EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

UBC maintains one of the lowest domestic tuition rates amongst BC peers, while our international tuition rates remain commensurate with UBC's Times Higher Education World ranking position within its peer group. Across peers, UBC is the second largest provider of student financial aid as a percentage of tuition revenue.

Student financial aid is considerable and growing rapidly, ensuring access by providing support for an increasing number of students each year. At the same time, debt levels at graduation have remained relatively constant.

Federal and provincial CPI increased by 8.1% in 2022 and is estimated to increase by 3.4% in 2023. The Higher Education Price Index (HEPI), a measure of inflation across US colleges and universities, is predicting a 4.5% increase for this year.

Similar to last year, UBC opted for sub-inflationary increases with the intention of smoothing out the unprecedented spike in inflation to protect our incoming students. The Administration recently concluded student consultations on a 5% tuition increase for all new international students, a 3% increase for continuing international students, and a 2% tuition increase for all new and continuing domestic students. This 2% increase also applies to all mandatory fees.

3,973 respondents completed this year's student tuition consultation survey, a decrease of 895 from the 2023/24 consultation.

Tuition Engagement

Under the guidelines of Policy LR4, the Vancouver and Okanagan Provosts and Vice-Presidents, Academic, Vice-President Students, and Deputy Vice-Chancellor conducted a student consultation regarding the proposed general tuition and fee increases for 2024/2025.

The consultation was conducted over the period of October 5, 2023 and November 2, 2023. Students were consulted on the proposed increases of:

- A 2% increase in tuition for all domestic continuing undergraduate and graduate students
- A 2% increase in tuition for international graduate students in research and standard programs
- A 3% increase in tuition for continuing international undergraduate students and graduate students in programs with specialized rates;
- A 5% increase in tuition for new incoming international undergraduate students and graduate students in programs with specialized rates;
- A 2% increase applied to mandatory fees

The student consultation process included the following components:

- The Tuition Engagement Approach focused on two key areas to continue to support an enhanced tuition engagement:
 - Enhanced and focused engagement with student leaders
 - A year-round tuition engagement website

- The administration continues to work with Student Leadership (AMS/GSS/SUO) to expand the number of budget information sessions. The purpose of the expansion is:
 - To increase our collective understanding of the scope of the financial issues considered when constructing the university budget
 - To comply with the tuition policy
 - To solicit greater input from elected student leaders about student financial priorities
 - To understand AMS/GSS/SUO priorities and alignment with university priorities and budget
- This approach follows the guidelines of Policy LR4 and supports an engaged and informed approach specifically supporting:
 - Our elected student leaders to have an informed understanding of the University’s budget and budget process
 - Better understanding student needs, concerns with regards to proposed tuition increases o In-depth understanding of student priorities linked to budgetary needs
- The Administration worked with the leadership of the Alma Mater Society (AMS), Graduate Student Society (GSS) on UBC’s Vancouver campus, and the Students’ Union (SUO) on UBC’s Okanagan campus to provide visibility and opportunity to provide feedback, into the draft 2024-2025 tuition engagement survey.
- There was significant work done two years ago to improve and optimize the consultation process and experience for students, this year we employed a similar approach in implementing the consultation website and communications plan.
- PAIR continues to provide support with data collection and analysis expertise.

A report with the analysis from both quantitative and qualitative feedback opportunities is attached. Individual student comments are also attached verbatim.

Peer Institution Insights – Tuition and Student Financial Aid

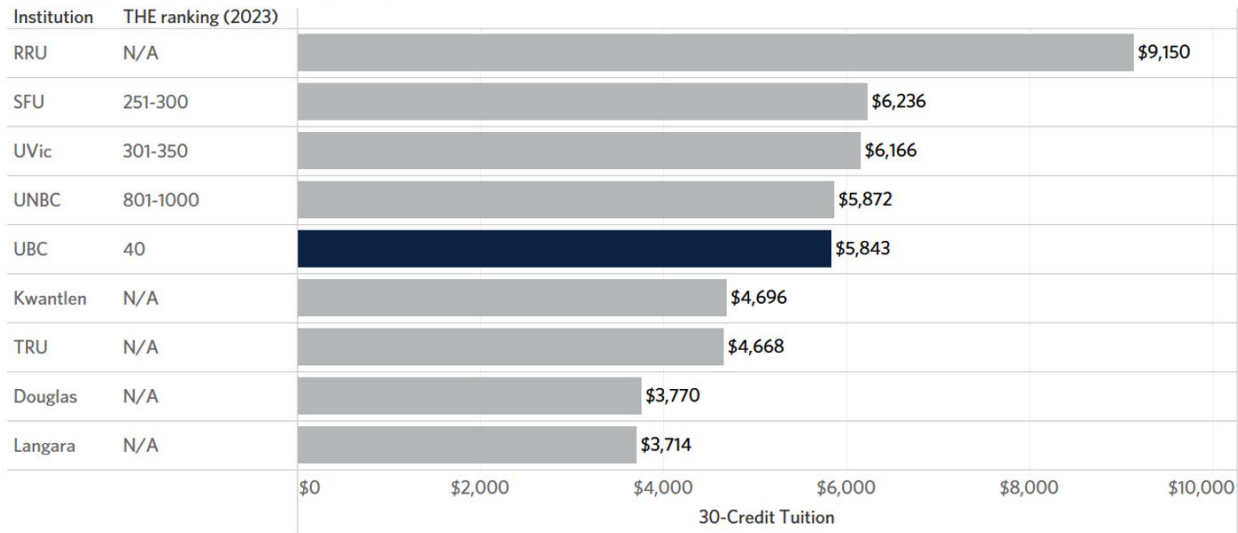
Tuition

UBC regularly conducts a tuition benchmarking exercise using a Board of Governors approved methodology. For the past few years, UBC has also benchmarked the amount of student financial aid as a percentage of tuition revenue.

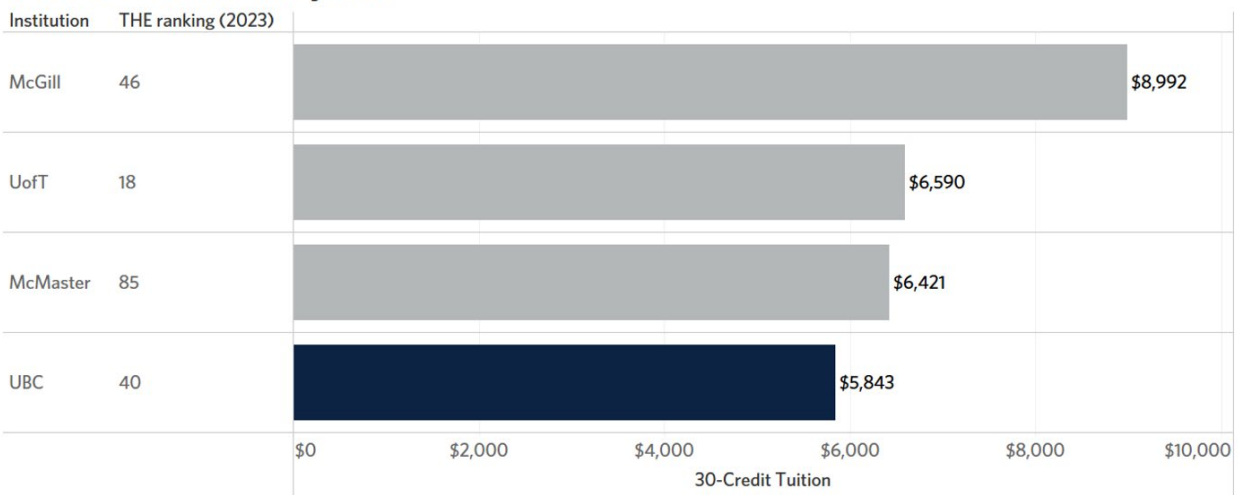
The benchmarked peer institutions include several members of the U15 Group of Canadian Research Universities (University of Toronto, McGill University, McMaster University), members of the Research Universities’ Council of British Columbia, Kwantlen Polytechnic University, Douglas College and Langara College.

With the exception of Thompson Rivers University, UBC’s domestic tuition is the lowest of the research institutions in the peer group.

Annual domestic tuition at select BC institutions: BA & BSc Programs (2023/24 academic year)



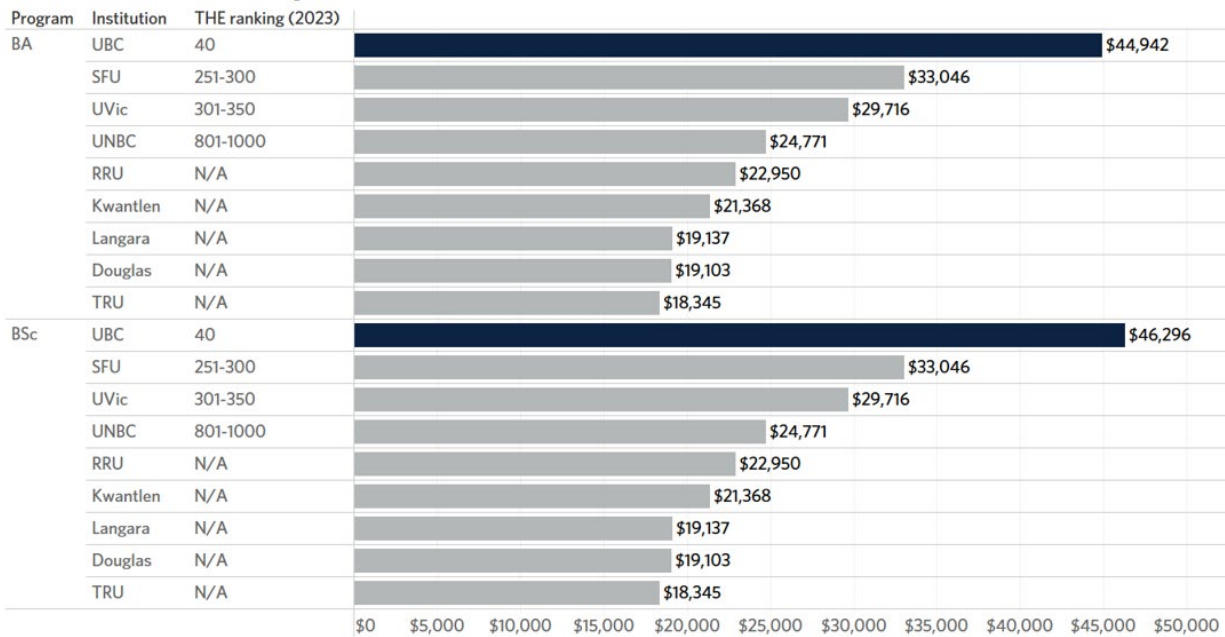
Annual domestic tuition at select U15 research universities: BA & BSc Programs (2023/24 academic year)



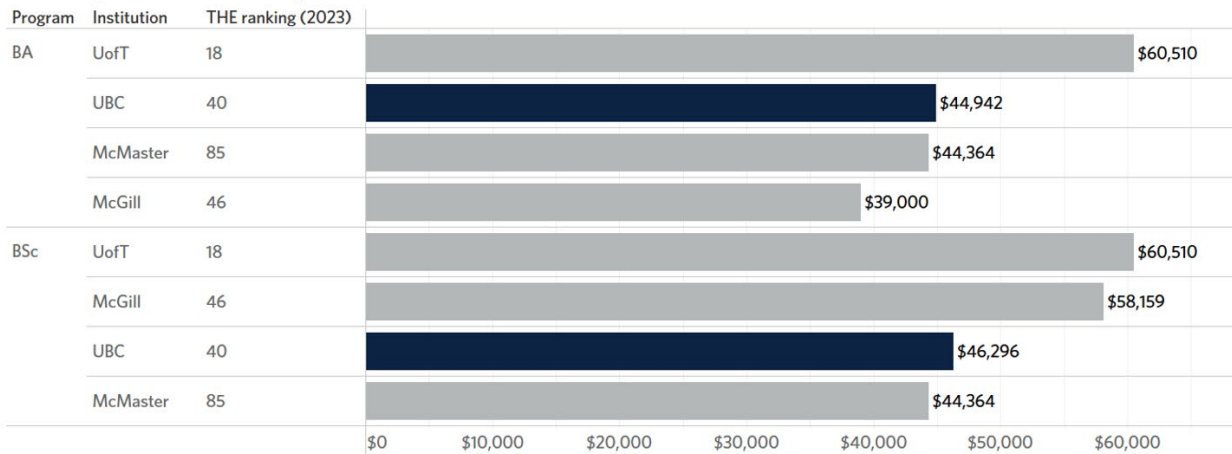
Notes to Above Table: Both McGill and McMaster assess a lower rate of tuition for in-province students (out-of-province rates reported above). In 2021/22, the Ontario government introduced a new policy allowing for differentiated fees for out-of-province domestic students. UofT established differentiated fees for out-of-province students in 2022/23, with a 3% increase for these students, while in-province student fees remained frozen under the framework. In 2023/24, fees for out-of-province students increased by 5%.

UBC’s international tuition is lower than that of the University of Toronto and McGill University (BSc). It is, however, the highest of its BC peers, which is commensurate with UBC’s Times Higher Education position in world rankings within this peer group. All else being equal, an increase of 9.6% *annually* over a span of five years would be required for UBC’s international tuition to be equal to that of University of Toronto.

While UBC tuition setting is earlier than most, some institutions from the U-15 and the Research Universities’ Council of British Columbia have indicated their direction with respect to **2024-25** tuition rate increases.

British Columbia Universities (2024-25): SFU and UNBC have indicated international tuition increases at roughly 4%, while UVIC and TRU are considering ranges between 5% to 6.75%.

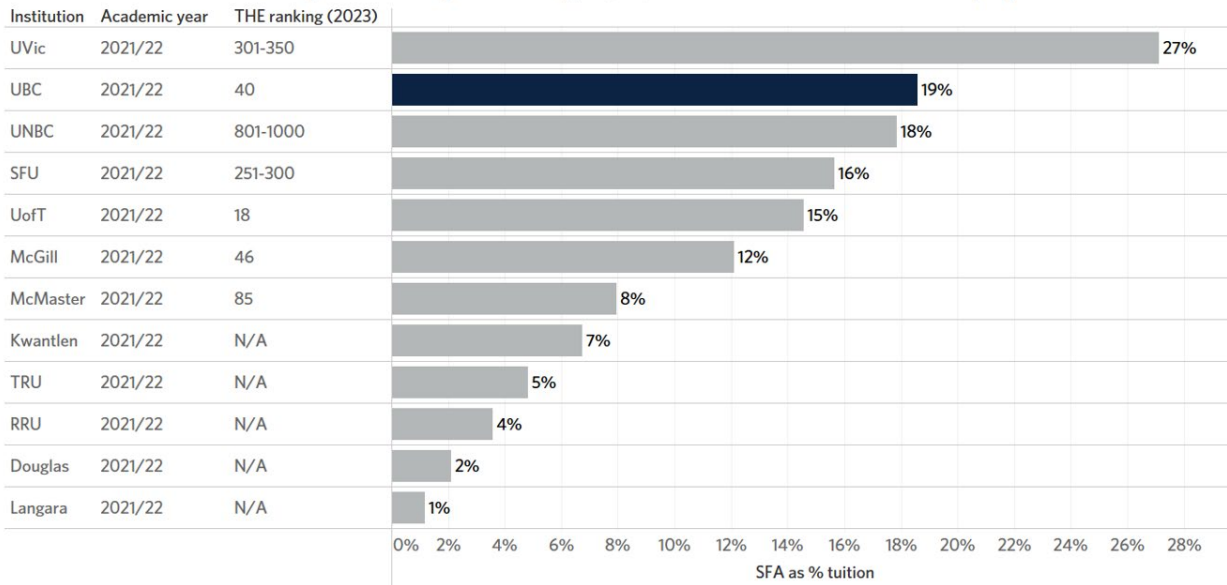
Ontario Universities (2024-25): In 2021/22, the Ontario government introduced a new policy allowing for differentiated fees for out-of-province domestic students. Queen’s and U of Waterloo are indicating a 5% increase for domestic out-of-province students, and for international tuition increases up to 5% for Queen’s and 5% to 10% (as high as 15% for professional graduate programs) for U of Waterloo. While U of Ottawa and Western have not set rates for 2024-25, the current year international tuition rate increases ranged from 8% to 12% (Western raised international tuition for continuing students by 4%).

Quebec Universities: The Quebec government recently announced the intention to increase 2024/25 tuition for out-of-province undergraduate domestic students by roughly two-fold (from \$9k to \$17k).

Student Financial Aid

Of the peer group, UBC is the second largest provider of student financial aid as a percentage of tuition revenue, after the University of Victoria.

Student financial aid spend as a percentage (%) of total tuition revenue, by institution

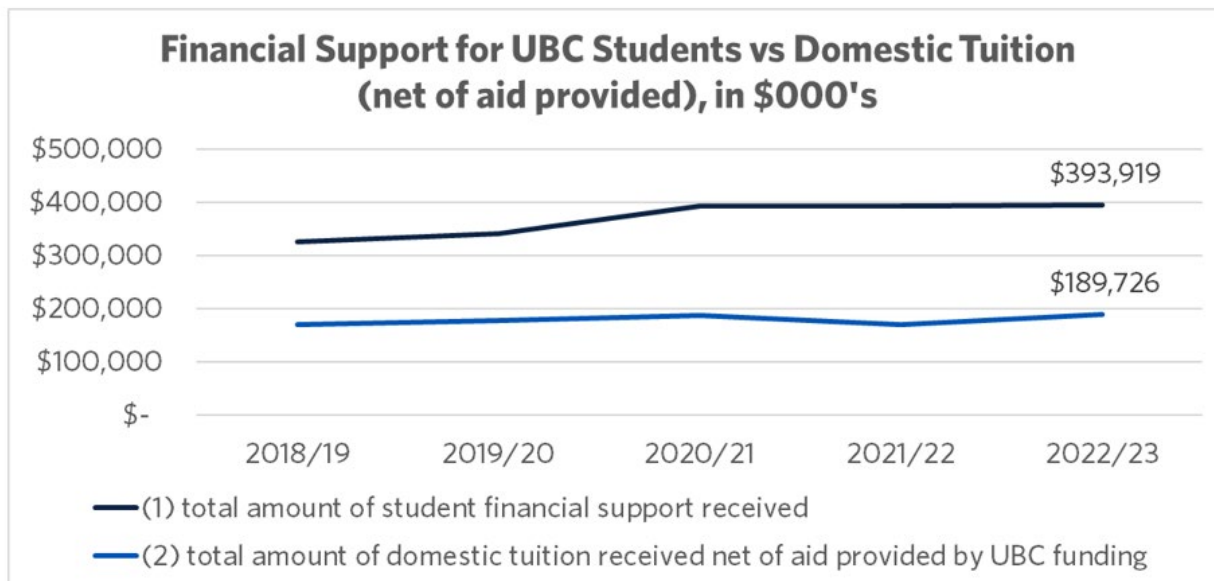


Note to Above Table: Student financial aid data is based on internally managed funds and excludes government funded programs.

Financial Support for UBC Students

In 2022-23, \$393.9M in total student financial support was provided to UBC full-time students, a \$1.1M or 0.3% increase from the previous year. Of this amount, \$251.1M is non-repayable and \$142.8M is in the form of Canada and US repayable loans.

The total amount of domestic tuition fees net of financial aid provided to students has been relatively steady since 2018, while student financial support in comparison continues to grow year over year.



