wait at least a couple of years between 2% increase in tuition, or even three or four?

I believe that an increase in tuition is not justified. While inflation does occur each year, the price that international students have to pay is already quite large. I believe that an increase in will turn students away and may even deter returning students.

It is pretty ridiculous that tuition fees go up every year, making it even more unaffordable for students already struggling to pay bills. For a university that boasts about diversity and concerns for the welfare of the students, this action is contradictory to what we have been told about the goals here at UBC. With the rising tuition fees, only a certain percentage of people will sooner or later be able to afford to be in this post-secondary education, limiting UBC's diversity. Education should be a right, not a privilege.

And so far, the money does not seem to be going elsewhere besides building more international buildings to favour more international students because they ultimately pay more. Can we learn to take some notes from other very successful countries and institutions that have free education (many European institutions)? We're not asking for free education, but we are asking you respect the existing and future students' plights in having affordable tuition. Thank you.

I believe funds can be redirected and re-prioritized rather than increasing tuition on students who are barely making it month to month.

do not raise tuition fee, since the international student tuition fees are 6 times of what domestic students pay. Also, Please renew some campus facilities and increase overall campus capacities.

It is already extremely expensive to get a "higher" education and the incentive to get one has gone down over the years. Increasing the already incredibly high tuition cost only makes going to university at UBC less appealing.

Obviously I am sensitive to the pricing of tuition, but 2% seems reasonable. I would even pay 3% if I knew the "extra" was being directed to people of color and disabled people.

with inflation being at an all time low and interest rates increasing the tuition hike will make it more expensive for students and it is not justified using inflation as a reason as inflation has been low in many economies

I find the tuition increases extremely inconvenient. I graduate in December. Although I have had to pay MORE money to the university, I wont be present to actually reap the benefits that the tuition increase will supposedly provide. The construction on campus (although I understand necessary) has proved to be very challenging. The traffic flow has increased substantially and time getting on and off campus has proved to be quite frustrating.

After reviewing the current proposal, I see no reason that tuition should be increased. If the university is so hard-pressed for money that it must turn to those who can already ill afford it, maybe it should consider replacing some of its lavish projects with more practical ones. As a simple example, the different coloured lights outside of the Nest and Alumni Centre are completely unnecessary. I understand that part of the charm of UBC is the beautiful campus, but this takes it too far. That lighting is to help students get around campus after sunset, not host a disco party. The money used on those lights could've been put towards purchasing more Safewalk cars or more of the blue safety poles instead. Collecting more money is not the solution, spending the money wisely in the first place is.

Tuition increases are never welcome, especially with the already high cost of living in Vancouver. It was unclear in the document as to what exactly is causing this increase, and it's hard for students to just take an administration's word on general expenses being higher when it's our money at stake.

1. The explanation provided does not specify where our tuition is spent. It is so general.

2. As an international student, I do not have access a lot of the scholarships available. This should be reflected on my tuition.

3. Why I can not opt out of student financial services if I am not eligible to use most of them. I am only eligible if I am on crisis which I hope no one reach. Reaching a crisis is very rare because to get the study permit you can not reach that level. This makes the financial support that UBC offers to their international student useless.

4. I am not a student with disability. However, I have a medical condition and religious restrictions that prevent me from using the athletic facilities and I do not understand why I can not opt out from that too.

5. If inflation affects UBC making the university wants to increase the tuition for their student. It is also affecting the students and their families. Increasing the tuition will put the students and their families in financial difficulties and that will affect their studies. I do not think UBC have intentions to do that.

6. increasing the revenue could be done by increasing investments and decreasing the expenses by freezing salaries and stopping parties.

I disagree. While I've been a student, I saw a rise in tuition twice, and each time, the "consultation" process has been ignored. I wonder if this illusion of participatory democracy is how we placate our conscience in light of the fact that UBC has become the most inaccessibly expensive educational institution in British Columbia.

I vote no.

As the cost of attending university increases, will the financial support available also increase accordingly? (ex. bursary, renewable scholarships, etc.)

To not increase.

I think that there should not be an increase in tuition as proposed. Students are already paying so much, some supporting themselves.