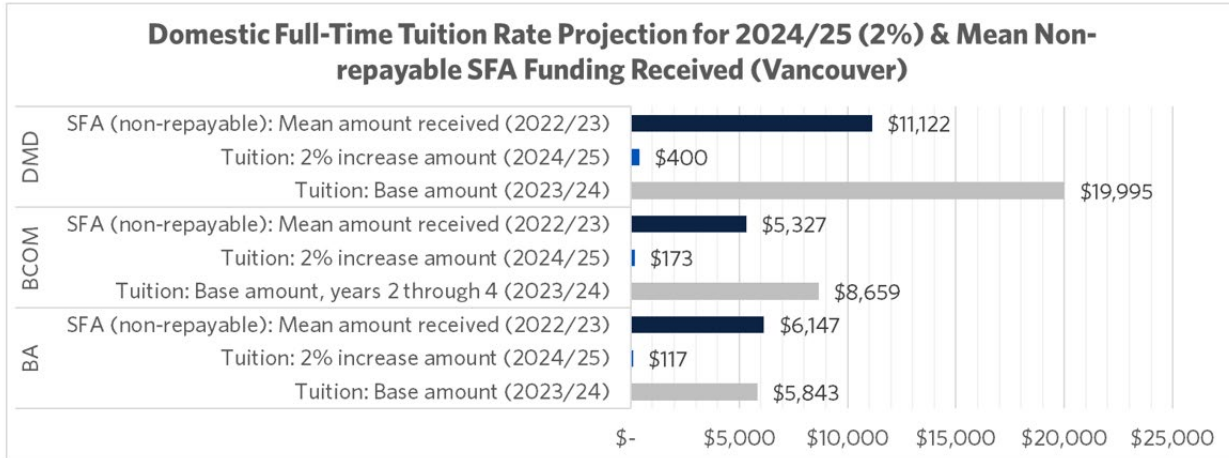
Notes to Above Table: UBC Funding refers to funding from the UBC Operating Fund and includes non-repayable needs-based, merit-based and hybrid awards. Domestic tuition includes tuition revenue from undergraduate and graduate tuition and all fees (with the exception of application fees), for both Vancouver and Okanagan programs.

Domestic Student Tuition Relative to Student Financial Support

In 2022-23, \$400M was collected in domestic student tuition and fees. In the same year \$394M in total student financial support was provided to full-time students.

46% of full-time domestic students received some form of financial assistance in 2022-23 (non-repayable & repayable).

On an individual basis, for those students receiving financial aid, a 2% annual increase will be funded by a corresponding increase in financial support (i.e., it is included in the assessment of expenses).

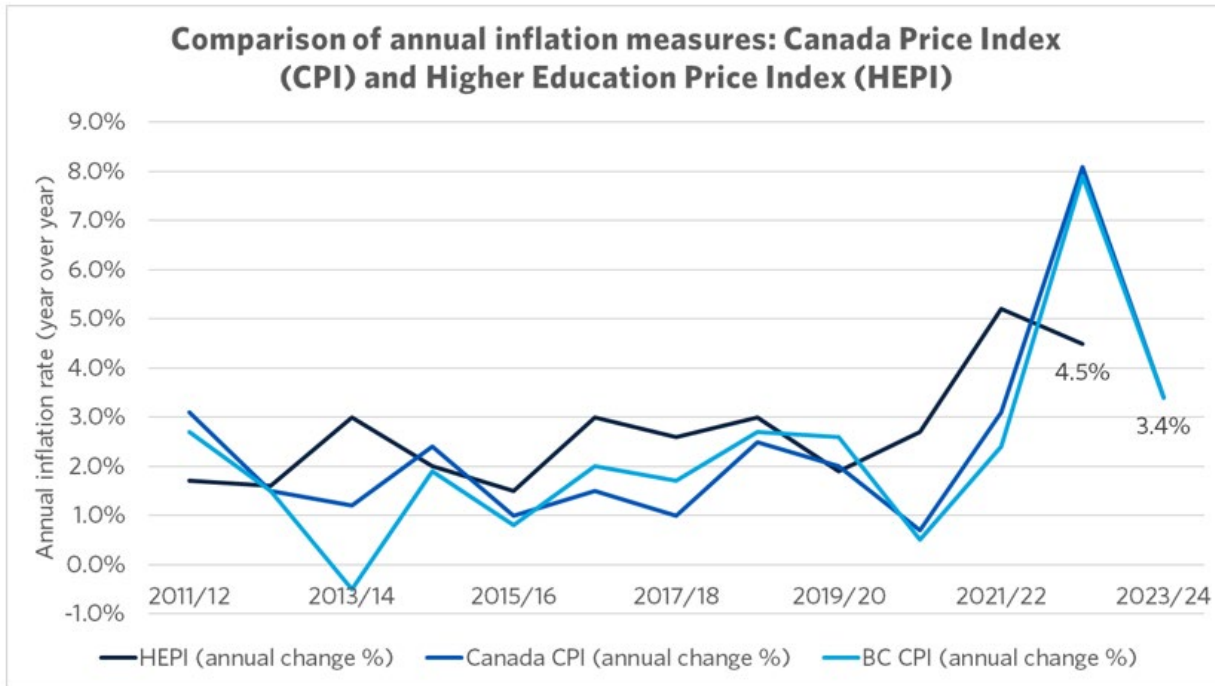


Note to Above Table: SFA mean amount received is the total of non-repayable needs-based, merit & hybrid awards received by domestic students in the program, averaged over those that received some form of SFA in 2022W. The SFA includes amounts sourced from operating funds and donations.

National and Provincial Inflation Measures

Canada's CPI in 2023 was 3.4% higher than in 2022 (BC's CPI was also 3.4%). These rates represent a modest deceleration of inflation, following the most significant year-over-year rate increases in nearly 40 years (2022 Canada CPI: 8.1%).

The latest HEPI is forecasted at 4.5% for 2023, a slight decrease over the previous year. This decrease is largely driven by a deceleration of inflation pertaining to supplies and materials.



Notes to Above Table: year-over-year inflation compares CPI rates as of June, with May as preliminary data for 2023 (% change, same month of previous year). Latest data for CPI are valid as of May 2023. Higher Education Price Index (HEPI) indicates inflation for U.S. colleges and universities.

UBC Budget Context

UBC reported a consolidated operating surplus of approximately \$83M for FY22/23 mainly driven by surpluses in the non-operating funds that are designated for specific purposes including endowment, capital and research.

Roughly one-third of the operating budget is funded by the Provincial grant, with the corresponding requirement to teach at least the minimum complement of domestic students at a tuition rate that is limited to a 2% annual increase to maximize access (UBC’s tuition rate is lower than most research peers, and far below the cost to educate students at a globally-ranked research intensive University).

In fiscal years 2020/21, 2021/22, and 2022/23 the operating funding for UBCV Administrative Units was reduced on a non-recurring basis by 1%/2%/2% respectively to manage the financial impact of COVID-19. 2023/24 (1%) is the last year of these cuts.

Costs continue to increase at a rate that exceeds our average tuition increases, and faculties and administrative portfolios alike are trending towards structural deficit positions.

For 2024-25, self-funded cost pressures are expected to be in the range of \$70M.

- Self-funded wages per labor agreements is in the range of 2 to 3.5%, net of GWI/COLA funding
- Inflation on goods and services are projected to be 4-8% (excluding interest, amortization, internal sales, capital expenses, interfund transfers). Significant future escalations expected for utilities (7%/annum), major capital project costs in line with industry standards, and software licenses & new digital learning tools (recently 20%-30%/annum).
- Strategic investments funded through the 2023-24 budget process which are prioritized for recurring funding going forward will continue. (e.g., ISC, PrISM, Operational Excellence, Undergraduate Admissions, IT).

The incremental tuition from the proposed tuition increases of roughly \$27M will help to partially offset these cost pressures, but will not be sufficient to fill the shortfall. To help offset cost pressures, the university continues to investigate and implement cost savings and efficiency improvement initiatives. The faculties and admin units will continue to look at staffing levels, service delivery optimization in administrative areas, implementing robotic processing, and reaping the benefits from projects funded from the FY23 Structural Deficit Relief Fund.

Similar to last year, this year’s tuition proposal is sub-inflationary and efforts will continue to be focused on efficiency initiatives in order to reduce costs.

2024-25 Tuition Proposal

The Administration concluded student consultations on a 5% tuition increase for all new international undergraduate students and international graduate students in programs with specialized rates, a 3% tuition increase for similar international continuing students, and a 2% increase for all new and continuing domestic students and international graduate students in research and standard programs. This 2% increase also applies to all mandatory fees. The estimated incremental tuition revenue of \$27M and its distribution is included in the table below.

Notes to the Above Table: Assuming zero FTE growth, incremental increases on the above in future years are minimal and would only be generated through the annual compounding effect of the same year-over-year % rate. Above figures are an estimate at the time of preparation and are intended to be directional in nature. Incremental revenue includes tuition revenue from Vancouver and Okanagan as well as fee revenue collected at the Faculty level. Allocation of revenue is based on current Tuition Allocation rules for each campus. Figures are best estimates and subject to change.

Case for a 5%, 3% and 2% Increase for 2024-25

For domestic undergraduate students, a 2% increase results in an annual tuition increase ranging from roughly **\$117 to \$400** for a full-time year of studies, with significant financial support available to ensure each student can maintain a moderate standard of living.

For international undergraduate students, a 5% increase for new and a 3% increase for continuing students results in an annual tuition increase ranging from roughly **\$1.3K to \$4.1K** for a full-time year of studies.

By maintaining the 2% increase for domestic tuition, and a modest increase for international tuition, our base tuition rate upon which future increases will apply will enable the university to address student affordability while providing funding to cover some inflationary pressures on our fixed costs and allow us to continue to invest in the core academic mission of the university.

Should tuition increase by 5% for new international students, 3% for continuing international students, and by 2% for all others in 2024-25, we will be able to continue to support, along with already planned central administration budget cuts, in the following areas in future years:

- Provide funding to implement key university STRATEGIC priorities, including supporting the recommendations from the Student Affordability Task Force and the President’s Task Force on Anti-Racism and Inclusive Excellence Report, implementation of the Indigenous Strategic Plan and support for Indigenous reconciliation, the UBC Climate Action Plan and UBC's response to the Climate Emergency, and faculty renewal through the PAEI;
- Provide funding to support an outstanding student experience, inclusive of funding for first-year experience, food security, and critical student mental health and wellbeing
- Support the recruitment of new to UBC students;
- Support international students with visa, study permit, and work permit applications, health insurance, and transitioning to life in Canada;
- Partially offset the impact of inflation on utilities, infrastructure, consumables and self-funded salary progression;
- Support the collections of the University Library;
- Fund the implementation of IRP Student.

Recommendation

In summary, Administration recommends approval a **5%** tuition increase for all new international undergraduate students and international graduate students in programs with specialized rates, a **3%** tuition increase for similar international continuing students, and a **2%** increase for all new and continuing domestic students and international graduate students in research and standard programs. This **2%** increase also applies to all mandatory fees.

RE: **2024-25 Cost Recovery Fee Items – Schedule C**

Your approval of the attached Schedule C, Cost Recovery Fee items, is requested for the 2024/25 academic year. These fees apply to both the Vancouver and Okanagan campuses. This Schedule was revised in November 2003 to set these items at a cost recovery level and have had increases applied annually ever since. They are presented to the Board for information and not for approval because they are not mandatory fees.

All items have been reviewed, and there is one proposed increase over 2%, and eleven fee increases up to 2%, as follows:

PROPOSED INCREASE FOR UBC CARD REPLACEMENTS IN VANCOUVER

A 67% increase to \$25.00 plus applicable taxes is proposed for UBC Card replacements on the Vancouver campus.

UBC Card replacements were listed at \$25.00 prior to 2020/21, at which time the cost was dropped to \$15.00. It has been determined that this cost in Vancouver is unsustainable. The cost per card breakdown at UBC Point Grey is included in Appendix A.

Carleton, Centennial, McMaster, Southern Alberta Institute of Technology, University of Montreal, University of Ottawa, University of Waterloo and York University all charge up to \$30 for replacement cards. Of comparable Canadian universities, UBC has the lowest replacement costs, including University of Toronto and University of Calgary who charge \$20 for replacement cards. Toronto Metropolitan University had the highest charge of \$50, which likely both covers costs and acts as an incentive for students to take care of the card.

The cost for UBC card replacements in Okanagan will remain at \$15.00 plus applicable taxes due to differences in chip technology embedded in the cards. The Vancouver campus requires a smart card with an embedded iClass chip to enable building access.

PROPOSED INCREASES UP TO 2%

A 2% inflationary increase is proposed for the following administrative services (non-mandatory) to reflect an increase in the cost of delivering services:

- Admissions Appeal Processing Fee
- Deferred Examination
- Degree Conversion
- Diploma Certification
- Duplicate Income Tax Receipt – T2202A
- Faxes
- Parchment Replacement
- Review of Assigned Standing (per course)
- Supplemental Examination
- Transcript
- Document Distribution

Please refer to Appendix B for a full list of proposed fees.

Because these are non-mandatory cost recovery items, an extensive consultation was not conducted. The UBC Alma Mater Society (AMS), Graduate Student Society (GSS), and UBC Students' Union Okanagan (UBCSUO) were informed of these recommended changes on October 6, 2023 and were given an opportunity to provide feedback. The increases, if approved, will be made effective May 1, 2024. Schedule C will be sent to the Board of Governors as an information item.

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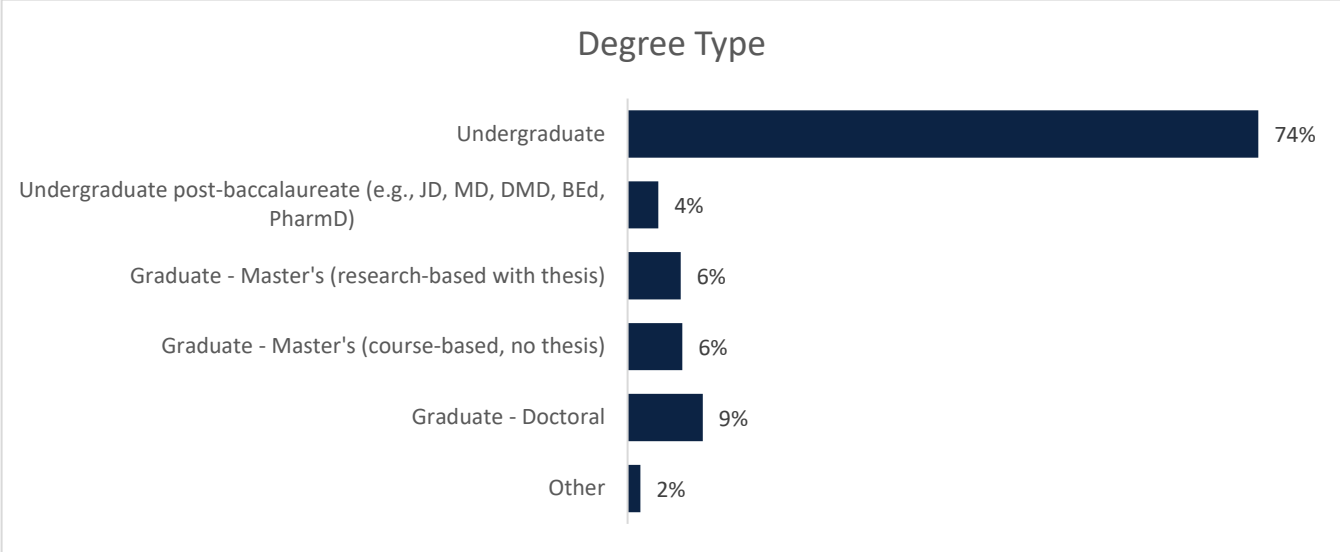
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In total, 3,973 student submissions were received regarding the tuition proposal. Of these submissions 3,901 were complete responses and 72 were partial responses. The engagement survey consisted of seven multiple-choice questions (4 main questions and 3 follow-up questions) followed by an open-ended question/comment box. A summary of results is provided below.

The tuition engagement survey was hosted online through the UBC Survey Tool (Qualtrics) and a link was included on the tuition engagement website (https://ubc.ca1.qualtrics.com/jfe/form/SV_eS9z0IRbKWh1Fga). The average visitor spent approximately one minute on the tuition engagement page. Ninety-seven percent of website visitors arrived through the direct email campaign, one percent arrived through a direct link, and two percent arrived through other sources, such as social media and organic searches.¹

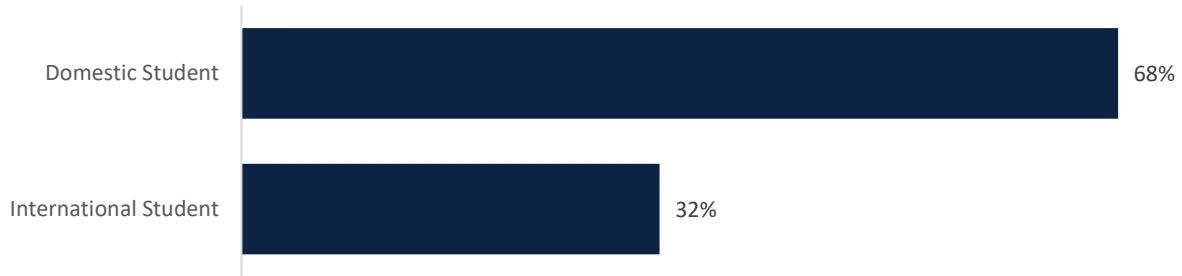

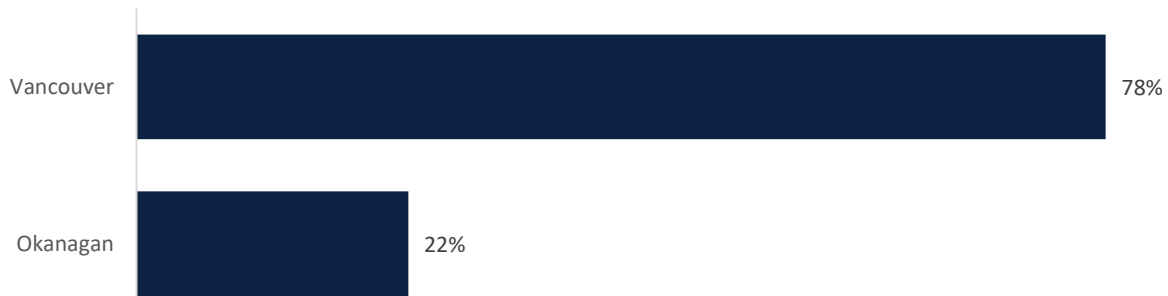

Enrolment Type



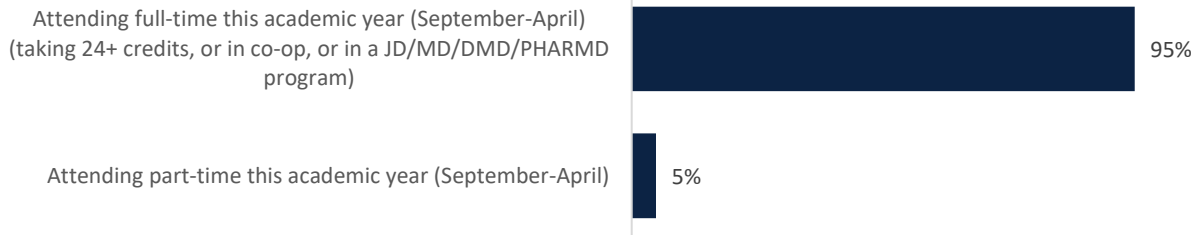

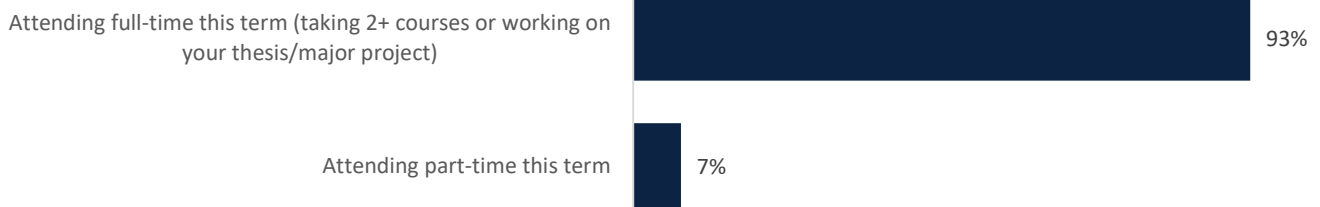

Enrolment Status - Undergraduate Students



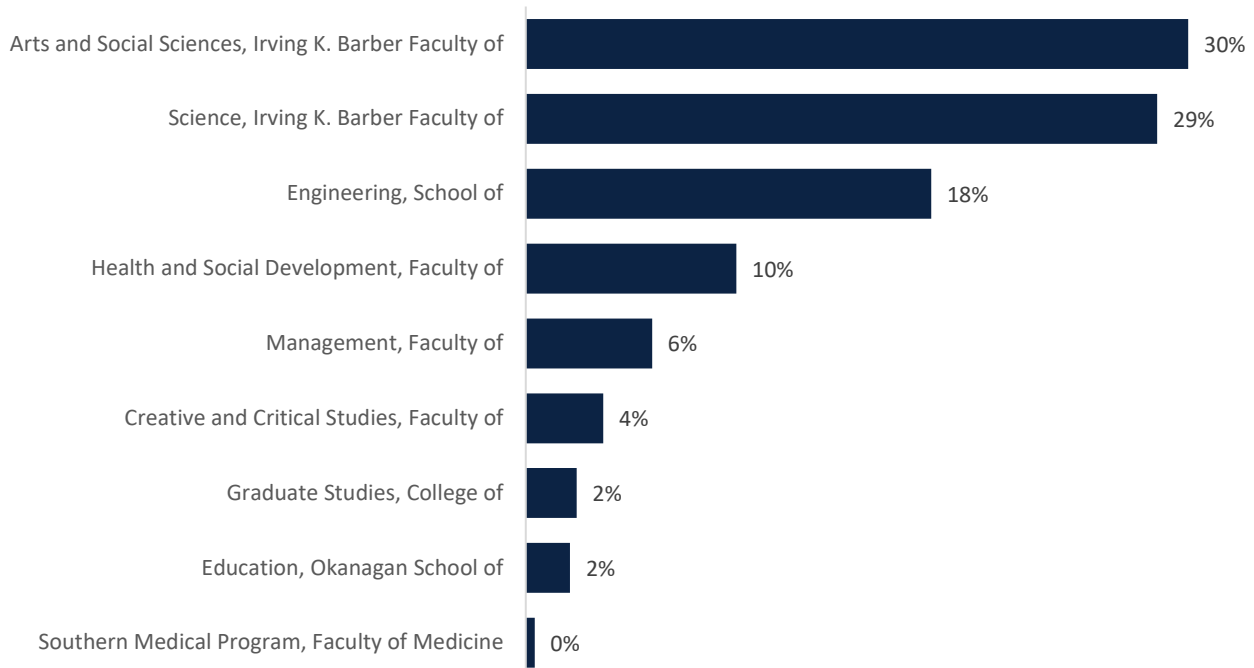

Enrolment Status - Graduate Students



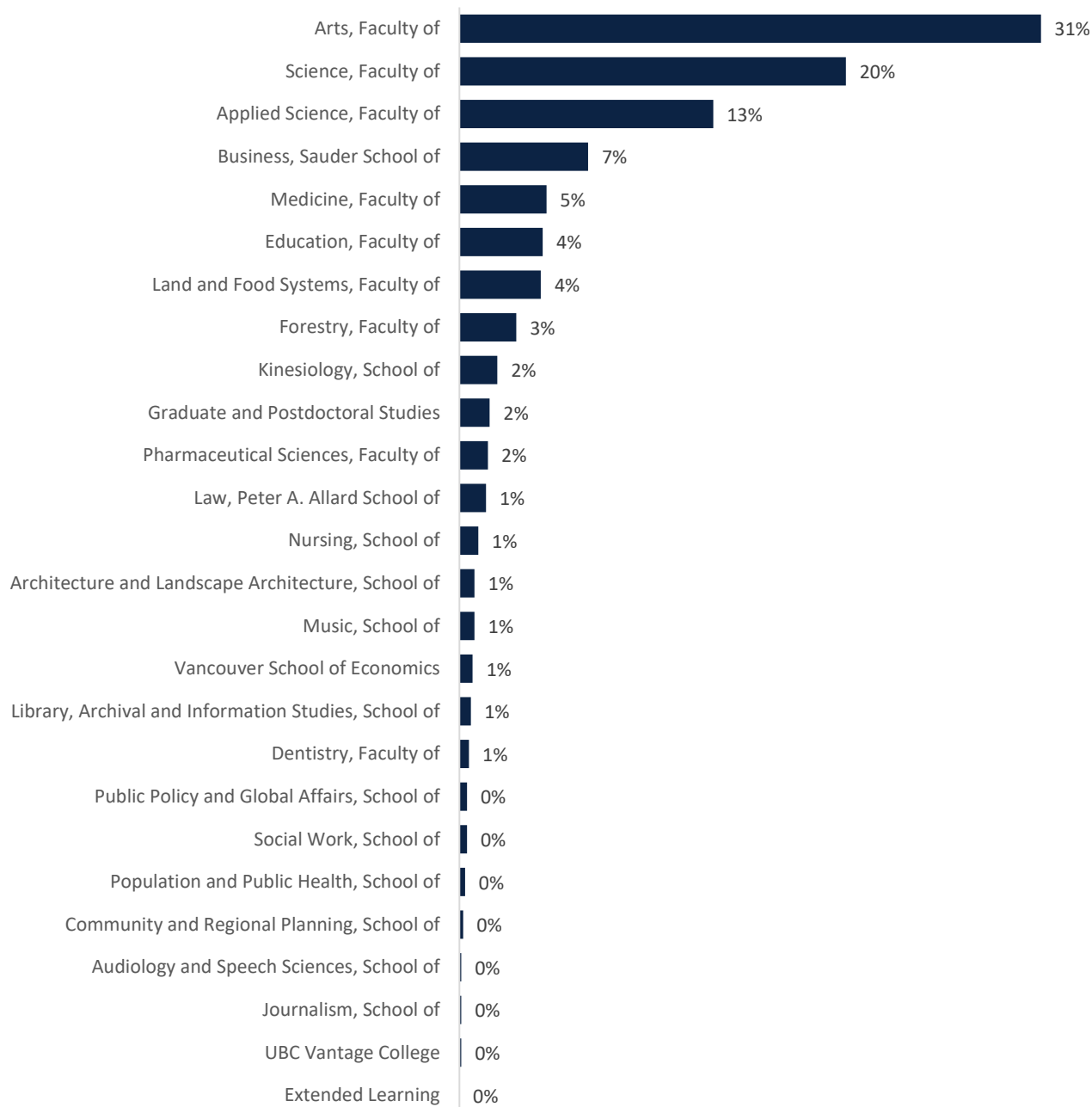

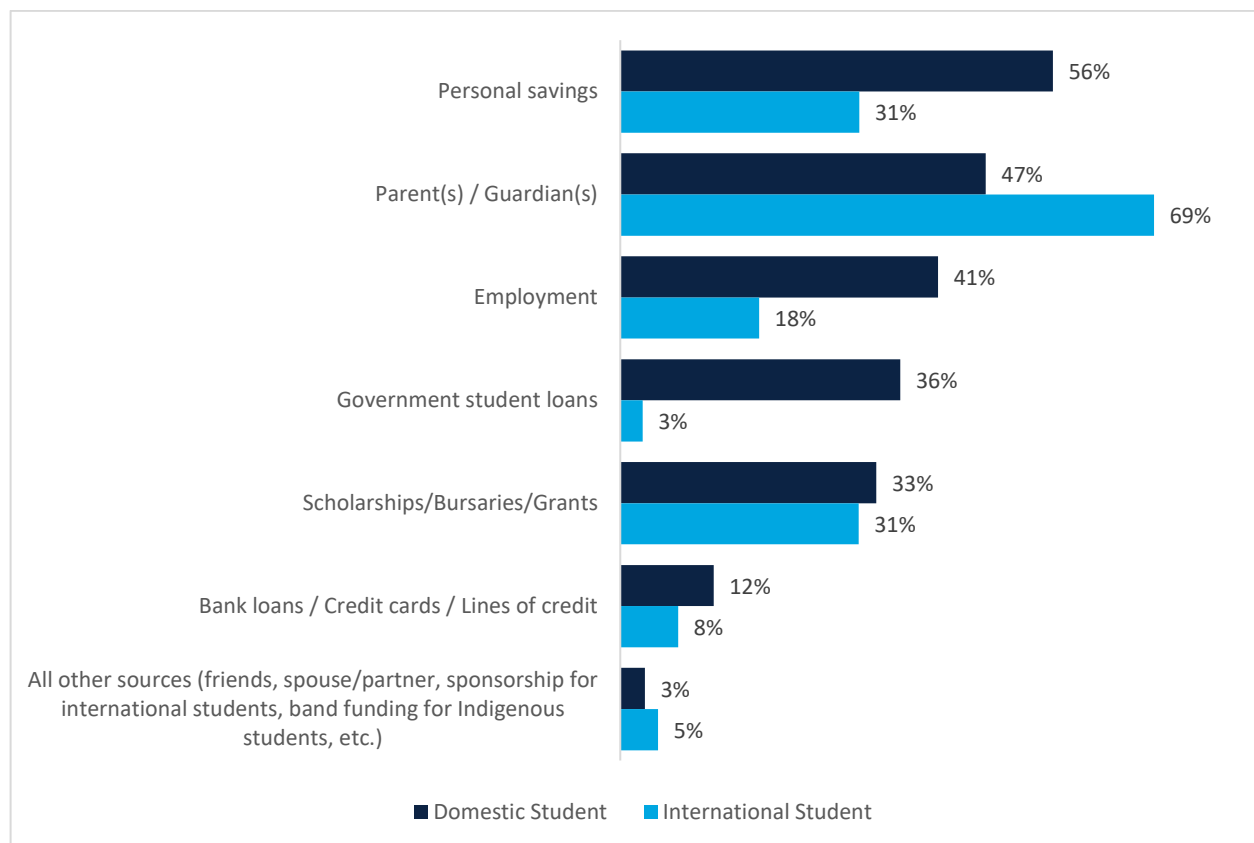

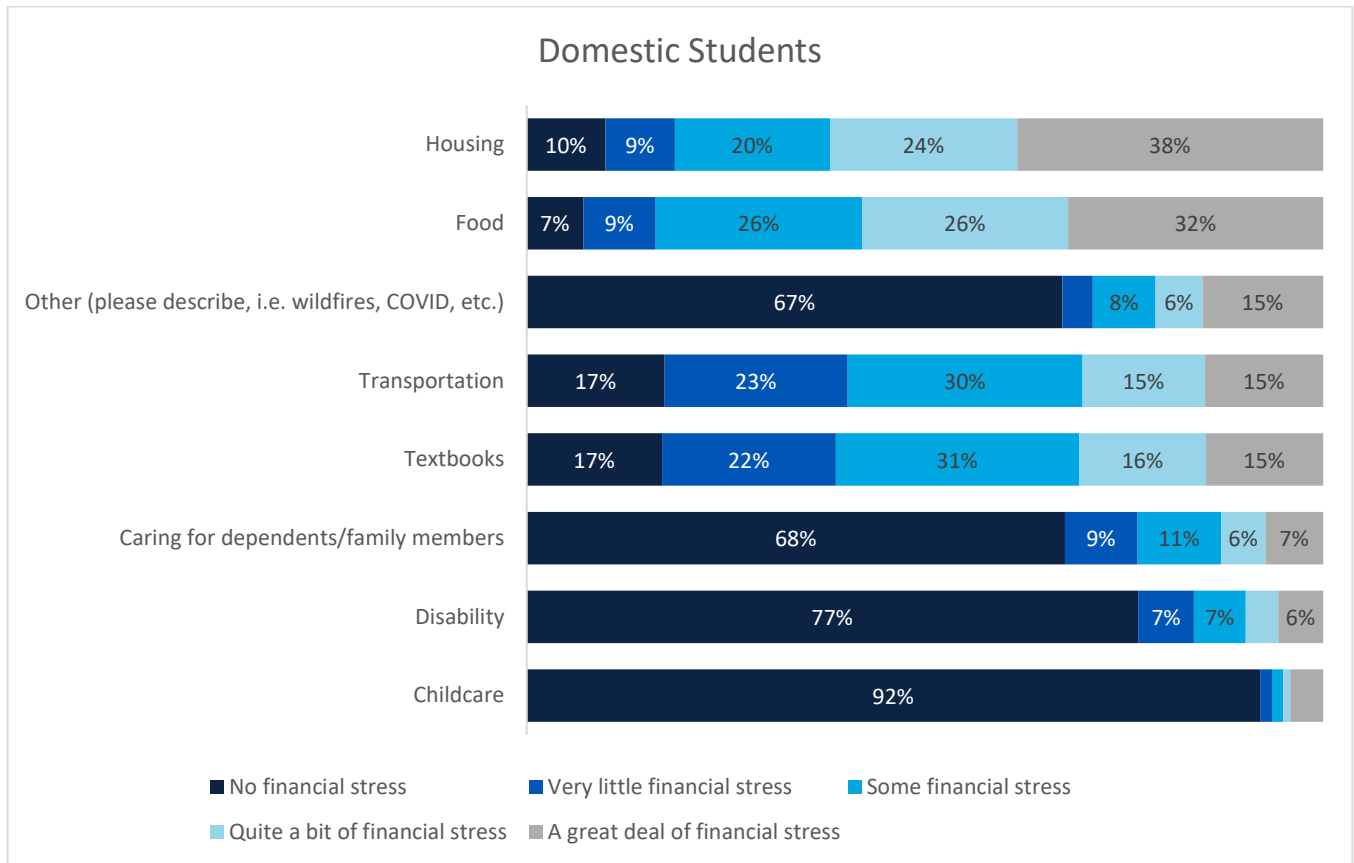
Q.1 What is/are your primary funding sources for tuition and living costs?

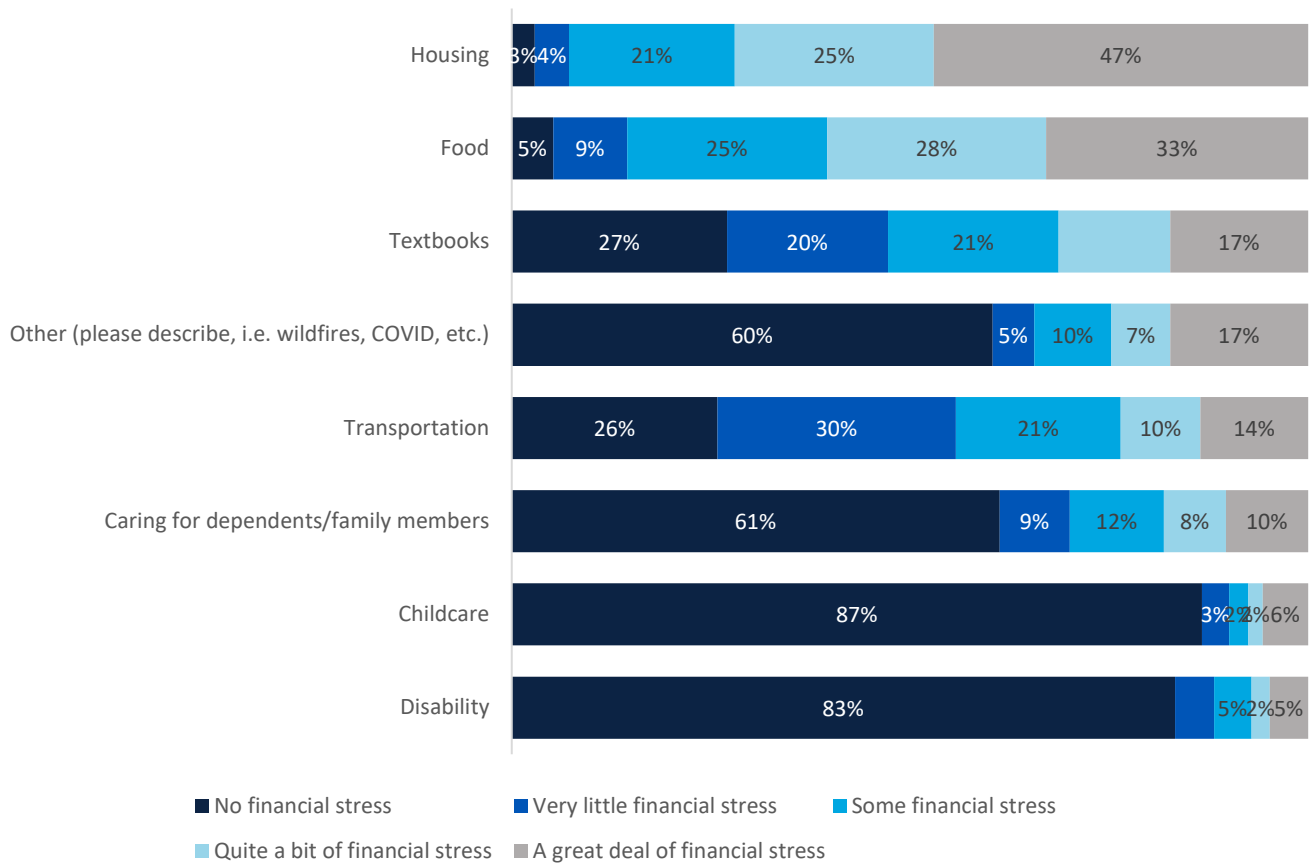

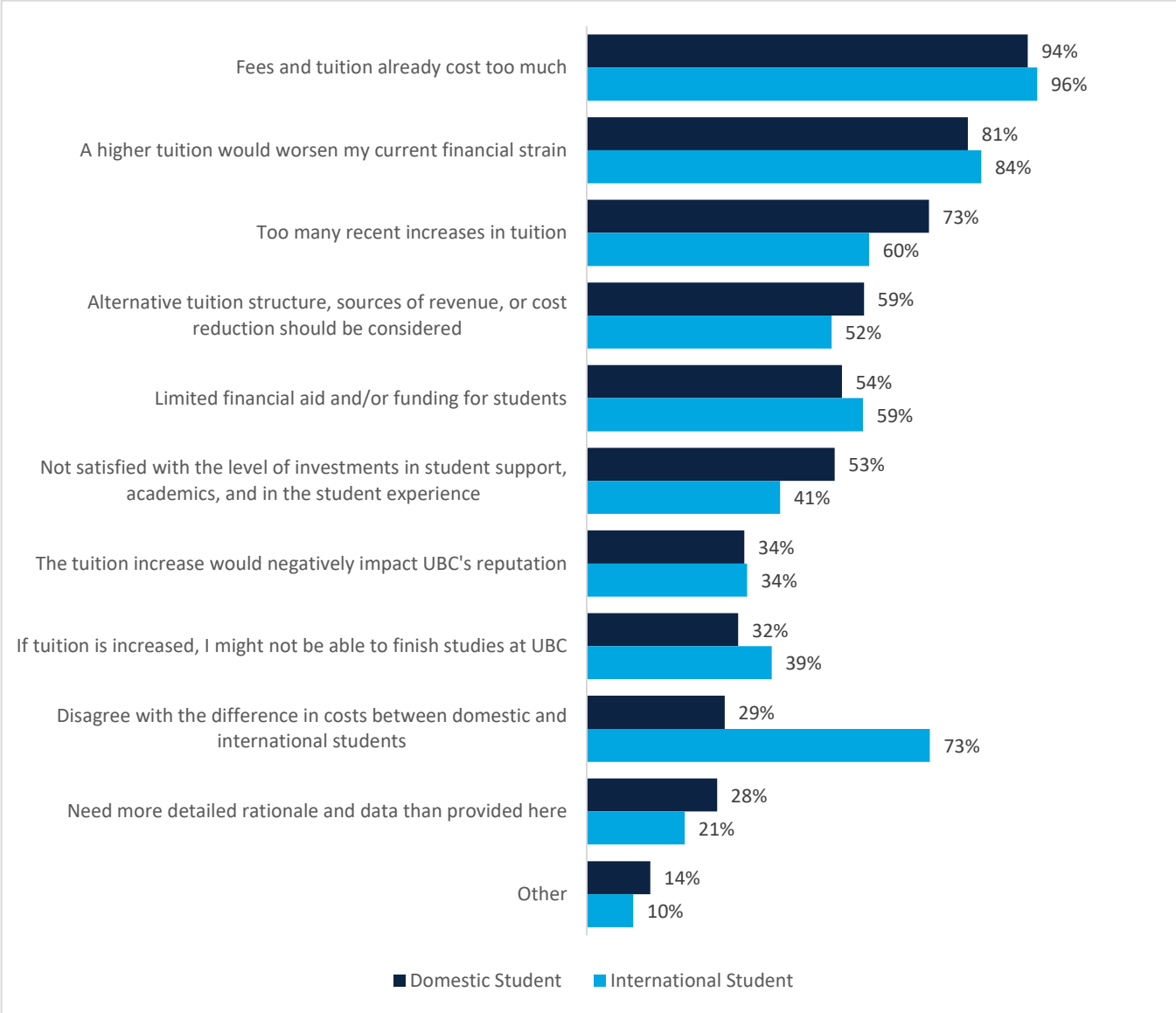

Themes from last year’s consultation were used as a baseline for the open-ended “other” theme analysis. 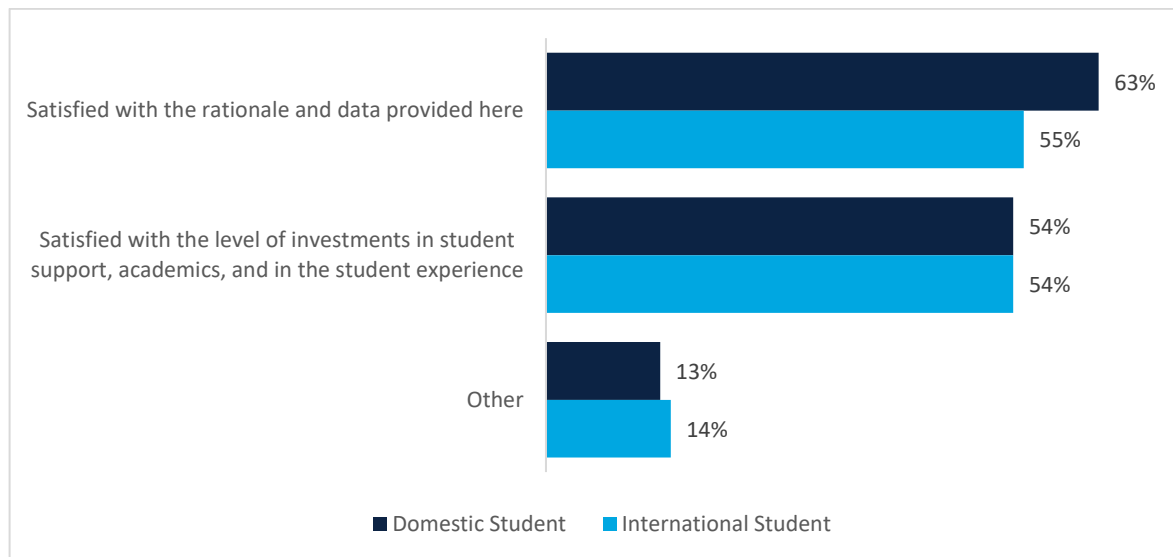