The international undergraduate tuition fee is already too high this year: \$1,163.76, about seven times the tuition of domestic students (\$172.99). Thus, increasing the international tuition even more is a "tragedy" for international students like me. My parents will to pay for my education. However, I do not want to take all of my family's money. Each school year tuition fee of UBC is worth the total salary of my parents in five years. What if my grandparents have cancer? What if my dad loses his job? What if one member of my family has a car accident? We need saving money, and this increasing tuition fee is "spoiling" it. I do try to work, but it is impossible to earn enough for the huge tuition (\$10/hour so I will have to work for at least 11 hour every day to pay for more than \$40000 a year). Most of the scholarships are \$10000 maximum so how can you expect me to pay for the left part - more than \$30000, which will be even more?

We international students come here with the hope to study, to do research, to do the work that we could not have done in our home countries. We do not come to UBC to carelessly use our families' "blood money". This increasing tuition will steal away the chance of many international students to graduate. Furthermore, there will be less international students who want to apply for UBC since the tuition seems too high for them.

I understand that UBC needs more money, but do not put that burden on international students who are already paying seven times more the domestic students are. If the tuition must increase, please at least increase the amount of scholarships, too.

Please do not increase the tuition fee for both international and local students.

I find that a 2% increase in tuition for undergraduate programs to be mostly reasonable. However, the tuition costs for programs which cost over \$10,000, a 2% increase is too much. Considering that most students in post-baccalaureate programs to have very intensive studying required, they will choose to live on campus. Adding to that the cost of an increased tuition, students which come from low-paying families will have no way to afford their child's tuition, even when the student has been accepted into the said program.

I really hope UBC don't increase the tuition fees, because it's already been really really expensive for Vantage students. I can't imagine what will happen if my family knows this news.

I've been always astonished by the ridiculous and enormous disparity of high tuition fees in undergrad level between Engineering/Science based courses and Sauder School of Business. Currently, business studies cost like \$45k for International folks while around \$40k for Engineering. What lab facilities or "extra-ordinary" technologies in Business department justify such high fees? For example, Engineering/Science departments need to have latest computing processors, software modules, FPGA boards, lab equipment/chemicals. How come Sauder needs more than Eng. and then spend on what? Lab. computers/Accounting software for business students? Or their faculties are more expensive to hire? Can't we divert some money from there?

On another note, the average tuition fee for undergrad international students for Eng. in 2007 was about \$25k. Now it's going to be more than \$45k- about 80% increase in 10 years! From my personal experience as both Grad and Undergrad, the quality of education or the student funding or securing job after graduation --none of these factors has climbed to 80%. This is evident from UBC's insignificant change in International University rankings (39th or 40th?) in the last decade.

I know UBC always use inflation excuse as a pressure every year to increase fees. Maybe UBC should take a step back and reflect at their net achievements against money spent/charged. It's very clear somewhere down the line UBC is not efficient in providing students "best value" for the money charged. An 80% increase in tuition in a decade but no such climb in improvements for students in terms of quality of education or landing a job is a failure.

My advice: please utilize your operating fund efficient to improve student's education quality and likelihood of securing job instead of burdening them by debts after graduation. Work with the Prov. and Fed. govts to come up with better solution than increasing tuition fees.

Every year, UBC asks its students for their thoughts on the proposed annual tuition increase. And, sadly, every year it seems our words fall on deaf ears. I have been a UBC student for over six years, having completed my undergraduate degree and now working on my masters, I have yet to see the administration take students' needs and concerns to heart. Vancouver's vacancy rate continues to sit below 1%, the waitlist for student housing numbers in the thousands, and our transit system is not yet fulfilling the growing needs of UBC's students who are forced to live further and further away from campus. Raising tuition not only increases students' dependency on loans, it may force them into riskier housing situations in order to save money.

A second pertinent issue is mental health. As an undergrad, I worked at least two jobs to make ends meet while studying at UBC. Now, I have had to move back in with my parents, and continue to work to support myself and pay off my student loans. I can only speak for myself, but the financial strain of being a working student has been hugely detrimental to my productivity as a graduate student and on my mental health.

As an institution, I truly believe there are other ways to contribute to the budget. Asking for more money from students will continue to define UBC as a corporate entity that does not value the health and stability of its 'workers.' I urge you to reconsider raising tuition fees and reevaluate how the institution allocates salaries, administrative costs and the perception that the growing number of UBC graduates may have after leaving an institution that increased its fees more often than it began construction.

I have only recently begun my graduate studies at UBC, and will have to decide whether I can continue should there be a tuition increase.

From the perspective of an international student, this increase in tuition would be very tough on certain people. I come from middle class background and it is already very tough for my parents to be paying the tuition for UBC as I did not receive any financial aid/scholarships. A 2% increase would mean my family would have to pay 3,200 dollars extra per year (if not more), which is akin to taking an extra class. I'm sure there are many others like me who come to UBC despite the tuition being out of their range simply because they would like to receive world class education.

Furthermore, the fact that UBC is cheaper than their US counterparts actually makes it very appealing for international students to come to UBC rather than go to an Ivy. I feel that if this increase continues, it might actually decrease the number of international students coming each year as UBC would lose that edge over their competitors.

The increase in International Tuition is absolutely fucking absurd. I'd ask for you to forgive my use of strong language but I feel that its use is the only way to properly convey my anger at the proposition. I am already paying an exorbitant fee to attend this wonderful university. A 10% increase would turn the price from unreasonable to ludicrous. I am livid at the thought of this University taking advantage of us international students. Don't we have to pay enough already? This is not a cheap school for us, most of us have accepted that fact but this is akin to being spat at by the higher ups. I am thoroughly disappointed.

I agree with increasing tuition 2% due to inflation but I feel the university should try to reduce spending. For example, lowering administrative costs and unnecessary construction/maintenance costs. Also reduce costs for public outreach events. More of the budget should be spent on research and providing support to faculty and students, not maintaining image.

I find it interesting that despite the downturn in the economy, this is the second year in a row that UBC is proposing another 2-3% hike to tuition rates for domestic students. I have no issue with this year's proposal to increase the tuition rates of international students and those students who are unclassified but I do have a problem with the continued increase in fees, despite not seeing any direct impact from the previous years increase. If UBC continues to increase tuition fees year after year, I imagine that there will be increased demand for tuition support and scholarships, so students can continue to go to school. I know with the downturn in the economy, it hurt my family. I was living in Vancouver, and my mom, dad and sister were all laid off from their jobs in Alberta. I was paying for my grad studies education myself but there went any sort of help, assistance or financial backing I had (when my entire family lost their jobs). I felt the pressure to all of a sudden financially support my family while currently on leave from my job/not working while completing an intensive dual Masters program and also trying to pay for school and live in one of the most expensive cities in the country! With limited financial assistance/scholarships from UBC or externally, I found it emotionally and financially stressful trying to balance my studies, finances and help my family while they tried to get back on their feet.

In regards to other fee increases to accompany the tuition fee increase, I am 100% against any sort of increase to non-instructional fees! These are the most aggravating fees that UBC charges to its students. Offering mandatory classes, required for program completion via online/distance (DL) only where a student may have at most only have email contact with their professor or TA once a month and everything is put on blackboard there is no need to charge an extra \$50 for the course on top of the regular course/tuition fees! This is a total cash grab by the university with no seen or added benefit for the student. Take my situation for example, a student living on campus where I had to take 4 classes during the last 2 years of my program via distance (because that is the only method for which the class was offered once in that entire academic year) and had to pay extra, for the privilege to take the class online when I purposely chose to take an in person/in class Masters program and NOT the alternatively offered DL Masters program, because I learn better in a classroom setting. The fact that students cannot get out of paying this fee, and that enrollment services cannot accurately tell me where that money is going and what it is used for, or how I will see it used to better my educational experience is aggravating beyond belief!

As an international student, I pay 600% more tuition than domestic students. However, I see my fees being spent on irrelevant projects to me. For example: South Gage Residence, fountain renovation, and Vantage College. For international students we are only here for undergraduate studies. But these projects can take years to complete.

I do not believe that raising the tuition by 2% for the sole reason of inflation is justifiable. Annual inflation from 2016 was just over 1.50%, thus begging the question how the school can justify for the extra 0,5%. Now, this is not saying I approve the 1.50% increase in the first place. People often rationalize that inflation forces or propels the price to rise. However, they forget about the income side. My parents' salaries did not rise, why should my tuition. If we are all about balance and fairness (if not, why would UBC ask to raise the tuition rate based upon inflation rate?), it is important to realize that a lot of students' parents' income is not increasing as fast as their tuition. And if UBC continues to stand by their motto: "It's Yours," then it should start by making it ours by giving us the ability (at least try to) to own it. If not, UBC should reconsider its values and motto.