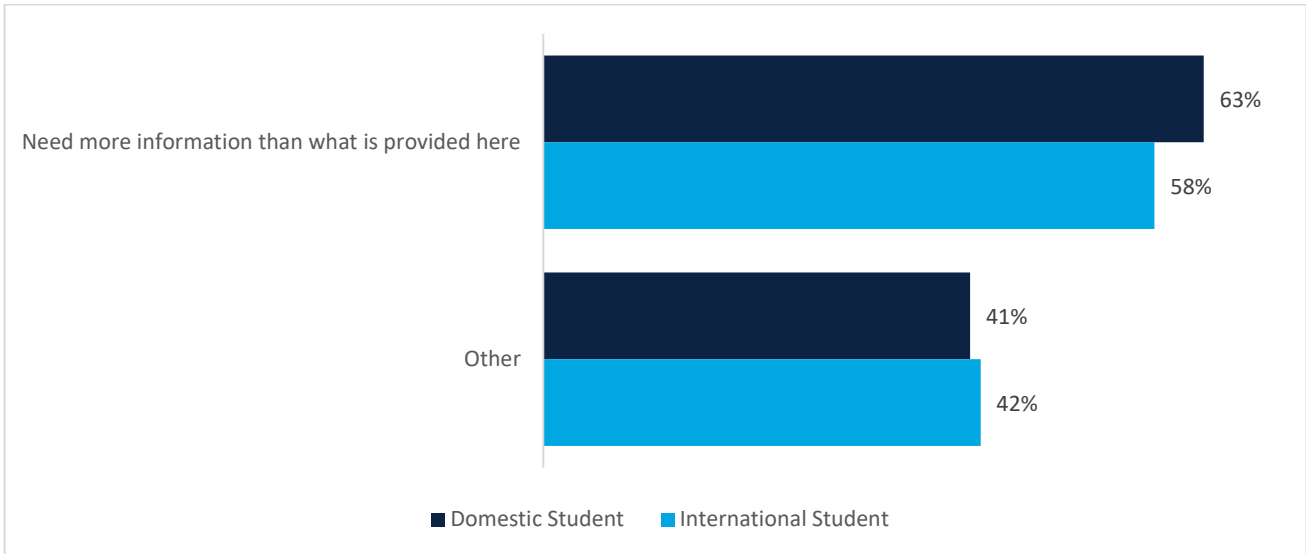

2. Constituents

2.2. For Tuition and Mandatory Fees that apply across multiple Faculties, the Responsible Executive will consult with the Alma Mater Society of the University of British Columbia, the Graduate Student Society of UBC Vancouver, and the University of British Columbia Students' Union Okanagan, as appropriate, and in addition, may consult more broadly with the general student body.

5. Consultation Process for General Increases to Tuition and Mandatory Fees that Apply Across Multiple Faculties

5.1 - The Responsible Executive will establish a schedule of formal meetings and mechanisms for the consultation process(es) that will take into consideration comments from the Elected Student Leadership and will be guided by best practices. The schedule will allow sufficient time for students and the Elected Student Leadership to respond in an informed manner

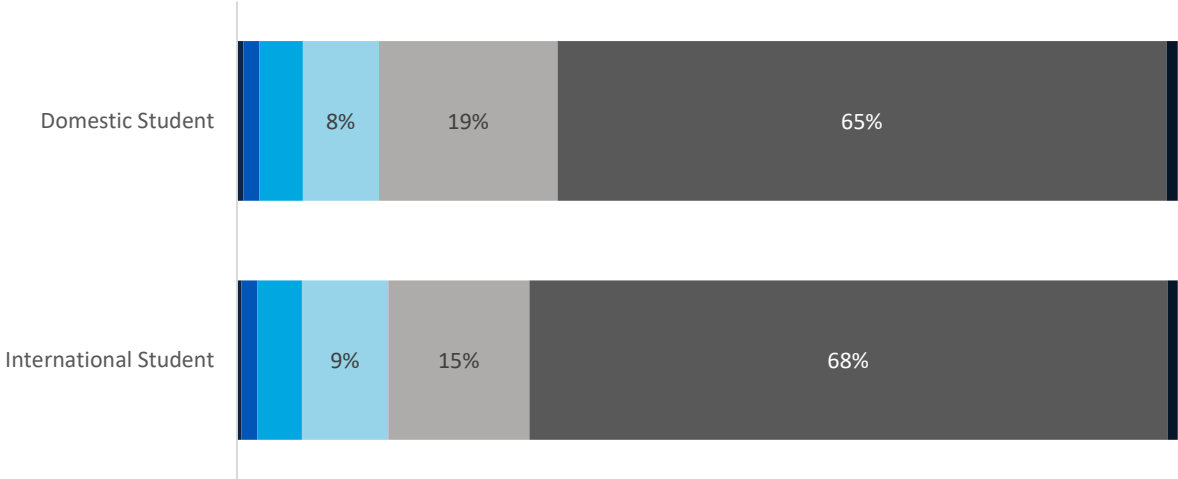
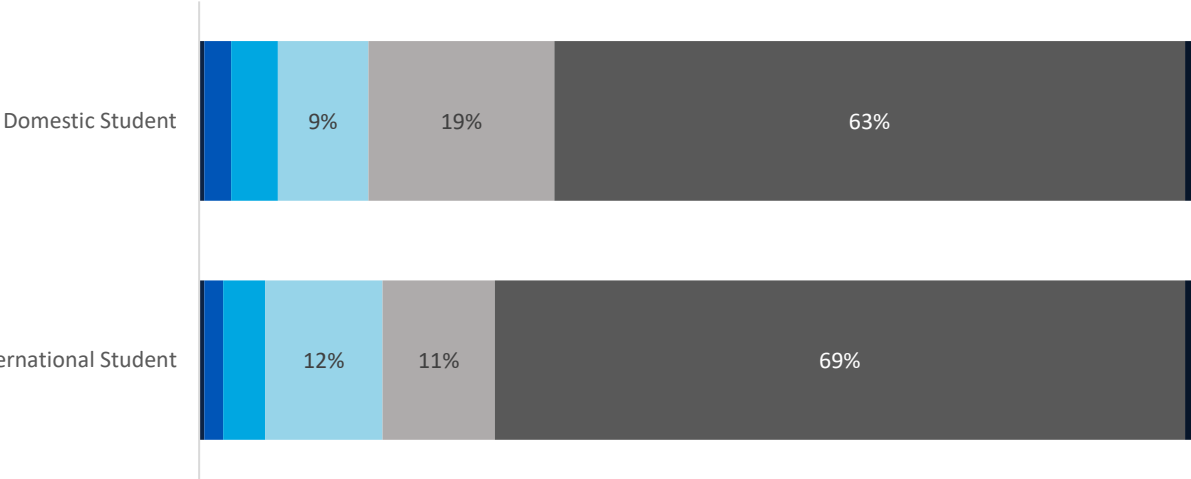