As an international student who's tuition will increase about 1% more than domestic students I would appreciate having a few more options for scholarships destined only to international students as the amount of money we have to pay is greater and is difficult to manage for some parents. I understand this is completely necessary to do and the University is doing its best to help us but this would be great news for people who could use a bit of financial help.

As an international undergraduate student I am finding that estimate/year I was given before applying for the degree is higher than what I am having to pay to complete the degree in 4 years as I have to complete 120 credits. Therefore, further increase in cost will seriously jeopardise my possibility of completing my degree.

I do not think that UBC should be increasing tuition at such a steep rate. In particular, I do not think that UBC should be increasing International Student tuition fees by 9.2%. International students already pay much more than Domestic students and it is shocking that this tuition is proposed to go up by such a huge amount (it is hard to understand why UBC needs to make such a large increase). It also causes me to think that the focus for UBC is not so much on students as these changes seem to be approached through a business lens and while I understand the importance of budgets, it is also important to recognize the real-life and human impacts of tuition costs and the stresses that this can place on students/people/society.

UBC does not seem to have demonstrated much deep thinking or creativity in presenting these challenges or funding the university in other ways and it does not seem like they are trying to make an effort to reduce the costs and stresses placed upon students. UBC also has emphasized diversity in the marketing I've encountered, but this does not seem to be supported by the actions of the university -- including increasing costs for all students (especially international ones).

I also think that future consultations with students should include more variety of platforms and more accessible surveys to make it easier for students to engage in these conversations and the decisions the university is making (e.g. multiple choice ones that are faster for students to engage with, open houses/town halls, etc.).

So for a first thing, it would be good to actually have proper graphics/figures. Of note: scales/axes? Also, not using areas (pie charts, rectangle areas) to represent things because humans are notoriously awful at that, and being more consistent with percentages vs absolute amounts (when you switch from saying percentages to plotting absolutes without a scale, it feels like we're being deliberately deceived).

I found the proposal overall lacking in specifics - it's a fine high level overview, but it would be good to be able to look more in depth at things. A focus on how the tuition increases might affect the student body (other than simply having higher tuition) would be helpful - especially if there were clear goals to be met.

For the increase in non-instructional fees, without knowing more about what they are currently going for, or what they will be used for, I have a hard time understanding why the increase is necessary (unless it's simply to keep up with increasing operating costs).

Other than that, I don't see anything terribly odd about raising tuition, just that it seems to be quite frequent (again, I haven't looked at the operating costs) - it might be interesting to see more ideas on what could be done more cheaply.

As a student in chemistry department, I felt the increase my tuition did not reflect at all on my education. Chemistry building is big yet old, and major chemistry lecture halls B250/B150 are dark, depressive, no natural light. In general the quality of classrooms need to be improved, and I remember during my second year's class, the projector stopped working. I have worked in a chemistry research lab in chemistry A-wing and the quality of lab did not match the quality of the research. Great researches deserve better labs, and even for the lab courses in chemistry, better facilities will be helpful (more and better glasswares/ fumehood etc).

I do not mind an increase in my tuition as long as it can be reflected in my own education. However I do not feel it, especially after I have seen the classrooms and labs in biochemistry building or sauder. Why do we still have a classroom like B150? I like the historical feeling but I think some spending on that will never be harmful.

I like the new swimming pool and all the cool things happening at UBC, but an increase of 2% in international tuition is not a small number. I want my tuition increase to be reflected in education material/environment etc before anything else. Thanks for reading.

Education should be free, I do not support the increase in the 2018 tuition.

Graduate Students that are not based on campus, like BC Children's Hospital or VGH still pay for a full tuition, even though we never take advantage of the infrastructure or other 'perks' of the Point Grey campus.

Also, the tuition and housing prices at UBC are already absurd. I am sure the budget (that is not small) can be more well spent. There is no transparency whatsoever to where the money that should be invested in the different departments (e.g. [...]) is actually going, and I really have the feel that there is a deviation of funds scheme happening.

Thanks for asking us though. Hope you take my comments in consideration.

First of all, I congratulate the university for providing state of the art facilities in the campus. Infrastructure is world class! Nevertheless, I would like to bring into your attention that with the increase of fees, there is no increase in graduate fellowship. It is becoming harder to survive in this expensive city. I receive a graduate fellowship of 21,000 per annum from my program. Moreover, being an international student, there are only limited scholarship opportunities. Also, average rent in Vancouver for a single room is \$750 which makes it very difficult to live in or near campus. As a result, I live in Burnaby and bus 1hr up and 1hr down everyday (I share a 2 bedroom place with 2 others). Another issue is, majority of the eating places on campus is super expensive and for sure I am not able to afford to have food on campus. I am depending upon high carb based meals (cheaper) day to day to survive. I wish the university consider the financial stress the students are in. Thank you for the understanding!

There's no point saying anything here since the university does whatever they want anyway. We didn't want the stupid tree shadow thing in the nest plaza but you're going ahead with it anyway. These feedback forms for annual tuition increase come out every year, no student ever wants tuition increase yet it gets raised every year. We have a very unique relationship with UBC - we are your customers but we also rely on you to empower and equip us to have a better future. It is all well and good to raise the tuition, but please consider raising the tuition consistently and its effect on your students entering a vicious cycle of having to pay back loans, that only get deeper and deeper.

It is all well and good to raise the tuition, but please be aware, that the individuals UBC serve, primarily students, are aware of the age old proverbial frog in hot water. If our voice truly matters, then please note that raising the tuition is well and good. But is it necessary to take place as regularly as it has?

I believe that the tuition increase for international students is insufficient. International tuition at UBC is dramatically cheaper than most institutions in the United States of similar extrapolation and significance. I urge the board of governors and pertinent authorities to increase international tuition by a minimum of 6%.

I believe that a further raise in our tuition fees is not a step in the right direction. Following last year's increase of tuition fees this will make UBC even more non-affordable for a lot of students. Please allocate more funds to education/research/faculties/scholarships and less funding for building repairs/renovations/etc (there's always construction at UBC and a lot of it is unnecessary)

As an international student from [...] paying full fees, it is a burden to me. Since I received my acceptance to UBC in May 2017 to the time I paid for my winter term fees, the Canadian dollar has increased 6% relative to the Malaysian ringgit. A further 2% increase would be an additional strain on my budget. Financial aid for international students are limited or almost non-existent, and some parents had to sell their houses to send their children here.

I understand that these services are important for UBC Faculty and students as the community continues to grow, but I think tuition is becoming extremely unaffordable. Some services we pay for aren't very necessary. For example, I think we could cut funds for the CitR radio, Bike Kitchen and Ubysey newspaper. I don't think anyone actually uses the radio, and I don't think the Bike Kitchen is really necessary for a university resource/service. Finally, I find those who read the Ubysey usually go online to read it. It would save a lot of ink, paper, and money to cut this service. I hope this feedback will be helpful for future tuition decisions.

As a graduate student I can compare myself to students in other institutions across Canada. Some graduate students do not have to pay tuition fees at all, or they are greatly reduced, which is not the case here. Other graduate students get supplies such as research laptops, second monitors or office supplies. I had to buy my own laptop because there was no UBC computer provided to me for my research; I had to buy a fairly powerful computer to have the power and space that I require. This is a problem because I also have to buy all the software that I need because university provided software cannot be installed on non-UBC computers. Otherwise I can do my research from a public computer at the library, which is definitely not ideal. Secondly, I have to complete four courses as part of my program. One is a seminar whereas the other three are directed readings. I understand that I have to do a certain amount of independent research, but there are no graduate level courses offered in my department, so what are my tuition fees used for? I decided to attend a conference with workshops, plenary sessions and fieldtrips next semester to compensate for the lack of education that I receive here, but I have to pay for everything from my own pocket. Thirdly, as part of my tuition fees I am paying \$63.00 per semester for a bus pass that I haven't used. Finally, I do a lot of outdoor activities, but it can be difficult sometimes in between seasons and when things get very busy at the university. I considered going to the gym here, but I just found out that it is not even free for students, even though I have to pay athletics and recreation fees every semester. At the moment I am not getting very much value for the large amount of tuition fees that I already pay, so UBC should consider not increasing the fees, but rather increasing the quality and value of education that it is providing to students.

Our tuition should be spent mainly in a way that benefits the students of UBC educationally and emotionally, not to improve the university's aesthetics by placing otherwise defunct decorations or renovating structures for reasons other than safety or student comfort. If the installation or change is absolutely necessary, the students should decide what is to be done (e.g. designs of a mural). More of our tuition should be spent on establishing more mental health support communities or facilities, as stress and depression rates are skyrocketing within the university.