LEVEL OF AGREEMENT WITH TUITION INCREASE

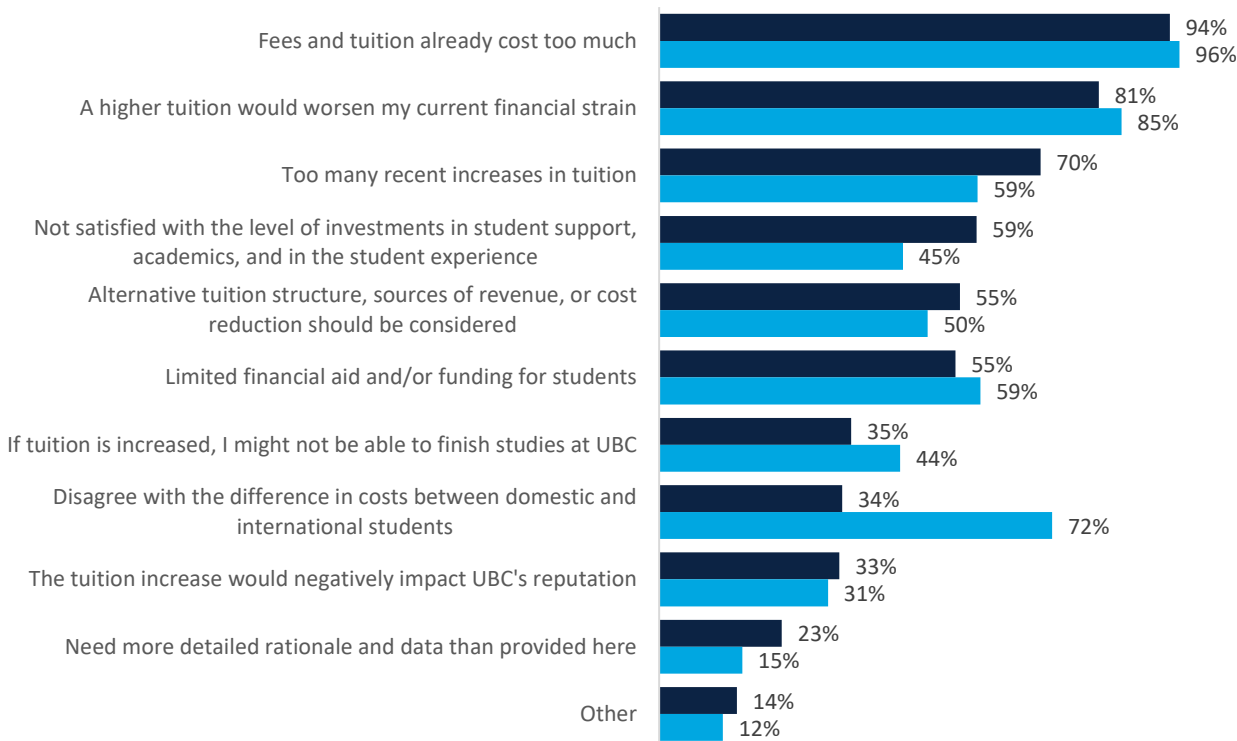

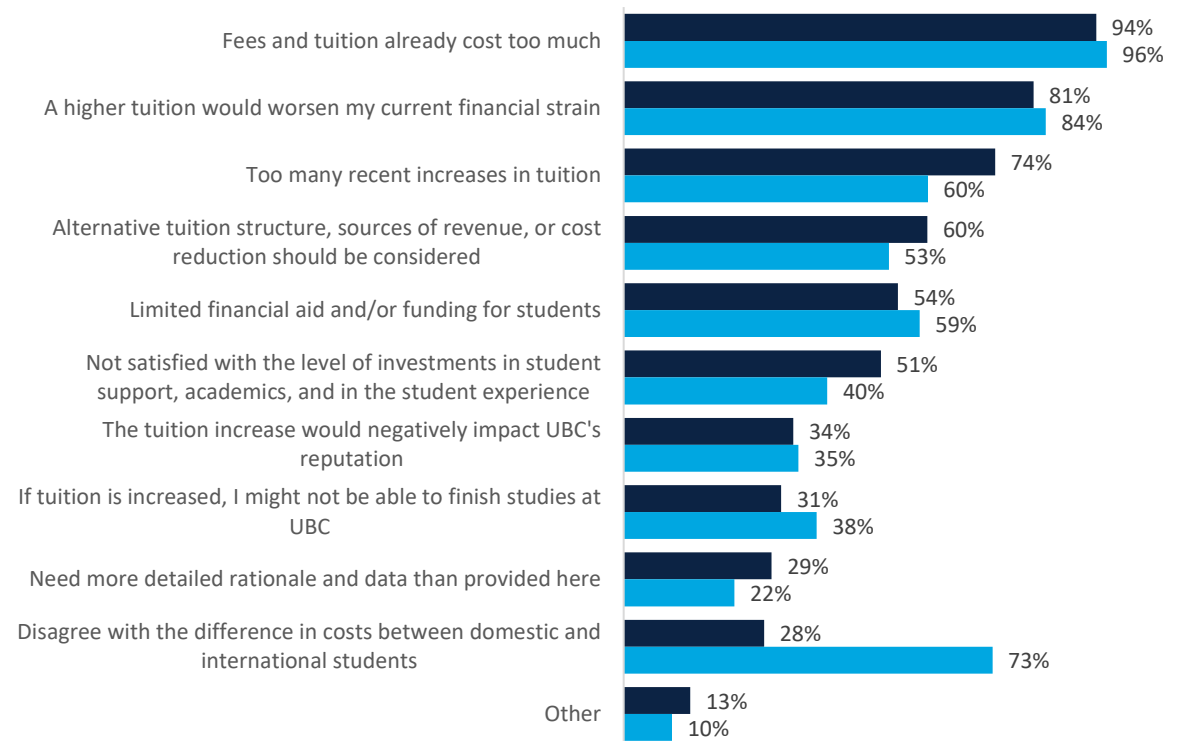

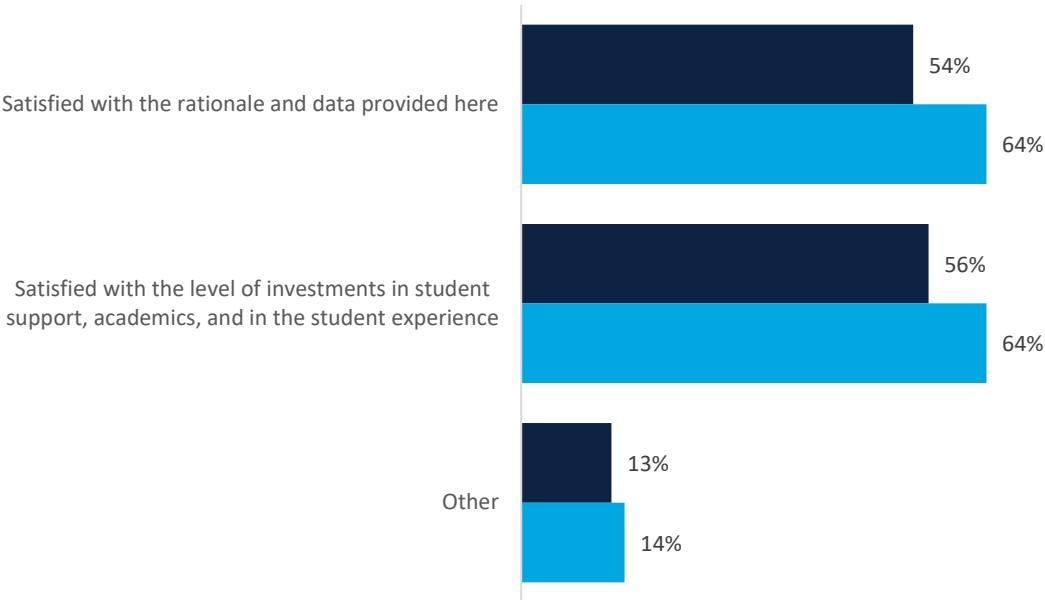

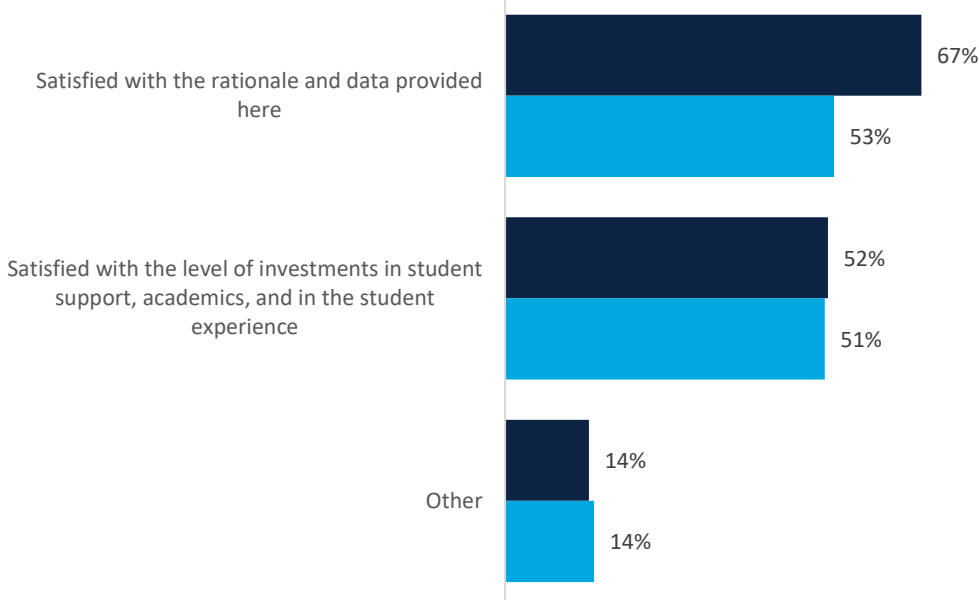

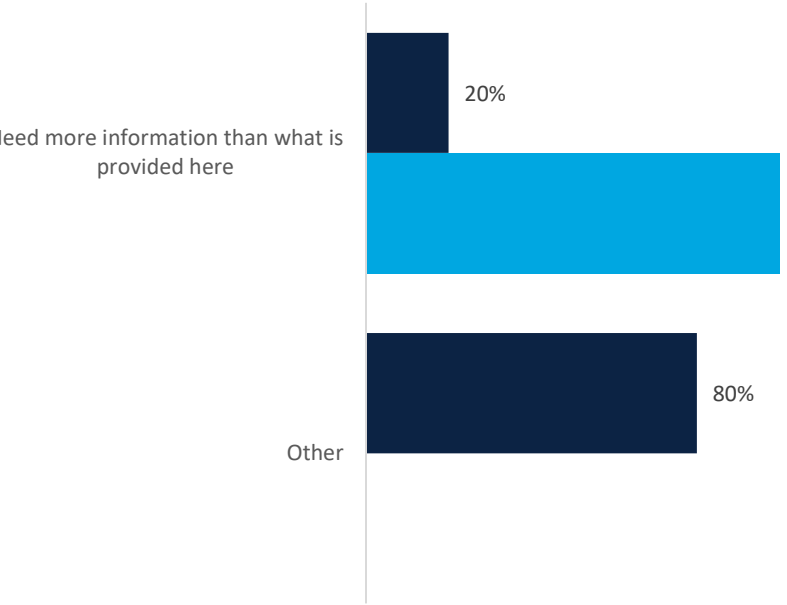

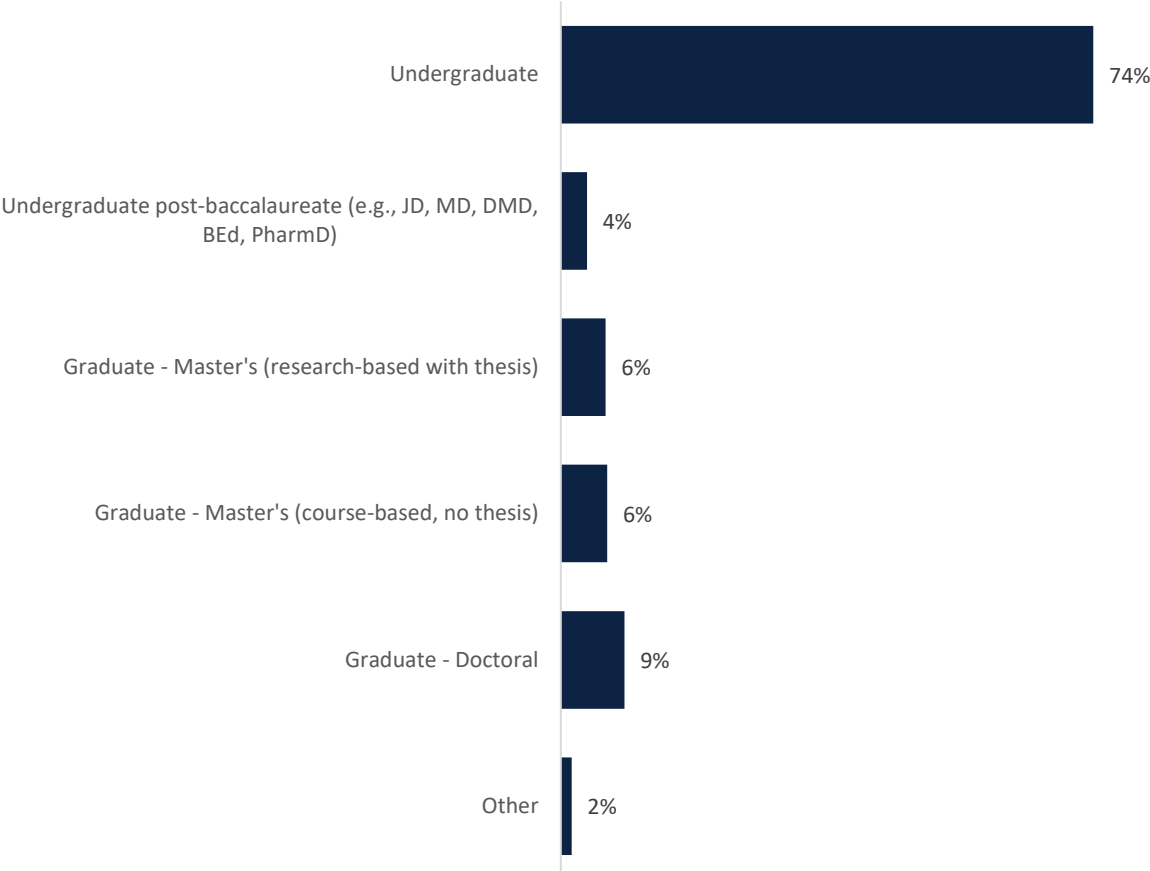

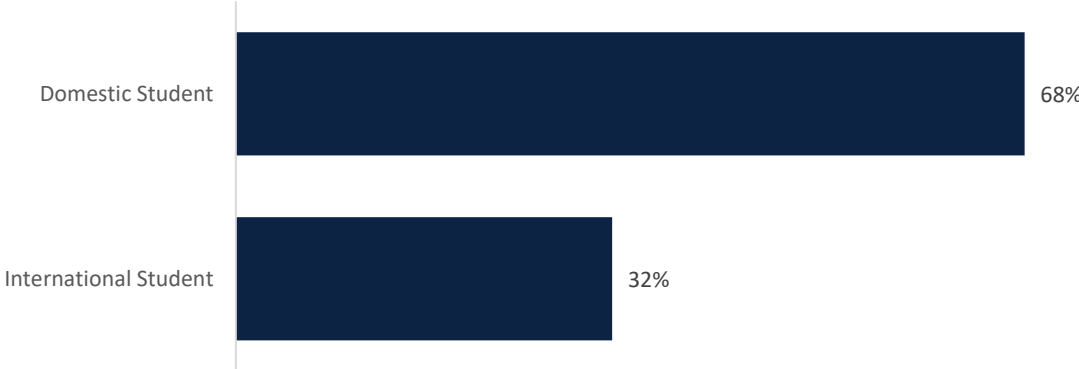

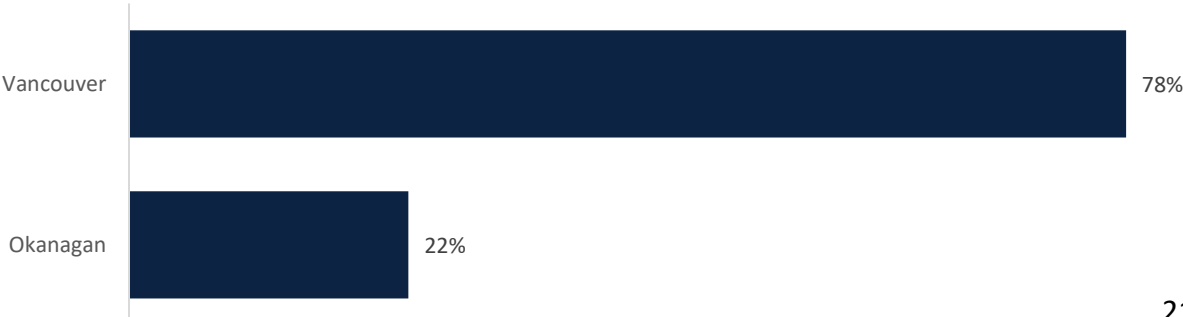
Degree Type (3,913 responses)

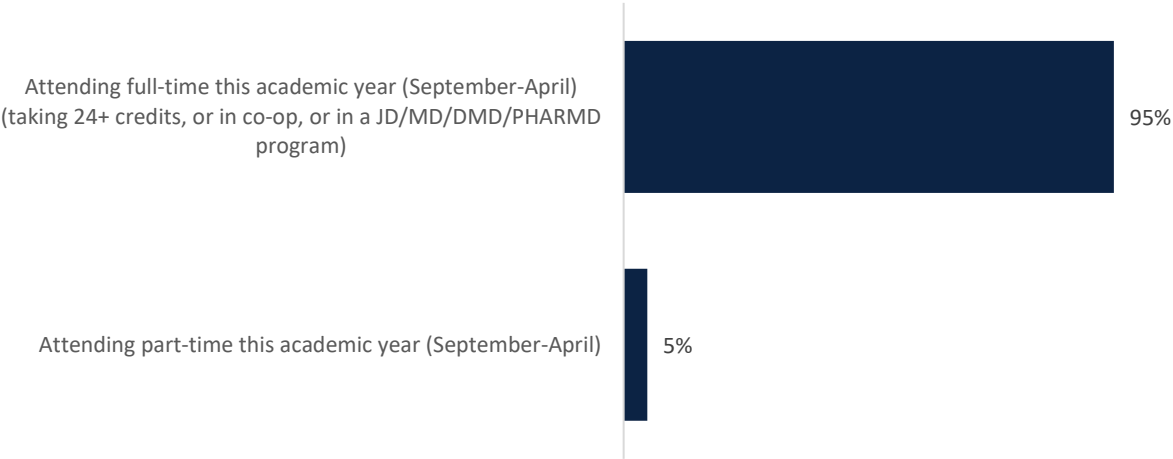

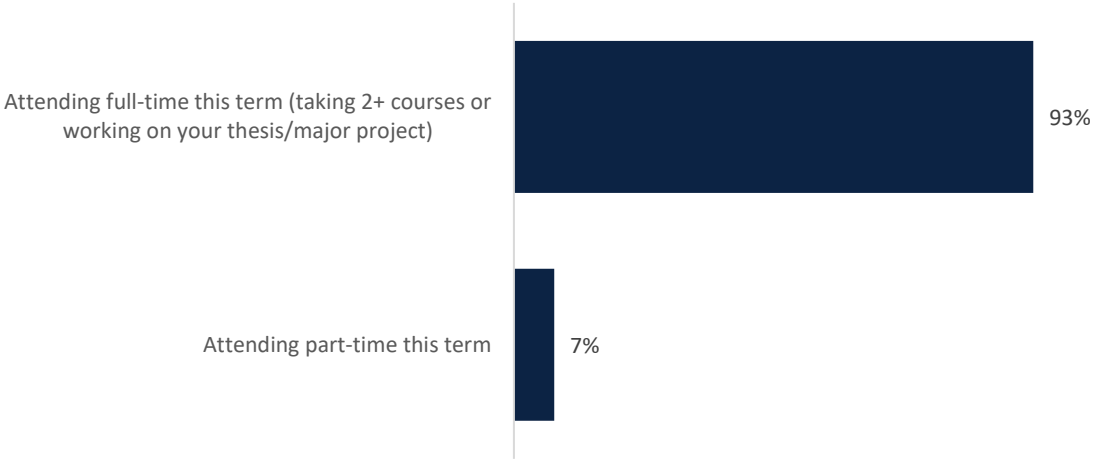

Enrolment Status – Undergraduate Students (3,006 responses)



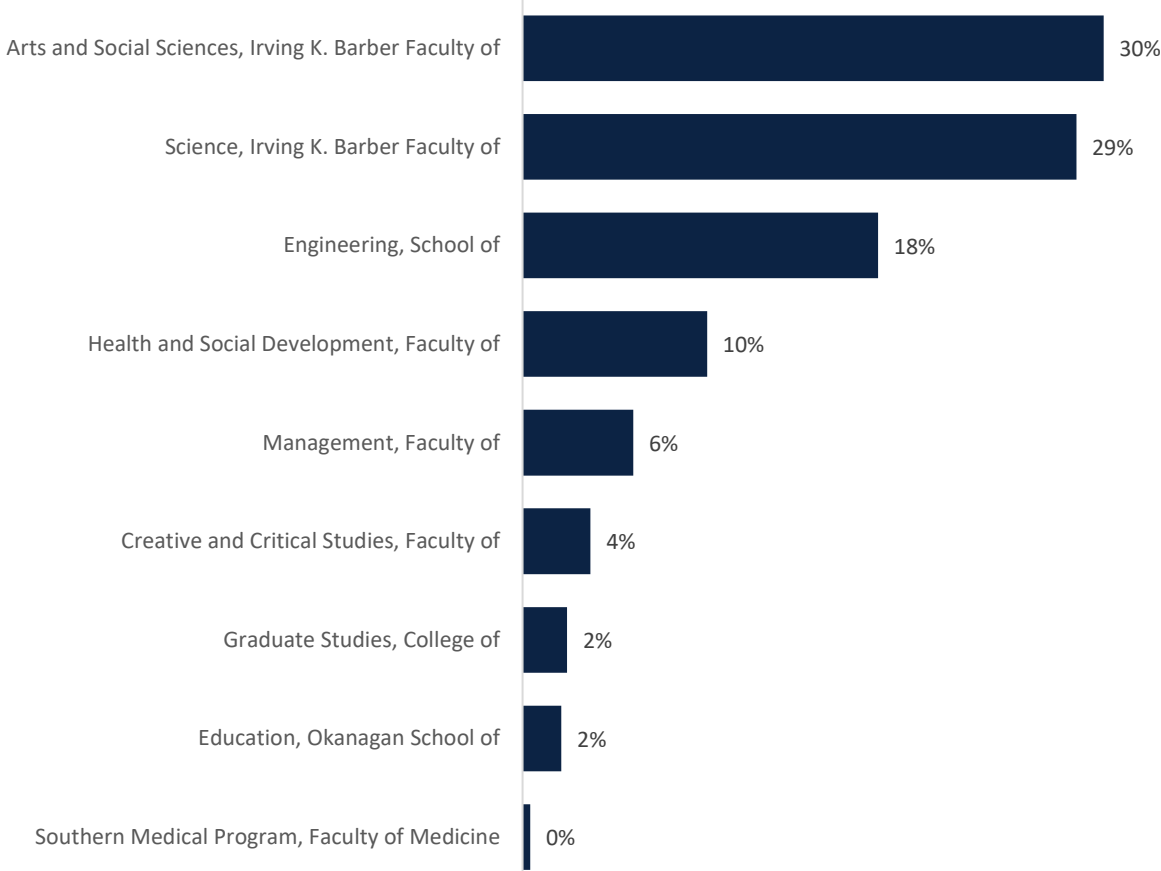

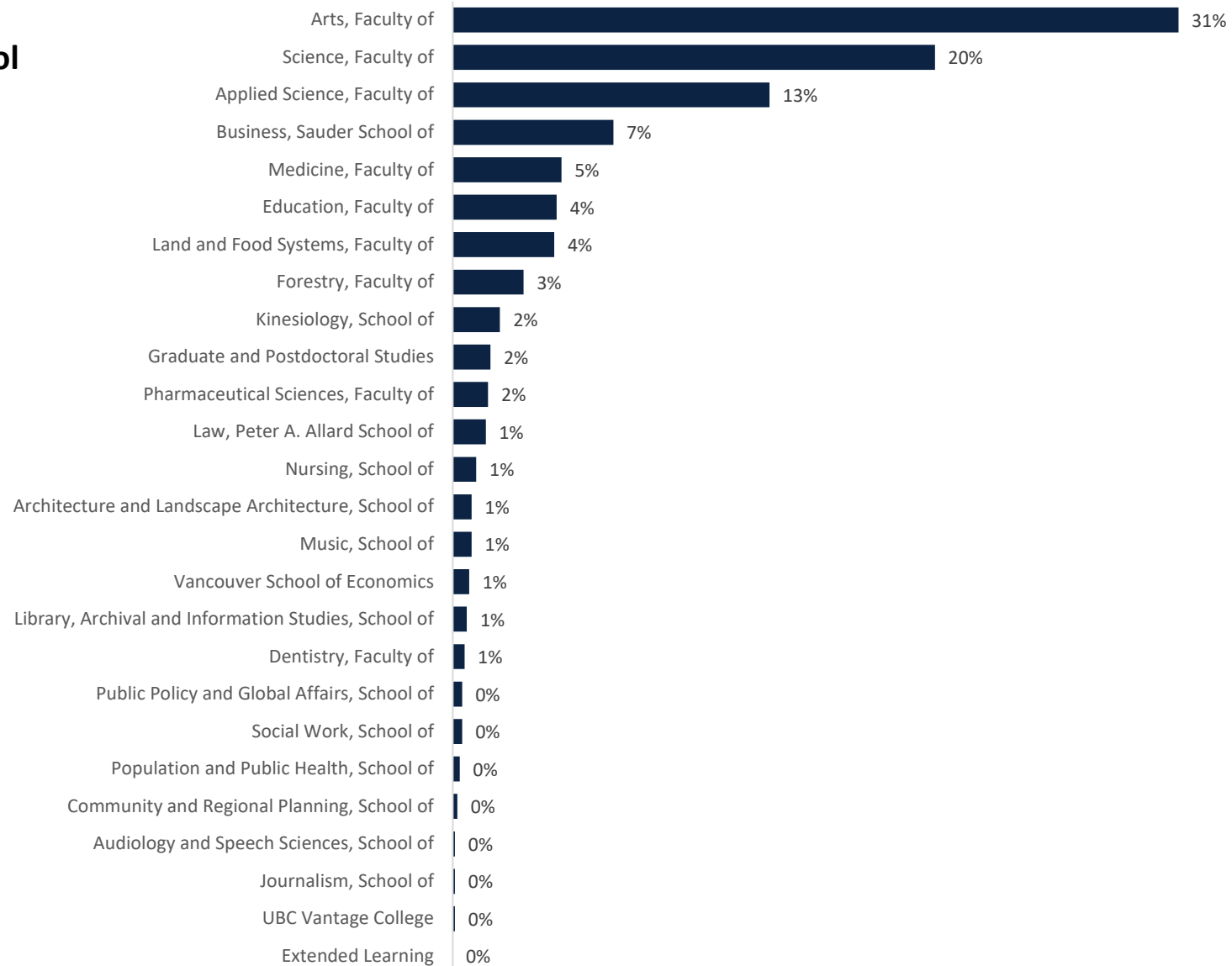

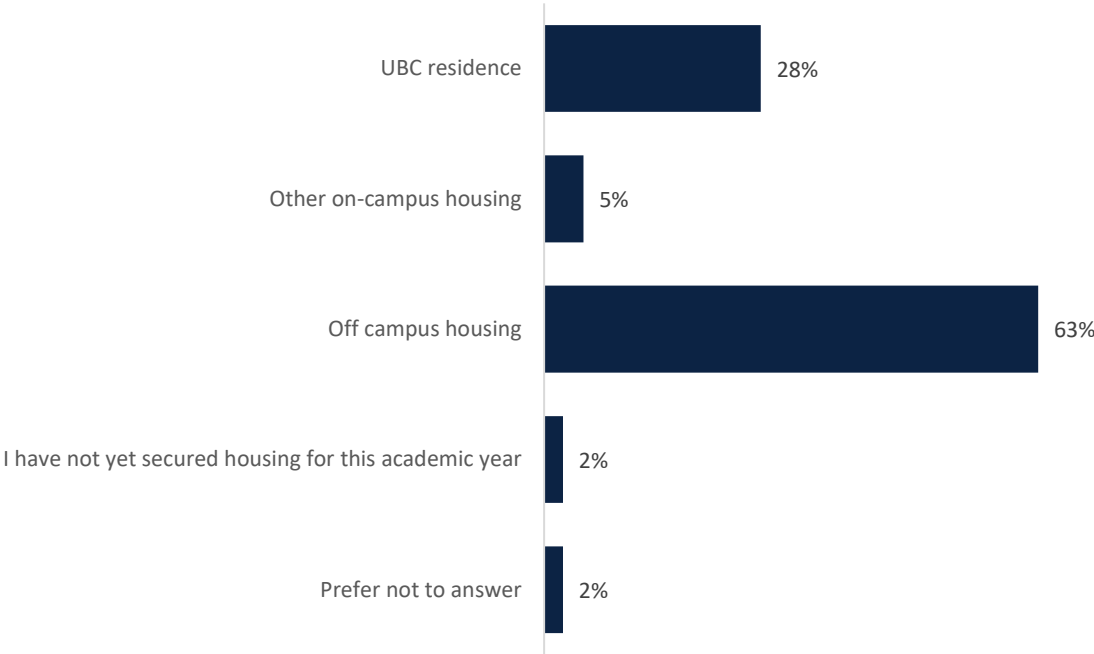

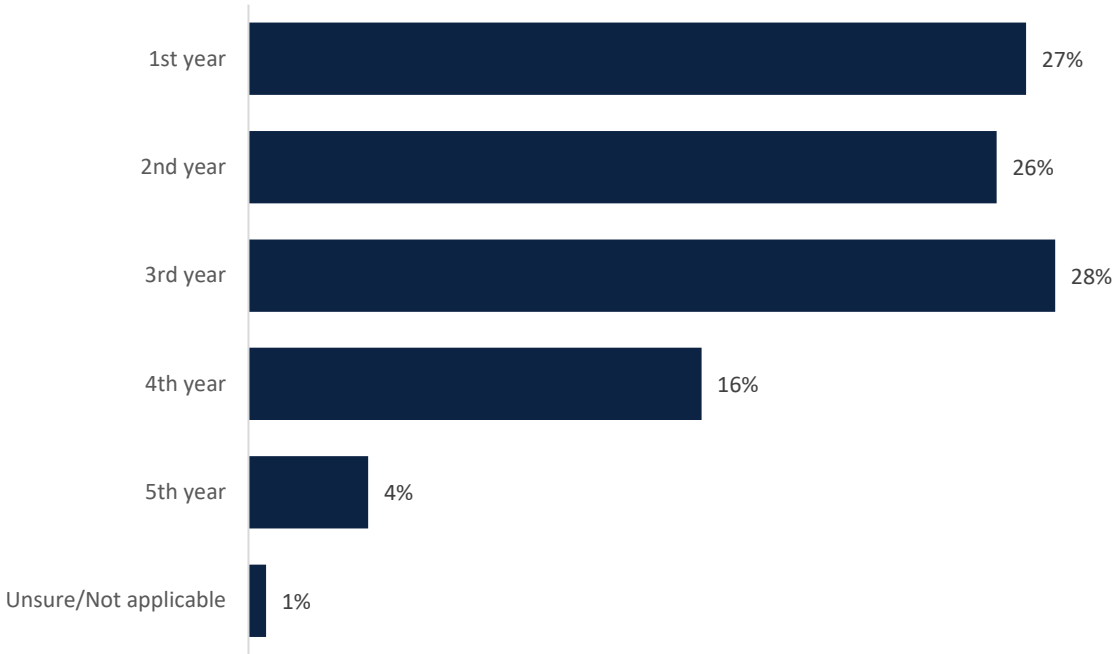

Tuition Proposal, 2024-25



- The Administration recently consulted on the following (3,973 respondents; vs. 4,868 prior yr.):
 - 5% increase for new international undergraduate students;
 - 3% for continuing international students;
 - 2% for domestic students and mandatory fees.
- This aligns with:
 - The first two years of the Province's wage mandate (~3.4%, 6.75%)
 - Two-year average CPI (5.5%) and HEPI (4.9%) rates for 2022-2023
 - Tuition decisions by our peer Canadian institutions
- Note: UBC has one of the lowest domestic tuition rates, and our international rates are aligned with our ranking vis a vis our peers

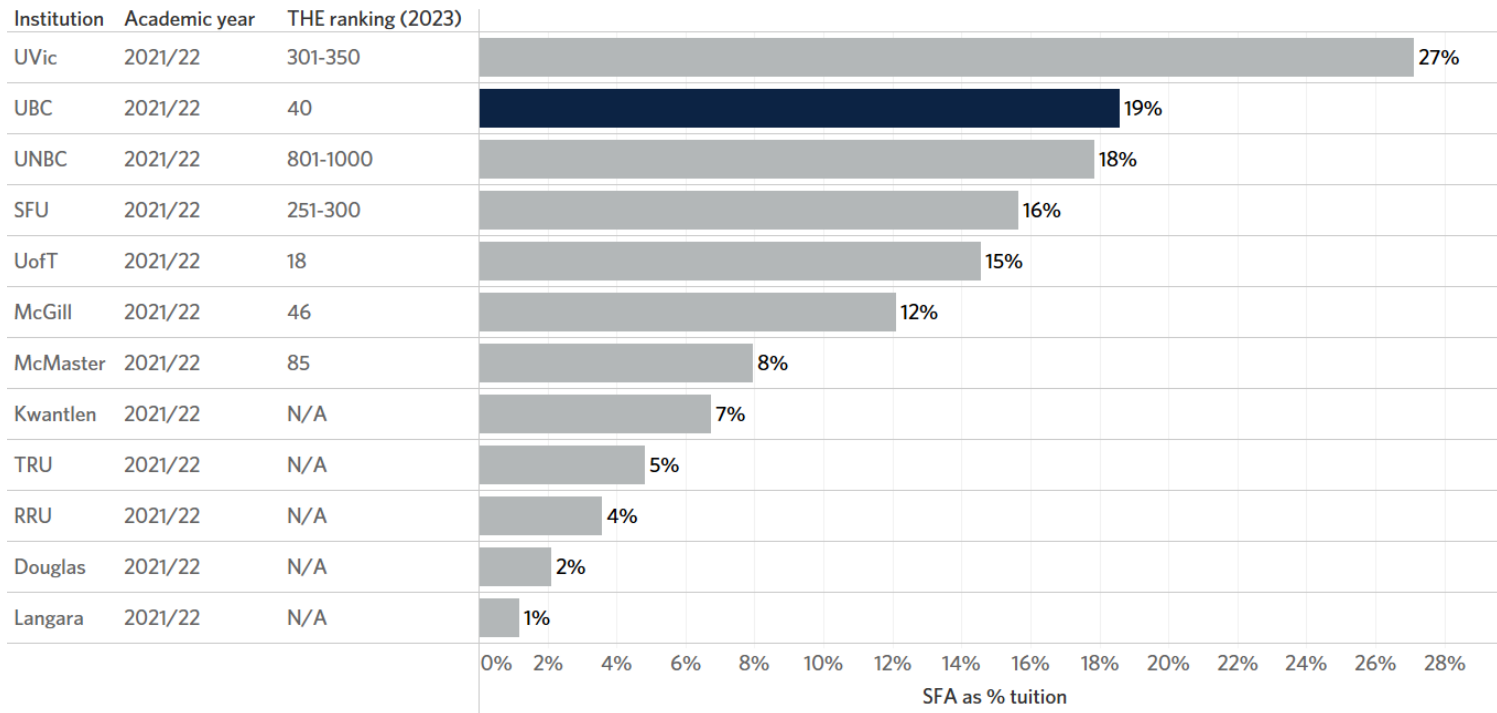
Additional Revenue, 2024-25



- Incremental revenue of \$27M from these increases will partially offset self-funded cost pressures in the range of \$70M.
 - Wage pressures per labor agreements is in the range of 2 to 3.5%, net of GWI/COLA funding
 - Goods and services inflation projected to be 4-8% higher year over year
 - Strategic initiatives carried over from the prior budget cycle
- Financial assistance is significant and sufficient to support access and to address students-in-need (as reported to the Board of Governors at the September meeting);
- New revenue will support the continuance of excellence in research, teaching and learning, and the student experience, as well as addressing the extraordinary inflationary impacts on our costs in the last two years.

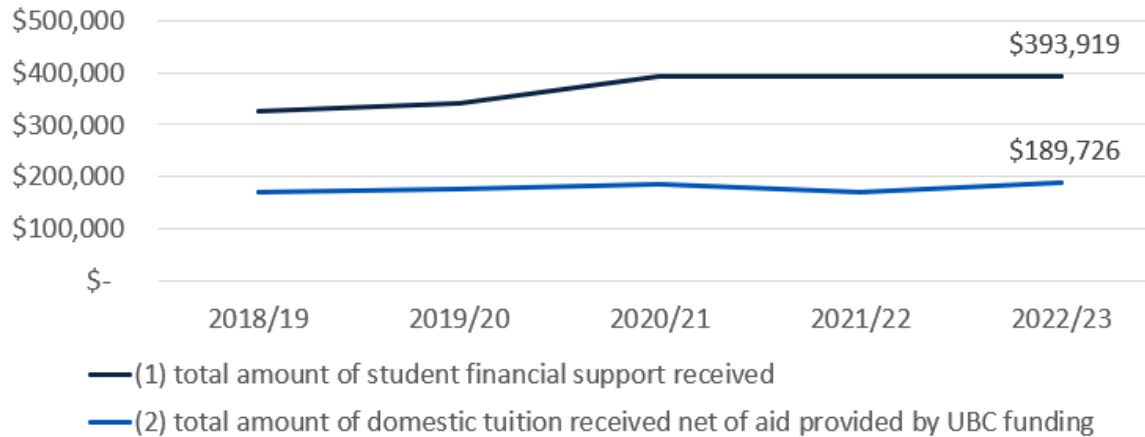

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR UBC STUDENTS

- In 2022/23, **\$393.9M** in total student financial support was provided to UBC full-time students, a **\$1.1M** or **0.3%** increase from the previous year. Of this amount, **\$251.1M** is non-repayable and **\$142.8M** is in the form of Canada and US repayable loans.
- The total amount of domestic tuition fees net of financial aid provided to students has been relatively steady since 2018, while student financial support in comparison continues to grow year over year.

- Carrying through on proposals re the FY23 Structural Deficit Relief Fund
- Requesting that no new funding requests come through the budget process from either the Faculties or the Administrative units