I do not agree with the proposed tuition increases. Perhaps if UBC's finances were handled better, tuition increases would not be needed. It is already difficult for many students to pay tuition if they are both in school and working part time.

I sincerely request the Board of Governors to not increase the tuition fees for continuing international students as it would impose a huge burden on me. I hope you will consider my request whilst making the decision as this will benefit the university in the long run as its popularity among international students will increase.

All increases are between 2% to 5% which is too high. In my opinion, expenses are very high for an international student anyway given the living costs including housing in Vancouver. I do not know if the funding given to grad students increase proportionally to the increase in tuition fees etc. However, an increase that may seem fairly small numerically may cause a student to struggle financially.

The tuition for international students is too high to afford. It is unfair to increase the tuition.

The [...] PharmD program had a massive tuition hike approx 2 years ago, another hike based on a percentage of the already increased tuition should be unnecessary.

Especially for an undergraduate program I had to think twice about paying the current tuition (~\$17,000 per year) to attend, If tuition were increased I would seriously consider not applying if I were a new student.

It's unfair for continuous international students. Every year UBC increase too much in the tuition even for the continuous students. Tuition for international students is already too high, don't increase that much while the teaching quality and students' opportunities remain the same. That's not reasonable!

Please consider international students who are also struggling to pay tuition. International students have to right to receive the same privileges as domestic students. We are NOT money-making revenues. With increased tuition, please provide more financial aid to international students OR please do not raise.

Tuition is already a big (if not the biggest) part of student's expenses while attending UBC. An increase of 2% will only worsen the finances of student on top of beating inflation and skyrocketing housing prices. For these reasons, we ask that all tuition hikes should be kept to a minimum and only used as a last resort

The UBC tuition has doubled in a decade - from 1.6 billion to 2.3 billion. Students are not getting what we're really paying for. From all this, only 36 million goes back to us, the supporters of this business, when over 50% of this goes to you (staff). We have higher tuition than SFU and other local schools, which is very saddening. I don't think that raising tuition fees is an innovative move for UBC. Why can't the money come from other sources - somewhere other than students? Like what my geography professor says, "we're only worsening the gap between the rich and the poor". Fee for international students is already high enough compared to local students. The suggested proposal would increase the difference between them. Being an international student i would start looking for different options, as would others, because this fee increase would make this college inaffordable.

Please take this into consideration

Being an International student at UBC puts a lot of financial stress on graduate students due to very limited scholarship opportunities. Most of the prestigious competitions and/or loans options are only open to Canadian nationals or permanent residents. Finding a residence in Vancouver is not even close to being affordable. This is already putting a lot of financial stress on students. Increasing tuition fees will increase the financial burden on students and this will surely impact their academic performance.

D: University is becoming something only the rich will be able to afford. As tuition costs continue to increase, some students will be pushed out just because of the costs. You may say that there are bursaries and financial aid, but with increasing costs and the same level financial aid offered, potential/current students are going to get pushed out because they just will not be able to compete. Such is the way of things, I just think it is unfortunate. I think it also may start to limit the diversity at the university... it will be like the movies where there are a class of rich kids and one small-town kid who got there because they just managed to scrape enough together... (plot line diverges) until they must leave school because it is just too dang expensive. There will be a limit in thinking styles if everyone comes from a rich home.

I do not agree with the 2% tuition increase. After reading the budgets the university still came out with 5m last year. I believe with the amount of students that ubc okanagan hosts the campus could get away with a 0.5-1% increase in tuition.

Personally, I believe a raise in tuition will cause more problems than not. Many of us, including myself take student loans that we will need to pay back after graduation. This increase may force students to take out larger amounts of loans or for those without previous loans to begin and apply. For those students who are relying heavily on student loans aren't getting an increasing amount as the cap remains the same. If the cap is reached too quickly and students are still unable to complete a payment for their tuition, it forces them into situations where they depend on bursaries, scholarships or may be forced into a program with a lower cost. This is problematic because this problem might occur during our third or fourth year of study, which by then a discontinuation of study due to economic conditions would have created a waste of years worth of time and money. UBC is currently in a great state without any major problems. It is unnecessary to make student lives harder to make small developments that may be overlooked.