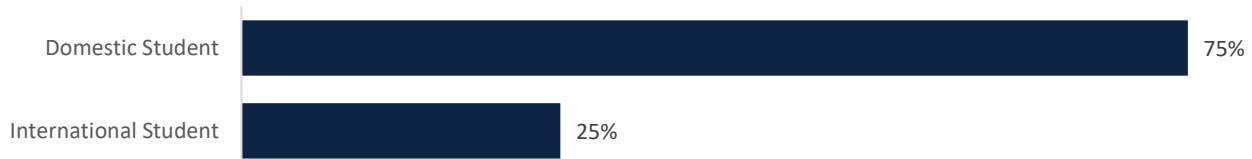

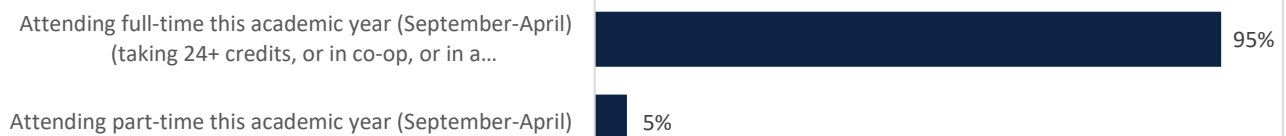

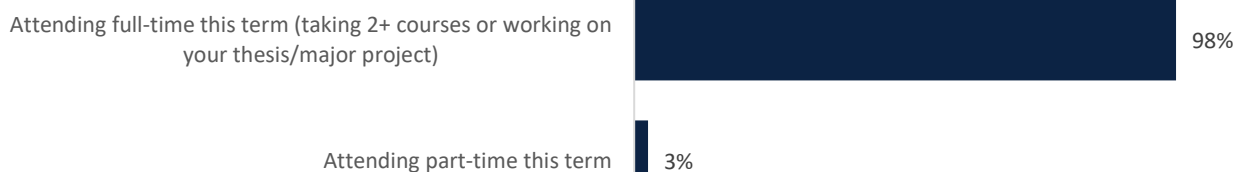

Enrolment Status - Okanagan - Undergraduate Students



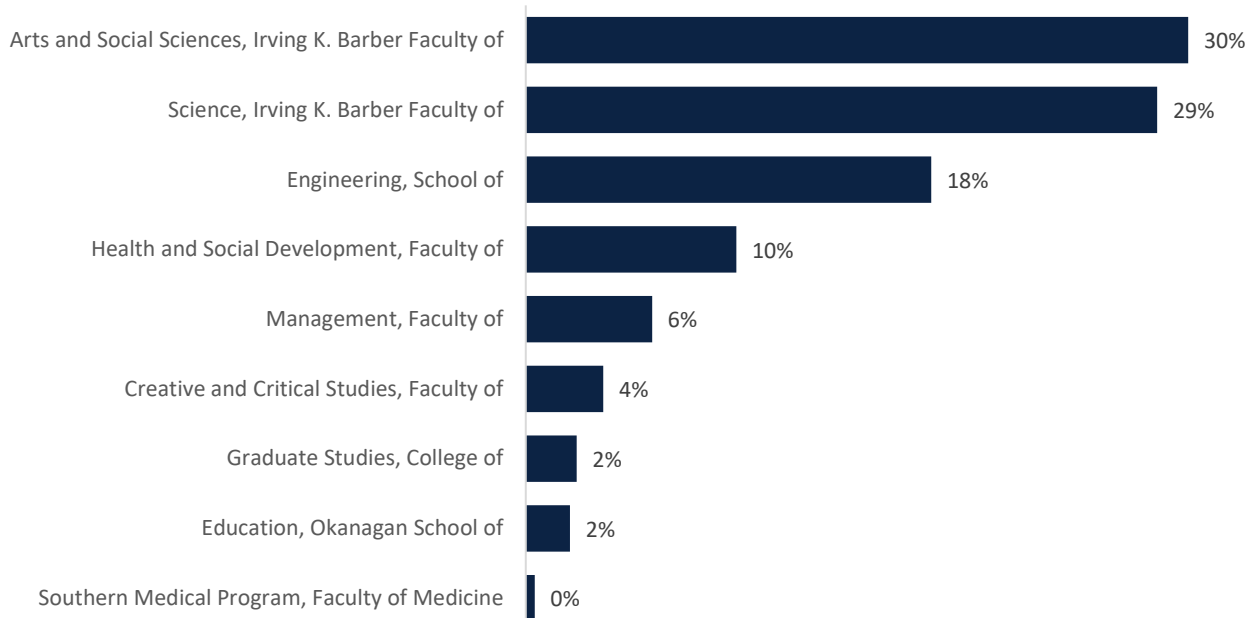

Enrolment Status - Okanagan - Graduate Students



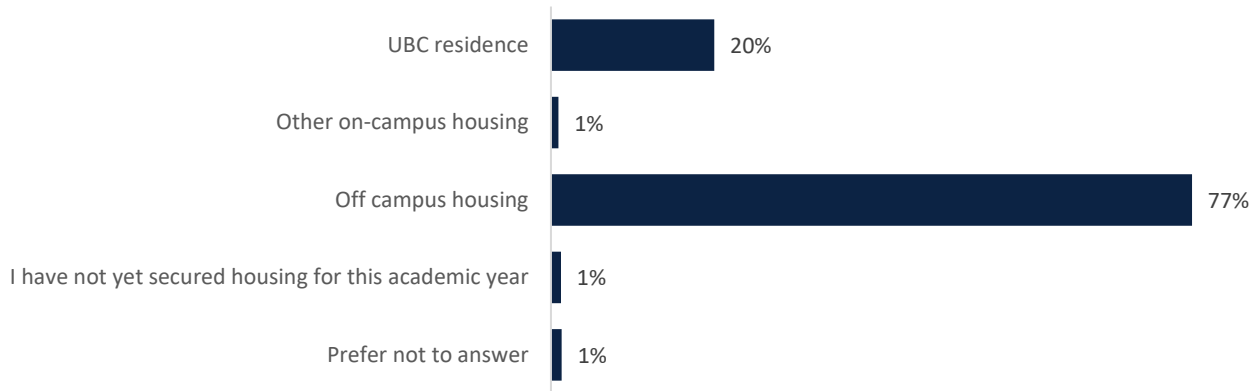

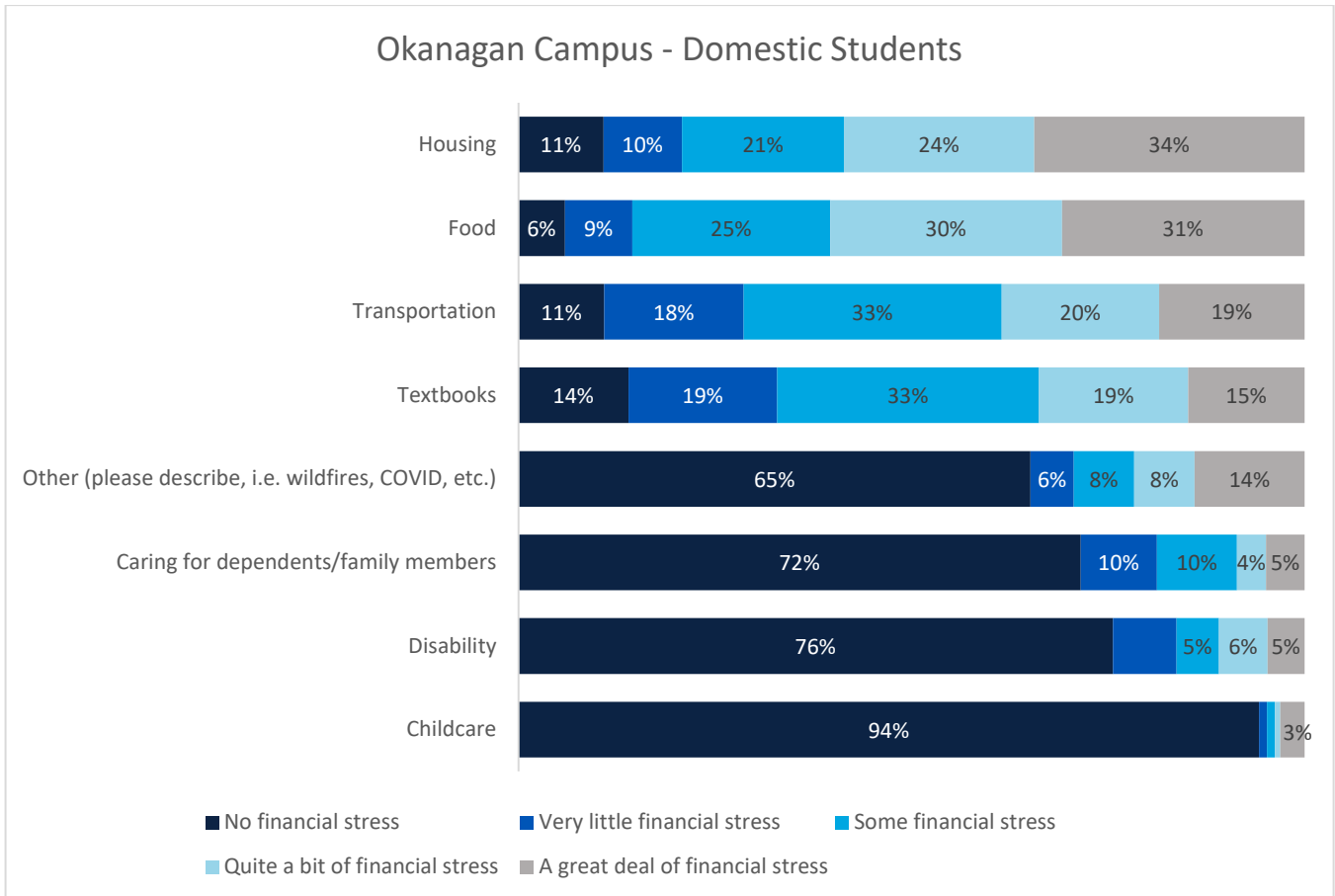

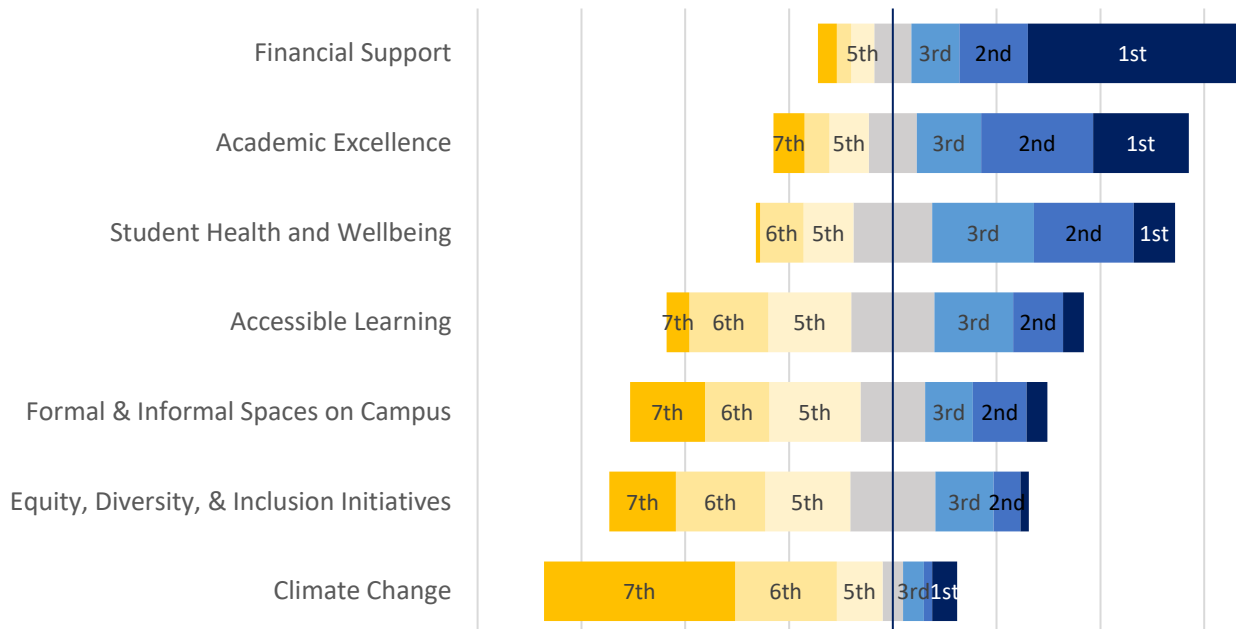

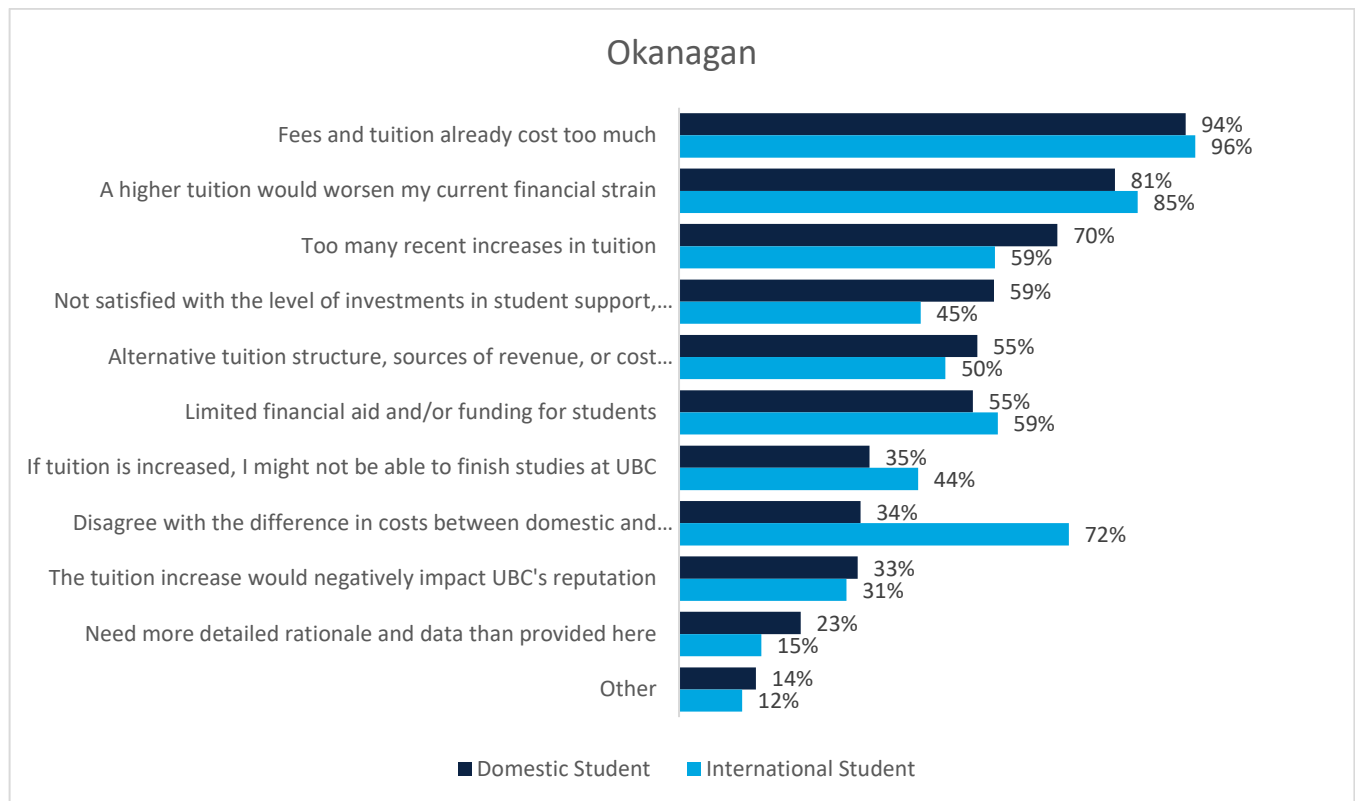

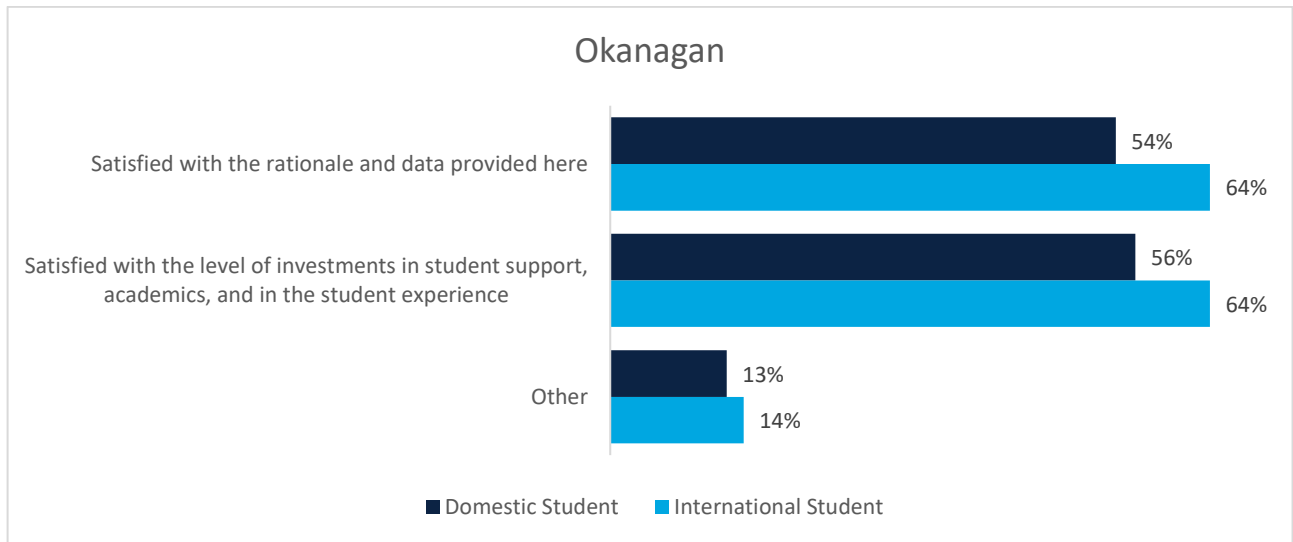

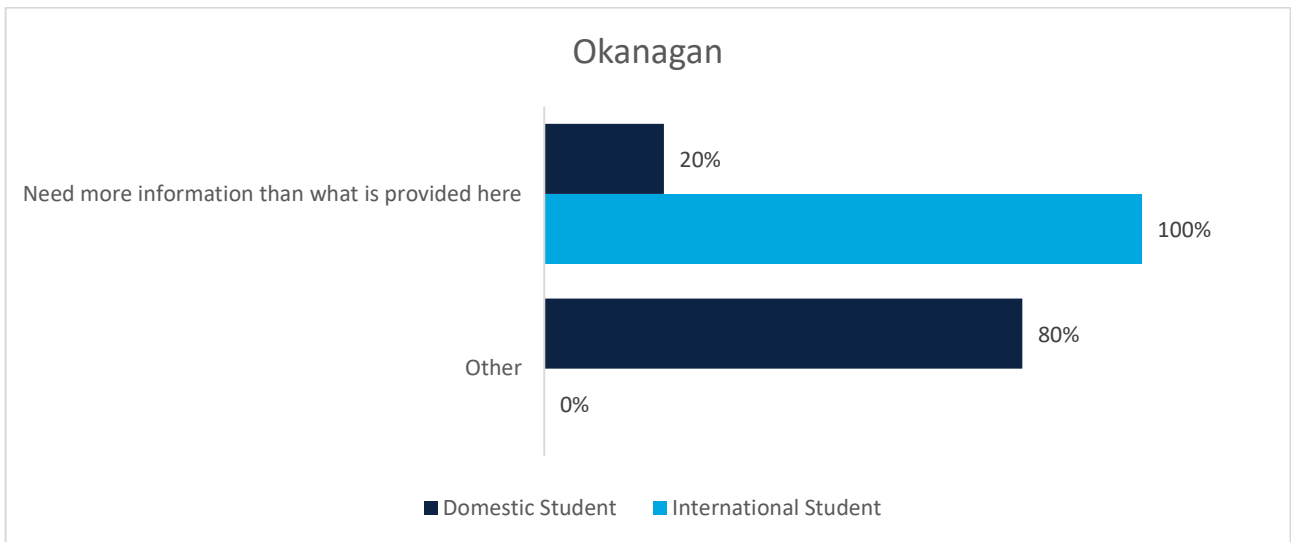

Also what specifically are the funds being used for in each category, for example, does improving the "academic excellence" mean hiring more highly acclaimed faculty members or does it focus on much more meaningful uses such as actively teaching existing faculty on how to present world class, understandable, informative lectures in the way students can actually learn from? 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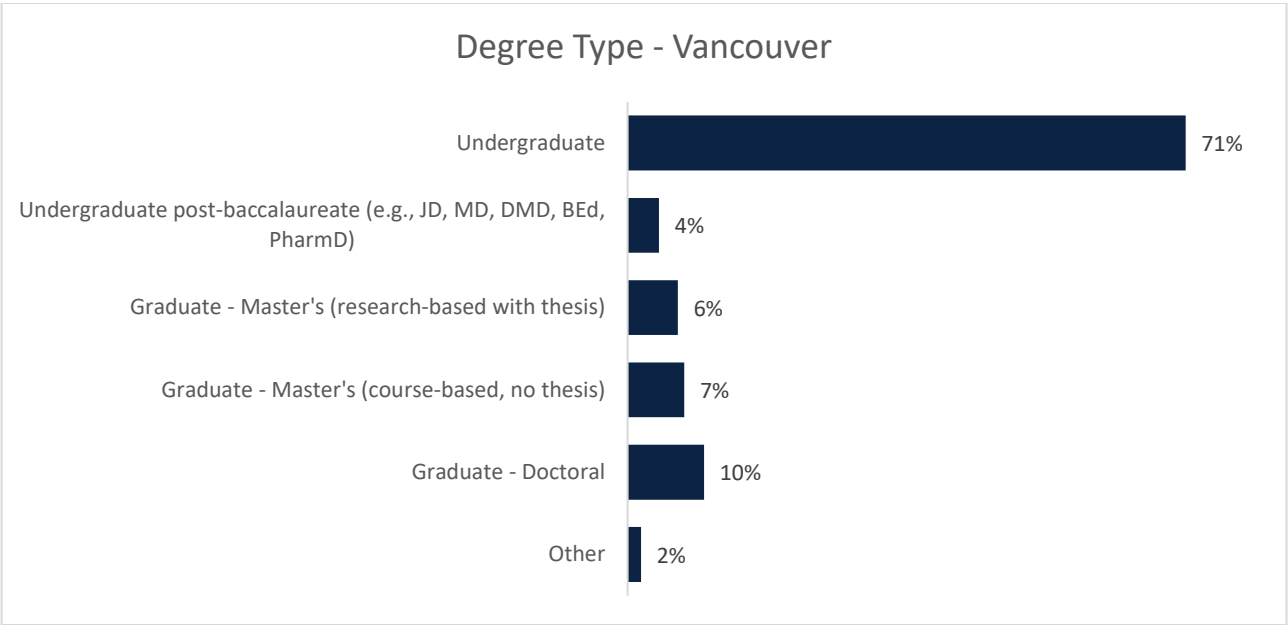

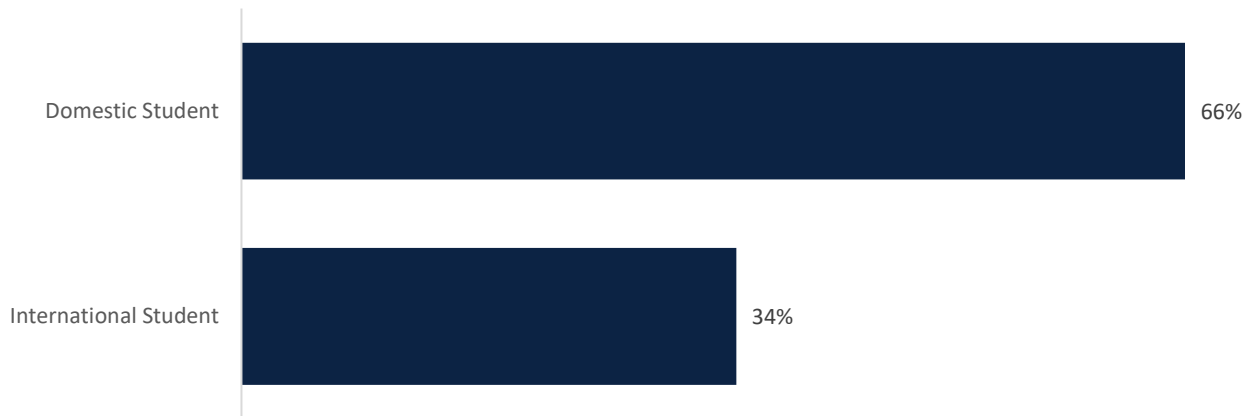

Respondents were asked for their degree type, international student status, enrolment status, faculty/school, where they reside, and in which year of their program they are currently registered.



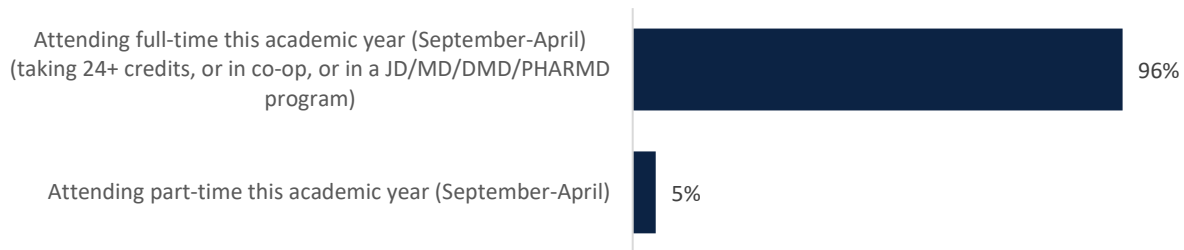

Enrolment Type - Vancouver



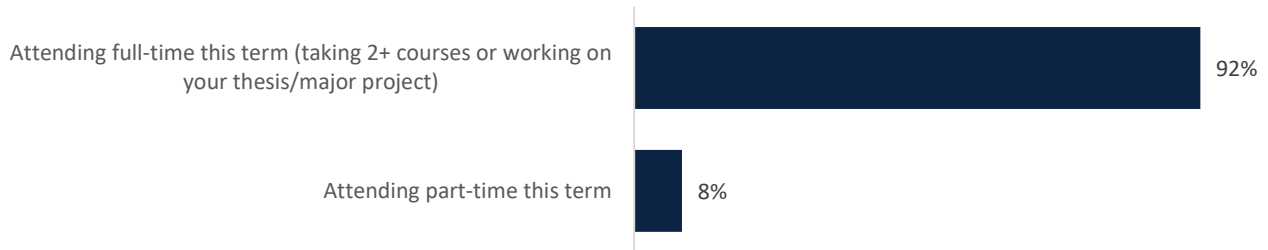

Enrolment Status - Vancouver - Undergraduate Students



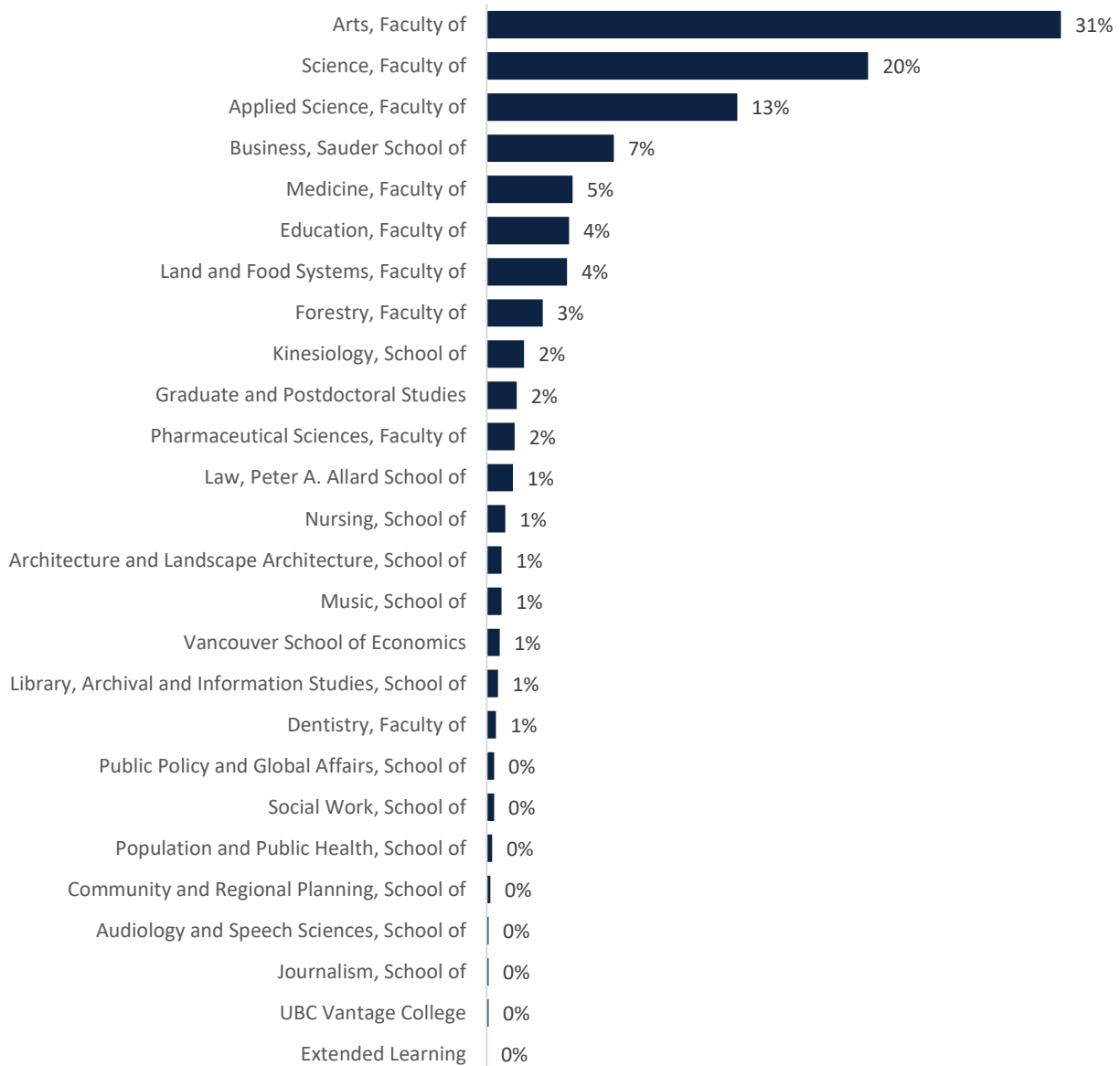

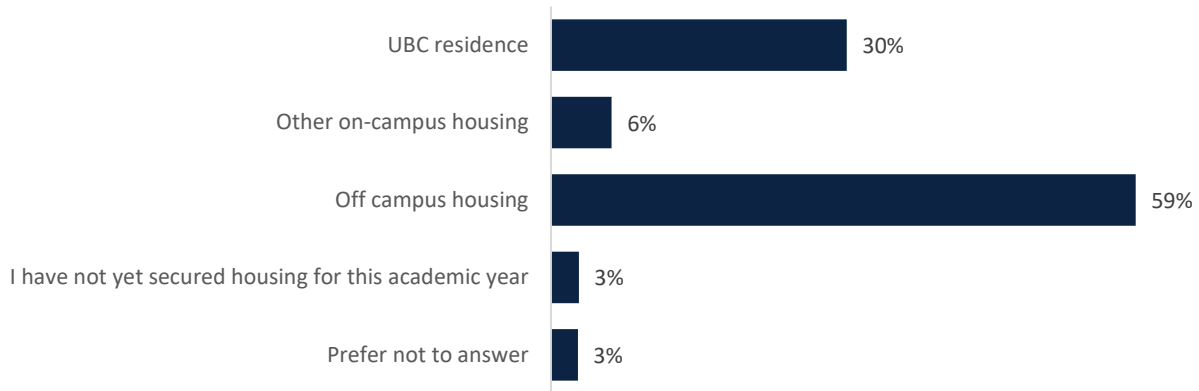

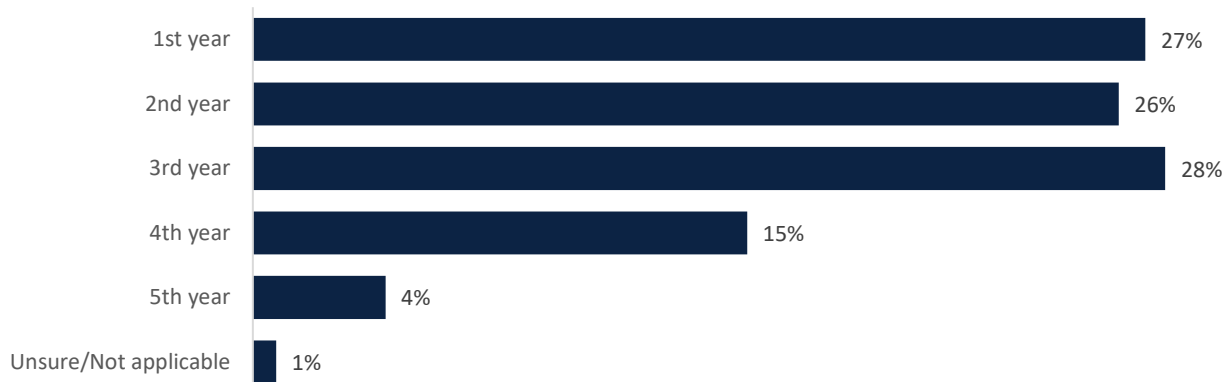

Vancouver Year Level



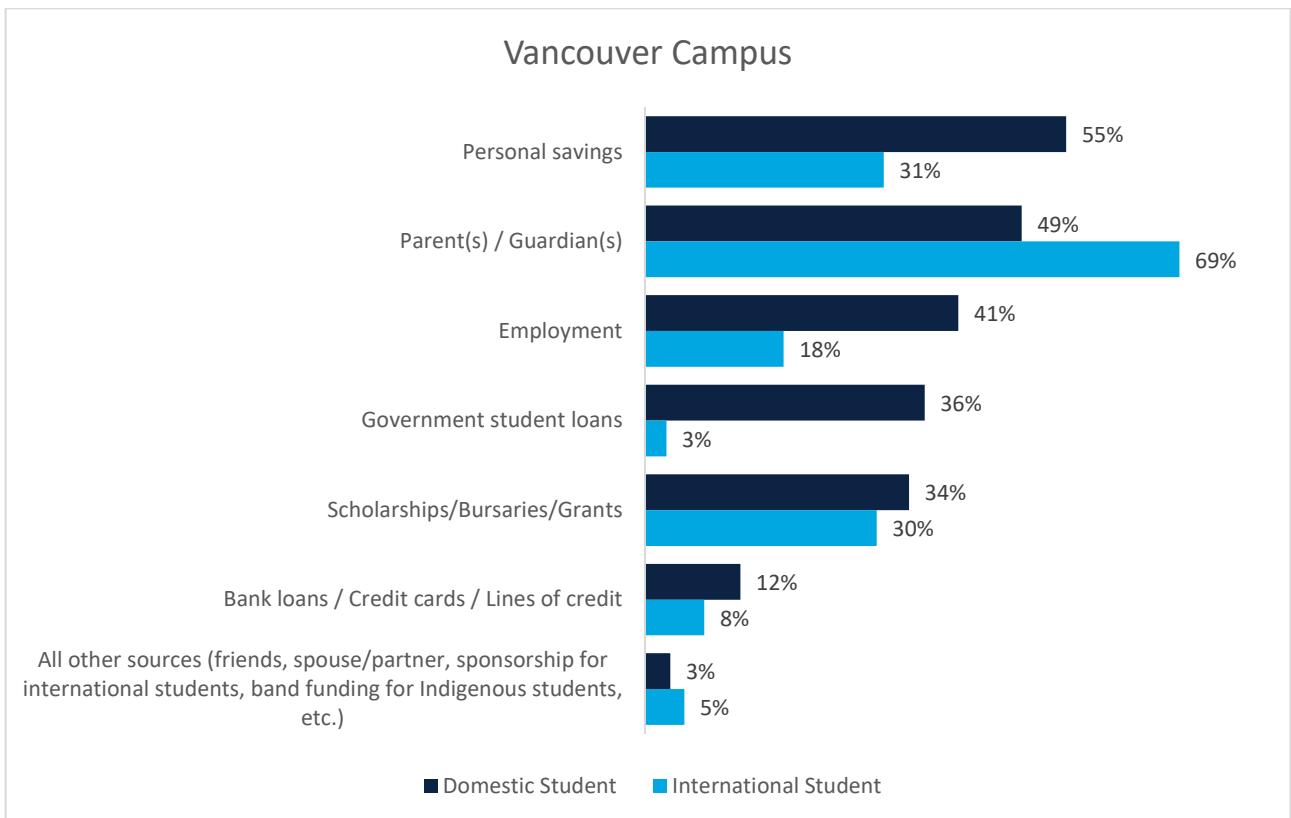

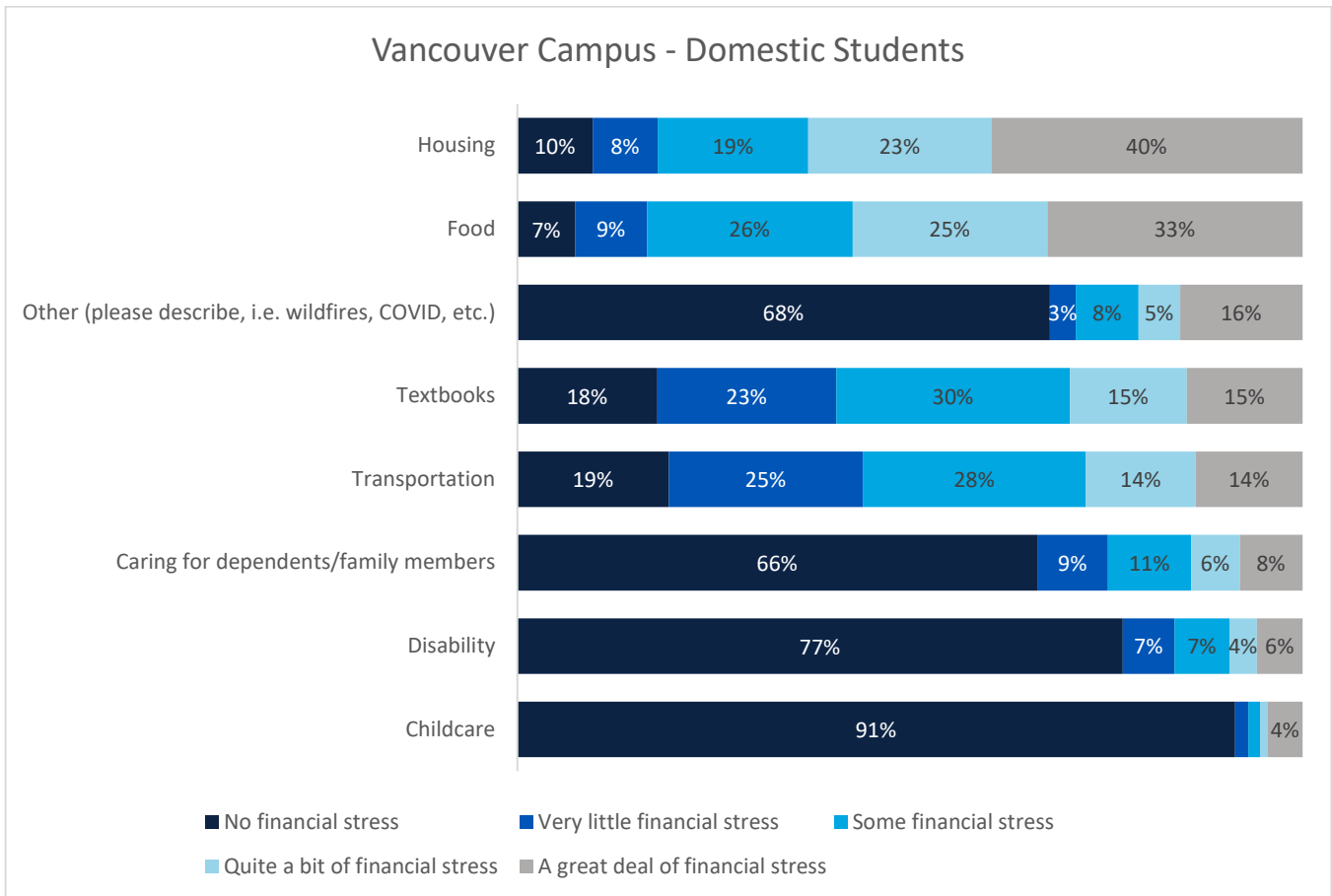

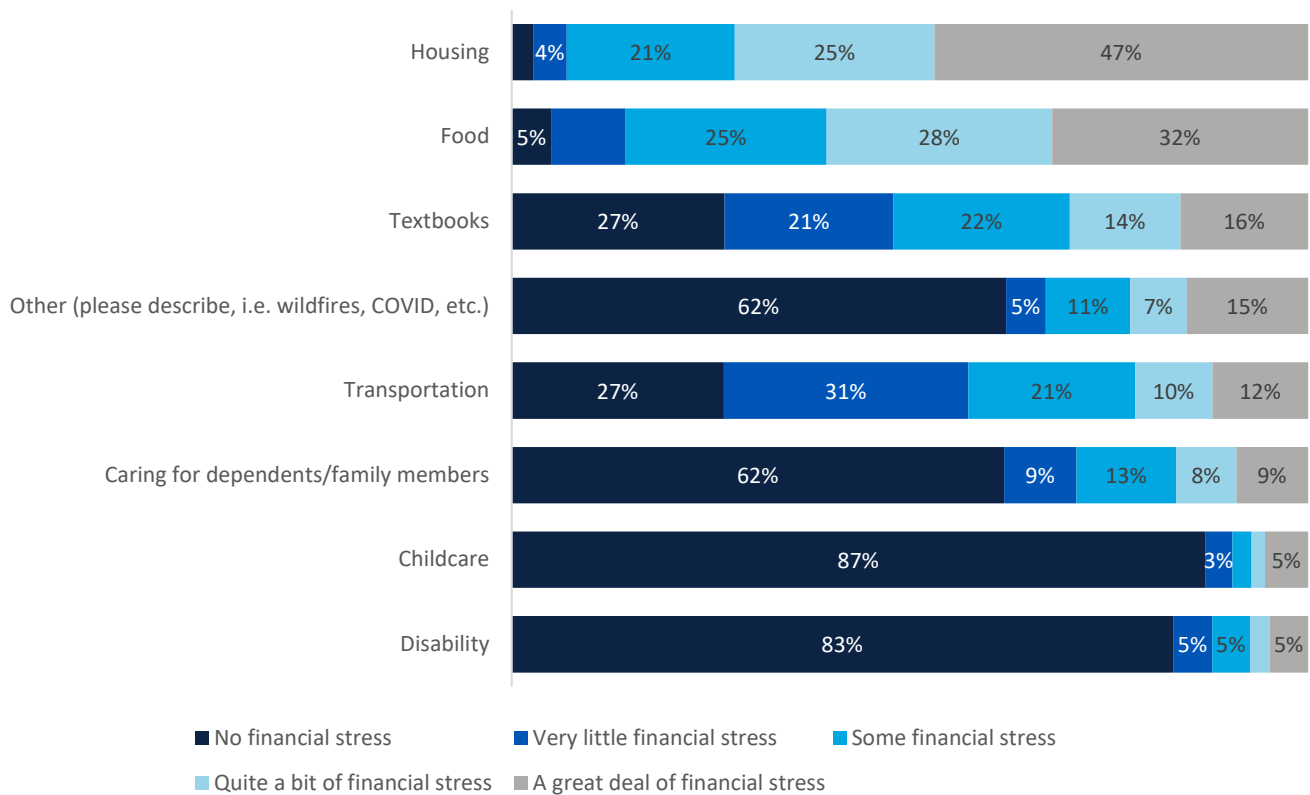

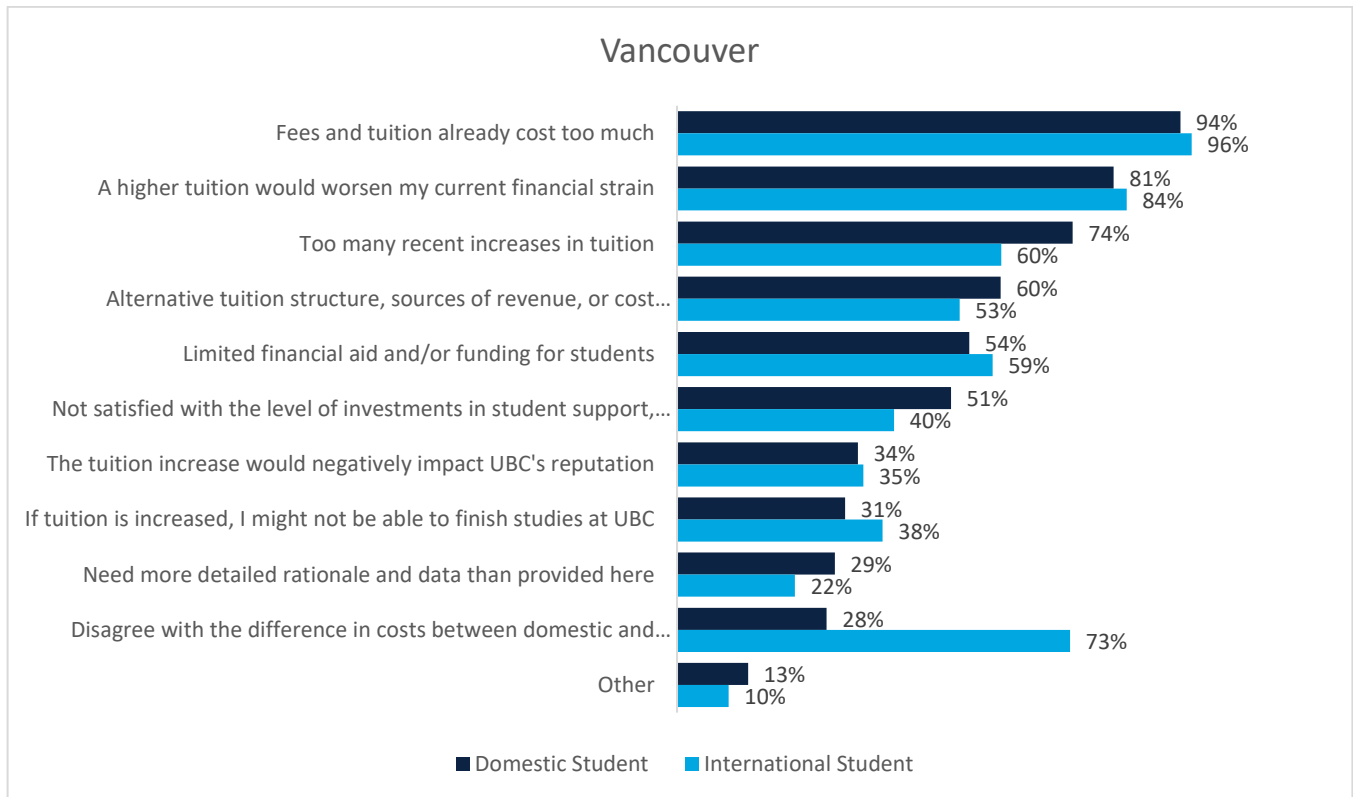

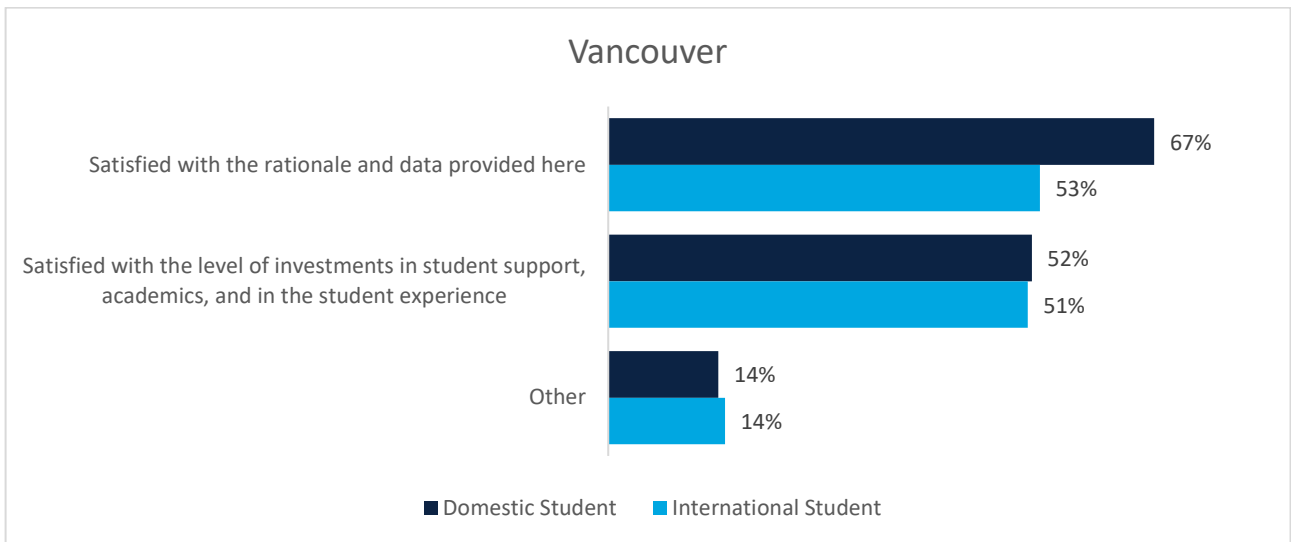

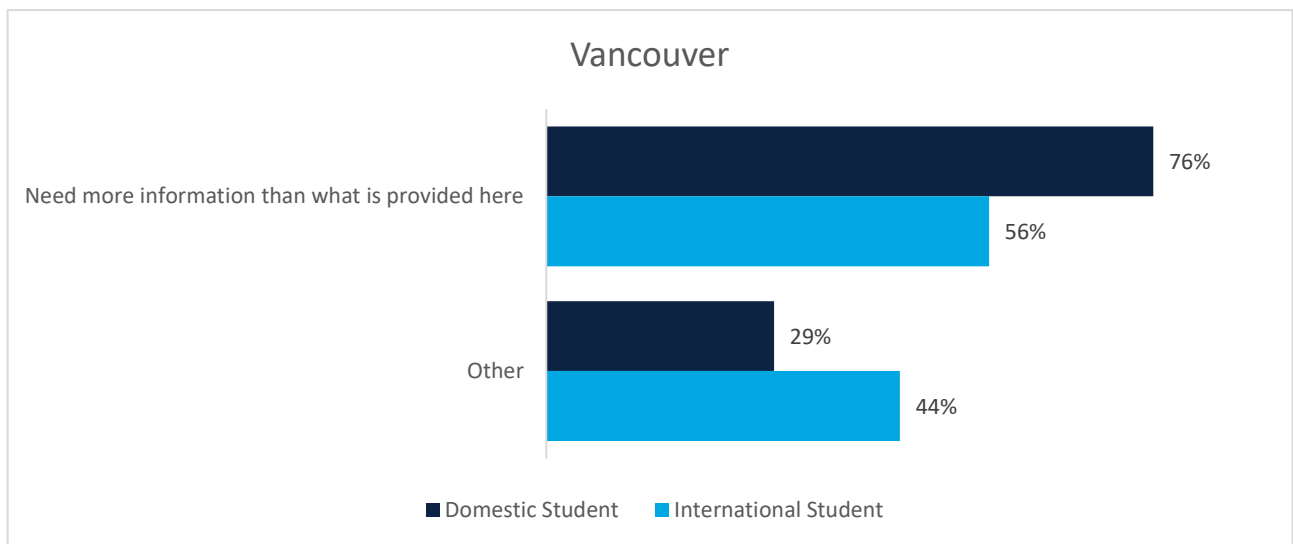

A total of 955 comments were analyzed for this open-ended question. Many of these comments did not directly address the question as presented, but rather reiterated why the respondents were opposed to the proposed tuition increase.

Of the comments received that directly addressed suggestions for improving the tuition engagement process, the most common theme was “student feedback feels irrelevant/is not considered for decision making”. Themes directly related to the question asked containing 10 or more comments are included in the summary table below.
